
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
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Fractured Tears: A Struggle for Justice Expanded Version

This is a fictionalized version of the real-life events of the Author.



Author SpotlightMichael Forester

Some are born with silver spoons in their mouths. Michael Forester was born with a pen in his hand. He writes at the fulcrum of perceived reality – that place where our certainties are challenged, where we encounter what we did not know that we knew.

His works range from the inspirational and provocative *Forest Rain* to the book-length metaphorical epic fantasy poem, *Dragonsong*; from his exploration of our endangered planet in the travelogue *One Journey*, to the ever-popular story of his first year with his hearing dog, *If It Wasn't For That Dog*.

Readers from all over the world follow Michael's books – from Australia to the USA, from the Philippines to Wales. A profoundly deaf full-time author and public speaker, Michael lives in the UK between the southern edge of the New Forest and the sea. From here he travels the UK and internationally for public speaking engagements and to sign his books for readers.

Michael's own life journey has taken him from formative years in charismatic Christianity, through a miraculously-survived suicide attempt and into a spiritual awakening; through the onset of profound deafness to the life-changing arrival of a hearing dog; from the Amazon rain forest to South Africa, from the Himalayas to the Philippines and beyond.














Ed Borowsky's Lizard of Transition

On his deathbed, a World War Two veteran, Joe Rubin, confesses to his son that he murdered a Japanese prisoner in the jungles of New Guinea seventy years ago. In his last hours, Joe enters the world between life and death, known as the world of transition. He tells of his journey, with an odd lizard leading the way, as he recants the tale of the murder prior to his imminent death.

He reveals to his son, Joshua, that he possesses a Good Luck flag - Hinomaru Yosegaki, that he had taken from the Japanese soldier he murdered on the island of New Guinea during the battle of the Druinimor River. The flag has handwritten messages from the prisoner's family and friends, which reveals his identity and the village in Japan he came from.

His son, Joshua, is under tremendous pressure. He's separated from his wife, who comes to visit her father-in-law, bringing the two together to face their problems under the gut-wrenching veil of his father's passing. By attempting to reunite the flag with the son of the soldier his father killed seventy years ago, will the family find their way forward?

From the wisdom of the ages, and from the Jewish perspective on death and redemption, "Lizard of Transition" shines a light on how understanding death and dying will lead us to live rich and fuller lives.

Literate-Ly Magazine: In three words, describe yourself.

Yvonne DeSousa: Memoirist Humorist Sentimentalist

Literate-Ly Magazine: How many books have you written? How many of those are published?

Yvonne DeSousa: I have two books, and both are published. The first, MS Madness! A "Giggle More, Cry Less" Story of Multiple Sclerosis, was self-published in 2014 and details the year following my diagnosis of multiple sclerosis and how I used humor to survive it. The second book, Shelter of the Monument: A Provincetown Love Story, was just published this past November by Black Rose Writing. It is a coming-of-age memoir about first love, loss, addiction and finding one's inner voice, all set in a beautifully unique small town.


Literate-Ly Magazine: How much research did you do, and how long did it take before you even started writing?

Yvonne DeSousa: Both books are from my actual life, so I didn't really need to do any research at all- yay!! Readers might wonder if I researched multiple sclerosis before I wrote about it in my first book, but I purposely didn't. There are many books available that can inform readers



about the science, facts, treatment, symptoms, and circumstances of MS. I wanted my book to be lighthearted and not designed to provide accurate information at all. It had the goal of taking actual experiences from my new MS life that year and then using my twisted sense of humor to make fun of the bully that was this chronic illness. When I felt I needed to explain something MS wise, I used my own raw knowledge and exaggeration skills to describe it.

For example, I did need to explain how MS was affecting my body and so I described the disease as a vicious game of Pacman where a horrid version of my immune system was zooming around my nerve endings taking random chomps of out of them. That description isn't totally accurate, and it is definitely not scientific. But it isn't outright wrong either and no research was needed!



Literate-Ly Magazine: What is the title of your last published book? What's the title and when was it published?

Yvonne DeSousa: **Shelter of the Monument: A Provincetown Love Story** was released on 11/16/24.

Literate-Ly Magazine: In regard to research, how did you do your research? Did you interview experts, online research, or in a library etc...?

Yvonne DeSousa: Since no research was needed, I was off the hook in that way. I did spend hours of quiet time in two different libraries editing and investigating publishers.

Both of those tasks were harder for me than writing the books themselves and I needed to be locked in somewhere without distraction to focus. One library had a quiet study room that worked perfectly and the other had tables on its third floor that overlooked Provincetown harbor, the setting of the book. That was the exact focus I needed.

Literate-Ly Magazine: What made you decide to write your past book, what inspired you?

Yvonne DeSousa: A random memory came to me that was related to something else I was trying to write. This memory was just hanging around in my head, not letting me complete the writing I actually needed to do. To try to get it out of my head, I scribbled it out. Then I took it to my writing group who were intrigued and encouraged me to pursue the story more. At first, I balked, not thinking it was a story important enough to share. But then other memories came flooding back to me regarding this relationship and I realized I desperately needed to share this with others. I wanted as many people as possible to know the great gift this unusual coupling provided.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Without quoting your back cover blurb, tell me about the last book you published.

