
Simple and Cheap Brine Shrimp Hatchery

 If your breeding your fish, newly hatched Brine Shrimp are one of the best foods to feed fry. Now you can buy yourself a hatchery on line from maybe Amazon or build one. I built this one pretty simply, mostly from stuff I had in my fish room.



I had an older 10 gallon tank that I wasn't using, so I set it up on one of my tanks benches. Filled it up and put an old in tank filter in it to circulate the water. You have to keep the water at 30 C so water circulation is important. I had an old 100W heater that wasn't reliable anymore for heating tanks with fish in them. I put it in to keep the water warm. Next I needed containers to actually hatch the brine shrimp in. So I went to the dollar store and for around \$6, I got 5 containers 1 Ltr in size with caps. They are actually drink cups and they work perfectly.



Next, I needed a way to suspend the cups in the tank. I took and old piece of plywood and cut it to the size I needed. I then cut some holes to put the cups through.



Next I put a small air pump at the tank and ran it into a valve assembly that I had kicking around. I ran 4 air lines to the tank, one for each cup. You need to have water circulating in the cup to help hatch the shrimp.

Next, the most important part which is the salt water mixture the eggs are put in. You can get your salt water 2 ways. You can buy salt water at a shop like Big Al's or mix your own. I mix my own. I buy aquarium salt off Amazon. It is the cheaper way in the long run.



In order to make sure you have the right concentration of salt you will need to pick up a simple tool, a Salinity Refractometer. Its \$23 on Amazon and you will use it a lot mixing your salt water.



In order to get the salinity you put a couple of drops of your mixed salt water on the slide part of the meter. Hold it to the light and read your salinity. Your Salt content needs to be between 25-30 ppt. It's really easy to read the meter. If the content is too low, increase the amount of salt in your mix. If it's too much, dilute it down with just plain water.

When you get the mix right it's time to put the eggs in the mix. I use Artemia Cysts Off Amazon. The particular brand I use has a high 95% hatch rate. These come





You don't put a massive amount into the 1 ltr container. It's about half a teaspoon.

Too much and you actually will get a smaller hatch. Trust me I know from experience!



Put the container in the tank with a cap on it and the air bubbling at a good rate. Leave it for 24 hrs and then if your temp held at right level, you can harvest the shrimp. To harvest, I use a turkey baster to suck up the hatched shrimp. Some people use a siphon, I find the baster better. To aid in the harvest, put a strong light near the container. The shrimp are drawn to the light and are easier to collect.






I collect the shrimp into a cloth. The cloth is then washed into a cup.









Once the shrimp are in the cup, you can feed them too your fish. I feed, guppy fry, my breeding guppy pairs, tetra's, barbs and even some small convict cichlids. I run around 20 tanks and I'm adding tanks every month.



















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
