KIRK SESSION REPORT

We are pleased to be writing this article for the Church magazine as it is an indication that our Church life and activities are starting to return to a familiar pattern, even though it is doubtful if we will ever return to exactly the same ways that were so familiar prior to the arrival of Covid 19.

During the first months of extreme lockdown, the members of the Kirk Session reached out to help anyone in the congregation or village who struggled with shopping, collection of prescriptions or were in need of someone to talk to. We are very grateful to everyone who provided this support and in some cases are continuing to do so – a very good example of Christian outreach

As you will recall, a newsletter was compiled every month to maintain contact with all our members and keep you all informed. We were very fortunate to have Dorothy Wallace with us during 2020 – she kept in touch with many of you and her technological expertise proved invaluable to us as we venture into the realms of meeting on electronic platforms like Zoom. The session and board clerks, Stephen and Dorothy met this way weekly to keep up to date on pastoral developments and with help from Alan and Emma Vaughan the online reflections were created.

The Church of Scotland provided guidelines for us to follow once we were allowed back into the Church building and a small group worked on the risk assessment which had to be approved by Presbytery prior to services resuming in the Church.

Slowly, slowly the restrictions have been relaxed and we have now come to the stage when we can stand to sing in church (with masks on), sit in comfort on the pew cushions, have some heating (if required) and sit in the balcony.

The newsletters have told you the main details of the last eighteen months but in summary, the Session has continued to meet using Zoom, the four new elders were eventually ordained in October, Dorothy Wallace completed her probationary year in December and was ordained and inducted to the Charge of West Loch Fyne side in April and we celebrated communion in Church and online at the end of June when Dougie Adam joined us for a six week summer placement.

It has indeed been a challenging time, but it is encouraging to see increasing numbers of you once again coming to the sanctuary to worship God and to hear of some of our organisations making plans to resume their meetings.

CLYDE PRESBYTERY UPDATE

The first meeting of Clyde Presbytery took place on Tuesday 1st September, 2020, this was a service of union (still available online on Youtube @ Service of Union Dumbarton Presbytery with Greenock and Paisley Presbytery | Renfrew North Parish Church). This was followed by meetings in November 2020, February, March and June 2021. When the General Assembly agreed to having new, larger presbyteries it was on the understanding that they would do things differently. This was also the case when discussions took place between Dumbarton and Greenock & Paisley and again when it was agreed to proceed to the merger. One of the different ways of working is related to the small number of business meetings of presbytery. Presbytery will meet for regular business on the second Tuesdays of September, February and June. With such infrequency of meetings, the assumption is that committees would simply get on with the work that came under their remit and to a large extent they would work autonomously and then report back to presbytery. If a committee has been set up to deal with a certain area of the church's life, it has the power to deal with whatever falls within its remit, unless it is a power which is expressly reserved for the presbytery as a whole or unless the committee itself wishes to bring forward a particular matter of concern for discussion by the presbytery. To put it more simply, committees will have the power to act on behalf of the presbytery on most issues associated with their remit. What will be expected of them when presbytery meets for business is that they report on decisions they have made and actions which they have taken. The Home page contains details of forthcoming meetings as well as the minutes of past meetings and also the remit and membership details of the various committees. The Clyde Presbytery newsletters for November 20, February, April and June 21 can be accessed under the newsletter tab. A lot has happened since the last issue of the magazine in the Spring of 2020. Not a lot of it has been good. We have all seen vast changes to our lives, and in the way we do things, due to the pandemic and the restrictions put in place to control it. Even very ordinary things have had to be done in different ways.

One consequence of this was that our online activity increased dramatically. We couldn't meet in church so we had to find other ways to worship, other ways to talk and to comfort one another. Social media suddenly became a bigger part of everyone's lives and our Facebook page saw a substantial increase in interest and activity.

On the morning of 22nd March 2020, we posted a short video message from Stephen on Facebook. He was standing at the closed doors of the church. Just a short message of comfort and encouragement as we entered the first national lockdown. The following Sunday we posted our first online reflection. We had no idea that it would be so long until we could worship in church again.