Yvonne DeSousa: When I was 17, I was beyond insecure and shy. But I loved my life as it was and where I grew up. There was nothing and nowhere else I wanted to be. Yet I was being pushed into something more. Then the timid me met an older, handsome man and despite our relationship not

making any sense, we clicked, fell in love, broke up, came together again, and built a lifelong connection. That connection helped me to learn to believe in myself. Despite how my first love helped me, I was unable to help him defeat the demons of addiction that consumed him. Yet we tried, amidst a small-town that harbored us as well as it harbored many diverse communities. My coming-of-age memoir details the highs and lows of our unusual relationship.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Tell me something about yourself that is separate from writing.

Yvonne DeSousa: I am a total classic rock girl. I was in high school during the 80's but my music leanings are way more Rolling Stones than Duran Duran. (*Rio* was a pretty cool song though.)

Literate-Ly Magazine: Who are your top THREE favorite authors?

Yvonne DeSousa: I love suspense books so I would have to say Lois Duncan- from my teen reading years, I still remember the plots of most of her books, Gillian Flynn, and Lisa Jewell

Literate-Ly Magazine: What is the last book that you read? (Not counting anything you wrote)

Yvonne DeSousa: All the Dangerous Things by Stacy Willingham.

Literate-Ly Magazine: When writing, do you have a system or something you plan, or do you just write?

Yvonne DeSousa: Yes, but it is a little TMI. I come up with a thought or idea and then take it into the shower with me. I do the best writing in my head in the shower. I once was struggling with an idea for a Christmas pageant for my Sunday school class, went to take shower, wrote a whole kids religious Christmas play in my head, got out and typed it up, still soaking wet and just in bathrobe. That little play has been performed around the world.

My brain works better in the afternoon so I usually have a big cup of tea and breakfast in the morning while I catch up on emails and social media, do a little cleaning or whatever other projects I can around the house, take an idea into the shower and then start writing after noon.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Why do you write?

Yvonne DeSousa: I write to keep my brain active-cognitive decline are real issues when you are living with MS. But I also write to revisit stories memorable to me. If they can entertain or inspire others, it is even better. I started writing as a means to support myself. Now I see that writing does not work that way. Luckily, these other reasons have become much more important.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Are you personally an expert on the subject of your recently published book?

Yvonne DeSousa: Right now, I call myself a memoirist and the memory function of my brain is still intact. So yes, definitely!

Literate-Ly Magazine: Do you read your own work a lot? If so, what does it do for you?

Yvonne DeSousa: Not a lot, but sometimes. When I do it is to revisit a certain time in my life even more deeply. And depending on which time that is, it can make me smile, laugh or even shed a tear or two.

Literate-Ly Magazine: I play music when I write, and depending on the setting or mood of the story depends on what I listen to. Do you listen to music when you write? If so, what genre or artist/band do you listen to?

Yvonne DeSousa: I don't. If I listen to music while I write I tend to get distracted by it. But I love music so when the writing is done, and especially when I am doing other things like cleaning or cooking, the music is on full blast! I like classic and folk rock the best.

Literate-Ly Magazine: As an author, I find that the hardest thing to write (for me) is the blurb that will be on the back cover or book's description. When you write, what is the hardest line to write, the first line, the last line or the synopsis for the book?

Yvonne DeSousa: I completely agree. I struggled with the blurb. You want it just perfect to describe the book, put enough in without giving away too much and make it engaging to potential readers. It is a lot of pressure.

Literate-Ly Magazine: If you could sit down and have a coffee (or your favorite beverage) with anyone, living or dead, from any era, any time, who would it be and why?

Yvonne DeSousa: Hmmm.... That is tricky. The beverage part is easy, a large mug of tea made just right for a good conversation. I guess the person would have to be one of my deceased ancestors, especially those I haven't yet met. I love hearing history and am fascinated with how things came to be. So why not start with family? I did try to learn as much as my family's history with relatives I knew while they were still alive. But since they have been gone, I realize I missed some things, developed new questions, and would love to hear in more detail shared family stories they heard growing up.

Literate-Ly Magazine: What does it mean to be a "successful" writer?

Yvonne DeSousa: I thought about this a lot before typing a response. Does a "successful" writer mean just publishing one book? Receiving a contract from one of the big five publishers? Is it making the bestseller list? A certain amount of royalties? Inspiring one reader? !0? 100? There are so many ways to answer this question and

different ways of thinking about the answer. So I guess I am going to answer with what I always thought would be cool. If I ever get my own Wikipedia page, I will know 100% that I have become a successful writer. But all of the above would also help me know that too!

Literate-Ly Magazine: What do you want to accomplish, so when you look back at your life, you can say "I did that"?

Yvonne DeSousa: I honestly don't know going forward. When I was younger, I wanted to be an author. Then I didn't. And now I have published two books so I guess I can say I accomplished something. Moving forward I will have to think of something new. I do know I don't want to stop moving forward, however that takes shape in my world.

Literate-Ly Magazine: I am on a quest to read as many banned, burned or challenged books as possible? What is your feeling or opinion on banning books? It seems to be a new epidemic now.

