I am writing this letter looking out at a beautiful snow scene. It is the morning of February 18th 2022. Here in Central Scotland, we have experienced a blizzard and the heaviest snowfall this Winter. Meanwhile, the Southern part of the UK has experienced the full brunt of 'Storm Eunice', with wind speeds measured at around 110mph in places and a gust of wind of 122mph recorded in the Isle of Wight, the highest gust ever recorded in England.

It has been compared to the 'Great Storm' of 1987. There is travel chaos, there will be significant damage and there is a threat to life. People are being encouraged to stay indoors and only make essential journeys if they have to.

But we will get through this, we will weather the storm.

In all the storms of life, let's remember to look out for one another, protect one another and care for one another.

And let us also remember in the words of the great BB Hymn, when the question is asked. 'Will your anchor hold in the storms of life.....', the response is

KIRK SESSION REPORT

In December, we were disappointed that the reintroduction of some Covid restrictions caused some of our organisations to temporarily stop meeting but, apart from a couple of services at Christmas time, worship in Church continued. The informal communion service on the first Sunday of the New Year was attended by 52 people with many more participating through the online reflection in their own homes We are pleased that with the easing of the restrictions at the end of January, the organisations have resumed and numbers attending worship in Church are increasing steadily – it has been lovely to see the return of so many of our faithful members as well as extending a warm welcome to some new faces.

We have been saddened by the death of several of our Church members over the winter and so we now have 372 on our roll.

After a lot of hard work to overcome many challenges, we were able to start livestreaming the services on 19th December. We are very grateful to everyone who helped in any way to make this become a reality. There is now a group of volunteers who supervise the streaming of the services and although there are no longer any reflections or telephone options, members who are not able to access the livestream can be provided with an audio version of the service.

Our Mission Audit was completed and submitted to Presbytery before Christmas, and we look forward to implementing the new Mission Plan as circumstances allow. We are now working, along with the Property Convenors, to compile the information necessary for a property audit. These two documents (which must be completed by every Church in Scotland) will form a major part of the assessment process used to decide the future of Church buildings and Ministers in Scotland.

Our congregation has been invited to send an elder as a commissioner to take part in this year's General Assembly which will meet in May. We are pleased that Myra Grant has agreed to be our representative although it is not yet clear whether the Assembly will revert to meeting in person in Edinburgh or whether it will be held online.

With the further easing of Covid restrictions, we look forward to seeing yet more members returning to Sunday worship as well as participating in our Church organisations.

Thank you to church members and friends for your continued faithful giving and financial support for our Church activities. As we type this article, our church annual accounts for 2021 are being examined

externally and full details will be provided at our AGM to follow in due course. Thanks to your kindness, fundraising events and additional donations received, there was no need to call upon our reserves at any time during 2021. Christian Aid Week (15th-21st May 2022)

Last year's Christian Aid Week was again disrupted by the pandemic, so we delivered envelopes throughout Kilbarchan and Brookfield but asked folks to return their envelopes to the church hall, or to donate electronically via the

The result was amazing. The total raised from the donation envelopes and JustGiving reached more than $\pounds4,700$, of which a huge proportion was gift-aided, raising a further $\pounds800+$ for Christian Aid.

This was substantially more than recent years and is testimony to the generosity of our local community.

For 2022, we still need to be mindful of Coronavirus, so intend to follow last year's format and deliver donation envelopes to as many households in the local area as we can, asking folk to return their donations to a central point at the end of Christian Aid Week.

For this, we require volunteers to deliver envelopes to a street or group of houses in their area during that week. There will be no need to call to collect or re-visit houses. Please contact Alasdair on

This work is vital if we are to provide support to those in need in some of the poorest communities in the world, amongst them are those worst affected by Climate Change.

UNITARY CONSTITUTION

A change of Constitution for our church?

Before the Covid pandemic, we, along with other congregations, were finding it was becoming more and more difficult to recruit volunteers to positions within the Board and Session.

There is now a 'significant' discrepancy in terms of the balance between elders and nonelders on the Board.

We believe the time has come for us to consider changing the constitution to adopt what is called the Unitary Constitution and bring us in line with most congregations within the Kirk.

This would mean that the Congregational Board would be dissolved and all key decisions would be taken by the Kirk Session. This would simplify the decision-making processes of the congregation and conforms more closely with the requirements of charity law and OSCR.

Under the Unitary Constitution, the Kirk Session is served by Committees, which have the power to co-opt non-elders to their committees with Session's approval. These committees have delegated authority to make decisions, within defined parameters. This means that non-elders (including those who currently serve on the Board, and others) are able to use their gifts and skills to shape the decision-making and working life of the church.

The existing Trustees (members of the Kirk Session and Congregational Board) have carefully considered matters and have taken the view that the move to a Unitary Constitution is desirable.

