# **Carroto commits to Pitt-Greensburg**

Charleroi's Bella Carroto will be a Bobcat and continue playing soccer close to home.

One of the Valley's highest-scoring girls soccer players has found herself a home next fall.

Charleroi's Bella Carroto announced this week that she'll continue her athletic and academic career nearby at Pitt-Greensburg.

"It's a beautiful campus and its academic programs and facilities blew me away," Carroto said. "Within the first hour of telling the coaches I was committed, the other commits and a bunch of players had texted me to congratulate me. It 100% cemented my decision and made me happy to be a part of the pro-

The Bobcats are heading into the 2023 season coming off a 16-4-1 campaign with a perfect 7-0 record in the Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference. The Bobcats also advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

Carroto was recruited by UPG head coach Chuck Wigle and assistant Chris Fabian. "Coach Wigle was very

passionate and it was easy to tell how much he loved the game of soccer," Carroto said. "It's obvious he brings out the best in all his student-athletes. The team and staff have been so welcoming this summer and made

me feel I was already part of the team."

Carroto, who will major in biology, is a three-time All-Section performer for the Cougars. She has 77 career goals and 41 assists heading into her senior season.

She's a three-time Mon Valley Independent-BeeGraphix Fab 15 performer and finished in the top 10 of the WPIAL in scoring in two of her three seasons. She was an All-WPIAL honoree last season.

She did play Cup soccer for Beadling before deciding to end her traveling soccer ca-

"I knew I didn't have the desire to play college soccer at the Division I level and I didn't want to play outside of the Pittsburgh area," she said. "Another big factor was the amount of school that I would have to miss due to travel."

Right now, Carroto is ranked second in her class of 112 students and carries a 4.54 grade-point average.

She added that she considered LaRoche and Seton Hill before setting her sights on Pitt-Greensburg.

"I really liked the campus, coaches and team at LaRoche," Carroto said. "It was a hard choice letting them down, however, I really felt like Pitt-Greensburg was where I had my heart set on. Plus it's a University of Pittsburgh education, one of the top out there."

Carroto said she's really looking forward to her senior season now that her commitment is behind her. Playing for the Cougars has come to mean a lot to her.

"Playing at Charleroi was a new experience for me," she said. "We had minimal numbers the past few seasons, which was hard to deal with over a long season. It gave us all such a close bond, though, and that's something I will cherish forever. We all trust each other to do our part to be as successful as possible. It's tough, but it helped me grow as a player and leader."

### **Austin looking to become** 'well-rounded' receiver

Barring the same type of unexpected — and unfortunate — injury that ruined his rookie season, wide receiver Calvin Austin will make his professional debut Friday night for the Pittsburgh

After suffering a foot injury on the eve of the 2022 preseason opener, Austin eventually needed surgery and spent the entire year on injured reserve.

Now healthy and flashing the type of playmaking skills that led the Steelers to using a fourth-round draft pick on him, Austin is just days away from hitting another marker in his recovery when the Steelers play at Tampa Bay.

Austin, though, isn't looking that far ahead, which is probably smart considering his injury last summer occurred during a walk-

through the day before the first exhibition game. "I haven't," Austin said Sunday when asked about suiting up for the first time

in a game. "I'm really just

thinking about this practice. I have to make this practice the best one."

Then, Austin went out and made a deep reception on a pass from Kenny Pickett, beating slot corner Chandon Sullivan down the right sideline for a completion that went for a touchdown.

"It definitely has been an emphasis," Austin said. "I've made some plays down the field, and I have to continue to do that."

It was another in a series of plays this summer that has brought a smile to the face of wide receivers coach Frisman Jackson, who, like Austin, joined the Steelers organization a year ago.

"We saw some of that (last year), but you really see it now," Jackson said. "One year of growth and development has helped. He's had to sit back, watch, lift weights and get stronger. He's bigger, he's stronger, and you can see the confidence he has in himself now."

Austin was the second receiver the Steelers drafted in 2022, following the selection of George Pickens in the second round. While Pickens was the camp darling last year with his spectacular one-handed catches, Austin was holding his own for the first two weeks before his injury.

Until that point, the 5-foot-8, 162-pound Austin was on track to earning a spot as the team's slot receiver. Armed with his 4.32 speed in the 40-yard dash, Austin was getting open on a consistent

The speed that could have been sapped from his foot injury has returned for Austin this summer, and he has evolved into a more well-rounded receiver by making plays all over the field — and not when the Steelers ask him to go deep.

"I've seen him making some catches running across the middle that gives us confidence he's not just an outside-the-numbers, vertical-speed guy," Jackson said. "He's got to continue to get better. We're starting to see some other things

# Charleroi may have found missing piece

Freshman defender Aryana Chiplaskey joins the fold for a Cougars team that has plenty of offensive firepower with Bella Carroto and McKenna DeUnger.

With a smaller roster than he would have liked the past few seasons, Charleroi girls soccer coach Tom Cameron knows it's all about having the right pieces in place.

This season, he's hopeful the missing piece in finally in place.

Charleroi returns the offense in seniors Bella Carroto (77 career goals, 40 assists) and McKenna "Boots' DeUnger (69 goals, 24 assists).

While the offense is exciting, it's the defensive addition of freshman Aryana Chiplaskey that may have Cameron even more excited for what could be.

"She's a special player as a freshman," Cameron said. "From our two scrimmages, I think the biggest thing is she has to get used to playing in high school games with high school rosters instead of Cup soccer with a lot of the highest-caliber players surrounding her.

"She has a very high IQ back there because she's played at a high level. She can make runs, she can take goal kicks, corner kicks ... a lot of things a normal freshman can't do."

Cameron said Chiplaskey is gaining confidence quickly and it has

led to a lot of trust building between her and her varsity teammates.

"I have her playing a deep sweeper, she's running our defense back there with seniors Cam (Musser) and Ella (Sypolt). That's allowed us to do some other things," Cameron

Sypolt and Musser have devel-

oped into a tough defensive unit as they approach their senior season.

"Just their maturity as young ladies is what really stands out," Cameron added of the pair. "Their IQ for the game continues to grow and their work ethic is great. They'll do whatever they have to do and always give you 100%."

One of those other things the Cougars will be able to do now is allow Taylor Ramsdell and her big leg to move back up into the midfield.

"Taylor is a really talented player and with her moving up into the formation, it's really going to make us that much harder to defend," Cameron said. "Boots is a handful up

there, and adding Taylor is just going to give us more skill to deliver the ball and move up in the attack."

Carroto, who is aiming to hit the 100 career-goal mark this season, has committed to play soccer at Pitt Greensburg. She's been a fixture at off-season workouts and has taken

# High expectations exist for TJ girls

The Thomas Jefferson girls soccer team won 17 games last season, but it suffered three losses to a WPIAL and state champion in Moon, a state-playoff qualifier in Latrobe and a difficult section foe in Elizabeth Forward that put a bit of a damper on such a strong season.

First, the Jaguars went down 2-0 against Moon, a team that conceded just three goals and scored 99 goals en route to a 26-0 record. After the Elizabeth Forward loss was a season-ending 3-0 loss in the district quarterfinals against the Wildcats, as they made program history.