Since that first video our online reflections have evolved into something that closely resembles a worship service with lots of willing church members keen to help with readings and music. We can't thank them enough and know that many have really stepped out of their comfort zones to help.

Our videos now look set to evolve even further in the coming months as we explore the possibility of live streaming worship services from church. Keep an eye on our social media for developments on this in the coming weeks.

Of course it wasn't just social media that the church turned to to continue its work and we also found ourselves familiarising ourselves with video conference software like Zoom. Session and Board meetings started to resemble an episode of Celebrity Squares and we slowly came to terms with muting and unmuting ourselves, and hearing "can you hear me?" throughout meetings. Of course it wasn't ideal, but it was necessary to allow church business to tick over.

We also turned to more familiar technology and made our online reflections available over the phone, allowing those with no internet connection to enjoy worship from the comfort of their armchair. This is available by phoning 01505 805893. Calls are charged at local rate.

Another development during this time was that BT, who hosted our website through their free community webkit scheme, decided to discontinue the scheme, meaning we had to look for alternative website arrangements. Admin Al decided to take the bull by the horns and totally redesign the website and secure a new domain name for our home on the web. And so kilbarchankirk.org started to take shape. The new website was launched in March this year with a new look and loads of new capabilities. You'll find worship service details, the latest reflection video, news, diary, documents, newsletter, church magazine archive, and of course all of our groups and organisations have their own dedicated page.

to-face as all our contact has been on Zoom. I wonder if the BB will be awarding a Zoom Badge? We have not been idle over the past 18 months as we have been doing classes using Zoom. One class that the Company Section did was on the development of the parachute. I thought I would drop that in! Anchors and Junior Section boys also met using Zoom with parents close by and sometimes even joining in. On Christmas 2020 Junior Section, Company Section and Officers combined to do a Zoom Pantomime of Aladdin which went well - eventually. Why is it that Zoom automatically recorded every rehearsal and yet did not record the actual performance? Isn't technology wonderful! We did an extra night and managed to get it recorded. Doing the Zoom Pantomime allowed the boys to experiment with different backgrounds and special effects, some of which were not provided by Zoom but by the boys' ingenuity and imagination. If you remember we were about 2 weeks before the first Lockdown when we were supposed to have our Coffee Morning in the Church Hall but when cases of Covid were starting to multiply we had the good sense to cancel it. That was in March 2020 - who would have thought that our lives would change so much! There were a number of times that the Company Section were going to meet in the park but the weather was very wet during March this year and then we experienced a second lockdown. BB advice was to keep Company boys and our younger Junior Section boys under 12 separate from each other. Paisley and District Battalion provided us with hand sanitiser, signage and various other items to allow the Boys' Brigade to continue. Since we were not allowed to meet face-to-face we thought that we would continue with our Zoom Meetings but the boys were often doing school lessons on Zoom during the day and it was felt that it would be too much for them to do BB on Zoom on Friday nights as well. Zoom fatigue - how do you feel after a Zoom Meeting with the Kirk Session or Congregational Board! However during 2020 two or our boys gained their

Special thanks to the boys doing their President's Badge as they had to complete the course with a final meeting on Zoom one Sunday in March 2021. I would like to thank them for their enthusiasm and indefatigability in completing their President's Badge during the present difficulties and also their parents for the encouragement that they gave to the boys in helping them complete the course. They now move onto complete their Queen's Badges over the next session. They have all arranged their placements to allow them to complete their service section of the Queen's Badge. Thanks also to our officers and helpers who have adapted their leadership skills to accommodate the changing circumstances of the Covid-19 lockdown.

