Oregonians for Fair Elections

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Three Laws designed to stop Accountability

1. Relax voter registration laws: Motor Voter expanded to Automatic Voter Registration.
2. Relax accountability of in person voting: Vote by Mail. Minimal examination of signatures.
3. Relax ballot custody laws, allow collection of ballots by anyone, thus legalizing “Ballot Harvesting.”



Voter Registration Statutes say to register a person who attempts to register if at all possible.

Oregon and US Constitution require citizenship to vote. Yet Oregon Revised Statutes 247.012 says

"...Except as provided in ORS 247.124, if a registration card is legible, accurate and contains, at a minimum, the registrant's name, registrant's address, date of birth and signatures, the county clerk shall register the person."



Voter Registration

Motor Voter: Oregon Added Automatic Voter Registration in 2015

Have you heard of anyone having problems with their voter registration since that time?

If they don't qualify to be automatically registered via AVR they can still be registered via a paper application.

- 5) Public employees or their family members who do not submit a residence address to DMV pursuant to ORS 802.250.
- 6) Anyone categorized by DMV as a "continuous traveler" (see Glossary on [page 14](#) for definition).
- 7) Individuals who do not provide an electronic signature to DMV.

A signature from a guardian who signs for another individual is not a valid electronic signature for the purposes of voter registration. However, individuals who provide guardian signatures may receive Oregon Motor Voter Mailers. County elections officials will not register those individuals through the Oregon Motor Voter Process.

Individuals who do not initiate the Oregon Motor Voter process may still register if they meet the qualifications (a U.S. Citizen, at least 16 years old, and an Oregon resident) by visiting oregonvotes.gov/myvote or completing and returning a paper voter registration card.

I was able to pull some quick counts.

Individuals who are marked as not having provided a valid driver's license number or social security number when they registered:

Active – 2,609
Inactive – 6,371

These records are marked as **HAVA** (provisional) and eligible for a provisional federal ballot unless the voter is able to provide proof of identify with current photo identification and another document that would verify their name and address, matching the information listed on the voter's registration.

Dear Voter:

Washington County Elections has received your voter registration. We have registered you for local and state elections. However, we are unable to complete your registration for federal elections because identification information required under federal law was not included with your registration application. You must provide the required identification information. **Until you have provided this required information, your votes on federal offices, including President of the United States will not be counted.**

You may submit a new registration form including the required information. We have enclosed a new form for your convenience.

The federal **Help America Vote Act of 2002** now requires individuals registering to vote in federal elections to provide the following identifying information with their registration application:

1. If you have a current, valid **Oregon DMV Driver's License or ID Number**, you must provide that number (a Learner's Permit is considered a License/ID).
2. If you do not have a current, valid Oregon DMV Driver's License/ID, you must check the appropriate box on the registration form and provide the last four digits of your **Social Security number**. Your name and date of birth must match your SSN exactly.
3. If you do not have a current, valid Oregon DMV Driver's License/ID or a Social Security number, you must check the appropriate box on the registration form and provide a **copy of one of the following**:
 - A current and valid photo identification **that shows your name**. If an expiration date is provided on the photo identification that identification must not have expired; **or**
 - A current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other US government document **that shows your name and address**. The address must match the residence or mailing address submitted on your voter registration card.

This identification must be received in order to complete your registration for the next Federal Election (an election in which a federal candidate is nominated or elected).

You may provide this identification with your new registration form by mail or in person at your county elections office.

Registering and requesting your absentee ballot

Under federal law, the Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) registers you to vote and requests absentee ballots for a minimum of all federal elections in the current calendar year. Be sure to complete a new FPCA each year and every time your address changes.

Complete the following sections of the FPCA

Section 1

Select the category that best describes you.

Enter your current name (Last, First). If you are registered under a different name, provide this information in the previous name area.

Your date of birth is required.

You must provide a State issued ID number. If you do not have a State issued ID number, provide the last four digits of your Social Security Number. If you do not have either of these numbers, you must enter in Section 6: "I do not have a State issued ID or Social Security Number".

Section 2

Enter the complete street address of your voting residence where you are registering to vote and requesting an absentee ballot. You cannot use a post office box mailing address. If your address is a rural route, use Section 6 to describe the location of your voting residence.

Section 3

Enter your current mailing address, even if you are requesting your ballot by email/online or fax. If you want your election materials sent to a different address or have a forwarding address, use the forwarding address space to provide this information.

Section 4

Your contact information is recommended so your election official can contact you if they need additional information from you in order to accept your FPCA. If you want to receive your absentee ballot by email/online or fax, you must provide your email address or fax number.

Section 5

You can receive your absentee ballot by mail, email/online or fax. Select your preferred method of receiving your absentee ballot.

To vote in a primary election for a major party, you must enter the name of the party ballot you want to receive. If you do not indicate a political party, you will receive a nonpartisan ballot. Political party affiliation is not required if requesting an absentee ballot for general elections.

Section 6

Provide any information that may assist your election official in accepting this form. You can use this space to designate particular elections or the period you wish to receive ballots.

Section 7

Sign and date. No witness signature required.