Needless to say, the Jaguars ran into a bit of bad luck last season. This year, coach Sean Richter likes what he's seeing as his squad is showing chemistry at the right time.

"I think things are just coming to-

gether where we're getting the right Day, Kennedy Alava, Emma DeSimmix of girls who have played together for a long time and understand the system and the work rate we're trying to achieve, and it's coming together," Richter said. "That being said, we also lose some significant help and some senior leadership like Bella Kozar and Jordan Sinclair.

"But I'm confident that we have the girls to step right in there and keep us competitive at the same time."

Among those difference makers are senior Natalie Lamenza, who is back after a 25-goal season, junior Olivia Della Lucia, who controls the midfield and often dictates the tempo of matches, sophomore Sami Maglico, who went under the radar, according to her coach, and sophomore Aubrey Little who plays at a high level in club soccer with other Jaguars players.

The senior class includes Sierra Frisoli, Abby Ngugi, Katie Sukal, Karolyn one, Alexis Marcinko and Liz Price. The juniors are Ashlynn Fry, Savannah Baker, Toni Blosl, Annmarie Graham, Aislin Majoris, Alissa Tarpey, Addison Fenlock, Cassidy Lamarca, Sylvia Kashak and Marie Beatty.

"There are a lot of girls that can make an impact," Richter said. "The hardest part is figuring out how the puzzle is built and how we can get the right players in the right places.'

Richter said the older players have helped to implement the culture that he's envisioned for the program since taking over in 2020. The team's captains are Lamenza, Della Lucia, Fry and Frisoli, with Richter crediting the group as leaders that have maintained standards that he wants the Jaguars to

### Serra volleyball eyes more success

The 2022 season was a successful one for the Serra Catholic

volleyball team. The Eagles captured 18 wins, went 12-0 in Section 4-1A, finished as the WPIAL runners-up in Class 1A and advanced to the state playoffs.

But despite all those accomplishments, winning the Class 1A Title is still something that is on the minds of veteran coach Keith Trahan and the Eagles.

"We had a lot of talent last year," said Trahan, who is entering his 13th year with Serra. "We had a good mix of players. A lot of experienced players, but also a lot of underclassmen that made a difference. We were very deep last season. We were not afraid to go 10 deep in most of our matches. "But that title game loss to Frazier hurt. We did not play our

best, and when you do that against a great Frazier team, you get that result. Serra has never won a WPIAL title in volleyball, so that is still our goal. We know it's going to be tough because there are still some quality teams in Class 1A this sea-

Of their three losses last year, one was the 3-0 sweep to Frazier in the title game, and the others were a 3-2 non-section setback to Kiski Area and another 3-2 thriller in the first round of the PIAA playoffs on the road against Oswayo Valley.

One of the Eagles' biggest wins a season ago was in the Class 1A semifinals against perennial championship contender Bish-

Serra only lost four seniors from that squad, and depth looks to be a strong suit again for the Eagles as they currently have 22 players on their roster.

The Eagles will have plenty of experience, as the squad will be led by eight seniors.

"Those eight seniors have seen a lot of playing time together," Trahan stated. "A lot of those seniors are three, four-year starters. They have been through it all on a volleyball court and know how to handle their emotions. We are excited for them to lead us this year.'

A strong passing game and a dependable offense will once again be the Eagles' calling card in 2023, and that will be led by the play of senior setter Emerson Trahan.

"We run our offense through Emerson," Coach Trahan expressed. "She is a great leader out there and has a very calming presence about her on the court. She is very composed out there. She also has tremendous hands and is very athletic with a high volleyball IQ."

Emerson was first team all-section, as well as a member of

a leadership role along with DeUnger.

"She was all in all summer long, even before she made her college commitment," Cameron said of the senior forward. "She came to all the workouts and made it fun for the younger players. We had low numbers, but so it goes in Class 1A soccer. But she stepped right up and led them.

"Boots is the same way. She's really led by her effort. She never wants to stop. She didn't want to come out of our scrimmage. She's 100 miles per hour all the time. We love that effort."

Sophomore Anna Kondratowicz and junior Fernanda Andrade will move into the midfield with Ramsdell and junior Mylie French and Carroto will be atop the formation.

Rhianna Grogan will be on the outside.

"Rhianna can not only put the ball in the net, but she has a really strong left leg," Cameron said of the junior forward-midfielder. "We're hoping her being on the outside that she can deliver a big cross into the box."

Lilly Withers and Lita Zelinsky will find themselves on the other side of the forma-

"I said when she was a freshman that she was going to turn into one of the best in goal," Cameron said. "I think she's there. She was all-section last season and I think she's capable of being an All-WPIAL keeper. She has good hands and she's not afraid to come out of the net. Her positioning and lines are so much better. Her punches and punts are so much better. Her confidence is really up and she really trusts Aryana running that defense. If she stays healthy, she can be one of the best."

Another addition Cameron made to the squad this season is bringing Brooke (Rebar) Ramsdell on as the assistant coach.

"The girls all respect her and we have a good working relationship. We're communicating well," Cameron said. "She was a heck of a player in her day and she's giving her input and making suggestions. She's going to be a great addition to the team and on the bench."

So far in the preseason, Cameron likes what he sees from his Cougars.

"We've looked all right. I mean, we have 14 kids, so it's going to be a matter of us staying

healthy," Cameron said. "We're going to do our best, but we do have some goals we want to fulfill and it starts with winning games.

"If we can keep them healthy, I think it's a given we should be in the playoffs. It's still a tough section," Cameron said. "I'm not going to predict a championship or anything."

The Cougars return to Section 2-1A with the likes of defending champion Chartiers-Houston, Waynesburg Central, Bentworth, Monessen, South Allegheny and Beth-Center.

"I think it's going to be a very competitive section, just like it was last season. I think we all match up pretty evenly," he said. "Chartiers-Houston and Waynesburg didn't lose too much. South Allegheny returns a bunch of seniors and I don't care how young Tyler (Hamstra) says he is, he has a great program at Bentworth and they're going to be tough. We can't sleep on Monessen, either, and I know Beth-Center has a new coach, I'm sure they'll be improved.

"There's going to be a lot of competitive games and I don't think either team is going to run away with it. A 9-3 team could very well win this section."

their work rate, their commitment and their leadership became so visible, you can't deny it," he said. "Now they're juniors in the same role getting better, and you have to be on board or move out of the way.

"That's the culture I've wanted. You have to have this environment that everyone's buying in, inspired, motivated and playing hard, or it's really hard to balance. This is one of those years. I'm not saying this is our

best team or the best players, but we're more cohesive as a unit. There's more buy-in, the work rate is a little bit higher; it's just a better soccer culture for what we want

to accomplish."

According to Richter, the list starts with trying to repeat as section champs, but he's hoping for even more. Early matches against Canon-Mc-Millan, West Allegheny and Franklin Regional will gauge

where the team is at.

"We gotta get in that second-level tournament game and that state game," he said. "Scheduling-wise, I tried to give us strong teams so we know where we're at, but you have to win that second playoff game, put your name out there and get into something bigger.

"I would rather go 12-7 and learn and compete like dogs and be successful in the playoffs than go 15-0 and not be ready for what's coming. I

look at where we were maybe not as prepared as they were (last year), and that's what I take into this season. We know what the top of the food chain looks like. What do we do? What are the steps to get there? That's our approach. Does much change tactically? No. We need to be better, faster, stronger."