Yvonne DeSousa: I don't understand it all. It is like the people who ban books want to put bubble wrap around young minds to protect them from certain ideas, yet they send them into the internet world unguarded where they can be victimized and exposed to all kinds of horrible things. It makes no sense! I can understand schools not recommending as curriculum books that are not age appropriate, but to ban them completely is just wrong.

Literate-Ly Magazine: What is the hardest part of the writing and publishing process?


Yvonne DeSousa: Editing. I am very impatient with editing. I wrote my latest book within a year, maybe less, but then it took me about 5 years to edit it. Editing is necessary but the grammar rules change, there is the pressure to make it as clean as possible, and trying to figure out what works best for different readers, what to cut, what to add, it all makes me almost unhinged. In the end though, thorough editing has made both of my books better, so it is a necessary, though grueling, task.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Why do you write nonfiction books? What subgenres do you write in as well?

Yvonne DeSousa: I write nonfiction because my brain can barely keep track of what I am doing, never mind what my fictional characters should be doing! I love telling stories and making people giggle so I write a lot of history related to my life, my hometown and then I like to spoof on things, especially on things that don't make sense. Those are fun things to spoof on for sure.


Their attraction makes no sense.

Amy Shannon's MOD Life Epic Saga



The MOD Life Epic Saga is a series of books (67 volumes in total, with 9 bonus books), that revolve around characters in a small, fictional Arizona town called Sars Springs. It follows the lives of the residents and their growing families and businesses. Evil also seems to flock there, either in a stalker form, corruption law enforcement, murder, kidnapping, torture, and human experimentation, just to name a few. Alex Garrison starts the story when she moves to Sars Springs to build a new life, and it grows from there. The first Volume is Unwritten Life, and though the stories are standalone, the author recommends reading them from the beginning. After reading Rewritten Life (volume 2) the reader has a choice to read the prequel (volume 3) (which gives spoilers for the first two books, so read those first), or move on to volume 4.

The MOD Life Epic Saga books are digital only, being published on <u>Smashwords</u> and Lulu.com.

Literate-Ly Magazine: In three words, describe yourself.

Nichole Heydenburg: Introvert, dedicated, tenacious

Literate-Ly Magazine: How many books have you written? How many of those are published?

Nichole Heydenburg: I've written seven books. Six of them are published so far.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Tell me about how you come up with your titles for your stories. Do you create the title before or after you write the book, and does it ever change from the initial title?

Nichole Heydenburg: I always use a "working title" while I'm writing the book because I'm terrible at coming up with book titles. Usually, after two or three drafts, I come up with the official title. One example is "Creepy Roommate Book." The official title ended up being *Don't Look Inside*.

Literate-Ly Magazine: What is the title of your last published book? What's the title and when was it published?

Nichole Heydenburg: My last published book came out on October 31, 2023. It's titled *Don't Look Inside*.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Out of all your characters in all of your books, who/what (sometimes a setting can also be an important "character") do you think is the most interesting and why?



Nichole Heydenburg: I love the complexity of Mara from my newest psychological thriller, *Don't Look Inside*. At first, Mara seems to be a socially awkward loner, but as the reader discovers more about her background, it becomes obvious why she is the way she is. She's a complicated person. I love writing about morally gray characters.

Literate-Ly Magazine: I know your story is fictional, but what inspired writing it?

Nichole Heydenburg: The initial idea for *Don't Look Inside* was inspired by one of my roommates in college. She kept a deep freezer in her bedroom and I always wondered what she kept in it, so one day my sister and I snuck into her room and opened it.

Literate-Ly Magazine: What sub-genres do you currently write in?

Nichole Heydenburg: Psychological thrillers and supernatural thrillers for young adults.

Nichole Heydenburg: Don't Look Inside is an upper YA thriller book. The main character, Elena, is a college student with a new roommate who she doesn't get along with. As Elena deals with her difficult roommate situation, she's also grappling with an abusive boyfriend. To add to the turmoil, multiple women go missing on campus. Elena wonders if someone close to her is responsible for the missing women.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Quote your favorite line from one of your stories. Indicate the line, and then the book title.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Tell me something about yourself that is separate from writing.

Nichole Heydenburg: I love traveling with my husband. Our goal is to visit at least one new country every year. So far, we've visited France, Germany, and Antigua. We're going to Japan in March.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Who are your top THREE favorite authors?

Nichole Heydenburg: Stephen King, Catriona Ward, and Kiersten Modglin

Literate-Ly Magazine: What is the last book that you read? (Not counting anything you wrote)

Nichole Heydenburg: Deception by Mariette Whitcomb

Literate-Ly Magazine: When writing, do you have a system or something you plan, or do you just write?

Nichole Heydenburg: After publishing six books, I have a system to my writing process. I create a rough outline based on the 15 beats from the Save the Cat! novel. Then I write at least 2,000 words per day, which means I can write a first draft in about 30 days.

After self-editing, I send the third draft to my beta readers. I sort through their feedback and edit. Then I send the manuscript to my developmental editor. With their feedback, I fix any of the

Next, I send the fifth draft to my copyeditor. I finish the copyedits, then I do two rounds of proofreading before publishing. I publish a book every six months.


Literate-Ly Magazine: Why do you write?