Recently we have made arrangements to link-up with 3rd Johnstone Company at St Andrew's Trinity to allow the boys to participate in a larger grouping of boys to experience the friendship and competition of a larger company as our numbers were getting smaller and doing games and competitions were becoming more difficult. Our Junior Section boys have also had the opportunity of being part of a larger group as well. We hope to rebuild the Company by concentrating on our Anchor Section and try to recruit more boys from Primary 1, 2 and 3 and see how things go from there. Here among the long-discarded cassocks. Damp stools, and half-split hassocks, Here where the Vicar never looks I nibble through old service books. Lean and alone I spend my days Behind the Church of England baize. I share my dark forgotten room With two oil-lamps and half a broom. The cleaner never bothers me, So here I eat my frugal tea. My bread is sawdust mixed with straw; My jam the polish for the floor. Christmas and Easter may be feasts for congregations and for priests, And so may be Whitsun. All the same They do not fill my meagre frame. For me the only feast at all Is Autumn's Harvest Festival, When I can satisfy my want With ears of corn around the font. I climb the eagle's brazen head To burrow through a loaf of bread. I scramble up the pulpit stair and knaw the marrows hanging there It is enjoyable to taste These items ere they go to waste. But how annoying when one finds That other mice with pagan minds Come into church my food to share Who have no proper business there. Two field mice who have no desire To be baptised, invade the choir.

A large and most unfriendly rat Comes in to see what we are at He says he thinks there is no God And yet he comes ... it's rather odd. This year he stole a sheaf of wheat (It screened our special preacher's seat), And prosperous mice from fields away Come in to hear the organ play, And under cover of it's notes Ate through the altar's sheaf of oats. A Low Church mouse, who thinks that I Am too papistical, and High, Yet somehow doesn't think it wrong To munch through Harvest Evensong. While I, who starve the whole year through. Must share my food with rodents who Except at this time of year Not once inside the church appear. Within the human world I know Such going-on could not be so. Foe human beings only do What their religion tells them to. They read the Bible every day And always, night and morning, pray, And just like me, the good church mouse, Worship each week in God's own house, But all the same it's strange to me How very full the church can be With people I don't see at all Except at Harvest Festival.

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Several years ago, in a church in Ayrshire, and during the Harvest Thanksgiving service, one little boy came forward with his tray of fruit. The minister noticed under the cling film there were two apples, two bananas, two oranges, one pear, and the core of a pear.

CARRY ON LOCKDOWN

As cases of COVI9-19 increased across the country in early 2020 it was becoming increasingly clear that drastic measures were going to be required to try to slow down the transmission of the coronavirus. Schools and workplaces were closed and on March 24th 2020 the country entered what became known as Lockdown. Leaving the house was only permitted for essential purposes such as shopping for food or going to work in jobs considered essential to the infrastructure and wellbeing of the country.

From day one of lockdown both my employer and my trade union considered that postal workers were indeed essential. Our nationwide network, connecting every home in the UK, would be used for helping in the supply of essential goods and medical supplies across the country.

There would be no furlough or working from home for me. With some special measures in place and a good supply of hand sanitiser it was pretty much business as usual for the posties. Except that it wasn't. We very quickly saw a huge increase in shopping online, meaning that our parcel workload exceeded what is normally seen at Christmas time. If folk can't go shopping, then the shopping will come to them. It also became clear that the essential supplies we would be delivering turned out to be things like pet supplies, books, DVDs, toilet rolls, boxes of sweets and crisps, alcohol, and sports and leisure wear. And of course, because most folk were at home our job began to resemble a huge game of chap-door-run-away.

So with a whole bunch of mixed feelings I had become a 'Key Worker'.

As I'm sure was the case for all Key Workers my very first thought was for my family. One person in the house on the shielding list and one with asthma meant that I was acutely aware of the danger I was putting them in. At this time my mum's health was also failing so the family care bubble we had established was also at the front of my mind as I carried on chapping doors and running away.

My initial feelings of fear and worry at times turned to anger and resentment as I went about my day trying to dodge scores of folk out and

about taking their government prescribed daily exercise. The quiet country roads that I work on had become busy with walkers, cyclists and joggers. I'm ashamed to admit that I often muttered and growled at these folk from the safety of my van as I passed them, moaning at them to go home where they should be. Jealousy is an awful thing.