But they will have to get through Section 2-3A first.

The section of Elizabeth Forward, Ringgold, Belle Vernon, Connellsville, Lau-

rel Highlands, Albert Gallatin, Uniontown and TJ still features a lot of strong teams. The section lost some top players, so the Jaguars will look to take advantage before looking to make a run in the district playoffs and beyond.

"Belle Vernon loses a big piece, so it's gotta change the way they play," Richter said. "I look for them to come out with a different look, so that'll be interesting. I think Ringgold, they didn't lose much and they have a new

coach, so I think they'll get better.

"Elizabeth Forward will be interesting. They don't lose anything and they come back with (new coach) Sotiri (Tsourekis) who's a good coach. He's been around and I know he knows what he's doing, so I'm excited. I look forward to the challenge. You want to play good teams and you want to be pushed or it's really hard to maintain a high level for your own team."

the first team WPIAL Class 1A squad. Junior libero Cassidy Trahan is also back, and she is also coming off a season where she was first team all-section and Class 1A.

Other key contributors coming back this fall are senior defensive specialist Caitlyn Cooley (second team all-section), senior hitter Olivia Hussein (first team all-section/ second team Class 1A) and senior hitter Maria Goldstein (second team all-section).

Senior Brianna Battles, who also was a force for the Serra basketball team, will see some action in front of the net to add more depth as a hitter.

"These girls are very comfortable playing together," Coach Trahan said. "They have played as a unit a lot over the last couple of years. We expect to be deep and get contributions from some younger kids

as well. We want to be a ball control offense and have our top players touch the ball. It starts with Cassidy and Caitlyn digging the ball to Emerson, and then Emerson setting up the right hitter at the net."

Serra has been utterly dominant in section play over the years, as they have won their last 24 games in section play and are 58-2 in section play since 2018.

"We have always put a strong em-


phasis on section play throughout the years," Coach Trahan pointed out. "I think we have won the section 10 out of the last 12 years. Before you make a playoff run, you've got to first win your section and get a good seed. We have been in some pretty competitive sections over the years, and I think that level of play has only helped us in the playoffs."

## Frazier starts title defense, sweeps Cougars

Defending Class 1A champions handle Charleroi – 25-19, 25-20, 25-18 – with balanced offensive

The Frazier volleyball team opened up defense of their WPIAL Class 1A championship in impressive fashion Monday, picking up a 3-0 sweep over visiting Charleroi at Henry DiVirgilio Field House.

The Commodores (1-0) won by scores of 25-19, 25-20 and 25-18.

While it wasn't the prettiest game on either side of the net, with both teams committing numerous hitting and service errors, Frazier head coach Mandy Hartman was proud to see her team back on the court in dominant fashion.

"As ugly as it was at times, if I wasn't in this position before, I'd be concerned. But I know the things I saw in this game were things that are going to clean themselves up as we move on, even within the next week," she said. "We just weren't as sharp as maybe I thought we'd be."

Coming off a championship in the Chartiers-Houston tournament over the weekend, Charleroi coach Ashley Abbott thought she'd see a little more from her team coming in with a little momentum.

"Just a lot of errors all over the court," Abbott said. "I always say

Frazier, carried much of last season by Jensyn Hartman and Braylin Salisbury, looks a lot different this year with the ability to attack from all over the court.



When Jack Kelley took over the South Allegheny volleyball squad five years ago, the Gladiators reached new heights and achieved a lot of firsts for the program

on the court.

After a 2022 season in which a young, Gladiators team missed the playoffs with a fifth-place finish, Kelley and the rest of the team are eager to continue their upward climb.

"I think we are at a good place right now," said Kelley, a 1986 Belle Vernon Area graduate and coach since 2003. "We have an exciting

mix of youth and experience. We have three, crafty seniors with 80 matches of varsity experience. They will lead this promising group of rapidly improving underclassmen."

SA went 6-12 last year, 6-8 in Section 2-2A. The season prior, the Gladiators won the section crown with the help of seven seniors.

"In 2022, we were trying to replace seven starters from our section championship team," Kelley pointed out. "That pretty much explains the dropoff. On top of that, one of our starters injured her ankle and missed the beginning of the season. The result was a lot of inexperienced girls playing unfamiliar positions."

The Gladiators started section play last season with a 2-5 record, but bounced back with a 4-3 finish. That

included an upset win over highly touted Fort Cherry.

SA lost three seniors from last year's team, but one was four-year starting setter Angelina Cortazzo.

"I think we will have 15 girls dressed for varsity this season," Kelley expressed. "While that sounds excessive, it is. We have so many varsity-capable players. A lot of the younger girls will see playing time on JV, but we have really solid depth at all positions. Eight of our top 15 will be sophomores and freshmen."

The Gladiators will be anchored by three seniors, 5-8 middle-hitter Lexi Lundberg, 5-8 middle-hitter Bri Hayes and 5-4 outside-hitter Lindy Lucas. Both Lundberg and Hayes are coming off junior campaigns in which they were selected third-team all-section.

"Those three seniors do everything well on the court for us," Kelley stated. "They play all six rotations. It's difficult to find occasions to take them off the court, but I think I need to remind myself to give them a rest every now and then. They've been an integral part of our program the last five years. They're always in the gym and they help with the middle school and our youth camps.

"They are tough, consistent players. They work hard and rarely disappoint. I try not to think about it, but I am not sure what we will do without them next year. I have never been without them."

Junior Ava Chizmar and sophomore Ava Luft will look to solidify the setter position, while sophomore Regan McBeth (5-11) and freshman Ally Chizmar will be forces at the net.

"Regan started as a freshman and did a nice job," Kelley said. "She has improved every aspect of her game. She hits harder than anyone I've ever coached. Ally might be the best all-around player who ever walked into our gym (as a freshmen). She will start the season playing right side for varsity, but she projects to a 6-rotation, OH in the near future."

The Gladiators again will be up against Brentwood, East Allegheny, Fort Cherry, Keystone Oaks, Seton La-Salle, South Park and Steel Valley.

"We do have a tough section," Kelley said. "Of the 32 all-stars in our section, 20 graduated. It looks like most teams will be installing new setters into the lineup. There are also some new coaches in the section, too. It is going to be up for grabs. But South

Park won it last year, so they will probably have a 'been there done that' advantage.

"I'd like to think SA will be near the top of the standings come the end of the season."

After a non-section loss to Ringgold and a thrilling win against Elizabeth Forward Wednesday, SA will start section play Tuesday at home against East Allegheny.

"We are cautiously optimistic," Kelley explained. "Cautious because we need to replace our seniors and our setters still need to sync up with our hitters. But we are also optimistic, because we were playing pretty good volleyball down the stretch last year. All those girls last year gained valuable, varsity experience and are playing with a lot of confidence."

# Ruey recalls some of the Valley's best athletes

Speer Ruey played one year of basketball, and two seasons of football at what he called the "monster position, like a free safety or a roving linebacker."

The president of his senior class of 1968, he also spent all three of his Donora High School years on the baseball team.

With his background, who better to share thoughts on some of the Valley athletes he saw and competed against.