Nichole Heydenburg: I write because it feeds my soul. I write because I've never been this passionate about anything else. I write about my worst fears, dark thoughts, and nightmares. I write so readers can enjoy my books, so they can escape their own world for a few hours, so they can relate to my characters. I write to make a connection with others and to be heard. I write to prove that women can write thrillers just as well as men. I write because nothing else gives me this much joy.

Literate-Ly Magazine: Do you read your own work a lot? If so, what does it do for you?

Nichole Heydenburg: I write seven drafts before publishing each book, so I definitely read my own books a lot! Each time I read one of my books, I spot something new I didn't notice before. After it's published, I don't read any of my books again, though.

Literate-Ly Magazine: I play music when I write, and depending on the setting or mood of the story depends on what I listen to. Do you listen to music when you write? If so, what genre or artist/band do you listen to?



Nichole Heydenburg: I always listen to music while writing. While outlining or drafting, I like listening to alternative rock like Blue October or Metric. While copyediting and proofreading, I prefer to listen to instrumental music. I love Ryan Delahoussaye's instrumental songs.

Literate-Ly Magazine: As an author, I find that the hardest thing to write (for me) is the blurb that will be on the back cover or book's description. When you write, what is the hardest line to write, the first line, the last line or the synopsis for the book?

Nichole Heydenburg: The hardest part is always the middle of the book. When I first start writing a new book, I'm on a roll and the words flow easily. I usually have a rough idea of how I want the book to start and end, but I always get stuck somewhere in the middle.

Literate-Ly Magazine: What does it mean to be a "successful" writer?

Nichole Heydenburg: Being a successful writer isn't necessarily defined by money or fame. It means having a loyal fanbase of readers who eagerly anticipate your next book. That's the best part about being a writer to me.

Nichole Heydenburg: My main goal is to publish at least twenty books. My seventh book comes out this summer, so I'm getting there!

Nichole Heydenburg: To my fans, thank you so much for your support. Whether you've purchased one of my books or all of them, I appreciate every book sale, page read, and new reader.

For future authors, writing isn't an easy career choice, but it's extremely rewarding if you focus on the fact that you're doing what you love.





Gary Orleck: I had an inside track to all the people he knew and his family and was able to email them for verification of my facts. A lot of online research also.






Scorched by Paula Quinn



Rorik by Mary Morgan




Earl of My Dreams by Sylvie Sinclair

Towards a More Equitable Audiobook Industry by Becky Parker Geist

The Stories We Share

We humans live in and as narrative. Each day we make sense of our reality in the stories we tell ourselves and others. From the earliest times, oral storytelling has been an integral part of daily life. So the double-digit growth of audiobooks over this last decade, as well as the growth of podcasting, should not be surprising.

What may be surprising is how the industry's boom has been largely built on an inequitable model, where greed and control strip authors of what should be rightfully theirs. While Amazon and other platforms have been important in the growth of the industry, the distribution and sales model is abusive to rights holders.

Audiobook Development Milestones

It wasn't until the 1990's that digital delivery opened the doors to the ongoing explosive growth in the audiobook industry, further spurred on by the ubiquitousness of mobile devices for listening.

Meanwhile, independent publishing has continued to rise. According to an article in Writers Digest by Victoria Champagne



Sutherland (Founder and Publisher of Foreword Reviews): "The audiobook market has grown significantly since 1998, with many readers preferring to listen to books rather than read them. This has made it easier for independent authors to reach a wider audience by producing their books in audio format." This lines up with statistics provided by Audio Publishers Association in their annual reports.

Another milestone development that started rising to the surface in 2022 (having AI replace human narrators) threw into the spotlight a challenge the audiobook industry has mostly kept in the shadows: the cost of producing audiobooks tends to be high while the likelihood that authors will generate a profit from their audiobooks has been generally low.

What's Wrong with the Audiobook Industry?

At the crux of the problem for authors is an imbalance in the retail distribution model of the audiobook industry. We've seen similar issues in 2023 in the SAG-AFTRA strike. The imbalance of earnings in the audiobook world means millions in profits drop into the pockets of retailers like Amazon, while the creators are left with pennies. Without the creators, Amazon and others would have nothing to sell and profit from. Additionally, Authors in regular retail distribution are deprived of control that would allow them to effectively market their audiobooks.

Control Matters

Since the inception of the retail audiobook industry, rights holders have been denied control over their own audiobook properties as soon as they engage in distribution. Authors and publishers who shoulder the expense of producing the audiobooks then turn over the finished product for others to sell—on terms completely controlled by the retailers. They do so with high hopes of earning some royalties and being out there for their audiences to discover.

Until recently, traditional distribution was the only option for indie authors and small

publishers. To sell an audiobook directly from your website does not produce a happy user experience. While a print or ebook is a single object, either physical or digital, an audiobook is a playlist of several audio files packaged together with its cover image and metadata. Thus authors and publishers need a partner and/or platform for distribution.

Misleading & Abusive Practices

What most audiobook listeners don't realize is just how little of their payment for their next listen actually gets to the author. In fact, most authors don't realize it either until they review their royalty statements. That's when they realize that the royalty percentages they were lured in with were of the NET profit, not the gross revenue received by the retailer or paid by the customer. Net vs Gross makes for a huge difference.

