Forward

The North East Community Fair Association takes great pleasure in presenting the 93rd Annual Community Fair. The Fair makes it possible for the residents of North East and its surrounding community to display samples of their work from the previous year and to compete for premiums. It gives all who enter an opportunity for their skills to be compared with the skills of others. The Fair represents over 1000 hours of volunteer labor for planning, setup, operation and tear down plus the work of more than 400 exhibitors and many others who contribute to its displays and activities. The Fair Association extends its gratitude to all who visit, exhibit and otherwise support the Fair. Special thanks go to the administration, teachers and custodial personnel of the North East School District, without whose cooperation the Fair would be impossible. We have replaced our 23-year-old floor covering with a vinyl (and easier to clean) floor covering, made possible in part by a grant from the North East Community Foundation. We continue to update other display equipment and received the donation of a new storage trailer from Mobilia Farms in 2018.

PERTINENT FACTS ABOUT THE NORTH EAST COMMUNITY FAIR

- The first recorded fruit exhibit was held in Gibson Park in 1895.
- The decision to hold an annual Grape Carnival was made in 1909.
- The Fair Association was incorporated on April 1, 1929.
- The North East Community Fair is located in Pennsylvania's primary grape growing region. There are about 11,000 acres of grapes in North East Borough and Township.
- Barbara Adkins was crowned as the first local Grape Queen in 1939.
- Shirley Thomas of Brocton, NY, was the first Grape Belt Queen in 1946.
- Linda Lee Roth of Millcreek, PA, was the first Pennsylvania Grape Queen in 1959.
- The North East Community Fair is a member of and under the direction of the Pennsylvania State Assoc. of County Fairs (PSACF).
- The North East Community Fair is a Class "D" fair and is required to have exhibits on display for three consecutive days with at least six (6) hours of operation each day. Sponsorships and grants have allowed the Fair to enhance educational programming and promotion.

ENTRY FEES & REGISTRATION INFORMATION

EXHIBITOR ENTRY FEES

Each person or organization registering an exhibit will be required to pay an entry fee. Except for some Special Contests and Amateur Wine & Homemade Beer entries, our fees allow an **unlimited number of entries/exhibits per exhibitor** and are based on the ages/grades listed below **regardless** of the age division entered.

Pre-School* through Grade 5 (Div. R, P, I)	- \$1.00
Middle & High School Students (Div. M & H)	- \$2.00
Adults (19 years old and older) (Div. A)	- \$3.00
Wine/Beer Dept. Entries Only - \$1.00 per entry or 6 entries per section (maximum) for \$5.00	

*Most departments limit entrants to those age 5 and above, see department rules.

REGISTRATION TIMES & RULES

A. Registration of Entries

1. Early registration of entries may be made by mail, **postmarked by September 4**, using the form supplied with this fair book. Please contact a Department Chair (see department listings) or an Officer (see page 52) if you have questions. Registration Forms may be duplicated and/or downloaded from the Fair's website: www.NorthEastCommunityFair.org. Early registrations may also be emailed to gerlakeside@aol.com; use the same format as the registration form and paste into the body of your email, use a table from WORD or scan (PDF or jpeg only) the completed form and add it to your email as an attachment.

EARLY REGISTRATION SAVES YOU TIME

Exhibitors who register early may pick up tags and place entries on registration & placement day once their entry fee is paid. No standing in line! However, additional entries must be registered and recorded in the department books. Persons with a large number of entries may pick-up entry tags early. Contact the Registrar at gerlakeside@aol.com or call (814)725-5762.

2. **SINGLE DAY REGISTRATION** Registration and **PLACEMENT** of entries will be made at the North East High School gymnasium only on **Wednesday, September 18, 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.**

3. Special registration instructions for Amateur Wine & Homemade Beer entries may be found in the rules for Department 21. Registration forms for **wine & beer entries** are available at www.NorthEastCommunityFair.org, the Fair's website.

4. **All entries**, with the exception of some in Special Contests, Department 15, Section 6; Dept. 21, Wine & Beer; and Dept. 22, Section 3; must be placed by 7:00 pm on Wednesday, September 18.

5. Not sure how to enter your item? Email gerlakeside@aol.com or call 725-5762.

B. Exhibitors are responsible for the proper and timely registration of their entries in the appropriate categories described in this book. **Improperly or untimely registered entries will not be eligible for judging** or the

award of ribbons or premiums. This includes entering the correct number of specimens. Entries not having the correct number of specimens will be disqualified.

