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Our environment is structured so our curriculum is child-centered which implies that learning is both child initiated, and teacher facilitated. We focus on the process of learning in all its intricacies, not just the end result or the product.

Our mission is to maintain a safe, healthy, affordable and nurturing environment where the developmental and educational needs of children are addressed while providing engagement with the natural world, where nature is an integral, joyful part of daily learning.



WHAT WE DO

PROGRAM OFFERINGS AT THE CHILDREN'S DISCOVERY CENTER

INTER-GENERATIONAL PROGRAMS

The CDC partners with our local senior citizen nursing facility, the Sublette Center, and our Senior Activities Center, Rendezvous Pointe. Our preschoolers and the seniors combine to form fun and meaningful relationships, resulting in a magical way for kids and seniors to bond together. Once a week, our 3-4-year-old and 4-5-year-old groups walked to the nearby facilities to visit seniors who are eagerly waiting. This program is on a temporary hiatus due to COVID-19.

YOGA

On Thursday's, our 4-5-year-old group participated in meditative Yoga and movement, with yoga instructor Tillie Dibben. This type of activity seems therapeutic with children showing marked improvement in focus on all types of life activities. A favorite amongst many of the preschoolers!

SWIM LESSONS

In a county of 1,300 lakes, it is important that preschoolers know how to swim. There are many benefits for kids to learn: Safety, increases strength and fitness, social development and confidence, and overall lifelong skills. Last Fall and Summer our preschoolers enjoyed indoor swim lessons at the Pinedale Aquatic Center (PAC).

ROCK CLIMBING

In our Summer Program, our preschoolers participated in Rock Climbing at the PAC. Although our lessons were few due to COVID and other planning obligations, rock climbing was a fun activity offered this summer. We hope in 2021 that we will add a rock-climbing club for preschoolers. Indoor rock climbing is an activity that will not only keep a child involved but will help them gain enough confidence to push through when things get tough.

SKI PROGRAM WITH WHITE PINE RESORT

In January 2020, we began our 6th year of ski lessons at White Pine Ski Resort. Our ‘Penguins’ participated in an 8-week Ski Program during the Winter Season. This past year we had 15 – 3, 4 and 5-year olds enrolled into the Ski Program. We look forward to continuing this wonderful enriched program for our preschoolers!

GYMNASTICS

Participating in gymnastics from a younger age is important. It targets all muscle groups for total-body strength and flexibility. In our Summer Program, our 2, 3, and 4-year olds participated in Gymnastics on Thursday’s with WYLD dance instructor, Anastasia Hamilton.

LITERACY PROGRAM

Liz Palmer, our local Youth Services Librarian read to our students at the Sublette County Library every other week during the months of October to March. Because of COVID, this program had to be cancelled for the remainder of the year. However, the Sublette County Library thought of other ways to engage the community with their Summer Reading Program, featuring 'Storywalk". Every 2 weeks, the library printed, laminated and staked out a story and placed it on the walking path at the American Legion Park.

FOOD PROGRAM

Did you know that full time preschoolers consume 50-75% of their required dietary intake while they are in care? The CDC is also the only non-profit preschool who serves breakfast, lunch and a snack to preschoolers and staff members daily as part of a focus on healthy food feeding active young minds. During our mealtimes, we serve our food in a family style setting. Children serve themselves, learn table manners, language and social skills, help set the table and put away their dishes. Our staff are viewed as a model for the children, gently encouraging them to try new foods and educating them about what they are putting into their bodies (i.e. red foods are good for your heart). Along with mealtimes, we have a cooking class where the students create meals (typically from the veggies at the local grocery store or from our greenhouse) and the process of them creating the meal and seeing the finished product helps encourage the students to try the dish. In 2019 we served 13,411 meals!

SUMMER PROGRAM

The CDC not only provides summer childcare with certified staff, but our Summer Program integrates outdoor education into the student's everyday activities. Having childcare continue throughout the summer allows parents to continue to work as most parents' jobs do not stop in the summer. From fishing at the town pond, hiking to the top of White Pine, visiting Sommer's Homestead, and swim lessons at the PAC, our Summer Program tends to be the highlight of the year. This past summer, the CDC had 56 students (the most we have ever had in a Summer Program) and collaborated with 20 different organizations/businesses in Sublette County.



GARDENING SPACES

Gardening is an integral part of our program, where our students are actively engaged in all stages involved with growing. The students at the Children's Discovery Center are fortunate to have structures (Growing Dome and Hoop House) that allow us to extend the season in this sub-alpine climate. This program helps establish healthy behaviors that have a lifelong impact on the child's quality of life. Students prep the soil in the Spring, plant seeds, water and tend the plants until maturity. Once Summer is here, our students attend the local Farmer's Market to sell the produce, baked goods, handmade items, and a variety of other items.

