New at the Museum

In 1994 when Clyde Muse purchased the former Kraner General Store located at 6 Lockville Road, it came with some Kraner treasures. Muse recently donated them to our Historical Museum. In addition to this framed circa 1950 Nesbitt's California Orange cardboard advertisement, other donated items include:



- A dozen of E.D. Kraner's account ledgers, the oldest dated 1871.
- Receipt from the Fairfield County Treasurer for 1889 taxes on E.D. Kraner's lots 66-67 comprising 2.5 acres valued at \$3330. Kraner's tax was a whopping \$25.40.
- E.D. Kraner's certificate of appointment as Pickerington Postmaster from the U.S. Postmaster General dated August 14, 1897.
- Several pages of items purchased by E.D. Kraner for resale in his store which included 1/4 dozen men's derby hats: \$3; Chinchilla coat: \$5; 2 ladies felt skirts: 75¢; 1 dozen boxes rat poison: \$1.15; 1 dozen Japanese silk handkerchiefs: 75¢.

A new exhibit of these Kraner artifacts will be available for viewing when we are able to open the Museum — hopefully during April 2021.

Historical Society's Projected 5-Year Plans

Each Fall, our Historical Society Directors review and update our 5-year plan to determine how to best preserve and promote the history for which we are responsible. Our organization's current plans for the next five years are:

2021-2022 Projects: (1) For preservation purposes, digitize our framed high school class photos and purchase a display rack for the new unframed photos. (2) Purchase video equipment to record residents' historic stories. (3) Encourage donations to our Operational and Endowment Funds to help secure the future of our Historical Society.

2023-2024 Projects: (1) Purchase museum-friendly software to convert our handwritten artifact donation record book into digital format for computer processing. (2) Begin repairing, reglazing, and replacing Museum windows.

2025 and beyond Projects: (1) Acquire a local vintage object for display in front of Museum. (2) Preserve original blueprints of the Carnegie Library. (3) Purchase new lighting in our Museum and update wiring if necessary.




2020 Fairfield County Foundation's 31-Hour Give

From our Museum's Archives: A handwritten short story by Anna Milnor Young

"I was born in Pickerington a mile north of the center of town on Sunday Noon June 18, 1893. My doctor was W.B. Taylor.

"My first grade teacher was James G. Kraner. That was a very cold year. Our large school room was heated only by a pot bellied stove. The children gathered around the stove to get warm.


"We had no water on the school ground; two students carried drinking water from Tussings or the Knepper property. Everyone drank out of the same tin drinking cup. The bucket sat in the window and the cup beside it. I have a school picture taken by my brother, P.C. Milnor.

"In 1907 our school was replaced by a consolidated school, the first such school in the county. In October, the children who attended the one-room country schools were brought to the new consolidated school by horse drawn wagons. I entered as a freshman student in 1907 and graduated in 1911.

"I took the teacher's examination and was permitted to teach. This seemed not very successful, so I went to Ohio Wesleyan University for two years then transferred to Ohio University for two years. I graduated in June 1918.

"When I entered the school room as a first grade teacher, I learned that first day a lot of things I didn't learn in college. I had large classes. One September morning 53 shining faces greeted me. The school board and superintendent agreed that was too large a class for one teacher. Violet Huntwork was asked to do the seat work in the home room, while I conducted classes in another room. During the year 75 pupils were enrolled. About this time it was decided to have two first grade teachers.

"Having known all of the families in Violet Township, it made my teaching very pleasant. After 42 years of teaching in Violet Township/Pickerington Schools, I decided to retire." (*Newsletter Editor's Note: Anna Milnor Young retired in 1960 and passed away February 23, 1984*)



Pickerington Methodist Church women created a cookbook (circa 1970) and, luckily, our Historical Museum has a copy! A few of their recipes are shared here with you:

1920's FLAPPER PUDDING: Marilyn Elliott Cream butter with most of sugar; add remaining sugar to egg white and beat well. Add beaten egg yolk to creamed mixture, then add pineapple and nuts. Add beaten egg white. Spread half the cracker crumbs in bottom of pan, pour in pineapple mixture, then top with remainder of crumbs. Chill overnight. Serves 6.

TURKEY DINNER FOR 250:

7 turkeys, 75 lb. potatoes, 75 lb. butternut squash, 10 bunches of celery, 20 large cranberry rings, and 145 pies.