The formal decision as to whether or not to adopt it is, however, one for the congregation to take. This will require a congregational meeting and members will be provided with information beforehand to allow them to come to a decision.

If the proposal to adopt the Unitary Constitution is accepted by the congregation, we must then seek the agreement of Presbytery and the Church's Delegation of Assembly. As the Unitary Constitution is now the Church's recommended option, it is anticipated that this step will be readily approved.

Further information will be provided in the coming months.

PRESBYTERY NOTES

BUSINESS COMMITTEE: The Rev Christine Murdoch was nominated as the next Moderator of Clyde Presbytery from September 2022. On the retirement of the Rev Dr Charles Cameron at Johnstone St Andrew's Trinity from 30th November 2021, the Rev Stephen Smith was appointed as Interim Moderator. During the sick leave of Rev Scott McCrum at Old Kilpatrick & Bowling, the Rev Christine Goldie was appointed as Interim Moderator. Rev Ann McCool is appointed as Interim Moderator at Linwood ahead of the retirement of Rev Eileen Ross on 31st March 2022. The Rev Alan Sorensen, minister at Greenock: Wellpark Mid Kirk, has indicated his intention to retire from 31st July 2022. Mrs Mary Jane Bird and Rev David Burt were appointed as Church of Scotland reps on the Renfrewshire & Inverclyde Councils when the appointments are reviewed following the local council elections in May. Now that the presbytery has been running for a year a restructuring of committees will take place in July 2022. Clyde Presbytery is due to be visited by the Moderator of the General Assembly in April 2023, the Clerk and Business Convener are to form a small committee to prepare for this visit.

TREASURER'S REPORT: The General Fund Budget for the year ending 31st December 2022 was tabled and agreed. The allocation of Presbytery Dues for 2022 as detailed was approved and the issue of payment requests to be sent to Church Treasurers noting that payment is due on receipt of the payment request and no later than 30th June 2022.

SAFEGUARDING COMMITTEE: Training has commenced by Zoom for Volunteers. "face to face" training had planned to be up and running by now in church Halls, but the Omicron variation of the Covid virus has delayed this process. The committee hopes that this will take place in the near future. Congregations are reminded that the recommendation from the Safeguarding Office @ 121 is that Refresher Training takes place every Three Years and not more than Five Years. **PROPERTY COMMITTEE**: The building audits – often referred to by the acronym AMBA (Asset Management Building Audits) will take place in February and March. These audits use a methodology provided by the General Trustees and are an essential requirement of the Presbytery Mission Planning Act as passed by the General Assembly in 2021. This process is not taken lightly, as all are experiencing many new pressures in this season of church life. The committee has sought to keep the actual burden placed on congregations in assisting with the audits to a minimum. The Auditors task is simply to arrange the site visit and then complete an audit form with reference to their training and also to the other audits they have completed within the same Local Mission Group. Grateful thanks to all the auditors for their willingness to serve and ask that congregations welcome them with respect and warmth.

MISSION PLANNING TASK GROUP: Would like to thank the congregations of Clyde Presbytery as well as our Local Mission Group representatives for submitting their Mission Audit reports. The group met on Monday 31st January to discuss how to proceed and agreed on the following: The Mission Plan Task Group representatives have all be assigned a Local Mission Group from the opposite side of the River Clyde to analyse. This is to prevent any conflict of interest. The submission from each congregation will be analysed and having evaluated each audit, the Mission Plan Task Group will meet with the Presbytery Planning Review Committee (PPRC) and representatives from Faith Nurture's Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Group (PMPIG). The data will be assessed and, the committee in collaboration with PPTG, prepare a draft plan for circulation by the end of February. Presbytery intends to host a Saturday conference on 5th March, where there will be an opportunity to discuss the draft proposal within our Local Mission Groups, along with the assigned Task Group representative, to allow for feedback and suggestions to be gathered. This will then be fed back into the next meeting of the Mission Plan Task Group, which will follow soon after and allow, in conjunction with the Presbytery Planning Task Group (PPTG) to formalise a more concrete draft for circulation as soon as the AMBA audits are completed and the scores returned for inclusion. In the meantime, should any situations 'flagged up' by congregations or local mission groups require careful discussion, consultations will be arranged to determine the best route forward. Hopefully, a final draft plan will be in the hands of Presbyters by the end of May 2022. Ideally, most of the plan will be agreed upon at this stage, but there is still time to make adjustments and discuss matters before the December deadline. The Mission Plan Task Group is working within a very tight timeframe at present, so your prayers would be greatly appreciated.

SAFEGUARDING UPDATE

Volunteer training is now beginning again and it is recommended that all volunteers undergo training every 3 years but certainly every 5 years. This means that, given that we have had almost 2 years without Crèche or Sunday school meeting in person, the large majority of volunteers require to attend training courses. I shall continue to update you as and when dates are organised and hope that can be addressed in the near future.

