Take an indoor self-guided "Journey thru Olde Pickerington Village". See tools used by early settlers along with photos and artifacts from our community's first churches and businesses.


Listen to olde time music generated by Historical Society members, Greg and Rose Karoly, on Howard Milnor's donated player piano.

LOCAL HISTORY

Looking Back 30 Years: 1991 Pickerington/Violet Township

March 1: This billboard appeared during basketball season to honor the Pickerington High School Lady Tigers. During the 1990s, the Lady Tigers dominated girls' high school basketball in Ohio. By 1999 they had won six state championships.

April 20: Pickerington became the second "City" in Fairfield County. The change from "Village" status was the result of 1990 census figures showing the population count to be 668 more than the 5,000 required for "City" status.


June: Turnberry Golf Course, with 18 holes and over 200 acres, opened along Blacklick Creek and Park Place Homes on S.R. 256.

> September 21: A dedication ceremony was held at Pickerington's new high school (later renamed "Pickerington High School Central") with a

crowd of more than 1,000 in attendance. Daniel Ross served as superintendent.

October: Pickerington's municipal building was

declared unsafe. Under consideration by city council were two sites for a new facility: the old creamery on Church Street and the SE corner of Lockville Road/Columbus Street (site of the former Kraner General Store).



November: In this month's general election, Lee Gray won the mayoral race with 59 percent of the vote. Gary Burkholder garnered the most votes for a council seat.


December 7: Nine homes/buildings were part of our Historical Society's Holiday House Tour including The Mason-Richter Building, Dovel House on Hill Road, Jewell Home (60 W. Columbus), Whims Home, and Railroad Depot.

December 16: This day's edition of *Pickerington This* Week, reported recent home sales for the 43147 zip code were a low price of \$95,665 for the property at 3111 Alderbrook Drive, and a high price of \$113,416 for 9427 Paddock Court.

1991 Pickerington-Violet Township businesses included: Ashley House Shoppes, ArtFrame, B.J. Bouquets, Bank One, R.G. Barry Corp., Bear-ly Worn Clothes, Big Bear, Claproods/A Country Daisy, Coffeeman Beverages, Countryside Hardware, Dane

Drugs, Down Under Hair Salon, Funni-Frite, The Good Company, HER Realtors, Hickory Lakes Party House, Hiser Homes, Mailboxes, Inc., Mama Bears Maternity, Picktown Beverage, Portraits by Sandy, and more.

1991 Violet Township Trustees were Lyle Diley, John Ricketts, and Lisa Kessler. Township offices were located at 4 East Columbus Street (now home to Fairfield County Sherriff's Substation in Olde Pickerington Village).
