

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

## Breeding Cyphotilapia frontosa (sort of)

**Let's begin with a disclaimer**: If you choose to read this article in the hope that it may help you become more successful at breeding your frontosa you may be disappointed. Note the (sort of) in the title.

The ichthyologists are now renaming different populations of these fish so I should point out that ours are Cyphotilapia frontosa 'Burundi' (6 bars). 'Burundi' is the location, actually the country, that owns the north eastern section of Lake Tanganyika where these fish were originally discovered and are still common. They grow quite large, (especially the males) to a foot or more and are said to inhabit deep water, (up to 50 meters), and to stalk their prey nocturnally or at least in the dim light of early morning. We found ours to be rather slow and deceptively calm and peaceful. I say 'deceptively' because, when startled they can and did move like bullets.

Our adventure, or misadventure with these handsome fish began some years ago at one of the yearly auctions put on by a CAOAC member club – sorry, I can't remember which one. A bag of 4 good looking little 'Fronts" came up and I made a modest bid to get things started. To my surprise, no one else seemed interested and they went home with us. Auctions are strange and wonderful – I had seen these fish about the same size in pet stores for around \$25.00 each.

As fortune would have it we had a 50 gallon rift lake set up with 3 Synodontis multipunctatus and some left over mbunas that could be moved out. They had bred but the Multipuncts had repeatedly failed to do their famous Cuckoo thing. I was 90 percent sure, (now 100%), that they were all males which makes any kind of breeding more than difficult. The tank has external and

undergravel filtration plus lots of broken clay pots for caves and the little 'Hump heads' soon seemed comfortable. At water change times, a bit of Rift Lake cichlid salt was added to keep things appropriately alkaline.

Years passed and they all grew but two of them grew much larger and developed those characteristic humps on their foreheads. At least one of them should have gone to auction but I procrastinated. There was no evidence of breeding activity but one of the large males began to show signs of physical damage and



the other hid most of the time and became startled sometimes for no apparent reason. He'd suddenly hit the lid or the walls of the tank with great force. I moved the damaged large male to his own tank and hoped things would settle down. They didn't. One of the smaller ones started to show some wear and tear. At this time we noticed that it too was beginning to develop a gibbosity. Some luck – three males and only one 'possible' female. I moved the smaller male out.

I began to notice that the 'female' would approach the lumps of homemade food and then stop, turn away and return to her hiding place. I wondered if she was sick or, perhaps, incubating, eggs. There was no perceptible swelling of her lower jaw so I just awaited developments. What seemed like a long time later, (these frontosas are mouth brooders and they incubate the eggs and fry for 30 days or more), I spotted a little one dashing from one pot to another nearby. We carefully removed all the caves and discovered the grand sum of 3 baby Fronts. No wonder her jaw wasn't noticeably distended. We moved the little guys to their own ten gallon and reset the tank to await further developments.

Unfortunately the first development was that one morning I found the male dried up and dead on the floor. Something must have startled him during the night and he obviously hit the lid hard enough to lift it out of his way. One down. We put the smaller male who had been growing pretty rapidly in his own tank, back with what we now knew was a female. He never got as big as the other males but he did put on some size and more male hump. He also started to hide most of the time and to be easily startled.

The female began again to reluctantly refuse food so we captured her and put her in a ten gallon tank of her own. So to make a long story shorter, after what seemed like an eternity, she released 11 baby Fronts. I decided to leave her with them for awhile so she could recover and get properly nourished. Big mistake! She stopped eating

no matter what I tried to tempt her with and she died.

We were now left with 14 young and 2 surplus males. That situation soon changed when the smaller male followed his brother's example and committed suicide on the floor. The other larger male had been placed in an out of the way corner tank where he wasn't easy to observe. I found him dead in the tank. I did say 'misadventure'. All down, except the babies which have been doing fine. Six of them have gone to auction and the remaining 8, some of which you can see in the picture, are about ready to be placed in the big tank. With any luck there should be more than one female this time around.





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
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## Girardinus microdactylus by Dave Furness

**This** peaceful little livebearer is found in the southern drainage system of the Sierra de Los Organos, Pinar del Rio, Cuba. They live in slow flowing and rapid flowing waters in areas with a lot of vegetation. The temperature in these streams can vary from below 75 degrees F to above 86 degrees f.. The PH of the waters where they are found was around 7.7.

In appearance, they have an elongated body and a pointed head. The colour is a light brown with black vertical stripes on their sides. There is a black spot at the base of the dorsal fin, plus the first two rays of the dorsal, may seem black as well.

I picked these fish up at the Brant Aquarium club, when I visited them with three friends from the St.Catharines club. These, new to the hobby specimens, were introduced to the Brant auction by Brian Glazier. Thank you Brian for bringing the different livebearer species to our clubs. It is greatly appreciated.

When I got the fish home, I placed them in a 15 gallon tank with some Java moss and some floating plants for cover. I filtered the tank with a box filter and set the temperature to 76 degree F. The PH was 7.4. With the higher temperatures, I made sure that the water is well agitated to keep to keep the oxygen level higher.

The parents were fed a variety of foods such as frozen blood worms, flakes, and micro worms. The gestation period is about 25 days. I could not find any information on them about how many fry they have usually, but, if they are like some of the other Girardinus; they may have between 10 to 40 fry. Mine where only giving me from 3 to 5 fry at a time, so it took me a little longer to get the required count for a BAP certificate.



**The** fry were fed crushed flakes, powdered dried shrimp and micro worms. The fry should be sexually mature in about 3 to 4 months.

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
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
