Thanks to our Benefactors

Our Historical Society donors, supporters, and volunteers continue to amaze us with their generosity. Approximately \$5,600 in donations were received through Fairfield County Foundation's 29-Hour Give, Kingy's and Barnes-Noble fundraisers, tips from Holiday Gathering's wagon rides, plus members' holiday donations to our Historical Society.

Most of these funds helped pay for the new \$4,981 electronic rear door at the Museum's Lower Level and LED light bulbs installed during February in the Museum's Main Level. LOCAL HISTORY

What Happened to Beals Lake?

C.O. (Ott) Beals was a Pickerington attorney whose financial successes mostly involved winning damages from the railroad for local residents.

For example, in 1914 he sued the railroad on behalf of Dora Root whose horse jumped a fence and was struck and killed by a locomotive. The court awarded the plaintiff \$125 plus attorney fees of \$16.80.

In 1927, Beals developed a summer cottage community — Beals Lake Addition — on land he owned between East Street and Sycamore Creek. A concrete dam was constructed northeast of what is now Heritage Elementary School, impounding the water of Milnor Run and, thus, producing a new 3.5-acre Beals Lake.

The lake was stocked with fish, a bath house was constructed, a subdivision of lots was formed and a plat filed. Unfortunately, the dam did not weather the elements and failed after only a couple of years' existence.

Beals' former home at 5 W. Columbus Street was razed in 2016 to make room for the new Violet Township Fire Station in downtown Pickerington. The resting place of his small law office, which originally stood next to his home, now can be found along Sycamore Creek's bike path in the athletic field adjacent to Victory Park. The building currently is owned by the Pickerington-Violet Township Historical Society.

Eventually, the Historical Society hopes to move the building to a new location where it can be converted into a living history museum and enjoyed by our community.



On Second Saturday, May 11, Franklinton Historical Society's Leslie Blankenship will portray *Elizabeth Greer Coit.* The program begins at 1pm in the Museum's handicap-accessible Lower Level.

In 1884, Coit founded the first women's suffrage association in Columbus, Ohio. She continued to fight for women's right to vote until her death in 1901.
