Legacy With Color

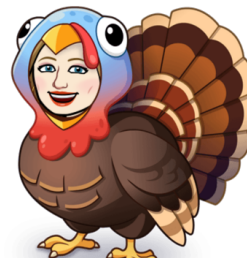
Dear LWC Members,

“But what’s a little arsenic when you’ve got a great new color to sell?” This is a quote from Carl Wilhelm Scheele who invented green paint in 1775. Scheele’s greens, loaded with copper arsenic, were popular among artists to use in painting, but as you can guess with arsenic as an ingredient, it was highly toxic. At the end of the 19th century, Paris Green replaced Scheele’s Green. This pigment was used by French Impressionists such as Claude Monet, Paul Cézanne, and Pierre-Auguste Renoir to create their lush green landscapes. Again, though, this paint was highly toxic. Some believe the pigment may have been responsible for Cézanne’s diabetes and Monet’s blindness. Paris Green was eventually banned in the 1960s. Just a little fact about green paint as we continue our Legacy With Color study through the fine arts.
