

Travels in the Lowcountry of South Carolina, USA

Wall you be traveling to the Southeast USA soon? Consider stopping in the Beaufort, South pline area. That's Beaufort: pronounced "BEW" as in BEASTREUL. There are other Beauforts oughout the USA and around the world but none as lovely as our "beautiful Beaufort."

unding Beaufort, from Savannah Georgia, north along the coast to Chi South Carolina, is known as the "Lowcountry," Similar in topography to that off the Niethellands, our Lowcountry consists of long fingers of water stretching into the land from the ocean and rivers. The highest hill is 30 feet. This makes for sweeping vistas, coastitines with beach "boneyards" of barren stees, manhes that stretch into the creeks and intern and century old live oak tries: with picturesque Spanish mass dripping from the beanches.

Your first stop, entering Beaufort ursy from the north, is the Old eldon Church Ruins. Undoubtedly e of the most photographed sites in all of South Carolina, this should not be missed. Built in the mid 1700's as a 'chapel of ease' for plantation it was burned during the Ar Revolution, rebuilt, and burne during the Civil War. You d with unique and dram

In town,"The Point" has shunning vintage homes that were not destroyed during the Civil War but is used by Union troops as hospitals and offices. In Springtime, when flowers are abundant, every ne seems to be framed by century old azalnas, jasmine, and camelias.

Also in Spring, bird enthusiasts head to Port Royal, the town adjacent to Beaufort, to photograph at the rookery at the Cypress Werlands. Egents, Hertons, Ibis and Spoonbills next in the trees and ducks and alligators inhabit the wetlands. A boardwalk circles the area. Nearby there is also a working shrimp boat dock on 11th Street that's especially photogenic at sunset.

Alligator Farm Zoological Park, St. Augustine, Florida, USA

Are you looking for a great bird photography opportunity? If so, St. Augustine Alligator Farm Zoological Park in north-east Fiords, USA, is the place to go. As you round the comer to enter the tamous Wading Blad Rookery, sounds and smells awaken your senses. There is non-stop action, Decked in colorful breeding plumage, birds perform elaborate courtship and mating displays. They fly back and forth overhead against an open sig: carryling sticks or fish to feed their chicks Territorial disputes occur and there is beightnessed activity when the issuestion chick are honore.

squawking chicks are hungry.

From mid-Februiny through July the rockery is an amazing place! Hundreds of wild wading birds return each year to build nexts, by eggs, and raise their young. An elevated boardwalk which around a large native swamp filled with alligators. There are leve places where you can experience nature at such door arage. These birds return each year and are obtivious to the thousands of people who come to see them.

The rookery is noisy and densely populated. The akmest count varies from 400-800 nests annually, my species of wading birds roost and breed here. which is a stread of great egents, spoonfalls, and wood storks, colonies start forming in the two large live oak trees. The smaller herors come next anness in folloge about 13 feet off the ground. Last to come are the small snowy and cattle egrets who nage to wedge their tiny nests in the "v" shaped I base of the cabbage palms. On the boardwalk will be shooting at eye level, sometimes so clor

My favorite time to visit is mid-April through May. New birds arrive daily, displaying and nest building continue, and wood stork chicks scream constantly. Chicks range in size from newly hatched to big fuzzy fledglings. The weather is pleasant. For more information:

To got there, connect from a major city such as Boston or Philadelphia to aMaine airport. Hancock County Airport is closest to Acadia, served by small commuter planes. Bangor is about 81 km or an hour's drive. Portland is 286 km, or about a 3-hour drive. Be sure to have a GPS device to guide you to your destination the most direct way.

Bar Harbor and Southwest Harbor have numerous hotels and bed and breakfasts. I prefer cottage tals, available through sites like VRBO or local realtors. On aminal, be sure to stop at the Acadia.

If you have only a day, focus on the Park Loop Road, a 20-mile road, much of which is one-way. Stop at various points along the way such as Jesup Path, Thunder Hole, Otter Cliff, and Bubble Pond. Walk the nature trail at Jerdan Pond. But to truly get the most out of Acadia and Mount Desert Island, plan at least a week's visit.

For sunrise, park at the Gerham Mountains lot on Ocean Drive and walk onto the rocks. Canch Other Cliff Ocean Drive at Sunrise walk onto the rocks. Canch Other Cliff at its bast, or head up to the summit of Cadillac Mountain. For Cadillac, reservations are required between May and October: https://www.recreation.gov/timed-entry/40000

Eagle Lake Carriage Path is my favorite for walks and bicycling. Somesville has my favorite bridge on the island. Southwest Harbor and Bass Harbor feature working lobster boats. Northeast Harbor is home to million dollar yorks and Astrou Gederlers. The Seawell section of Acadia Includes two gentle hilles: Wonderland and Shap's Harbor. Near there is also the iconic Bass Harbor Lighthouse.

There will always be something more that you can photograph on Mount Desert Island. And if you fall in love with the island and its people, you will yearn to return.
