

First Weeks of School: The children were so excited to be back in school and socializing with their friends. They have been assessed and the new norm routine seems to be working well in our classroom. We plan to extend the outside area from our back door to an additional learning environment. All suggestions and donations are welcomed. The children will rotate throughout the morning work cycle. We are happy to report when we got back from the Labor Day weekend, we were close to being back on track. Your children have missed the academic hands on approach, and they are eager to receive new lessons and have been focused on their works.

All about Me: Is the start of our unit of study. Starting with our school, our environment, and new friends. Emotions, what are they? We will use our baby pictures to look at how much they have grown and became more independent and socially aware of our surroundings.

Contracts: The Kindergarten children started using their individual work contract, which helps them with time management. A contract consists of completing language, handwriting, and math work, and a choice of Practical Life, Sensorial, Cultural, Botany, Science, or Zoology work. This enables your child the responsibility of keeping track of her / his work. We will be sending their homework packets home the 2nd or 3rd week of September.

Handwriting: The children have started daily handwriting exercises. These will consist of push pin work, tracing, metal inset materials or writing their language words. We will begin with the three "P's" posture, proper paper placement, and pencil grip. These will be fun and extremely valuable lessons. Some of the kindergarten children started writing in their primary composition books.

Unit Studies: We have reviewed the classification of living/nonliving, plant/animal, and vertebrate/invertebrate from our Zoology shelf. Mammals will start the learning of the animal kingdom with the parts of the horse. In Geography, the children have studied the sandpaper globe of land and water. With this globe the children get a sensorial impression of the Earth. The sand surface represents land and the blue surface represents water. (The tactile of rough & smooth.) We also worked with the continent globe representing our continents by color, which is color coded to our continent map. What country do we live in? We live in the United States of America which is located on the Continent of North America. Learning through fun, the children are refreshing their memories with the Oceans and Continents songs. Our environment is labeled with directions; North, South, East, and West and we practice being compasses as part of our circle time. The children really enjoy this game.

In Botany: we studied the parts of a seed and planted lima beans. We will discuss the parts of a root and what fruits and vegetables grow from the ground. We will grow a sweet potato plant and a carrot for the children to see the roots growing. September studies will also cover parts of an apple and who was Jonny Appleseed? Science started with Bacteria, Germs and Viruses? This unit helped the children understand how and why we need to stay healthy. This brings continued studies of our bodies and learning the functions of our 5 senses.

Art: We are studying Wassily Kandinsky a Russian artist. We have a poster in our classroom which was the inspiration to start our art unit "Squares with Concentric Circles." We will create several art projects through music and try and feel what Kandinsky wanted to accomplish. Can you guess which work of art the children made?

Dear Parents,

While this school year is starting off like no other, I am so excited to welcome back all my students. Although we have had to make several changes, I am happy to say that the children are adjusting and working harder than ever. It is great to be back together!

Botany: Our fun started with the story Jack and the Beanstalk. We grew beans in plastic baggies and then investigated what the inside of a seed looks like. Everyone was excited to see the “baby plant” inside the seed. Next up, will be what grows above and below the ground and the parts of a plant that we eat.

Cultural: We are talking about our emotions and how to handle difficult situations. Seems very fitting for 2020! In this unit the kids will complete an emotion book.

Science: I will continue to offer hands-on science experiments with the addition of STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math). This will be tied into the story of the week.

Geography: We begin with land/air/water. I have some new work on the shelf with 3-part cards to introduce the parts of a bike, airplane, and sailboat. The kids are anxious to get started on the books that accompany this work.

Zoology: We will discuss North American Farm animals. At school we will focus on the life cycle of a chicken. The time has come for our Kindergarteners to start the much-anticipated research project! I will send home more information after I have talked with the kids and they have chosen the farm animal they would like to research.


Language: Each child will begin an individualized road to reading. I have gone back to where they were when we left in March and are working with them to get them caught back up. We will also focus on reading comprehension and the retelling of a story. Please read with your child every night and then discuss the story with them. Ask who the main character was. Ask for a description of that character. Talk about the conflict in the story and the resolution. We do this at school, and they love discussion time!

I will do my best to email pictures, as I am sure you love to see a glimpse into their day. If you ever have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to reach out. I am always here to help.

Maplewood is up and running and looks amazing! We would like to welcome all our existing families back and give a big welcome to our new families! The first few weeks of school have been great! The children are eager to learn and are excited with the new environment.

The first month back always consists of getting to know each other, assessing all the children through observation, and getting them into a routine. We also review and familiarize them with the materials and how the classroom functions. We have been encouraged with all the children's ability to adjust to the changes implemented due to the Covid 19 guidelines. They are resilient and willing to do whatever is needed.

In August, we began learning about ourselves, how we're different, how we're the same and how we're all special and unique in our own way. We have talked about and read books about feelings, explaining how we all have them and that there are healthy ways to behave and react when we are feeling excited, sad, or angry among other emotions. Implementing breathing exercises and strategies to settle and calm down. They have enjoyed listening to Frank Leto's song "Can you tell how I feel". In Zoology, we are learning about the difference between living and non/living, and the difference between plants and animals. We are also learning about farms, why they are important to us and about the animals that farmers keep and why.

This month, in Science, we will be expanding on All About Me, learning about the human body and why it is important to take care of ourselves, as well as different types of germs and how we stop them from spreading. We will discuss how our character counts and why it is so important to treat people with respect and to make good choices. Grace and courtesy are the foundation of the Montessori environment and vital to having a successful class. In Zoology, we will also continue to learn about the farm, with a focus on parts of the horse, that they are classified as mammals, and the different types of horses that exist.

Thank you for all your support and for allowing us to be a part of your child's growth. We are looking forward to an amazing year!

In September, we will be learning about how we are all different, yet the same. We will also learn about parts of the body and focus on our 5 senses.




In Science, we will be learning about apples and planting apple seeds. We will be learning about farm animals.