As volunteers, I am sure we are all looking forward to being able to meet in groups in person and hope that this will take place soon.

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COVID UPDATE

Our regular Sunday worship continues at 11 a.m. and the numbers attending continue to grow towards pre-pandemic levels.

Recent announcements by the Scottish Government have eased Covid19 restrictions significantly, but our priority remains to ensure that all attendees feel safe and comfortable when attending worship.

Although social-distancing rules have been removed we continue to advise attendees to occupy designated locations in the church, at least 1 metre apart, and this has been welcomed by many.

The wearing of masks indoors remains a Government requirement, unless you have an exemption.

The Government's requirement to obtain contact details from all attendees has been discontinued, but we shall continue to record the names of attendees, to assist with the Test and Protect scheme should the need arise.

We no longer ask attendees to book a place in advance.

By the time this issue of the magazine reaches you, we shall have resumed serving teas and coffees following Sunday Worship and plans are also in hand for the resumption of the Midweek Fellowship. We know how these opportunities for fellowship are valued by our members.

In line with the easing of Covid restrictions, a number of church and non-church organisations have resumed meeting again within our buildings.

We all look forward to the time when concerns about Covid no longer impact on what we would regard as "normal" life.

HEALTH AND SAFETY REPORT

Then there was Omicron. When the last issue of our magazine was published, we had just started to relax a wee bit. And then this new variant arrived. Suddenly we had to reapply precautions and widen social distancing back to two metres and a few Christmas celebrations had to be revised. But we are getting better at doing things like that. Several of the measures which the Scottish Government and the Church of Scotland had previously relaxed and were now reinstating had still been in place in Kilbarchan Parish Church so it did not affect us too badly.

The Omicron variant was reported to be rampant among certain sectors of the population but fortunately, it did not seem to be too prevalent in our part of the world. Perhaps the multiple vaccinations and good disinfection habits have given us a better degree of protection. Unsubstantiated evidence tells us that the majority of people who were hospitalised by this latest covid variant had not been fully vaccinated.

Then on 28th January, we were told that "the data" showed that the Covid Omicron variant, though still here, was not as serious as had previously been anticipated and we could now relax back to the November level of precautionary measures.

So, we are now back to where we were last time. I was tempted to just repeat the same report as in the November Issue, but I won't. Just remember "the new normal".

Suffice it to say that in Church Services we are still taking people's names and contact details, sanitizing our hands and hymn books, and using a precautionary spacing in the pews. The congregation is slowly increasing in numbers as more people gain confidence in coming out on a Sunday. It is great to see you all and I hope you feel safe. If you would be happier sitting a little further apart from the others you just have to mention this to the steward at the door and you will be accommodated.

It is also good to see a number of groups and activities restarting within the Church and Halls. These still have restrictions and precautions to which we need to adhere. Please don't be grumpy with the organisers, they are doing their very best under the circumstances and should be applauded.

In the near future, we are planning to reintroduce teas and coffees after the Sunday morning service, restart the Wednesday morning fellowship, and hold an Easter event. There will be the usual safety measures on these occasions but it will be great to have more opportunities to meet each other.

So take care of yourselves and each other.

Kilbarchan Baptist Church was built in 1904 on Glentyan land in High Barholm where the Guide Centre now stands. The church seated 400 but due to declining membership was closed as a Baptist Church in 1916. It then became St Barchan's Congregational Church until it was demolished in the late 1950s prior to the wooden Guide Hut being built on the site.

THE GUILD

How good it was to be back together again at the beginning of February and what an interesting speaker we had that afternoon. Each year we are asked by the National Guild in Edinburgh to select a Project to support. Our choice for this session was "Home for Good" a charitable Organisation working to place vulnerable children in short and long term care foster and



adoption. This is a new venture in Scotland but has been running in areas in England and Ireland for some years. Our speaker, Graeme McMeekin, a father of three adopted siblings, spoke from his heart of the work "Home for Good" does to help prospective carers think through the idea of fostering and adoption and when a match is made the Organisation continues offering both advice and practical help to carers/parents. We learned that there are around 10,000 children in care in Scotland. On looking around the audience Graeme was well aware that none were of an age to be carers but he asked that we tell people about the Organisation and as Guild remember the work of "Home for Good" in our prayers.

Later in February, we had Mr, John Copeland who came along to show slides of his visits to Israel and talk about the people he met there.

In March we have two meetings. The first is on 8th March when Mr Gordon Wilson will show slides and give a talk on the P.S, Waverley. The talk will last around 45 minutes and covers a bit why the Waverley is unique, the work involved in keeping sailing, some of the places you can visit aboard her and finally some of the present challenges she faces. Visitors are cordially invited.




TOTS'CLUB

For the first time since March 2020, the club has succeeded in meeting for three consecutive months' walks. It has been lovely to get back together again.