"The best curveball pitcher I ever saw was Jimmy Parsons at Donora High. What's ironic about that is when we played Little League, I caught him and I could read him like a book," Ruey said. "And that curve was almost unhittable - it broke a few feet.

"When I played PONY League,

Bernie Galiffa was his catcher. I just sat on Jimmy's fastball because he didn't have an outstanding fastball, so I hit him pretty well."

Parsons once held Ruey's team to five hits and Ruey had four. "The other guys were biting on his

curve, but I just let them go," Ruey said. "He played Legion ball with us with the Charleroi Magicians." One of the fastest pitchers that he remembers was Vic Worry at Bell-

"I batted against him when I was a sophomore. Ed Miller was a good pitcher for them, too," Ruey said. "They could really bring it."

Another Valley star was Donora's John Peltz, a slick infielder out of the Class of 1967. Ruey said he was virtually guaranteed to make any team he tried out for "because he was that good.'


One outfielder Ruey singled out was Jack Lundy.

"He was one of the smoothest center fielders - he looked like Andy Van Slyke out there," Ruey recalled. "Everything was real fluid with him. He robbed a home run off me once and I ended up marrying his sister."

As for the high school basketball scene, Ruey called Dragons' star Galiffa "the best passer, by far. He made people look silly. I'd say he was the best shooter, too.'

Sticking with Dragons, Ruey added, "Another one of the best shooters I saw was Dennis Lomax, who had a great jump shot. Rick Booth was an excellent shooter. Inside the paint 'Simmie' Keith James, had a real nice jump shot, and Kenny Griffey had a great shot."

Ruey's sharp memory took him to many schools around the Valley, and that included Monongahela's John Radic, who was also a good running back on the gridiron.

"I remember Chuck Roman from Monessen who was a really good shooter," Ruey said. "They didn't have much of an offense, so he kind of took over. And there was a really good ballplayer named Junior Wilson for Belle Vernon and Rich Planey, too.

"Gene Belczyk was a three-sports star at Belle Vernon. In baseball, he had a real strong arm and he could fly in the outfield. The top four athletes I ever saw and played with were Ken Griffey, Bernie Galiffa, Malcom Lomax and Belczyk."

Ruey is also proud of another Donora athlete, his father, a man who exemplified Western Pa. blue-collar pride and grittiness.

"My dad played (defensive) end on the 1932 Donora Dragon team when they defeated Monongahela, 7-6. He was about 5-8, probably about 150 pounds. He blocked two punts in the game on a frozen field. It was like 15 degrees, and he caught the winning pass to end the game.

# Mistakes hurt Cal in loss to No. 14 Shepherd

California had plenty of offensive firepower on Saturday afternoon.

The Vulcans finished with 570 yards of total offense and featured a 400-yard passer, a 200-yard receiver and a running back who nearly surpassed the 100-yard plateau. Mistakes came back to

haunt them, though. Cal committed three turn-

overs, including one with five-plus minutes remaining, and allowed 14 unanswered points in the final six and a half minutes of a 44-34 loss to No. 14 Shepherd at Adamson Stadium.

The Vulcans (1-1), who also surrendered a special teams touchdown in the second half, lost a fumble and Davis Black threw an interception on back-to-back drives in the first quarter before Black's second interception led to a game-clinching touchdown for the Rams (3-0) in the fourth.

"I thought we improved from last week, but we gave them too many," California head coach Gary Dunn said. "We just made too many mistakes to beat a good football

Shepherd trailed 34-30 before taking the lead for good with around 6:30 remaining in the game.

Quarterback Seth Morgan, who completed 26 of 33 passes for 326 yards and

four touchdowns, capped off a seven-play drive with a 6-yard touchdown pass to Jeremiah Taylor in the corner of the end zone. An extra point by James Bozek allowed the Rams to take a 37-34 lead.

Cal look to respond on its next possession, but it ended prematurely, as a pass from Black was a bit overthrown and went off the hands of Eric Willis III. It landed in the hands of Shepherd defensive back Donte Harrison, who returned it to the Cal 31yard line.

Seven plays later, Morgan was in the end zone following a 1-yard touchdown run that capped off the scoring and put the game out of reach.

"It's not an excuse, but we're playing a lot of young kids, and we've got to grow up quick," Dunn said. "We're

making way too many mistakes on both sides of the ball and on special teams. You're not going to beat a 14thranked team in the country when you make the kind of mistakes that we did."

The team exchanged leads throughout the second half, as Cal held a 21-17 advantage at halftime.

On the lone play of the Vulcans' second drive, they extended that lead.

Black connected with Willis on a bubble screen and the 5-8, 160-pound sophomore receiver did the rest, taking it to the house from 95 yards out to make it 28-17 in favor of Cal.

The touchdown grab was one of two on the day for Willis, who also scored on a massive 91-yard touchdown in the second quarter.

Willis, who finished with 273 yards as a freshman last year, posted the second-most single-game receiving yards in school history by finishing with six catches for 274 vards. He was just eight yards shy of the mark set by Garry Brown in 2014.

"Eric is dynamic and we look to find ways to get the ball into his hands," Dunn said. "For him to have six catches for 274 yards is incredible."

Omari Hopkins led the Vulcans with seven catches and totaled 73 yards with two touchdowns. Demonte Martin had five catches for 56 yards.

"We need to get more guys involved. I thought Omari Hopkins had a good game, but we need other guys to step up," Dunn said. "We can't have just three receivers, we need other guys to contribute in crucial spots."

The excitement from Willis' second long touchdown reception was short lived, as Cameron Dorner returned the ensuing kickoff 96 yards for a Rams touchdown, cutting

the deficit to 28-24.

Four minutes later, Dorner was on the receiving end of a 49-yard touchdown pass from Morgan that made it 30-28. Dorner had a team-high nine receptions for 124 yards and two touchdowns, including a 27-yard reception in the final minute of the first half.

Cal answered Dorner's second touchdown reception with 9:33 to go in the fourth when Black connected with Hopkins from 2 yards out to allow Cal to momentarily regain the lead at 34-30.

"You can't turn the ball over twice going into the red zone, you can't give up a kickoff return for a touchdown and you can't give up big plays. That was the story of the game, but I'm still super proud of the way the kids battled and competed."

Shepherd held an early 10-0 lead after a 25-yard score from Morgan to Kordell Batten in the first quarter and a 43-yard field goal by Bozek in the opening minutes of the

Then, Black began to heat up under center for the Vul-

In his second start donning the black and red, Black completed 19 of 31 passes for 411 yards and four touchdowns.

He threw for two touchdowns in each half, adding a 22-yard strike to Hopkins with just over a minute left in the half.

### 'Pope' was one of Army's all-time best athletes

For those lucky enough to have seen Donora's Arnold Galiffa perform his incredible feats, this story is a refresher course on "Pope." For younger readers, consider this to be a history lesson, as Galiffa figures richly in Valley lore and national sports history as well.

His 1944 Dragons football team won the WPIAL Class AAA championship with him under center and as a defensive back. The team went 9-0, capping things off by claiming the championship in a 35-7 breeze over New Kensington.

The DHS offense averaged 36 points per game and surrendered a total of 42 points.

