Pickerington-Violet Township Historical Society members are invited to The Tabernacle on Thursday, September 14, at 5:30pm. The Tabernacle is located on the former McGill Farm at 9270 Pickerington Road. Our host is

the Tabernacle/Farm's new owner, Coyote Run LLC, represented by Historical Society members David Hague and Tammy Miller.

The Tabernacle, seen here in a 1964 photo, was constructed circa 1889 by the United Brethren Association who conducted religious services here during summer months. Guests arrived by horse and buggy or wagon and slept in tents or cottages. The Association remained an active group until 1911.

At 5:30pm, campground-style bean soup, cornbread, and beverages will be served. A tent, tables, and chairs will be set up near the farmhouse where Coyote Run hosts also will share their plans for the Tabernacle property with us. Enter the Pickerington Road property via the farmhouse drive; guests will be assisted/directed to the parking area.

# Have you stopped by our Museum to visit Pickerington's Dovel Family? Their photos, homes, clothing, jewelry and more are showcased at our Museum.

John H. Dovel, a farmer, and Grace Looker (one of James Looker's daughters) were married in Virginia in 1817. They moved with their four young daughters from Virginia to Violet Township circa 1825. Throughout the next 150 years, John, Grace and their descendents acquired thousands of acres of farmland in this area. In 2017, former Dovel properties include public lands such as: Kerr Mound; Willow Pond; Central H.S. Athletic Field; Ridgeview Junior H.S.; Pickerington's sewage plant on Hill Road South; and the Pickerington Police Station on Refugee Road.

Other Dovel land has been transformed into Shadow Oaks, Simsbury, Manor House, and Meadowbrook subdivisions; Pickerington Ridge Apartments; and the commercial businesses on all four corners of SR 256/Refugee Road.

The Dovel Family Special Exhibit showcases clothing and jewelry once worn by Dovel family members as well as photographs, an 1878 marriage certificate, baby carriage, coverlets and other artifacts belonging to the Dovels.

# Preserving Pickerington's Depot

John Grunewald spent a good part of his life restoring and caring for one of Pickerington's most historic buildings

As late as 1865, Pickerington had only 150 residents and 37 buildings. All of this changed when the Toledo & Ohio Central Railroad Company's trains rolled through Pickerington in 1880.

Pickerington's train depot housed a Western Union operation and served as both a passenger and freight station -- bringing mail, fresh bread, mail order goods and more to townspeople.

Not only did the railroad bring farm-related industry to Pickerington (flour mill, a stockyard, and a lumber yard), the railroad also allowed farmers to sell and ship their corn, hogs, cattle, poultry, flour, and dairy products to distant markets.

The development of interstate highways and commercial airlines after WWII dealt a blow to the railroad industry. In 1956, railroad passenger service was discontinued in Pickerington, and the depot was closed.

The depot was used for storage until purchased by John Grunewald in 1975. He refurbished the depot and replaced a section house that originally stood on the property. Over the next 30 years, he acquired maps, photos, lanterns, and other railroad memorabilia that he used to decorate the depot's interior.

In 1990, the Pickerington depot earned a place on the National Register of Historic Places. In an interview that same year with *The Columbus Dispatch*, John Grunewald said, "I'd like to have the depot the way it was in 1879 when it was the center of life in the town."

We like your dream, John. For now, thank you for allowing us to enjoy Pickerington's train depot in 2017 and, hopefully, for many more years to come.



The Pickerington Depot on High Street (now 50 North Center Street) was constructed in 1879 while the railroad was being built. The Flour Mill on Mill Street (now Church Street), seen at right in this circa 1910 photo, was part of the building boom that followed the trains after their 1880 arrival. Railway passenger service and the depot were abandoned in 1956. John Grunewald purchased the property in 1975.



# John Howard ("Punkey") Grunewald

John passed away May 11, 2017. He was born in Seattle, Washington on February 24, 1942. He and his family moved to Ohio when John was 8 years old. He was a graduate of Newark H.S. and the Ohio Dominican College.

John was a "Lifetime" member of the Pickerington-Violet Township

Historical Society for more than 25 years. He loved Pickerington history and accumulated a large collection of historic photos which he allowed our Historical Society to scan and use.

He worked as a State Farm Insurance agent in Pickerington for 32 years. His office was his restored historical landmark — the Pickerington depot.

John, seen in the above 2003 photo, was known by many as a fun and loving guy who readily shared his knowledge of Pickerington's history. He also loved nature and animals.

He is survived by his wife, Chinty, and sons Alex, Mick, and Andy Grunewald. Our sincere condolences to John's family.