As an example, Audible uses free audiobooks as a teaser to entice new subscribers. Those freebies to listeners when they pay their subscription price, earns \$0 for the authors. ACX, the production side of Audible and part of the Amazon monopoly, also tries to ensnare authors in a seven-year exclusive contract (which is not in the author's best interest). In this case the creator might earn as much as

40% of the NET of whatever Audible chooses to sell it for, and calculated using an elusive proprietary "factor." Other audiobook retailers and outlets including libraries and music channels generally work out to slightly higher royalties of about 35% of the sales price. That's better, but still not a great deal considering what rights-holders spend for production. Keep in mind that authors also have no control over that sales price—that's up to each retailer.

Magnifying the problem is the fact that the retailer that pays the lowest royalty rate (and has the most rights-holder-UNfriendly policies) controls the U.S. majority market share. The ongoing double-digit rise in audiobook sales, up 25% in 2021 according to Audio Publishers Association, also ups the stakes for the rights-holders. They have more to lose by the status quo staying as it is.

Greed, But Not Just Greed

The issue is not, however, just about royalties. Authors are denied control over their pricing and customer information in the sales process. Retailers keep for themselves all the customer details that are so valuable. Authors are left with no way to connect to

their followers, no way to build community and utilize email marketing to further engagement. Indie authors are kept in the dark and expected to keep churning out content—at their own expense—for retailers to exploit.

This is the greatest challenge in front of authors trying to decide whether or not to produce their book in audio. Many excellent books never make it into audio due to the very reasonable concern that they may never earn as much as it costs to produce. The problem is not actually the cost of production, but rather the inability and lack of access that in combination prevent them from getting a return.

Direct Sales - Community, Team & Support

While there are a couple options for direct sale from an author's website, including Book Funnel and Shopify, each of these options incur significant monthly fees. Selling from your own website has an additional challenge: discoverability. Having your audiobook in a platform with other audiobooks can provide the advantage of listeners discovering your audiobook while shopping for another. On the flip side, in a catalog with over 200K titles, your book can quickly get lost in the overcrowded store. Ongoing marketing will always be a key to success.

Yet most retail platforms are focused on their *own* success in selling subscriptions, not the author's success or bottom line. There are no tools to help authors succeed. While Amazon offers some tools for use with print and ebook formats, there are currently no options for audio. Even if there were, the royalty crumbs left for the authors would largely offset the value of time spent.

Most audiobook retailers are also far out of reach for any communication or cooperation on promotions. On Chirp you can apply for a promotion, but most authors won't get past that hurdle. Indie authors and small publishers need to be able to run their own promotions, but without a platform where they can control pricing on their audiobooks, it's not an option.

Until now.

Poems and prose use imagery, rhyme, metaphors, and structures within the body of work. The details that are added to the poems without being literal are carried in through techniques used by the poets. Every poet has his or her own technique and life that is brought into each poem that is written. The diction provided by the poet may differ, some use the language of the time the poem is being written, and some poets use past language, such as the use of old English. However, if a poet was writing the poem several centuries ago, the language of old English, may as well be current. Three poets that stand out with the different writing techniques are Shakespeare (1564-1616), William (11759–17961759– Robert Burns 1796759-1796), and Paul Laurence Dunbar (1872-1906).

Red Red Rose

Robert Burns, born in Scotland, wrote the poem Red Red Rose, which was published in 1794. The poem is written in ballad stanzas, since the poem



was inspired by an old Scottish folk song. The poem falls into the category of love and romance.

Imagery

Burns imagery is direct as he compares his love (spelled Luve by Burns) to a "red red Rose," (Burns, 1794), and he goes on to compare her to a "melody that's sweetly played in tune," (Burns 1794).

Rhythm

The ballad's use of rhythm and structure are what makes it fall into the ballad format of poetry. The most standout part of the poem is not just the theme of the poem, which is romance

and his love for his "luve," but how the poem flows when reading.

Structure

Burns uses the rhythmic structure of ABCB. Burns uses words such as "O" which is repeated throughout the poem, as well as other repetitive phrases, such as "O my Luve." Burns also used the diction of his native Scotland, when he refers to his Luve as "my bonnie lass."

Metaphor

metaphor Burns uses elements throughout his ballad. The rose in the title and within the ballad itself is the metaphor that refers to his luve. He uses hyperbole when he refers to loving her as "So deep in luve am I; And I will luve thee still, my dear, Till a' the seas gang dry." (Burns, 1794) and then he repeats for more effect by stating "Till a' the seas gang dry, my dear, And the rocks melt wi' the sun; I will love thee still, my dear, While the sands o' life shall run." (Burns, 1794).



When, in Disgrace with Fortune and Men's Eyes

William Shakespeare, born in England, wrote "When, in Disgrace with Fortune and Men's Eyes," also known as Sonnet 29. Sonnet 29 is one of 154 sonnets that were published in 1609.

Imagery

Shakespeare used the imagery throughout the sonnet. The first few lines use visual, auditory, and kinesthetic imagery. In line one, the use of visual imagery as he writes "in disgrace with fortune and men's eyes," (Shakespeare, 1609). This imagery sends a negative message as if many were looking at him with disgrace. The


sonnet is written with a deep depression that adds to the imagery of the sonnet. The use of the words "beweep" and "bootless cries" gives the reader the sense of a man who is uncontrollably crying. The imagery flows throughout the sonnet.

