September 21st—our program will discuss the evolutionary changes at the Sanctuary

Smoky Hills Audubon is pleased to present two speakers for our September program. The uniqueness of the sanctuary and changes currently taking place will be the focus. SHAS has enlisted the help of wildlife biologist Pat Riese and fisheries expert Travis Riley for professional management of the Sanctuary. The two have teamed up to advise the SHAS board on management of the sanctuary.

Wildlife biologist Pat Riese will discuss the needs, challenges, and opportunities

related to wildlife habitat management. Fisheries expert Travis Riley will cover fisheries management of the pond through the use of fish population sampling. Both have acknowledged the complexity of the management of the Sanctuary. SHAS's initial goal was to restore the natural prairie. Past leaders of the Smoky Hills Audubon Society have repeatedly faced the complexity of restoring what once was, with what exists now. Simi-

lar to putting toothpaste back in the tube, some things cannot be easily undone. Native habitats and wildlife species can still be managed for and maintained successfully, but it requires more expertise - rather than good intentions. This meeting will be in room 229 in Kansas Wesleyan's Peters Science Hall. You may come early and meet the speakers at 7:00 with the program beginning at 7:30.

Friends of the River approaching action time!



November 16th come and hear the latest updates about the Smoky Hill River Renewal from the Friends of the River Foundation. The restoration project has taken a long time, but the outcomes are beginning to become

visible, and there is now a timeline for the river to flow once again. Executive Director Jane Anderson has been at the Friends of the River for over eight years. During this time the city sales tax support for the restoration was passed by the voters, the Corps of Engineers has a signed agreement for a study for a river project supported by the

Corps, and a \$22.1 million RAISE Grant was granted to the City of Salina for the Smoky Hill River Restoration.

Jane has a BA from Marymount College in Theatre and English Education, is married to Brad Anderson, has three children and six grandchildren. Jane considers her greatest achievement is that all three of her children love the outdoors, and now her grandchildren are following suit . We've had a wonderful change at the sanctuary this year! Last year, being our second consecutive year with no bluebirds. This year we have had 3 nests with a total of 11 eggs. 10 hatched and 9 fledged successfully. Not sure if this is because we stopped checking the nesting boxes weekly or that 28 large

cottonwood trees were removed from the middle of the prairie. Either way we're so pleased with these results.



We're checking into getting the Northwest prairie burned this fall. Research suggests burning every 3 years so it is time to do this section.

The hope is this will help keep the woodies under control as well as help wildflower seeds germinate. The short vegetation will allow these wildflowers to get sun in the spring to help them get established.

I hope that you are getting excited about our programs this season. Many of them are ones





we have never had before. I received a wonderful list from our collaborative chapter meetings with Dr Jackie Augustine. She is the director of Audubon of

Kansas (AOK). You may have met her when doing a beginner's bird walk, birding by ear at Prairie Days or listening to her talk on Black Footed Ferrets. Not only is she a great resource for our chapter, she is a huge help with keeping the Audubon chapter boards inspired and educated on what's happening throughout the state. We have been meeting by zoom monthly and a yearly in person meeting with the other Audubon chapters in the state. I would recommend that you check them out on the internet.

11/3/23 - 11/5/23 AOK will be sponsoring Celebration of Cranes at the Quivira National Wildlife Refuge in



Stafford Ks. Registration will be at Sterling College with speakers and tours.

Kansas Lek Treks Prairie Chicken Festival in Hays will be 4/11/24-4/14/24. Registration for this fills up fast with visitors coming from throughout the Nation as well as internationally. AOK manages three Sanctuary's, they are Hutton Niobrara Ranch Wildlife Sanctuary near Bassett, NE, Connie Achterberg Wildlife-Friendly Demonstration Farm in Lincoln County and Mount Mitchell Heritage Prairie 1/2 mile east of Wamego, Ks. Did I hear anyone say Road Trip!!

She is also working to get Nature Adventure packs in all the libraries in the state.

These include a backpack with one adult pair of binoculars, two children's pairs of binoculars, guides for identifying birds and butterflies, and a map showing where to find wildlife in the library's county.

They will also get education to link to how to use binoculars and help with bird identification. We do not currently have any in our county, but it is definitely something to look forward to.

DECEMBER 16th **122nd Christmas Bird Count**

This year will mark the 122nd year of conducting the annual Christmas bird count by the National Audubon Society. Started on Christmas day in 1900 this activity has continued every year. The Smoky Hills Audubon Society has conducted an annual count since its local formation in 1976. This year the Christmas Bird Count will begin at 8:00 am at Lakewood Discovery Center with participants, and often members of the news media, reviewing the area to be covered. After the group breaks into 4 teams, they will head out to count every bird they can find. After birding all morning the teams will return to Lakewood Discovery Center to compare notes and head back out for the afternoon. This is a great opportunity to get out and explore every mile of every road in the county's designated 15 mile radius circle. It is a great opportunity to get some fresh air, make friends and see rural parts of the community never before seen. The Christmas bird count is for people of all ages and all experience levels.