That same year, he was a star on the basketball team which also steamrolled its way to the WPIAL title. Winning both crowns in the same season gave Donora the distinction of being the first team to accomplish this.

Galiffa was named All-State

in both sports. The 6-2, 190-pound Galiffa

wasn't through that year. He was a bright spot on both the track and field and the baseball teams. Before leaving school, he racked up 12 varsity letters. It led to 27 colleges trying to lure him to their school.

He chose to play for Army, where this time he earned All-American honors and more letters, 11, than any other West Point grad ever except for one. He finished as high as fourth in the voting for the Heisman Trophy in 1949. To top things off, he was elected to the College Football Hall of

Interestingly, that was the season that Army had an assistant coach who had yet to gain national fame, but would about 10 years later. It was Vince Lombardi, who earned most of his stellar reputation as the head coach of the Green Bay Packers.

Galiffa helped his team score 354 points while the defense was stingy, giving up just 69. He helped Army conclude the

season fourth in the Associated Press national poll. A recap of his career shows

he led the team in passing in 1947 through 1949. In 1947, he completed 22 of 49 passes for 295 yards, not a ton of yardage. To this day, though, the Black Knights remain a team that favors the ground game.

The following season he was 44 for 95 in the passing department for a new school record of 701 yards. In his senior season, he reached personal records for completions (50), attempts (97), yards (887) and completion percentage (51.4%).

In 1947, he took a rebuilding team to a 5-2-2 record.

He followed that season with a record of 8-0-1 the next year, with only a 21-21 tie against Navy in the year's finale spoiling a perfect season.

Then came perfection in 1949 with his 9-0 season. Galiffa led his squad to lofty point totals of 47, 42, 54, 63, and 40. Over a three-year period, his Army team scored 40 or more points 11 times, and 50+ points on four occasions.


That legacy included being featured on the front cover of

the May 2, 1949, edition of the Life Magazine.

Although Galiffa was still months away from playing in his final, record-setting season, "Life" called him "the best all-around competitor in college athletics today." He was a forward on the hoop team, the football team's quarterback, and a first baseman and pitcher in baseball. One picture featured Galiffa wearing his cadet uniform while surrounded by the uniforms he wore while playing his various

Galiffa, who spent time in the NFL and the Canadian Football League before injury ended his football days, was part of a chain of family members to play quarterback at Donora. Two of his nephews, Frank and Bernie also handled that position in the 1960s. Bernie went on to become a record setter himself at West Virginia University.

The Valley lost a sports legend in Arnold Galiffa way too early when he passed away in 1978 at the age of 51.

# Detective back on job after drug case is dismissed, but charges could be refiled

The DA's office rehired Raymond Bonacci, 57, of Elizabeth after the charges were dismissed.

A Westmoreland County district judge dismissed charges last week against a former detective with the Allegheny County District Attorney's Office who police said provided testosterone and Adderall to his son when he played high school foot-

The DA's office rehired Raymond Bonacci, 57, of Elizabeth after the charges were dismissed, though the case has been referred to the state Attorney General's Office and charges could be refiled.

The DA's office did not respond to requests for comment. The AG's office declined to comment.

Michael DeRiso, Bonacci's defense attorney, said Mon-

day that the case was a rush to judgment that was improperly handled.

"None of these allegations took place in Westmoreland County — if they are true," DeRiso said.

Bonacci was charged in mid-July with two felony counts of drug delivery after state police said they learned that he provided testosterone and Adderall to his son, Anthony Bonacci, in 2019 when the younger Bonacci was a senior center and nose guard on Franklin Regional High School's football team.

Police said that information came to light after the younger Bonacci applied for a job as a state trooper. As part of his interview process, police said he told the agency that his father gave him Adderall and testosterone in the fall of 2019 "to enhance his performance and attention," according to a criminal complaint filed in the case.

While conducting its background check of the younger Bonacci, state police said they requested an interview with the Bonacci family. During the interview, Raymond Bonacci admitted to injecting his son with testosterone and providing him with Adderall, police said.

Magisterial District Judge Charles Conway dismissed the charges during a Sept. 19 preliminary hearing.

A spokeswoman for the Westmoreland County DA's office said the office received information after the charges were filed that the case had to be prosecuted in Allegheny

Although the original criminal complaint listed Raymond Bonacci's home address in Westmoreland County's Murrysville, DeRiso said his client lives in Elizabeth in Allegheny County.

DeRiso said his client is separated from his wife, and that for years, she has lived in Murrysville while he has resided in Elizabeth.

"Mr. Bonacci had to live in Allegheny County for residency requirements for his employment," DeRiso said. "I don't think anyone is disputing where he lives."

After the charges came to light, DeRiso said his client was asked to retire by the DA's office.

"He wasn't given much of a choice based on the charges," he said. "It's just a big rush to judgment."

As for the case, the spokeswoman for the Westmoreland County DA's office said, "Upon conferring with the Allegheny County District Attorney's office and the obvious conflict of interest, we have jointly referred the criminal case to the Office of the Attorney General."

Raymond Bonacci returned to work with the Allegheny County DA's office on Monday, according to the county controller's office.

A county database that redacts officers' names showed a DA's detective matching Bonacci's hire date earning \$104,000 annually as of June.

PennDOT officials said the state will invest more than \$200 million for infrastructure and safety improvements that will help to accommodate the additional trains.

Amtrak now operates one daily round trip between Pittsburgh and New York City, via Harrisburg and Philadelphia. The agreement supports increasing that to two daily round trips. It would mark the first additional passenger train service for Western

Pennsylvania in decades. Separate federal funding is also providing new Airo trains on the route, which include new cabin interiors with panoramic windows, larger tray tables and upgraded chairs.

Amtrak's Pennsylvanian line runs through stations in Pittsburgh, Greensburg, Latrobe, Johnstown and Altoona before continuing to Harrisburg, Philadelphia and eventually New York City.

An eastbound Pennsylvanian train departs Pittsburgh once daily, at 7:30 a.m., and a westbound Pennsylvanian train arrives in Pittsburgh at 8 p.m. dai-

A feasibility report about adding a round trip said one possible schedule would have eastbound trains departing Pittsburgh at 7 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. daily and westbound trains arriving in Pittsburgh at 3 and 10 p.m. daily.


Charleroi girls soccer coach Tom Cameron asked his team one simple question before its critical Section 2-1A contest against Chartiers-Hous-

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Garrett Stubbs still stripped one strap down on his powder blue Phillies overalls at his locker, just as he did 24 hours earlier when he hosted a hoedown inside a boozesoaked clubhouse.

It was the same garish look Stubbs sported when he sprayed the team owner with bubbly. He wore overalls just as he did a night earlier when he tipped his head back and let teammates pour beer down his throat as part of a rowdy postseason clinching celebration.

Yes, Stubbs drank all the alcohol and then laughed at all the memes, the ones that showed the backup catcher would see six baseballs at once when it was his time to hit in what was affectionately called a "hangover game."

One that seemed appropriate when Stubbs awoke from a night of partying.

"Probably still a little hammered from the night before," Stubbs said, laughing.

