## Kirk Session Report

Since the last magazine, there has only been one Session meeting when one of the main items was to decide which of the many choices of defibrillator to purchase for our Church. It was agreed to purchase one recommended by the British Heart Foundation and so, it is good (and reassuring) that we now have a defibrillator available on our premises. It will usually be in the entrance way to the hall but will be taken to the sound desk during worship or when there is an event at Church.

Reports of the final visits made by elders to our organisations had been circulated and it was encouraging to know from them that all our groups are well supported. Grateful thanks were extended to all those who visited and also to those who plan and run the groups which are enjoyed by both Church members and the wider community.

The Session was also pleased that Graham McKay has agreed to represent us for another year at Presbytery.

On Maundy Thursday, our worship was enhanced by several pieces sung by the Choir and during the service we celebrated the Sacrament of Holy Communion. At the end of the service, once the front of the Church had been cleared, the congregation left the Church in silence.

On the evening of Good Friday, there was a joint service with our friends in Howwood Church, and then on Easter Sunday (in spite of the poor weather) an early service was held outside the Weavers' Cottage. Morning worship included an egg hunt for the children during the service, with eggs then being given out to the whole congregation.

We were glad that Stephen had some well-deserved time off after the pressure of all the Easter and funeral services and were pleased to welcome Rev. Robbie McFarlane back to lead our worship. It was also good to have Rev. Ian Miller back in the pulpit in May.

At the end of March, Helen Robertson was presented with a long service certificate in recognition of thirty years dedicated commitment as an elder and tireless Church worker.

Our involvement in fund raising for others has continued with a fashion show and strawberry tea being held in aid of St. Vincent's Hospice; the Junior Church and helpers making and selling pancakes for Mary's Meals; and a Soup Lunch raising funds for Christian Aid. It is good to be part of such an outward looking congregation.

Yet again, as I am sure you are all aware, it has been a very sad and difficult few months for the Church family, with so many members suffering the pain and sorrow of the death of a loved one. We ask that you remember all the families known to you in your prayers.

However, in contrast, the Baptisms of Myla and Robyn were lovely services, and we are encouraged by having some more new members. Their names are recorded later in this magazine.

Finally, we are extremely grateful to Alasdair Law for coordinating this and the spring edition of our magazine. His involvement is very much appreciated.

## Welcoming Linda Kelly

The following is an excerpt taken from the April 2026 edition of Renfrewshire Foodbank's Community Newsletter:

### ***Food for Thought***

We are happy to announce that Renfrewshire Foodbank has appointed Linda Kelly as its first ever Chief Executive Officer. This is a significant moment for us, and we could not be more pleased to have Linda leading the way.

Last year, the foodbank provided 5,426 emergency food parcels, supporting 10,405 people including 3,310 children. It was also the first year we had to purchase food to supplement donations; a reflection of the growing pressure on local families. Creating a CEO role is our commitment to meeting that challenge head on and building a stronger, more sustainable organisation for the future. Linda joins with senior leadership experience across Scotland's charity sector. Most recently she was Director of Income Diversification and Messaging at Right There, supporting people at risk of homelessness, and has previously held senior roles at Cyrenians and Ardgowan Hospice.

*Linda said: "I feel genuinely honoured to be taking on this role. Too many people are facing financial hardship, and foodbanks are providing vital support in communities across the country. Foodbanks play an essential role in meeting immediate need, but they shouldn't be the long-term answer to poverty. I'm looking forward to working with the team, volunteers, and partners to support people through crisis with dignity, while also contributing to wider efforts to reduce the need for foodbanks in the future."*

Current shortages include UHT Milk, tinned potatoes, tinned meat, tinned fish, toiletries, sweets and treats.

We quickly realised that we couldn't do such an event on our own and so got in touch with St. Vincent's Hospice Shop in Bridge of Weir and also Jennifer Douglas who is a Lecturer in Fashion at City of Glasgow College.

Our planned event rapidly grew arms and legs and before we knew it, we had a list of sponsors, meringue makers, strawberry tart assemblers, scone makers, kitchen team for tea and coffee, 10 volunteer models, 2 MCs, 2 make-up artists, Music Team, Security Team, photographer, a prize draw with lots of lovely prizes, rails of beautiful pre-loved ladieswear, tables of accessories and a clamour for tickets!

We held the event on the Church Hall to a sell out crowd on Friday 15<sup>th</sup> May and we are all absolutely delighted that we raised £1919 for St. Vincent's Hospice.

You will find some photographs elsewhere in the magazine which will give an impression of the event, for those unfortunate not to be there.

However just as importantly we were able to highlight facts about the “clothing mountain” and encourage those present to re-think their fashion buying strategy and consider buying Pre-loved items. The Hospice had never previously been involved in such a joint venture with a church and they fully intend to look to replicate our model with other churches in future.

## Hillwalking Group

This quarter the hillwalking club have done two hillwalks, a lower level walk and a weekend away near Kingussie.

March's target was an ascent of Carleatheran in the Gargunnock Hills. Nine started from Gargunnock village to climb on a good path to the top of the escarpment. However, due to deteriorating weather we decided to avoid the boggy summit route and shorten the walk. Other than one heavy shower, the weather was kind with some blue skies and views to the north with snow on the Trossachs hills.

April's walk was in the Kilpatrick Hills. Nine walkers took in Cochno Hill, Jaw Reservoir, Dunellan and Lucifer's Loch. Despite some boggy underfoot conditions, we were very fortunate with the weather with some decent views. The club has visited the Kilpatricks many times, but rarely from this side, so it was great to explore new terrain..

In May, six of us enjoyed a 12km circuit around the reservoir at Whitelee Windfarm and we also visited the viewpoint at Blackwood Hill, complete with poetry inscriptions. The landscapes at the windfarm were varied and interesting and we were delighted to hear and see a cuckoo, amongst other birds.

The weekend away was in Kincaig, near Kingussie

Saturday saw four set off for the three easterly Munros of the Monadhliath. The day began promisingly, with good weather and fine views as we climbed Carn Dearg. Sadly, that didn't last - rain moved in and, apart from a brief hailstorm for variety, stayed with us for the rest of the day. Despite tricky navigation and some slipping and sliding we all made it back to the car in high spirits.

The fifth member opted for a Corbett in Glen Feshie. A three-hour bike ride on the approach made it more a cycling adventure than a hillwalk. We reunited in the evening for dinner in front of the log burner, to share stories of our day.

On Sunday, the group split three ways. One headed north for Bynack More, another went for a shorter Corbett day near Nethy Bridge, and the remaining three climbed a single Munro, Meall Chuaich, just off the A9 on the route home. Our upcoming plans include a mix of lower level walks, some Munros and a weekend stay in Braemar.

To enable the Church to claim Gift Aid, donors must be UK taxpayers and have paid as much or more income tax and/or capital gains tax in the tax year than will be reclaimed through Gift Aid on their offerings/donations. The responsibility for checking the tax position, lies with the member/donor and not the Church.

As some of the Declarations were signed several years ago, the Finance Team is taking the opportunity to remind members who have signed Declarations to check that they are still paying enough tax so that the Church can continue to claim Gift Aid on their offerings/donations.

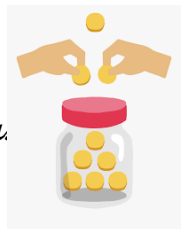
If any member has a query about Gift Aid, and/or any Declaration which they may have signed in the past, please speak to one of the Finance Team.