C. With the exception of those in the Pre-School division, exhibitors may make entries in a higher (age group) when no junior division exists (Pre-School, Primary, Intermediate, etc.) If an entry is not identified as a junior entry, it will be judged as a general or adult exhibit. Junior divisions include any youth divisions. **The age and school grade of the exhibitor must be written on the entry tag for all entries in junior divisions and the division must be selected.** Division letters are found on the Registration Form and in the General Rules, page 4, section B.

D. At the time of registration every entry accepted (including those for display only) will be given an entry tag which must be plainly marked with the following information:

1. the exhibitor's number
2. the name (description) identifying the exhibit
3. the "entry code" of the item to be exhibited with the entrant's age division - See General Rules, Section B.
4. the exhibitor's name, address, **telephone number** (necessary for contact & notification issues) and e-mail.
5. the name of the article in "other named article" categories

E. No article may compete as more than one entry; that is, an article can be judged but once. (*Example: a re-upholstered and refinished chair may be entered in the category for "Upholstery" or "Refinished Furniture" but not both*). Only one entry per exhibitor will be accepted in any single category (*Example: an exhibitor may enter tomatoes in both the "Italian" and "Beefsteak" categories under Class 44 - Tomatoes, large-fruited, but may not make two entries in either category*).

GENERAL RULES

C. Entry Codes

All entries have a “code” based on the following

Department – the department number (two digits)

Section – digit or digit and letter preceded by a zero; “01” if no section is specified

Class – two digits

Category (division of class) – upper case letter or letters

Sub-Category – one or two digits

Age Divisions - only needed if entrant is under age 19 or entering in Departments 8, 9, 18, 19.

These codes are used in the entry/judging books, entry tags, and registration forms, see the graphic on the opposite page.

D. Judging & Premiums

1. Judging Policy - It is the policy of the North East Community Fair Association to apply rules that enforce fairness in the judging of entries. All entries are to be “blind-judged,” that is, all marks that would indicate the identity of an entrant are covered before judging takes place. No fair personnel other than the Association’s Judging Coordinator, Director of Special Contests, and Wine & Beer Department Chairs select judges. These persons do not make entries in areas for which they have selected judges. In addition, department workers or chairs DO NOT advise judges during judging except to clarify the criteria already printed in this premium book. Department chairs and workers may, however, enter the departments where they volunteer.

2. Premiums, as listed, will be given for meritorious exhibits. Ribbons will be awarded for the places listed in each class. Judges will award places as they deem worthy; therefore, **not all places in a category may be awarded**. No judging using the “Danish” system is allowed (multiple first, second or third places). Best of Show entries are awarded rosettes but do not receive additional premiums (See Department 22, Section 4.)

3. The decision of the judges shall be final except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is **proved**. In such cases, the Rules Committee will make the decision. The case may be appealed to the Association Board of Directors whose decision cannot be appealed. Department personnel who choose to make entries in the department which they supervise shall not be involved in the selection of judges for that department.

4. During judging, the exhibit hall or exhibition area is to be closed to everyone but fair officials, judges and necessary attendants. (This rule does not apply to those exhibits Department 22, Section 3, or to the judging of Department 21, Wine & Beer, which is open to the public.) No exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with judges during the time of determining awards except to answer questions posed by the judges. All writing, marks

or symbols which might identify the exhibitor must be covered by the exhibitor prior to judging. (Excluded from this regulation are the recipes for entries in Department 15, Section 6 – see contest rules.) Any exhibitor interfering with judges during judging will forfeit any premium or other award to which he/she might otherwise be entitled. Department workers and aides shall not advise judges on the merit of exhibits, but may advise judges regarding the conformity of entries to Fair regulations.

5. Premiums

a. All premium checks will be mailed by the last week of November. Premium checks must be cashed by February 1, 2020.

b. All persons wishing to donate premiums to the Fair must endorse their premium check and write “pay to the order of the North East Community Fair” beneath their endorsement, then return the check to the Fair Treasurer, 9503 Sidehill Rd., North East, PA 16428. The Pennsylvania Fair Fund does not allow the Fair to benefit from uncashed premium checks.

c. No additional premiums will be paid to Best of Show winners by the Fair. Sponsors may provide additional premiums or other prizes.

6. Use of **Fair Theme** in exhibits. The Fair Theme is located on the front cover of this book. The Fair Theme is required or may be used for certain entries in the following departments: Dept. 15, Cake Decorating, Cup Cake Contest; Dept. 17, Floral Arrangements - Niches; Dept. 19, Photography; and Dept. 20, Group Exhibits.

