Let's say your child is reading a story, but she can't understand the meaning of a specific word. Rather than look it up in a dictionary, she can try to learn what it means by using the clues in the sentence to work out its meaning. We use these hints to understand the meanings of new or unfamiliar words. For example: My friend from Brazil really suffers from the cold during our Chicago winters. The student needs to work out what suffers means. The context clues are: Brazil is a warm country, so people who live in Brazil are used to a warm climate and not a cold one. We also see the reference to winter – a season that is cold. Some students may even know that winters in Chicago are bitterly cold. The friend must, therefore, feel discomfort and feel it's unpleasant in the cold. [zomivozaredesedef.pdf](#)

The definition of suffer, therefore, is experience discomfort or be subjected to something unpleasant. [30615122892.pdf](#) Utilizing "context clues" is a reading strategy taught to students to help them figure out the meanings or definitions of unknown words. Whenever a student sees an unfamiliar word while reading, they use the other terms in that sentence (or nearby ones) to find clues about the meaning of that particular word. Such clues can be anything from definitions and examples to synonyms and antonyms. Clues can also be extracted from meaningful portions of a word, such as suffixes and prefixes. How Do Context Clues Help? Context clues do more than just help students with their understanding and vocabulary. Using this method enables them to learn multiple ways of finding unknown (as well as difficult but slightly familiar terms) words and gaining a deeper comprehension of the text. For teachers, imparting this skill develops self-sufficiency among their students.

Once they've mastered the "context clues" technique, defining unfamiliar words on their own would become easier. They might even find it a fun activity while devouring the contents of a book! Furthermore, authors can incorporate context clues into their writing in different ways. It's more a case of learning how to understand the hints that a writer provides within a piece of text so that the readers can figure out the intended meaning. Strategies for Reading Following are some useful strategies for using context clues. Word Parts In this approach, the idea is to deconstruct the various parts of a word. These include the base word (also called "root word" or "word stem"), suffixes, and prefixes. Doing so can help deduce the author's intended meaning. Some words only have a suffix, like "reading." Moreover, some terms contain just a prefix, such as "reread," while others have both a suffix and prefix, like "pre-reading." In the same way, some words don't contain any of these portions, such as "read," while a few have a combination, like "unreadableness." Synonym The idea with the synonym approach is that the term next to the unfamiliar word can be used as a clue. Explanation & Definition In this strategy, readers try to look for an explanation or definition of the unknown word within the sentence. Antonyms The antonym method of using context clues suggests that opposite info about an unfamiliar or difficult word can be offset through the use of terms and phrases like "different from," "as opposed to," and "unlike." Example Including examples related to an unknown word can provide vital clues to a reader about its possible meaning. Appositive In this method, readers try to understand the grammatical arrangement of appositives, which can offer definitions, synonyms, and examples. Analogy The analogy technique makes comparisons to help readers determine the meanings of unfamiliar words. Context Clues: Examples Definitions, synonyms, antonyms, and examples can be used as context clues. Consider the sentences below. - Kimberly was lethargic; she had no energy or strength to get out of bed. \*Definition - Dave is a spendthrift, unlike his miserly brother. \*Antonym - The students were crestfallen after finding out that the playground was waterlogged during recess. \*Explanation - Henry felt remorse, or shame, for his bad behavior. \*Synonym Tying It All Together...
