Kirk Hall and a Community Grant from the Parkinson's Foundation

Kirk Hall wrote, "I would love to see TC become available to everyone with PD in the U.S. Personally, when I see the impact Sun Joo and singing has on our group, I am deeply moved and impressed by the difference it makes in our lives."

Diagnosed by a movement disorder neurologist with Parkinson's disease in 2008, Kirk Hall's initial response was to learn everything he could about PD. After the shock was over, his faith helped him to refocus his energy from himself to helping others with PD.

Eleven years later, Kirk is a nationally recognized Parkinson's author, speaker and advocate. His book "Carson and His Shaky Paws Grampa" written for youngsters is the first in a series about the relationship between a grandfather who has PD and his seven-year-old grandson.

Living in Colorado, Kirk sang regularly with his church choir and occasionally with Tremble Clefs groups. Kirk met Patti Meese when both were research advocates with PDF, which is now Parkinson's Foundation (PF). Patti brought him to a West Side TC practice. When he bought a "snowbird condo" in Surprise several years later, Kirk dropped in at a WSTC practice and he states "the rest is history."

In his blog posted May 31, 2019, Mr. Hall described how he came to write a grant to the Parkinson's Foundation (PF) for Tremble Clefs Arizona (TC AZ). When he found PF was offering community grants up to \$25,000, he immediately thought how TC could use it. He talked with Sun Joo and Jim Histand about the possibilities. They were keen but had no one with experience to write it. Kirk wrote. "Though I had never written one, I had some experience with them from my consulting days. I told Jim I would give it a try."

He researched, learning of future needs in Maricopa County. At this time existing Tremble Clefs are stretched to the limit. After discussions with Sun Joo and Jim Histand, Kirk wrote a proposal for a community start-up grant for two new Tremble Clefs.

Thanks to Mr. Hall's work, TC AZ received a grant for \$20,000 from the PF to create two new music therapy groups. The North West TC started in May and meets in Sun City West. A second new group is planned for the Sun Lakes-Chandler area. We all appreciate the work Kirk did obtaining a community grant from the Parkinson's Foundation.


I want to welcome our third group in the Valley the North West Tremble Clefs.