2 provide proof of legal presence in the United States when applying for a limited term iden-
3 tification card, a limited term driver license or a limited term driver permit if:

4 (a) The Department of Transportation previously issued a limited term identification
5 card, a limited term driver license or a limited term driver permit to the applicant;

6 (b) The applicant presents to the department an Employment Authorization Document
7 issued by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services under category C33, A12
8 or C19; and

9 (c) The applicant's Employment Authorization Document expired on or after August 1,


2006 6,000 dead people found on the voter rolls. 900 plus more found in 2012

VIII.C Voter registration

3/2/2017

A. Overview

The National Voter Registration Act (NVRA) of 1993 requires agencies which provide public assistance or services to persons with disabilities to also provide voter registration opportunities. All Department of Human Services (DHS) programs are required to comply with NVRA requirements as well as partner agencies such as Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) and the Oregon Health Authority (OHA).

- DHS and AAA staff is required to assist any person who asks for help with completing voter registration forms.

5. Mailing in completed registration forms

The obligation of DHS and AAA is to provide appropriate voter registration forms and send all completed forms to the local County Elections office.

Review all forms for completeness, and advise the registrant if they have missed any sections.

- Date stamp each completed voter registration form the same day it is received;
- The date stamp cannot include an agency or division name; the stamp must display the date only;
- Add the date stamp to the right of the bar code:
- If the form is not complete and the registrant is not available, send the incomplete form to the County Election office for processing;
- If the registrant does not have either an Oregon driver's license, permit, or ID number, or a Social Security number (question 4 on the registration form), make a copy of the identification they are using and attach it to the registration form;
- Do not accept out of state identification;
- Options for identification are listed on the voter registration form, [SEL 503](#), *Voter Registration Card with Declination*.

If the consumer completed a voter registration form but does not live in the local office county, send the card to the local County Elections office to be forwarded.

The Election office will determine if the registrant is eligible; staff is not allowed to advise on potential eligibility.

Dear Sir or Madam,

I am a resident of Oregon and Chief Petitioner for Initiative Petition No. 5, which seeks to amend the Oregon Constitution to provide proof of citizenship before allowing registration to vote. I am also the Chair of the Multnomah County Republican Party, which has supported this Petition, and is generally interested in the subject of illegal alien voting.

Upon learning that Syracuse University's Transactions Records Access Clearhouse reported that ICE had referred criminal actions in the District of Oregon for violation of 8 U.S.C. § 1326 (re-entry of deported alien), resulting in ninety-five criminal actions in the District of Oregon during FY 2017, I sought the identity of the ninety-five criminal defendants through production of the referral documents.

I did this because it is well established that under the U.S. Constitution, it is a "universal requirement of our federal and state governments that criminal trials be public". *Richmond Newspapers v. Va.*, 448 U.S. 555, 591 (1980). For this reason, the identity of these criminal defendants must be released to the public.

Nor do the provisions of federal law ICE has invoked bar release of the records. It is particularly obnoxious that the request was denied on the basis of 5 U.S.C. § 552a, when the "individuals" protected by this law are specifically defined as "a citizen of the United States or an alien lawfully admitted for permanent residence". 5 U.S.C. § 552a(2). By definition, these are not aliens lawfully admitted.

Nor are we seeking "third party records," as ICE prepared the referrals, which had to contain the identity of the proposed criminal defendants. Frankly, now that I see that § 552a does not protect illegal aliens, I would like to request *all* the referrals for FY 2017, not just the ones that resulted in public prosecutions.

My preference is to receive the above listed information electronically.



This information is not being sought for commercial purposes.

I would request a prompt response to this request. If you expect a significant delay in responding to or in fulfilling this request, please contact me with information about when I might expect copies or the ability to inspect the requested records.

If you deny any or all of this request, please cite each specific exemption for each denial you feel justifies the refusal to release the information and notify me of the appeal procedures available to me under the law.

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Prohibits public body from disclosing specified information concerning person unless required by state or federal law. Prohibits public body from inquiring concerning person's citizenship or immigration status except as required by state or federal law or when determining benefit eligibility.

Authorizes public body to decline to disclose information concerning person's citizenship or immigration status except as required by state or federal law or in certain other circumstances.

Directs Attorney General to publish model policies for public bodies intended to limit, in manner consistent with state and federal law, immigration enforcement in public facilities.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.



No address is required for residency.

Oregon allows anyone to register without a residence.
You only have to think of Oregon as your home to qualify.

Oregon Legislators passed a law ORS247.035-038 :

(a) The person's residence shall be the place in which habitation is fixed and to which, when the person is absent, the person intends to return.

(a) The residence address of a person who is homeless or resides in a shelter, park, motor home, marina or other identifiable location may be any place within the county describing the physical location of the person



Vote by Mail

Least Accountability and most vulnerable to fraud election system.

Ballots are everywhere, making accountability unrealistic. You can see this at the local Post Office trash can, when ballots are first delivered.

Signature examination is very limited, with artwork smiley faces allowed as signatures.



Ballot Harvesting

Allowing anyone to pick up voters ballot is Ballot Harvesting.

97 ballots turned in late in Multnomah County gave evidence that ballots harvesting was in full swing in Multnomah County.
