Historical Society Acquires Player Piano

Our thanks to Barb and Dan Rankin, residents of Violet Township's Mingo Estates, who donated an early 1900's Norris & Hyde player piano to our Historical Society Museum during the summer. With the piano came a box of music rolls featuring vintage songs such as *Tie a Yellow Ribbon*, *Somewhere My Love*, *Till We Meet Again*, and *William Tell Overture*.


We hope you will share with us the joy of this music once it's safe to re-open our Museum.

For many years, this player piano belonged to Howard Milnor (*photo at right*), who was a friend of the Rankins.

Howard Milnor was an accomplished pianist and organist. He regularly played at weddings, local restaurants, and church services in the Pickerington area. Howard also provided the music for weekly Friday night sing-a-longs at Pickerington Nursing and Rehab Center where he lived for over 20 years prior to his death at age 85 in 2017.

Howard played his music entirely from memory as he was blind.

AROUND OUR MUSEUM

Pickerington's Milnor Family

Howard Milnor was the grandson of prominent Pickerington-Violet Township landowner, businessman and civic leader, William W. Milnor. The elder Milnor served on the school board during the construction and opening of Pickerington's first high school on East Street in 1907. This building now serves as Heritage Elementary School and the Pickerington Local School District Office.

The Milnor family lived in the farmhouse that is still standing at 319 North Center Street, near the intersection of Milnor Road. The former family farm has since been developed into Pickerington Meadows, Milnor Crossing Subdivision, The Meadows Apartments, and Epiphany Lutheran Church.

Howard's father was Charles R. Milnor who, with his father (William W. Milnor) in 1920, established Longview Poultry Farm, a chicken hatchery that provided chicks throughout the eastern United States.

Howard had three siblings: Helen, Kenneth, and Charles — all of whom are now deceased. The four attended Pickerington schools and had been active in the local School Alumni Association. Howard, a member of the class of 1951, entertained fellow alumni by playing the piano or organ during annual get-togethers.





LOCAL HISTORY 100 YEARS AGO

1920 Homecoming Parade

An enthusiastic booster of Pickerington in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Frank Dovel leads the 1920 Parade as Grand Marshal wearing his stove-pipe hat and riding his horse named "Billy". The crown of flowers Billy is wearing was made by Dovel's daughters, Miss May Dovel and Mrs. Rose Dovel Kallies.

Frank Dovel owned a farm and racetrack where the present Ridgeview Jr. High School currently is located. His family's brick home, still standing at 50 Hill Road South, is now owned by Dovel descendent, Rick Ricketts. This 1920 fall photo was taken by Mary Judy who, with her husband Ray Judy, owned the Pickerington Greenhouse.



1920 Huntwork-Shimp Sinclair Filling Station

Do you know where this Sinclair gas station was located? It stood on the northeast corner of Columbus and Center Streets — where the Fairfield County Sheriff's Substation stands today.

Roy Huntwork is standing by the station door, with his enlarged image underneath the station photo. In later years, Huntwork was a director of the Pickerington Bank and involved in the development of Mingo Estates.

In 1977, this downtown corner was occupied by a new brick gas station selling Sohio products and owned by Dude Harrell.



← **The Pisgah Church and burial ground**, located on the southeast corner of Routes 256 and 204, was built in 1852 as part of the United Brethren in Christ denomination.

The congregation was served by circuit riding ministers. Regular meetings were discontinued in the late 1800s, and the church was torn down circa 1920. However, the Pisgah Cemetery lives on and contains the resting places of early pioneers with names such as Harmon, Motz, Houser, Allen, Price, Ashton, Millar, and Fishbaugh.