E. Acceptance/Rejection/Removal of Entries

1. Chairpersons of departments reserve the right to reject any entry of inferior quality or of insufficient merit to warrant recognition and may disqualify entries that do not conform to regulations. Fair officials may refuse to accept exhibits which are in poor taste, violate community standards, or are potentially libelous.

2. The Fair management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of exhibit that is in bad or decayed condition as soon as the exhibitor has been notified. (Messages left on answering machines, cell phones or e-mail messages shall be considered notification.) Any article unfit to show may be excluded. All food products except those in Department 15, Section 1, Class 12 must be edible. Food products on display may be treated for the control of insect pests only after consultation with the Fair management. In any case, such treatment must be reported to the Fair management and the exhibitor.

3. If the Fair management has reasonable proof that an exhibit has been entered in a previous year’s fair, then the exhibit will be disqualified. Collections that have been added to since a prior exhibition are excluded from this rule, however the exhibitor should list the additions to

the collection on the back of their entry tag. (Photographs and/or video tapes of exhibits at prior fairs shall be considered reasonable proof.)

4. The Fair management may limit the number of entries in any department or class due to the space available.

5. Upon prior request (must be filed before Sept. 4), the Association may approve entries which do not conform to the classifications in this book. However, such individual entries may only be accepted for display and will not be eligible for the award of ribbons or premiums. All items entered under "Other" or "Miscellaneous" categories in a class must be substantially different from the categories listed under that class. Extra categories or classes that conform to the rules and regulations of existing Fair departments may be added at the discretion of the Fair President, Registration Coordinator, and Department Chairperson if **TWO** or more entries exist for that division or a prior request has been filed.

6. **Number of specimens required.** Where a number of specimens are required for an entry, failure to enter the correct number of specimens will result in **disqualification** of the entry.

F. Release/Donation/Disposition of Entries

1. **No exhibit may be removed before 4 p.m., September 21, 2019.** All exhibits must be claimed before **5 p.m.** on the same date. **The Association is not responsible for unclaimed exhibits which may be sold at the auction.** Exhibitors who cannot conform to this rule should refrain from entering the Fair or **may designate someone to pick up their exhibit(s) at the appropriate time. (Perishable entries in Department 15, Section 6, [Sander's Markets Contest and Favorite Grape Recipe] are excepted from this rule and must be removed following judging.)**

2. Each exhibitor (or their agent) must present his/her Registration Card to a department worker before they are allowed to claim and remove an exhibit.

3. Exhibitors may elect to donate their exhibits for sale at the auction held at **5 pm** on Saturday, Sept. 21. Persons wishing to donate an entry should indicate this when it is registered. Unless exhibitors claim their entries before **5 pm** Saturday, September 21, or request their return in writing, all entries in Department 12 (Hay & Grain), Department 13 (Vegetables), Department 14 (Fruits & Edible Nuts), Department 15 (Home Produced Products), Department 17 (Floral - individual specimens only) and Department 23 (Apiary & Maple Products) will be sold at such auction.

G. Fundraising/Sponsors/Vendors

1. Sponsorships: The North East Community Fair Association accepts sponsorships to help defray Fair costs. Individual departments or sections of departments

may be sponsored. Sponsorship levels are Patron (up to \$49), Bronze Patron (\$50 to \$99); Silver Patron (\$100 to \$249); Gold Patron (\$250 to \$499); Platinum Patron (\$500 and up). In addition patrons will be recognized on the Fair's website. For further information about sponsorships, please contact the Fair Book Editor. To be included in the 2020 Fair Premium Book, sponsorships must be made on or before April 3, 2020.

2. **Basket Raffle:** Donations to the Basket Raffle (normally valued between \$15 and \$40) are accepted through Monday, September 16. Persons age 18 and older may purchase tickets for this auction during the Fair up to the time of drawing on September 22. Persons must make sure that their name and telephone number is legibly written on their entry ticket to receive prizes if they will not be present at the time of the drawing. *Due to the new state regulations for "Small Games of Chance," any winner must provide their name and address at the time their prize is picked up.*

3. Vendors

a. **Outdoor.** A limited number of **outdoor** vendor spaces will be available near the Fair's main entrance. For a nominal fee, the vendor will have access to this space during the Fair and have limited access to electricity (1000 watts maximum). Local non-profit organizations are given a preference when vendor spaces are assigned. Use www.NorthEastCommunityFair.org to access the Fair website and select the vendor tab for further information.

b. **Indoor.** An indoor vendor fair will be held in the High School Gym Lobby on Saturday **ONLY** from 10 am to 5 pm. Please call (814)725-9187 or email NECommFair@gmail.com

1. Limited to producers having less than 3,000 laying birds No eggs may be exhibited from flocks quarantined for avian influenza.

