





Every roof wears differently relative to its age, number of layers, quality of the materials, method of installation, exposure to direct sunlight, prevalent weather conditions and regularity of maintenance. Recommend a licensed plumbing contractor correct as needed.

Washing machine drain line for example cannot be checked for leaks or the ability to handle the volume during drain cycle. Older homes with galvanized supply lines or cast iron drain lines can be obstructed and barely working during an inspection but then fails under heavy use. If the water is turned off or not used for periods of time (like a vacant home waiting for closing) rust or deposits within the pipes can further clog the piping system. Please be aware that the inspector has your best interest in mind. Any repair items mentioned in this report should be considered before purchase.