Once at the plate, Stubbs hammered one — a three-run shot — that sparked a rally for the Phillies that was completed when Bryce Harper hit a go-ahead solo homer in the seventh inning in a 7-6 win over the Pittsburgh Pirates on Wednesday night, a day after clinching the NL's top wildcard spot.

Harper, one of the few regulars in the lineup and playing first base, had three hits, and slugged his 21st homer of the season off reliever Jose Hernandez (1-3) for the 7-6 lead.

Gregory Soto struck out the side in the ninth inning for his third save and preserved the Phillies' seventh straight win.

And yes, Stubbs survived all nine innings.

The backup catcher became a social media hit in Philadelphia after videos of him danc-

ing and drinking in overalls in the clubhouse on Tuesday night were unleashed into the viral universe, and there was faux concern that he could actually play.

Was he really hydrated? Was he rested?

"I love popping champagne," Stubbs said. "I think the rest of the guys in the locker room do, too."

Stubbs took a healthy cut on a four-seam fastball from Pirates starter Johan Oviedo in the fourth and slugged a three-run homer to right.

Phillies fans went wild for their cult hero, and he was welcomed at home with a warm embrace from Bryson Stott.

"Everybody just pulls for Stubby," Phillies manager Rob Thomson said. "He's kind of the energy guy in the clubhouse and in the dugout. He's a great teammate. One of the best teammates I've ever been around. So everybody pulls for him."

His homer cut the Phils'

His nomer cut the Phils deficit to 5-4, the second time in as many years Philadelphia trailed early in the first game after a clincher. A year ago, the Phillies secured a wild-card spot in Houston, then Ranger Suarez went out and got rocked for six runs in two innings the next game. It happened again against the Pirates.

Suarez gave up three runs in the first and two in the second against the Pirates. The 28-year-old left-hander was chased in the fifth after Jack Suwinski tripled in a run to make it 6-4.

Edmundo Sosa hit his 10th homer of the year for the Phillies, a solo shot, and Christian Pache tied the game 6-all on an RBI single in the sixth that scored Harper.

Connor Joe had four hits for the Pirates.





# Pa. officials hear Charleroi's refugee issues

The language barrier is among several challenges of trying to educate foreign-born students.

Members of the Pennsylvania Department of Education got a first-hand look Thursday at what teachers, administrators and staff are up against in the Charleroi Area School District when it comes to providing top-of-the-line education for refugee students who are now

Superintendent Dr. Ed Zelich said the meeting allowed teachers, administrators, staff and board members to sit at the table with PDE officials and other stakeholders to discuss challenges within the district as educators navigate how to best educate refugee students.

State officials at the meeting included Office of Elementary and Secondary Education Deputy Secretary Dr. Carrie Rowe, Bureau Director Amy Lena, Division Chief Carmen Medina, Nancy J. Keeling, assistant director of federal and state programs for the Northwest Tri-County Intermediate Unit, Jose Reyes-Lua, statewide program recruiter coordinator, Lavinia Ritter, PDE Intermediate Unit Migrant Education Program officer and Deke Showman, supervisor of Migrant Education for the region.

Officials heard from Zelich, who shared the district's story as it navigates education for a new population, with a focus on struggles with communication barriers, and how the PDE might be able to help.

There are 120 refugee students enrolled in the district, with the majority of new students at the el-

### LaunchBox has new McKeesport home

The former location for the initiative was destroyed in an explosion last year.

A year after the Mon Valley LaunchBox suffered a devastating setback due to an explosion inside its building, the initiative unveiled a newly renovated location on Fifth Avenue in McKeesport Thursday afternoon.

The initiative is a collaboration among the City of McKeesport, Penn State Greater Allegheny and Invent Penn State designed to provide resources, networking opportunities and facilities to aspiring entrepre-

neurs in the area. It's headed by LaunchBox Director and Penn State Greater Allegheny Director of Continuing

Education Eric Ewell. At the time of the explosion in August 2022, The Mon Valley LaunchBox was located in the former YWCA building on Ninth Avenue in McKeesport and was sharing space with the Fry Bar, Paint at Your Own Risk, Just a Little Talk Counseling Services, the Black Women's Policy Cen-

ter and Care Heart CPR. Shalay Williams, founder of Care Heart CPR, was one of the entrepreneurs who suffered monetary setbacks and lost her workspace as a result of the accident. Upon seeing the new home of the LaunchBox, Williams was

thrilled with the turnout at the new location at 225 Fifth Ave.

"It's really nice to see the new space," she said. "I love the colors and the signs on the walls. They really made sure that they brought

everything back together for us. At the time of the explosion, there were five businesses displaced, and it was very devastating. ... When we lost that space, I also lost a significant amount of equipment and thousands of dollars in CPR mannequins and emergency medical training equipment.

"LaunchBox wasted no time jumping in and helping me to continue on with my

It was sweet redemption for the Leopards, who lost in last year's championship to Sewickley Academy in a onehole playoff.

"This is so much better. It's such a sweet, sweet taste," BVA senior Rogan Maloney said. "Last season was the motivation for this year and it really fueled us heading into today."

The Leopards finished with a team score of 417, five strokes ahead of runner-up Neshannock (422).

Maloney led the way for BVA, shooting a 7-over 79. Sophomore Jack Edwards finished his round with a 9-over 81 with fellow sophomore Jordan Mocello closing it out with his 85.

It marked redemption for

Mocello, who missed a key putt on the playoff hole last season

"I feel a lot better today than I did last year," Mocello said with a smile. "I'm just glad we won it straight up and not in a playoff. We came in and wanted to win it outright and that's what we did."

Mocello finished his round on the front nine, and it didn't go quite as well as he wanted to. "This might be the worst round I've ever shot on the Gold Course," he said. "I had an unlucky 8 on No. 6. Coach came and talked to me and just told me I had a little room, so I just figured

I'm going to go out and make pars."

And that's what he did, finishing his last three holes going par, par and par.

"After last year's disappointment, we knew we had the guys to win it this season," BVA coach Melvin Gouker said. "Sometimes it was a little harder this season because we have four or five guys that can be the No. 1 guy. Even today, I mixed some things up a bit, put our No. 1 (Maloney) in the three spot.

"For Jordan, I'm really happy for him. He had the three pars to clinch it and was so locked in to close it out."

Rounding out the scoring for the Leopards were John Bellissimo and Seth Tomalski, who each shot 86.

"That's been the key for us all season. It takes consistency to win a championship," Gouker added. "Rogan wasn't happy with the way he played in the semifinals Tuesday and played a rough round. He came in really focused today."

Another detail not lost on the Leopards was some added pressure from playing at home.

"I think we were the favorites coming in, and there was a little more pressure playing the home course," Maloney said. "If we lost, there's a

lot of questions we'd need to answer. All the whys and hows."

Despite having a "homecourse advantage" Gouker said the course wasn't what his team was used to.

"The course played pretty tough today," he said. "They double cut, they double-rolled the greens. It was definitely harder than we've played it all season."

Trevor Kovatch finished the day with a 95 and had the nocount score for the Leopards. He had a disastrous hole on which he took a 15, but probably shouldn't have. In the end, it was inconsequential.

"Yeah, that was tough for him because he probably shouldn't have taken that score on the hole," Gouker said. "It was an issue with the (Interstate 70) construction. In the end, it didn't affect us, but I know he wanted to be a contributor."

