- (3) Tony Mills portrayed Clyde P. Leach, Pickerington Railroad Depot Agent from 1907-1942. He showed railroad artifacts, photos, and demonstrated telegraph equipment once used to send messages between trains and rail stations.

Wilma Moore's Potato Salad Recipe for a Crowd


1 qt. Miracle Whip 1 c. sugar 1/2 c. vinegar 1/4 c. mustard 9 lb. Idaho potatoes 2 large onions

2 large onions 2 stalks celery 10 large boiled eggs Boil, peel, and dice potatoes in a large bowl. Dice onions, celery, and eggs on top. 

Help Keep Local History and our Museum Alive!

2023 Window Repair Project: Our Historical Museum is 106 years old and some of its windows are in a state of disrepair. Recently, we asked Window Gurus, from Plain City, to evaluate the situation. During October a technician examined the windows — inside and out — and made these recommendations and estimated costs:

- Rebuild the sash of four Museum upper level north-facing windows at a total cost of \$2,214.90.
- Paint and reglaze windows; perform yearly window maintenance including cleaning sills, checking window bottoms for softness/paint/stain touch up; spraying silicone lubricant on side zinc tracks. Cost estimates for these additional al window repair/maintenance projects still need to be obtained from vendors.

Recent Roof Repairs: To stop water leakage inside our Museum during rainstorms, a roof contractor hired by the City of Pickerington (the building's owner) installed a white rubber-like sealant. It covers the top of the wall cap and comes over the inside of the wall to cover the seam with the roof. The contractor said the roof should be good for another 10 years.

In order to be able to check the roof periodically for any damages, the contractor agreed with our thoughts that a fabricated caged ladder could

be installed on the west side of the building for access to the roof. We are pursuing this project with the City of Pickerington.
