Sunday Worship

Our regular Sunday worship continues at 11 a.m. with increasing numbers attending - the service on 27th June celebrating the Sacrament of Communion saw 74 members take part. Our revised procedures, where everyone shared the elements at the same time, added a real sense of togetherness.

Recent announcements by the Scottish Government have eased Covid19 restrictions in many ways but have a more limited effect with regard to worship.

1) Social-distancing rules have been removed but we are conscious that many folk may not yet feel comfortable with this. Accordingly, we shall continue to seat attendees at designated locations in the church, at least 1 metre apart. This will increase our capacity to 120.

2) We are now permitted to sing, but masks must still be worn at all times. We shall resume congregational use of hymn books **from Sunday, 22nd August.**

3) We still require to obtain contact details from all attendees to assist with the Test and Protect scheme, should the need arise. For this reason, and to minimise delays in the vestibule before the start of worship, booking of places is strongly recommended.

Live streaming of services

Since March 2020, the pandemic has placed great pressure on us all, including our church. We have made use of computer technology to create the weekly “Reflections” online, which has allowed many of us to keep in touch with our church.

The Trustees have been looking at ways to improve this method of outreach and a sub-committee was set up to look at how we might make our services available “live” online. The sub-committee received quotes from four companies who have expertise in providing camera technology in churches, which, when linked to broadband, would allow us to broadcast church services live online. The system installation will, of necessity, involve alterations to a few of the downstairs pews and those affected will be consulted accordingly.

A preferred provider has been approved by the Trustees and, should approval be received from Presbytery and the General Trustees in Edinburgh, we will take steps to have the system installed. We have also accepted a quote from Virgin Media who installed broadband cabling into the church last month (July).

POP UP STALL

From Dougie Adam

I'm penning this midway through my sixth week of my placement in Kilbarchan, and although it feels like I have just started my placement, my time with you is now almost at an end. I'll be with you for two more Sundays at the start of August while Stephen is on annual leave.

The time has flown by and there have been many highlights: Admin Al's video editing skills as Stephen and I attempted to play keepy-uppy with a football on camera, hearing someone sing 'live' in church for the first time in over a year, celebrating communion in church for the first time in almost a year and a half, trying to find crowds of willing participants to record vox-pops on the streets of Kilbarchan. The list goes on.

I've really enjoyed being part of Sunday worship and recording bits and pieces for the Online Reflection and getting to meet a few of you before and after the services. I've learned a lot from Stephen and from folks at the church gate.

It has been really good on a personal level to be thinking about our theme of mission from the book of Acts over these summer months, just before I begin my probationary period in September and as I hope to complete my training and being called to my first charge in the next few years.

Although it is tempting to see Acts as a romanticized view of the early church, I've certainly been aware that almost every time something great happens there is criticism from within the church to deal with or persecution and threats from outside as well.

I've been struck by how many of the missionary encounters in Acts happen outside or on journeys and it has got me thinking that the church in Scotland often invites people to come inside a building to a church service or special event. I sometimes wonder if I would have the courage and imagination to spend a good portion of my time as a minister meeting people on the streets, outside in the community? I've also been inspired once again by the way the early church was fearless in speaking about Jesus and also living out Jesus' teaching to love their enemies and share their money and food with the poor.

Recently, as I have been reflecting on the scale of the task facing the church in Scotland as it seeks to engage in mission in meaningful ways with the people in our communities, I have found myself returning to the lyrics of an Ian White song which was sung at my graduation from International Christian College in Glasgow more than 20 years ago:

*Though I feel afraid of territory unknown
I know that I can say that I do not stand alone
For Jesus you have promised your presence in my heart
I cannot see the ending, but it's here that I must start.*

*And all I know is you have called me
and that I will follow is all I can say
I will go where you will send me
and your fire lights my way.*

*What lies across the waves may cause my heart to fear
will I survive the day must I leave what's known and dear?
A ship that's in the harbour is still and safe from harm,
but it was not built to be there it was made for wind and storm.*