2. Entry shall be one-half dozen eggs of average size for the variety, displayed in open top cardboard or foam containers. Entries showing signs of incubation or are inedible will be disqualified.

3. Eggs will be judged on uniformity of size/weight, shape and color; cleanliness; shell texture and condition and interior quality (40%). Judges have the right to break two eggs for examination.

4. Eggs will be displayed in a non-refrigerated case. No entries will be sold at auction. Entries not picked up by 5 pm on Saturday will be discarded.

Health Regulations:

1. All entrants exhibiting animals **must sign** the line on page 2 of the registration form regarding the VCPR- "Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship". No other

VCPR forms are required. More information about the rule may be found on our website (see front cover) under the "Registration" tab.

2. Rabbits will be screened on arrival for health and show condition. No rabbits showing signs of contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to the Fair.

3. The Department Chairperson will have the final judgment in resolving any dispute.

General Exhibition Rules:

1. All rabbits are to be judged according to the latest standard of perfection of the American Rabbit Breeders Association.

2. Rabbit pens must be cleaned daily by the exhibitor.

3. Exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering their rabbit(s) daily.

4. Access to rabbit pens will only be guaranteed during published Fair hours.

5. Rabbits will not be released until 4 pm on Saturday, unless signs of disease are found; then the rabbit must be removed as soon as possible.

6. Any violation of the above rules may result in forfeiture of any and all premiums and awards.

7. Other classes may be added at the discretion of the Department Chair if two or more entries per breed exist. The Fair reserves the right to limit entries in this department due to space and pen availability. (Twelve pens are available on a first-come, first-served basis. These pens must be reserved by calling 725-9187 before September 4, 2019.)

1. Read General Rules, follow all rules and regulations.
2. One pint glass jars with lids must be used to show grain in Classes 1, 2, 7-9, 11-13.
3. **EXHIBITS WILL BE DISQUALIFIED** if the correct number of specimens is not displayed.
4. Grains grown since the close of the previous year's Fair (Sept. 22, 2018); winter wheat, etc. may be entered.
5. Paper plates will be supplied where needed.

1. All fair rules and regulations are in place at all times. To be eligible to submit a craft beer to the North East Community Fair, the following criteria must be met.

- a. Any beer submitted must have been brewed and bottled with a volume of **10 gallons** or less finished product (beer).
- b. Open to Pennsylvania residents only.
- c. Beer must have been bottled on or after **January 1** of the current year.

2. Registration forms (Homemade Beer Registration Form) must accompany all beer being entered into the Fair. Beer may be registered by mail to NECF Beer Registration, P.O. Box 373, North East, PA, or by delivering the entry/ies to Presque Isle Wine Cellars. Entry codes follow descriptions in brackets [].

3. Judging

- a. Entries are limited to one per category per exhibitor. All beer must be submitted in twelve- (12) or sixteen- (16) ounce brown, green or clear bottles with pressed-on caps (no reusable, re-sealable caps permitted). Two (2) bottles are required for each entry.
- b. All beer will be evaluated by experienced judges. A rating sheet will be available for each entrant following the judging.

4. **Definitions**

- a. Ale – Ale beers are defined as beer brewed with malts, hops and using ale (top fermenting) yeast.
 - (1) Belgian – Belgian beers include Abbey and Trappist beers, Saisons, Lambics and White Biers.
 - (2) Wheat – Wheat beers include Hefe-weizens, Dunkle-weizens and Bocks.
 - (3) English – English beers include the Barley Wine and Bitters varieties along with pale ales (and IPA's).
 - (4) Dark Ales – Dark Ale's include Stouts, Porters and Brown Ales.
 - (5) Scotch – Scotch Ale's include all styles of Scotch and Scottish Ales.

(6) Other Ale– All other beers brewed with ale yeast.

b. Lager - Lager beers are defined as beer brewed with malts, hops and using lager (bottom fermenting) yeast.

(1) General German – General German beers include Bock's, Doppelbocks, German Helles and Munich-Style Dunkels.

(2) German Pilsner – German Pilsners include German style pilsners, Oktoberfests and Rauchbier's.

(3) Other Pilsner – Other Pilsner's include Czech and Bohemian Pilsner's.

(4) Other Lager– All other beers brewed with lager yeast.

c. Specialty / Mixed Styles – Specialty and mixed style beers include beers brewed from fruits or other non-grains.

(1) Ciders – Cider is an alcoholic beverage made from apples.

(2) Meads – Meads are defined as alcoholic beverages made from honey.

(3) Other – All other specialty or mixed style brew.
