Girardinus falcatus

The Goldbelly topminnow -

This peaceful little livebearer is found in central and western Cuba, as well as the Isle of Pine. They live in slow flowing and rapid flowing waters in areas with a lot of vegetation. The temperature in these streams can vary, from below 75 degrees to above 86 degrees F. between 75 and 86 degrees is probably the norm. The PH of the waters where they are found was about 7.7.

The fish are long and slender with a brown-yellow colour. The belly is light. The fins are transparent, and the caudal fin has a light black pattern.

When I got my fish home, I placed them in a 15 gallon tank with some Java moss and some floating artificial plants for protection. I filtered the tank with a box filter and set the temperature to 76 degrees F. The PH is 7.4 .With higher temperatures I made sure that the water was well agitated, to keep the oxygen level higher.

The parents were fed a variety of foods, such as frozen foods, flakes and micro worms as well. The gestation period is about 25 days, and they give birth from about 10 to 40 fry. The fry are fed crushed flakes, powered shrimp, and micro worms. The fry become sexually mature in about four months.

Xiphophorus alvarezi

The Upland Sword -

This species was named in honour of Professor Jose Alvarez del Villar. This species, for which he is named, is found in the highland drainage basin of the Estado Chiapas, Mexico, as well as in Huehuetenango, El Quiche, and Alta Veracruz, Guatemala.

X. alvarezi is very similar to X. Helleri. Xiphophorus Alvarezi's dorsal fin has 11 to 12 rays, and the lateral line has 26 to 29 scales, and has 28 vertebrae. Xiphophorus helleri's dorsal fin has12 to 15 rays, the lateral line has 26 to 28 scales, and has 27 to 30 vertebrae.

The Alvarezi males attain a body length of 5 to 6 cm, plus the sword of 3 to 4 cm. The females attain a length of 6 to 7.5 cm. Both male and female have at least two, or even more longitudinal stripes on the middle of their flanks. Below these stripes the body is bright turquoise. The dorsal fin has broad red spots. The yellow sword is edged with black, top and bottom.

I set my pair up in a 15 gallon tank with dense vegetation for the female, and the fry to hide in. The aquarium was filtered with a box filter, and the temperature of the tank was around 77 degrees F. I kept the water well agitated, and made water changes once or twice a week. They prefer live foods, but will accept frozen foods and flake foods, particularly those containing vegetable matter. After the fish have successfully spawned, fry will be born after a 24 to 30 day gestation period. Normally 20 to 80 young are born. Of course this depends on the age and the size, and how well conditioned the female is. They usually reach sexual maturity after about eight to twelve months.

After the fry are born, I usually start them off with some crushed flakes. After a week or two, I add some micro worms to their diet.

Xiphophorus Montezuma

Montezuma sword -

This attractive swordtail's name is based on the last leader of the Aztecs, Montezuma the second. The range of the species include rivers in the Mexican state of San Luis Potosi, of the Rio Panuco drainage area. The water is furnished with aquatic plant growth and has a water temperature of 22 to 24 degrees C.. The water in your aquarium should be well agitated and should have weekly water changes.

This fish reaches a body length of 4 to 6 cm. The sword on the males vary in size, but are a great deal longer on this species, compared to other sword varieties. The sword of the male is longer than the body and can reach 8 to 10 cm. The colour of the sword is turquoise, and edged in black. The lower border is broader than the upper one. There are black spots, and spot patterns below the middle body line, which is different from one individual to another. The dorsal fin of the male has a dark border along the upper edge, and spotted in the middle. Most males posses a black caudal peduncle and a caudal fin that is black in the lower third.

The females of this species can reach a length of 5 to 6 cm. The body colour is brown with a medium brown middle line. The belly is light. The side of the body has a turquoise tinge to it. This colour is stronger in the males than the females.

When I brought these fish home with me, I put them in a 15 gallon tank, planted with Java moss on the bottom and duct weed as my floating plant. The water temperature of the tank is 76 degrees F, and the PH is 7.4 .The aquarium is filtered by a box filter. The fish were fed flakes daily along with micro worms. When the fry had arrived, I added a few artificial floating plants for extra protection, and fed the fry the same as the adults. They also fed on bacteria in the tank.

THE ST. CATHARINES & AREA AQUARIUM SOCIETY JAR SHOW RULES

- 1. The monthly jar show will consist of three separate classes:
 - (a) Fish of the Month (found in the SCAT each month)
 - (b) Open Class
 - (c) Junior Class (16 yrs. of age and under]
- 2. All members entering FISH OF THE MONTH may be Senior or Junior with no distinction. If a Junior is awarded points, these points go to his/her Junior total points.
 - (a) Standard C.A.O.A.C. approved 1 gallon show tanks should be used, but square-faced jars will be accepted.
 - (b) Drum bowls are permitted for Bettas and Guppies. No round jars are permitted. If fish is too large, an aquarium of up to 20 gallons may be used.
- 3. The Jar Show Chairperson will have complete control of all entries, disqualifying sick or injured fish, etc..
- 4. No plants, gravel, ornamentation, artificial colouring or medication of any kind will be allowed. Solid coloured paper backing outside of tanks is permissible.
- 5. (a) Members may enter a total of three (3) entries each month. Visitors may show fish on their first and/or second visit but must take membership in order to make any subsequent showings.

(b) A family membership consists of a couple (and their children if any).A family entering monthly jar shows is only allowed to enter a total of three(3) fish as a family holding a family membership. These entries must come under individual point scoring as a Junior or Senior.

- 6. All entries for the Jar Show must be single fish only.
- 7. The decision of the judge/s is final. Judge/s will be available for comment at the close of the meeting.

A new leaf formed on the *Anubias hastifolia*, and another flower stalk emerged from the *Sagittaria sagitifolia*. I thinned the duckweed (*Lemna minor*) during Week 36. So all-in-all, the plants continue to do well.

However, I have been experiencing problems with the suction cups that keep the rainmaker suspended. While the rainmaker continues to work, I find that once every couple of days the suction cups let go on one end or the other, resulting in the tubes sagging a bit. I haven't figured out a solution, and may end up replacing the suction cups.