Rhythm

Shakespeare followed a pattern of rhyme throughout the sonnet by having every other line rhyme as well as the final two lines rhyme. The flow of the sonnet provided a beat that gave the reader the sense of despair of the writer. Shakespeare's word placement was carefully executed to create not only the rhyme but evoke the emotions to the reader. "With what I enjoy contented least, Yet in these thoughts myself almost despising." (Shakespeare, 1609).

Structure

The rhythm structure of the sonnet was a typical English structure of ABAB CDCD EBEB FF. The sonnet followed the correct 14 lines in order to



be considered a sonnet. Shakespeare also wrote the sonnet with the iambic pentameter format. Shakespeare finishes the play with a rhymed couplet, "For they sweet love rememb'red such wealth brings that then I scorn to change my state with kings." (Shakespeare, 1609).

Metaphors

Shakespeare's Sonnet 29 follows the theme of sadness and depression. The use of metaphors flow throughout

the sonnet. "Wishing me like to one more rich in hope," (Shakespeare, 1609) describes his sadness and lack of hope, as well as his desire to be happy when all he can be is sad and depressed. "Haply I think on thee, then my state, like to the lark at break of day arising." (Shakespeare, 1609).

We Wear the Mask

Paul Laurence Dunbar, born in the United States, wrote, "We Wear the Mask" in 1896. His poem "We Wear the Mask" was about living on the plantation. Dunbar's parents were emancipated slaves that lived in Ohio. Imagery

Dunbar uses the references of personification of the "mask" as imagery. In the first line of the poem, he writes, "We wear the mask that grins and lies," (Dunbar, 1896) which gives human qualities to the mask. However, the mask is a figurative and not a literal mask, the personification and then describing it as a disguise, adds more imagery. "It hides our cheeks and

shades our eyes," (Dunbar, 1896), informs the readers that in order to survive, they must hide who they really are and how they really feel.

Rhythm

The use of the words "We Wear the Mask" throughout the poem reiterates the point of the mask as well as provides needed repetition in the poem. The subtleties of the phrase "we wear the mask" bring in the punctuation and placement of the phrase. The poem ends abruptly with the exclamation point. Throughout the poem, Dunbar uses words such as "tears," "cries," and "sighs" which present the rhythm as well as the declaration of hidden sadness.

Structure

The rhyme structure of the poem "We Wear the Mask" is AABBC AABD AABBAC. By reiterating rhymes back to previous lines, it adds a rhythm and structure that lends to the emotions of the poem. "This debt we pay to human guile; With torn and bleeding hearts we smile." (Dunbar, 1896), lends to the

emotions of the poem as it connects with a few lines below "Nay, let them only us while." (Dunbar, 1896).

Metaphor

Dunbar's "mask" is the metaphor that is maintained throughout the poem. His mask is what hides the true emotions by pasting a fake smile on their faces as they muffle their own inner cries. "Why should the world be over-wise, In counting all our tears and sighs?" (Dunbar, 1896) declares that the mask is there for one reason, so no one will ever know the sadness that is within them.

All three poems are different in the format, such as ballad, sonnet, and poem, but the connection of the way the work was written and the techniques used by each poet is clearly relatable. The imagery, rhyme, structure, and metaphors fall into place into each work by the poets. The structure and technique used by the poets allow the

reader to get a sense of the feelings and emotions within the work as well as the feelings and emotions that were behind the work. Burns wrote about love, an everlasting love. Shakespeare wrote about depression and sadness. Dunbar wrote about hiding ones sadness with a smile. Each poet wrote about a strong emotion without stating it, just painting the emotion with words.












Not every character needs the writer to describe in complete detail about the clothing or dress of a character, but sometimes it is needed to show the audience something about the character. Sometimes the clothes make the character, or at least give some insight into their personality, stature, career or wealth.

If the character is very wealthy, yet eccentric (or just plain strange), dress can show just how eccentric a character is, without telling the reader. In the instance of my story, "Shattered Pages", main character Lincoln "Link" McLaren is a best-selling mystery writer, but also eccentric. Link's back story comes in to play to show why he is the way that he is, but also his dress (or nudity, as he prefers to write his stories while naked) shows the reader how he can be both exposed and guarded at the same time. socks, they When he wears are mismatched. His housekeeper is constantly reminding him to wear clothes, at least shorts or a robe.



For the character "Savvy Macavoy" in my books "Smashed: A Savvy Macavoy Story" and "The Relic: A Savvy Macavoy Story", the character of Savvy dresses very casually, always wearing the same types of clothes, such as corduroy or denim jeans, linen shirts, and always brown sandals.


Tools of the Trade

When giving the character a career, the writer should have knowledge of what supplies, equipment, weaponry, or other accessories (including proper dress) is used to perform the job. The

list of career categories and their "accessories" below is just a small example of basic careers (where many more specific job titles would fall under) and what is needed to perform the duty in the job. (For a list of "careers" go to the Resources page).

