Historical Society Board members and volunteers have been working during our Museum's winter closure on new things for visitors to experience when the Museum opens in 2020:

Journey Through Olde Pickerington is a new exhibit focusing on our early pioneers. The exhibit highlights Pickerington's history from its 1815 founding through incorporation as a city in 1991. Vintage items in this exhibit include:

- Circa 1883 doll belonging to Emma Bish.
- 1880 hand-held corn huskers made by Jacob Houser.
- Spikes used during 1870's Pickerington railroad construction.
- 1869 issue of Harper's Bazar.
- 1800's town pump, kerosene street lamp, and more.

LOCAL HISTORY



On November 27, 1878, Frank Dovel and Jennie Mae Smith were married. The bride wore the hand-made silk and velvet burgundy wedding gown shown here which currently is on display in our Historical Museum. The dress was donated to our Historical Society by Ann Boyer Melzer.

The photo at left is of the red-haired, 21-year old groom which appears on the couple's "Marriage Certificate" — also on display at our Museum and donated by Barbara Freeman after purchase at auction.

Although various shades of white wedding dresses were gaining momentum by the late 1800s, most brides chose a more practical style — such as

Jennie Mae's dress — that was suitable for wear as a "best dress" long after the wedding itself. At the time of the Dovel wedding, bride gowns came in a variety of colors and styles, with purchase often dictated by finances, availability of materials, and location.

After their marriage, Frank and Jennie Mae spent their entire lives at 50 Hill Road South in a brick home that currently serves as the law office of Dovel descendant Richard T. Ricketts. The home, built on 160 acres, was a wedding gift from Frank's parents, Jacob and Elizabeth Dovel. Frank and Jennie Mae had four children: Daisy, Boynton, Rose, and May Dovel. Jennie passed away in 1932, while Frank died in 1936.

Harper's Bazar America's first fashion magazine

Do you know our Historical Society Museum has a collection of vintage *Harper's Bazar* magazines dating from 1868 to 1884?

"A repository of fashion, pleasure and instruction" is how Harper's Bazar (spelled without the double "a" until 1920) described itself on the cover of its first issue on November 2, 1867. The editorial stated that the journal's mission is to be "a vast repository for all the rare and costly things of earth — silks, velvets, cashmeres, spices, perfumes, and glittering gems."

If you are interested in owning (or gifting to a friend) a piece of fashion history, our *Harper's Bazar* magazines will be available for sale for \$5.00 each — while they last — when our Museum opens for the season.

Each issue includes several pages of fashion as well as poems, short stories and — sometimes — a vintage dress pattern.
