The Historical Aircraft Squadron is an all-volunteer, non-profit

organization dedicated to restoring, displaying, and operating former military aircraft and equipment.



Their museum houses uniforms, memorabilia, and vintage equipment from past wars. In addition, a library contains more displays as well as hundreds of books, videos, and DVDs.

Our annual members-only summer picnic will be held inside the National Barber Museum in Canal Winchester. The indoor picnic, sponsored by our Historical Society, begins at 6:30 PM followed by a self-guided tour of the Barber Museum.

The Museum re-opened earlier this month at its new location after a 2014 fire forced the move. In the new 5,000 square-foot building, you'll be able to see more than 50 barber chairs as well as collections of shaving mugs, barber's poles, razors, combs and shears. There's also a collection of bloodletting tools — reminders that barbering was a far different business in the 1600s.

LOCAL HISTORY

19th Century Medicine in Pickerington

There is a lack of history concerning the medical profession in Pickerington during the 19th century.

A great deal of this probably is due to the laxity of laws governing licensing prior to 1892 when the Medical Practices Act was enacted. *Millers History of Fairfield County* and the *Pickerington Sesquicentennial Bulletin* are some of the principal sources I found.

Through a great part of the early 19th century, many physicians had little or no formal medical education.

With very few exceptions, physicians remained in our community no longer than 2 or 3 years. However, we probably had more than our share of graduates of medical colleges during a time when a man entered the practice of medicine after "reading medicine" in some physician's office.

19th century physicians in our community included:

- Dr. William Tolbert practiced most of his 30 years in Violet Township. He had two sons who also became doctors.
- Dr. Minor probably was the first physician in Pickerington, starting his medical career here prior to 1836.
- Dr. Ewing, a graduate of Miami Medical School, practiced in Pickerington from 1852 to 1888. He also served as postmaster and justice of the peace part of this time.

- **Dr. Greg Stewart** was one of the exceptions to the short tenure of physicians here. He practiced from 1879 until 1904. He also was best remembered for his colorful and impeccable attire and his beautiful horses and buggies. He presented the appearance of "the well dressed man of his day". Dr. Stewart practiced at 38 E. Columbus Street. His "fancy" can be seen in the intricate decoration of the exterior of this grand old home.
- Dr. F.R. Morath practiced from 1885 until 1900 when he moved to Columbus to continue his work.