Law Enforcement. This refers to, but is not limited to, police, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), or Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). For a character that is in some form of law enforcement, the equipment or supplies, and even procedures are important to give more credibility of the character. If the character serves a specific agency, and the agency is a real agency, the writer should do research on ranks, policies, procedures, departments, and how the particular character would fit in.

If the character is a police officer, the writer should know what color uniform the officer wears, what color is the badge (and what they call a badge.



For example: NYPD officers all refer to their badge, no matter the rank, as a "shield"), as well required as deportment, and equipment necessary to full fill their jobs, such as weaponry (know the type of weapons character may carry), duty belts, batons or night-sticks, tasers, etc.). I found a good reference book for me in order to better understand law enforcement agencies is called Howdunit Book of Police Procedure and Investigation: A Guide for Writers 1st Edition, by Lee Lofland (details are on the Resources page).

The characters will have to know how to address superiors as well as subordinates. The writer should also

know the differences of the ranks, rank grades, and titles within the law enforcement, as in the FBI some are SSA (Supervisory Special Agents) and some who work for the FBI are not agents, or they are supervisors, directors, or leads. Accessing the FBI website can provide a lot of details on the bureau, its responsibilities, as well as qualification requirements.

Military. If one or more of the characters are veterans, or active duty members of one of the five branches of the armed services, the writer should research that specific branch/branches of the service, along with the rank, and dress. There are different uniforms for different occasions, and on dress uniforms there are ribbons and service awards that are mandatory. It is also important to know the order in which the ribbons and medals are placed. If someone is active duty, or "retired," the character may talk or act like he/she is in the service. Saluting commanding officers is an imperative act, and the



commanding officer returns the salute. The characters will have to know how to address superiors as well as subordinates.

There is specific jargon to the armed forces, and some that is specific to the branch of service. Some even use their battle in certain situations. crv commonly used in a verbal greeting or expression of enthusiasm. The marines battle cry is oorah, where the army's battle cry is *hooah* and both the navy's and coast guard's battle cry is hooya. The air force doesn't have a specific one, but they often use hooah, the same as the army's.

Health Care. Health care professionals are doctors, nurses, technicians or anyone who works in the healthcare field. Whether the setting for the health

a specialty, the writer needs to learn about the specialty. When I make up something in the healthcare field, I use medical terminology to fit the disease or medication. I've used Merckmanual.com (see Resources page) for help with medical terminology.

I recently wrote a storyline that had to do with a kidney transplant, so I researched what would happen to both the donor and recipient, as well as how it would be done, and what side effects could happen, so I could write it accurately.

Also, not all doctors are medical doctors: doctors some have doctorate, which also makes them a doctor by title. The writer should know the background or education of the characters, even where they would have graduated from school, and the process they had to take to become where they Medical doctors are. that have specialties may not just have an M.D (Medical Doctor) behind their name.



Doctors of Obstetrics have DO after their name. Some may also have a Ph.D and a medical doctor degree. The writer should also know the amount of time in college and what other type of training the doctors had to do to become doctors, such as internships, rotations, and residencies. There are also different types of eye doctors or dentists.

I have many doctors in my MOD Life Epic Saga, and some in a few other stories, and I have done research on the character's specialties. I've read some books on medical technology (and the website that I've mentioned earlier) and have used references such as *The American Medical Association (AMA)* website, which also has some other great links and references. And for drugs

and medications, use *The Physicians'*Desk Reference Book or the same information can be accessed on PDR.Net (Prescribers Digital Reference) for the drug types and names.

There is also a great article written by a doctor as a guest columnist on Writer's Digest.com; the link is on the resources pages.

Firefighters. Firefighters have a lot of equipment, including their different types of trucks, as well as their turn-out gear. They also have dress uniforms. The truck color is usually red, but there are fire stations that have white or even yellow trucks. The writer should be familiar with the procedures and ranks of the firefighter, and what tasks they are to perform. For more information on firefighters, check out the Firefighter Nation website; the link is on the resources page. Some firefighters may refer to the fire station as either "the house" or "the station."

Medical **Technicians Emergency** (EMTS) and Paramedics. The biggest differences between paramedics and EMTs are the training and exactly what they can and cannot do. EMTS have less training hours and can do less than paramedics. Paramedics usually have a 2-year degree. Some firefighters may be paramedics or EMTS, but not all EMTs firefighters. Paramedics are Paramedics and EMTS may have an emergency truck or use an ambulance. For more information on education and training for a EMT or Paramedic, check out the website; the link is on the resources pages.

Lawyer. Lawyers, in some states, such as California, Virginia, Vermont, and Washington are not required to have a law degree, if they just pass the bar and do an internship. However, the majority of lawyers have law degrees. Lawyers do have to pass the bar in all the states they wish to practice in. The type of lawyer the character is, he can determined by where they went to school, and what type of place they

work in. There are major differences between public defenders, prosecutors, single lawyer-firms, or major firms with partnerships and associates. Lawyers may specialize in a specific type of law, such as criminal, family, or malpractice cases (those are just a few examples, there are many types of law). One place to get a list of law types is on *The Lawyer Portal* website, the link is on the resources pages.

