CHURCH DOORS RE-OPEN FOR IN-PERSON WORSHIP



Saint Stephen

UMC, like many churches around the world, moves from assembling in the physical church to on-line ministry. This shift redefined what

we understood to be a "church without walls." Of course, this was unexpected and even shocking to know there was an unknown virus (Covid-19), and it would change they way we worship forever.

Although the church was changed, making disciples did not change and that is the ultimate mission of the church, and

that continued. A decision was made to return to the church building June 6, 2020. Members were required to wear a mask, check temperatures, and social distance in the sanctuary.



In addition, virtual worship continued in tandem.

Virtual Vs. In-Person Worship







Offering prayer and encouragement prior to starting would give them confidence and faith to prepare for a successful year in the "new normal."




The speakers were introduced by **Yasmire Evans**, Junior at Clemson University, Clemson, SC; Marcus Jarvis, Senior at





The SAINT Unites For A Worthy Cause!

SAGE, the Spirited Anointed Gifted Eagles ministry along with other members of Saint Stephen UMC and the virtual audience demonstrated what it means to answer the call of the those who are in need.

Henry Miller, the Director of the Samaritan House of Orangeburg shared the needs of the shelter during a meeting and how the SAGE ministry could help. While there were many needs, the members were intentional about choosing a mission that would benefit the most people and have the greatest impact.

Mr. Miller expressed the need for bed pillows. He explained that with the transition of the number of transients they have during any given week, "they go through a lot of pillows." He further explained that when they come, they are given a basket with toiletries and a pillow. Due to COVID guidelines, the member takes the pillow upon leaving the shelter. This rotation in and out can deplete their pillow inventory quickly.

SAGE decided that they would purchase at least seventy-five pillows and maybe rotate this mission among the other Life groups in the church. **Rev**.

Charles L. White, Jr., liked the mission idea and decided to challenge the church by doing a pillow drive to help with SAGE's missionary project. The drive culminated June 30th during regular morning worship service.

Mr. Miller was invited to attend worship service and was able to receive more than two hundred (200) pillows to take back with him to The Samaritan House. Thanks to the Men's Ministry who assisted with delivering the pillows to the Samaritan House.

Janelle S. Mitchell, chairperson of SAGE thanked all who participated and shared with Mr. Miller that this would be a continuous partnership, and we look forward to future missions with The Samaritan House.

was in need of baby items for their **TOBY's Place**, an extension of their services for women and children who have experienced homelessness and trauma, and SAGE answered their call. With over seven gift baskets, filled with the items requested via a list from **Danielle Morris**, **Executive Coordinator**, a group of SAGE members traveled to Columbia May 6th to present these items to the director and offered our services to the outreach program that pro-

vides shelter meals and chapel services to those in desperate need. Oliver Gospel was founded by Reverend Oliver in 1888 and over the years has expanded its services to 24/7 emergency meals and shelter, addiction recovery, case management, counseling, and career and lift skills development.

Green for assisting with coordinating the beautiful gift baskets which consisted of diapers, pampers, pull ups, baby bottles, baby foods, batteries, cereal, sippy cups, and other baby items donated by the SAGE members. future needs. The need arose in October when the director requested a need for cleaning supplies for their facilities.

SAGE gathered over seven (7) boxes of various cleaning supplies donated and purchased by SAGE members.

who along with his co-workers at Valley Proteins in Orangeburg donated financially to purchase over fifty plus cleaning items to accompany what SAGE already collected. Thanks to Linda Larkin and Tracie Green who did the packing of the collected items after worship service and Gail Jarvis and Janelle Mitchell who carried them to Columbia to Oliver Gospel Mission on October 26th.




Hide the Word in Your Heart Lille Hibbler

Peace Corps volunteers were sent back to the US to avoid an outbreak of the Covid Virus, specifically because they were located in remote areas, with little access to hospitals.