With the championship in hand, the Leopards move on to the PIAA Championships Wednesday at Penn State University's White Course.

"We're playing with house money now, that's what I told them," Gouker said. "It's the program's first championship, I really want them to enjoy it. Let's go up there, enjoy the couple of days off school and see what happens. You just never know."

# Carroto nets goal No. 100, Cougars win section outright

Charleroi celebrated its first section title in eight years with a 2-0 win over South Allegheny on Senior Night.

It was a night for celebration under the lights at Charleroi's Myron Pottios Stadium Thursday.

It was a busy Thursday for Belle Vernon Area's Trevor Kovatch.

In the afternoon, Kovatch was a part of the BVA golf team that won the school's first ever WPIAL Class 2A team championship at Cedarbrook Golf Course.

Then Kovatch exchanged his golf clubs for his soccer cleats in the evening, as the junior scored a pair of goals in the Leopards' 4-0 victory over McGuffey to win the Section 3-2A title outright at James Weir Stadium.

"It wasn't too bad tonight," Kovatch said. "My legs felt a little tired in the second half, but I just pushed through it. We were really excited about the WPIAL championship and making school history. We worked for it all summer. But after. I went to the soccer field and got refocused. It was not too bad of a day winning a WPIAL title and then a section title."

The Leopards (14-2, 13-1) completed a perfect second half of the section schedule and extended its winning streak to seven games. In that win streak, BVA has outscored the competition by a 36-2 margin.

BVA also gained revenged on the Highlanders (12-5, 10-4), as Mc-Guffey gave BVA their only section setback, 2-1, on Sept. 19.

"After a little bit of a rough start, I liked how we settled into this one," BVA coach Alan Yeschenko said. "We limited our turnovers and errant passes. I think once we possessed the ball and moved it well in the midfield, that kind of deflated McGuffey. Things clicked for us when we can control the middle. To get four goals against a defensive-minded team like McGuffey is something I am really excited

After both teams traded closein free kicks that didn't produce a goal, Kovatch was able to break through with a hard shot that found the back of the net.

"It starts with our defense," Kovatch said. "The defense has carried

us all season, especially these last couple of games. To get that first goal was key and to play with that lead early on was great for our confidence. We are excited about winning the section title, but we want more in the playoffs.'

Tyler Bell grabbed the assist on the opening goal at 18:22.

The Highlanders tried to get the equalizer five minutes later when Dylan Stewart broke loose from the defense, but BVA's keeper Bryce Burkhart squared up and made his second save of the first half.

The Leopards held a 1-0 lead at halftime and outshot the visitors, 9-3, in the opening 40 minutes of play.

Brandon Yeschenko tallied the opening shot of the second half six

minutes in, but the Highlanders keeper, Sam Stout, was there for the point blank save. Stout was busy all night, and he recorded nine stops in between the pipes for the visitors.

### McKeesport's Marty Vaughn was a trailblazer at QB

Marty Vaughn was not only a great football player for McKeesport High, he was also a pioneer.

He guided his Tigers to a 9-1 record as a senior and in 1973, he became one of the first Black quarterbacks to play in the Ivy League, doing so for the Pennsylvania Quakers.

His trailblazing ways were never more evident than on Oct. 6, 1973, when he and opposing quarterback Dennis Coleman of Brown became the first-ever pair of Black quarterbacks to start a major college game. Vaughn said that he and Coleman

knew they were making history, and realized there were only about five college Black quarterbacks in the entire nation at that time. He said they wanted to put on a good display, and they did.

Vaughn led his team to a 28-20 victory, throwing for 200 yards, and Coleman ended up rushing for more than 10 yards per carry. Chris Berman of ESPN did a

nice piece on Vaughn at a pre-Super Bowl event this year when all of the conversation was about the first time there would be two Black quarterbacks starting in the Super

Super Bowl LVII featured Patrick Mahomes of the Chiefs and Jalen Hurts of the Eagles in February of 2023, but the Ivy League had the NFL beat by decades.

As for Vaughn's feats, in his first collegiate season his completion rate was 55% for 1,926 yards. His 17 touchdown tosses helped him earn a quarterback rating of 153.3, playing for a coach with a fitting name for a bold leader, Harry Gam-


In Vaughn's next and final season, he completed 52.6% of his passes and added a dozen more touchdowns through the air. A recent article stated Vaughn still ranks sixth all-time at Penn for career passing yardage and 10th for his best single-season output.

The humble and articulate Vaughn said, "When I got to Penn, there was myriad people from Asia, Africa, and Black, Hispanic, Caucasian and Jewish Americans – we all lived in the same dorms, but with different backgrounds.

"It was a microcosm of what the world is. It was a relaxed, friendly atmosphere and we exchanged ideas. It was like how I grew up in McKeesport."

Off the gridiron, Vaughn continued his winning ways which was not surprising to high school classmates who saw him as a natural leader in and out of the classroom.



The No. 3 Cougars didn't capitalize on as many opportunities as head coach Tom Cameron would have liked, but they did enough to come away with a 4-1 win over No. 14 Riverside in the first round of the 1A tournament at Myron Pottios Stadium.

McKenna DeUnger netted two goals, while Rhianna Grogan and Ella Sypolt each added goals to help lead Charleroi (15-2) to its first playoff win in seven years.

"I'm happy and I'm proud that my girls got their first playoff win," Cameron said. "We had so many opportunities, but we unfortunately pressed and played too fast. We tried to beat too many people when we have to find the open player and put the ball in

the back of the net."

Charleroi finished with 29 total shots, as Riverside goalkeeper Sianna Falk made eight saves.

Riverside (4-9) finished with

six total shots, making Cougars netminder Addison Conrad have to tally five saves.

DeUnger helped lead the offensive effort for Charleroi, which finished with 17 total

shots and three goals before halftime.

DeUnger, who entered the contest three goals shy of joining the 100-goal club, fired at least three shots at the net within the opening 10 minutes of the game.

She rang one off the cross bar with just under 32 minutes on the clock before having another saved by a defender a minute later.

The Carroto-DeUnger connection connected again with 9:32 remaining in the half. Carroto delivered a perfect through ball and DeUnger used her speed and scored on a breakaway to get No. 99 in her career and give Charleroi a 3-0 cushion heading into halftime.

"I know we had a few different players with four or five shots, and we have to put those balls in the net," Cameron said. "We have to convert the chances that we create. This game should have been over at halftime."

Sypolt scored 14 minutes into the second half following a corner-kick by Taylor Ramsdell to give Charleroi a 4-0 lead.

Down the stretch, DeUnger had more than a few chances to get her 100th career goal, including a shot with just under five minutes left that rang off the left post.

Riverside eventually broke through with just over a minute left on a goal by Gi Finch.

"I can't fault the girls for their effort," Cameron said. "The last 15 minutes or so, we were back on our heels. We'll give them (today) off and get back at it Thursday to get ready for Saturday."

The Cougars turn their attention to a Saturday quarterfinal matchup against No. 6 Springdale, which defeated No. 11 Sewickley Academy, 10-0, Tuesday.

"They're a little faster, a little stronger and they have some kids who can move the ball around a little bit," Cameron said of Springdale. "I expect them to put more pressure on our defensive third than we saw tonight. We have to play aggressive, play fast and come out ready to play from the get-go."