If part of the story takes place in a courtroom, the writer researches on procedures in court, how to address staff in a courtroom, how to ask the pertinent questions, and give opening and closing statements. A courtroom would have some specific décor. In a recent story I that had scenes that were wrote courtroom-based, I made sure that the opening statement of the bailiff was accurate, as well as the décor, showing along with county crest, the American Flag, the scales of justice held by the blind statue, and other courtroom settings, such as the jury box, the tables where the prosecutor and defendant sit, and the galley where the observers sit.

Court procedures and laws should be researched to make the story as accurate as possible, and even if something is made up, it should sound logical to the story.

Author/Writer. (old school or latest tech): If the writer is writing about a writer or author, they should explore different writing styles or quirks about how someone writes. To see others writing styles, read several books with different genres and different authors. The writer may not want to write about a writer with their own writing style, or they may want to mimic themselves in way. Some writers write some everything in long hand and then have someone transcribe it (or they do it themselves). Some writers only use typewriters manual electric or typewriters, while others use notebooks and a computer (the last one is me). The writer should decide what the writer writes about. Is it a book? Is the writer a journalist?

Is this a writer who writes mystery novels and now someone is using the book as a murder map? (That last one is

a basic synopsis of my book Shattered Pages by Amy Shannon). I thought it would be an interesting story to write about a writer. I recently wrote a short story, also about a writer, but he wrote about serial killers, and he thought he needed to perform the exact action, in order to write about it. (This story has not yet been published, and it is still a work in progress).

Business Owner. The character that owns a business would manage their ways that affect its business in customers or clientele. A restaurant or bar owner would run their business differently than a person who owns a retail store, an accounting firm, or even grocery store. (Those are just examples). A restaurant owner may also be a chef, or they just hire a chef, while handle they the business administration work. Some doctors may have their own private practice, so that is also considered a business, as they

have patients. A doctor would run the office differently than if he or she just worked in a hospital or a clinic. Any business owner may have managers, or assistants, and they would have some staff. Maybe the business is the main setting of the story, or just part of the story. It could be where all the action is, or where the character feels the safest.

I couldn't list every career that there is in the world, but research on whatever career is chosen so it can be accurate and be reflected in the character of the characteristics.














Kris Falcon - Some blue, a little spur

Gary Orleck is the author of Travels with Maurice: An Outrageous European Adventure in 1968, where he tells the incredible story of a vacation he spent with a larger-than-life friend of his, Maurice. Gary is sharing this story, and even though it is a short story, it is true, because all of Gary's stories are based on facts.

In 1963, I decided to choose Babson College in Wellesley, Mass, an all-boys' school of only 650 male students. But my decision to go to college had nothing to do with knowledge, as you will see.

My room was a tri-corner room, with three of us newbies in it. Ronnie and Frankie were both from Connecticut, while I was from Rhode Island. (Part I)


Max

"We oughta clean him up and take him to the vet tomorrow morning. I'm gonna need your help."


I cringed at the thought.

The story of Christian Gerhartsreiter, aka Christopher Kenneth Gerhart, aka Christopher Chichester, aka Christopher C. Crowe, aka Christopher Mountbatten and aka Charles Chip Smith. Christian Gerhartsreiter wasn't just a con-man who married a wealthy woman, and pretended he was one of the aristocratic Rockefellers, but lived off her money to maintain his high society profile. They had a child together, and when they divorced, he kidnapped their child, and the trail to finding background information on Clark Rockefeller led to dead ends. A couple disappeared. All trails that led to Rockefeller also faded as the mystery remained a mystery. This book was written very well. It was detailed and terrifying, and makes you wonder how this man could be so many different people, and yet, also keep his real persona a secret, but this was also the era of the 1980s and 1990s, a time much different from where we are now. 



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

When she was 19 months old, Helen Keller (1880–1968) suffered a severe illness that left her blind and deaf. Not long after, she also became mute. Her tenacious struggle to overcome these handicaps — with the help of her inspired teacher, Anne Sullivan — is one of the great stories of human courage and dedication. In this classic autobiography, first published in 1903, Miss Keller recounts the first 22 years of her life, including the magical moment at the water pump when, recognizing the connection between the word "water" and the cold liquid flowing over her hand, she realized that objects had names. Subsequent experiences were equally noteworthy: her joy at eventually learning to speak, her friendships with Oliver Wendell Holmes, Edward Everett Hale and other notables. her education at Radcliffe (from which she graduated cum laude), and-underlying all-her extraordinary relationship with Miss Sullivan, showed remarkable who genius communicating with her eager and quick-to-learn pupil. These and many other aspects of Helen Keller's life are presented here in clear, straightforward of prose full wonderful descriptions and imagery that would do credit to a sighted writer. Completely devoid of self-pity, yet full of love and compassion for others, this deeply moving memoir offers an unforgettable portrait of one of the outstanding women of the twentieth century.

Julie Boglisch- The Raven's Crux



People, not just prominent, and the writings of people, long past, where their work may be long forgotten. It is a shame that some are forgotten, so with this being a history of Balls-Town, the incorporation of the Village of Ballston Spa, it is also an homage to those who wrote about these precious lands of the towns. Some stories, poems, historical writings about hometowns, may have been once lost, but in this book, some of them are being revived.

I'm Amy Shannon, and this is my hometown, and its community of history, lingering spirits, and neighbors