But being a Key Worker at work is only half of it. That's the part that you do on autopilot. Get up, go to work, be as safe as possible, do the job, go home. Home – the place that is constantly on your mind with every doorstep interaction, with every squirt of the hand sanitiser, with every curse of the face mask. Returning home to rush past your loved ones, too scared to interact with them until every possible trace of covid has been rinsed down the shower drain in a gurgle of soapy suds. Terrified to visit elderly parents but knowing that the care bubble that is in place is there for a reason – they need the care you give. Having to make the decision to either visit my dying mother in hospital or protect my vulnerable family from Covid was one of the most heart-breaking decisions I've ever had to make. Being a Key Worker obviously has no bearing on such decisions but it was certainly a role I could have done without at such an awful time. So when someone would occasionally say thanks for what Key Workers were doing it made such a huge difference to my day. Not the discounts offered in shops, or gifts and treats handed in to the Delivery Office, but just a sincere "Thanks for what you are doing, we really appreciate it." What a massive difference that made to my state of mind.

And yet, I know that my part as a Key Worker has been a small one. The risks I've been exposed to have been small when compared to others. I have nothing but respect and admiration for health care professionals and hospital staff, literally coming face to face with the virus every day. Care workers visiting homes and nursing homes have been under so much pressure. The abuse faced by retail workers early in lockdown was shameful. I know many people who have been unable to earn a living since the first lockdown which must be incredibly hard. My workload may have increased massively but at least I could work.

HEALTH AND SAFETY REPORT

In the 19 months since the last H&S report the whole definition of Health and Safety has been turned on its head. Then it was the Church of Scotland initiative within which we were predominently looking at a safe environment in our Church and Halls to ensure that there was nothing to endanger out health. Fire risks were assessed and minimised, evacuation procedures drawn up, electricity and gas supplies checked and improved, and peoples awareness of the way we go about our worship and business in the Parish broadened to include safe practices.

Now, it is a case of protecting our own safety from the health limiting world-wide Covid-19 pandemic. The Church of Scotland was very quick to recommend that our churches close our doors for worship and all other activities in March last year. And since then has provided numerous updates from their regular discussions with the Scotlish Government. If you have a few hours to fill, check the Church of Scotland Covid pages on their website. There is so much information there, you will be amazed. Amongst many other directives, advice has been given on alternative forms of worship and outreach, and our own weekly online Reflections from Stephen et al has been a great way to keep the Congregation together.

As the impact of the virus has lessened we have slowly and cautiously (the CoS way) been able to reopen the Church for Worship. Initially only 35 people were allowed into the Sanctuary at 2 metre spacing. With the relaxation of Government restrictions we can now accommodate over one hundred by reducing the spacing to 1 metre and including the use of the Gallery. In fact, with the dimensions of the pews you will still be nearer 1.5 metres apart which may be reassuring to know.

We still should not come to Church if we have any symptoms or feel unwell. We still have to give our names and contact details for the obligatory Test and Protect scheme. We still have to sanitize our hands and wear masks. But we can sing again.OK, that is congregational singing with masks on, but it is a start. Surely it cannot be too long till we can get the choir back.

There are also moves in hand to restart other Church based activities like the Sunday School, the Guild and the BB and hopefully these are not too far away.

Similarly, non-worshipping activities within Kilbarchan Parish Church are a part of our community commitment which cannot be ignored. Hoops still have to jumped through and our own covid risk assessments and safety procedures must be adhered to by all. In addition, applications to use Church facilities must be accompanied by the group's own risk assessment relevant to their own activities. If any advice is needed, just get in touch. If I do not know the answer I will do my best to find it.

While the Church pays the additional cost of thoroughly cleaning the Sanctuary between Services, we cannot afford to clean the Halls many times through the week to accommodate multiple users. So it must be up to the activity groups to ensure that the halls are completely clean before they leave.

I personally think that Covid is going to be with us for some time into the future. It is something we can only control by conforming to the recommendations given to us by those in the know. I am not one of them. But if you have any other worries or points of concern you can speak to me at any time.