## Recapping the remarkable life of 'Deacon' Dan Towler

If Wheaties chose Valley athletes to feature on the cover of their boxes instead of national figures, fullback "Deacon" Dan Towler would have had one of his own. He would have been front and center, even as far back when he was a Donora High running back.

His high school feats have been widely chronicled, so a brief recap should suffice.

Towler was an integral part of Donora's back-to-back WPIAL championships in 1944 and 1945, earning All-State honors both seasons.

There's a video on YouTube entitled "Football Legend 'Deacon' Dan Towler Memorialized in His Hometown." It focuses on one of Donora's most superb athletes ever. Although his story has been widely told, there's always more to be shared.

For example, Towler is one of only six Donora players to ever win the Mon Valley Conference individual scoring championship, putting 152 points on scoreboards during the 1945 season. According to Towler's

Washington & Jefferson College roommate, Walter Cooper, Towler could run the 100-yard dash in 9.7 seconds. "I've never seen a faster

person," Cooper said. Couple that blistering speed with the steam-roller power in his 6-2, 230-pound frame,

and you have the perfect portrait of a dynamic runner. As a college junior, he led the nation in scoring with 133 points, single-handedly aver-

aging 16.6 points per game.

Three times he was named

to the Little All-American squad.

People don't normally associate such a bruising football player with high academic achievements, but Cooper said Towler was "a very bright individual," who even took four years of Greek. He graduated cum laude and was part of the 1945 All-Scholastic United States organiza-

"He later received a bachelor's degree in Divinity. He was brilliant," Cooper said.

While with the Los Angeles Rams, during the offseasons and at nights, he was able to get a doctorate at USC in education."

Cooper also said Towler was outstanding in baseball.

"He could hit a baseball a mile," Cooper said. But he focused on football. He was

talented in various intramu-


ral track and field events, including the broad jump, high jump, javelin, shot put and sprints. He had all the tools it requires to be an olympian.

According to Cooper, Towler compiled better competitive records than Bob Mathias, who won the 1948 decathlon in the Olympics.

Another YouTube video, "Deacon Dan Towler for the Pro Football Hall of Fame," makes the case for Towler deserving Hall status.

A narrator called Towler a player "close to my heart. ... One of the most underrated players in the history of pro football." He also pointed out that both Towler and NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell attended W&J.

The narrator marveled at Towler's NFL lifetime average of 5.2 yards per carry. He

# Springdale ends Charleroi's season

The Dynamos scored four firsthalf goals en route to a 6-2 win over the Cougars.

Sometimes speed kills on a soccer field, and Springdale just had too much for Charleroi to handle.

After getting the opening goal a minute in, the Cougars couldn't maintain that pressure and couldn't control the Dynamos' team speed in a 6-2 loss Saturday afternoon at Myron Pottios Stadium in Class 1A quarterfinal girls' soccer action.

"Springdale is a very good team," Charleroi coach Tom Cameron said. "You can't take anything away from them. They have a lot of speed and have a lot of girls that can score. The film didn't lie, we knew it would be a challenge today."

The No. 3 Cougars (15-3) were looking for their first semifinal appearance since 2015. That season, Charleroi defeated New Brighton in the round of eight and then Shady Side Academy in the semifinals before falling to Greensburg Central Catholic in the finals in overtime.

With the win, the No. 6 Dynamos (14-3) will move on to face No. 2 Freedom, a 3-2 winner over Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, in the semifinals Tuesday.

Springdale lost to Freedom in the championship game last year.

"Our balance scoring has carried us this season," Springdale coach Marc Bentley said. "Whether we play Freedom or OLSH, we just have to continue to play the same style. Both are good teams. We will concentrate on our play and focus on putting more balls in the back of the net."

Coming into the game, Springdale had scored 92 goals, 10 of which were in their first-round contest against Sewickley Academy. The Dynamos finished third in a stacked Section 1-1A behind top seed Riverview and GCC.

"They come from a very good section," Cameron said. "They were probably tested a lot in section play and they know how to score. They are fast and well-coached. They played a physical game and we didn't have an answer for it today."

The first goal was scored by

Charleroi just 50 seconds in and it was a historic goal by McKenna DeUnger. The senior midfielder was battling for possession of the ball 20 yards away from the net, but her hard shot ricocheted off a defender and then off the near post before bouncing into the back of the

The goal by DeUnger was the 100th of her storied career with the Cougars. She is the sixth player to join the milestone goal list. Bella Carroto, who tallied her 100th career goal earlier in the season, as-

Charleroi, unfortunately, couldn't celebrate the goal for very long as Springdale came storming back with the tying goal by Molly Hurley 34 second later.

The Cougars had their second shot of the day in front of the visitors' net went wide right, but on the play DeUnger was injured. At the 31:14 mark of the first half, DeUnger exited the game and did not return.

"I hate making excuses, but not having Boots really stung," Cameron said. "She is such a big part of our team. Our girls played hard and we fought, but those early goals put us back on our heels. We used a different formation in our attack and it didn't work."

With Charleroi being without one of their top scorers, Springdale took full advantage and titled the field in their favor. After several scoring chances were thwarted by Cougars' keeper Addison Conrad, the Dynamos struck for a 2-1 lead after another goal by Hurley at 22:38.

Hurley completed the hat trick with a marker with 2:10 left in the first half and then the visitors extended its advantage to 4-1 with a goal by Charli McClafferty 50 seconds before halftime.

Conrad was extremely busy in net for Charleroi in the first half, as Springdale held a 16-3 shot advantage over the Cougars in the opening 40 minutes of play.

After the teams battled for possession to start the second half, the Cougars climbed back into the quarterfinal contest with a goal by Rhianna Grogan at 29:46. Carroto had an assist on the goal.

Charleroi had another chance that was stopped, and then Springdale countered with a huge, insurance

goal with a shot from 20 yards out by Hailey Marchlewski with 27:39 left in regulation.

"We played really well in the first half and bounced back from that early deficit," Bentley said, "We got everyone involved and we moved the ball well in the offensive third. These girls had resiliency and they are not satisfied with a one or two goal lead. Our message is to always attack and be the aggressors."

The play was more even in the second half, as Springdale held an 8-4 edge in shots. Conrad finished with 10 saves in net.

Briana Ross, who had four goals in the first round triumph over Sewickley, ended the scoring in the game with a goal at the 2:50 mark of the second half. The marker was her 41st of the season.

Baileigh Hass was credited with two stops in net for the Dynamos.

Despite the postseason setback, Charleroi had a historic season by winning their section and capturing its first playoff victory since 2016. The Cougars will lose six key seniors - DeUnger, Carroto, Conrad, Camryn Musser, Ella Sypolt and Taylor Ramsdell.

"The girls gave it their all this season," Cameron said. "You can't take that away from them. We have worked our butts off the last three seasons and these seniors have faced some adversity. We went through some agony and self-doubt, but we came together this fall. They gave me their heart and soul."

The high-scoring duo of DeUnger and Carroto ended their spectacular careers with some staggering numbers and milestones. DeUnger has totaled 100 careers goals with 36 career assists, and Carroto has compiled 101 goals with 68 assists.