STAINED GLASS

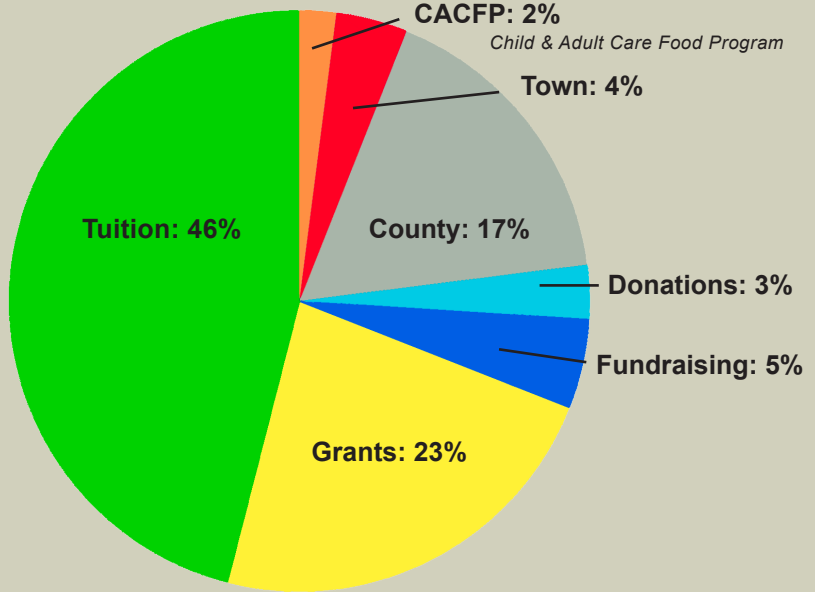
Since 2015, the Children's Discovery Center has collaborated with local artist, Hayley Ruland who introduces students ages 2-5 to stained glass, providing each student with the opportunity to create unique pieces of work. In December 2019, we were pleased to hear that the Pinedale Fine Arts Council would be assisting Hayley in these efforts, additionally covering the financial costs that we incur. PFAC and Hayley were able to provide 39 students each with unique pieces of stained glass, and a large piece of glass to be hung at the CDC.

CLAY POTTERY

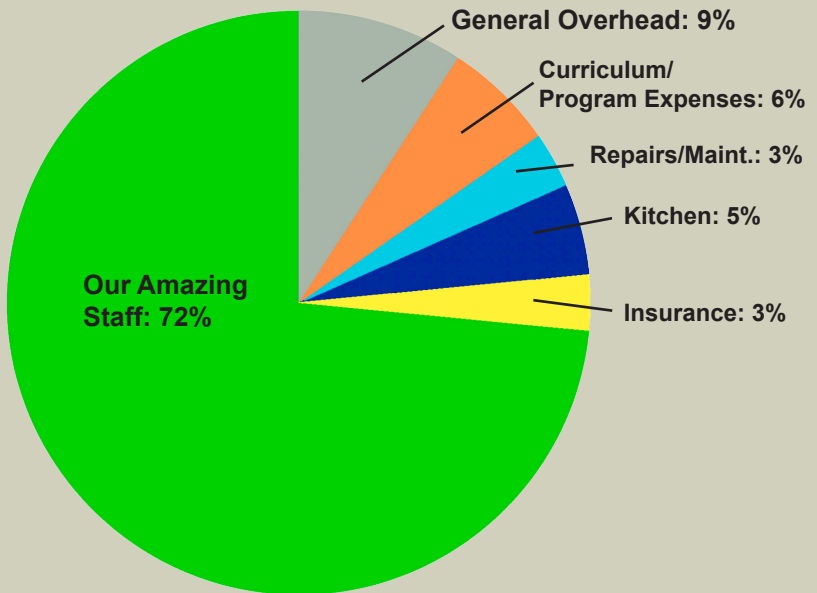
In our second year, Mae Orm local artist and business owner of Pinedale Arts and Crafts, provided a 2-week clay pottery class to our preschoolers.

COVID-19

The CDC was forced to close its doors from March 23rd until April 3rd due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On April 6th, the CDC was one of two childcare facilities in Pinedale to re-open its doors only for services to children of the 'essential personnel': serving 8 children, ages 2-8. During the month of April, we kept our Head Teacher and Executive Director on as full-time employees, but had to temporarily lay off 4 employees during that time due to lack of income. On May 4th, the CDC was able to re-open its doors to all families who needed childcare, which resulted in bringing back 35 students, as well as rehire 4 employees back to the school. Additionally, we served 8 Kindergarteners, 2 First-grade students, 1 in Third Grade and 1 in Fifth grade with online learning lessons as well as homework sent from school. On June 1st, our Summer Program began and we served



56 children ages 2-7, along with 1 Executive Director, 1 Head Cook/Assistant Director and 4 full-time teachers.
