Yet change is all around, in the world, in society, in our country, in our church and in our life.

One change you will notice from September onwards is a new face in the ministry team of Kilbarchan Parish Church. Aaron Marshall will be with us for fifteen months as a Probationer. This is the final period of training in Aaron's journey towards becoming ordained as a minister of word and sacrament within the Church of Scotland.

Aaron will become involved in all aspects of the life, worship and ministry of our congregation. Elsewhere in this issue of the Church notes Aaron introduces himself.

Soon he will become a recognised and friendly face around our church and village. I know you will guarantee Aaron a warm welcome.

I look forward to seeing you in worship and in the various organisations within the church that start up in September.

#### THE CRECHE



#### PRESBYTERY REPORT FOR TUESDAY 20<sup>TH</sup> JUNE 2023

The Presbytery Clerk, Rev Dr Peter McEnhill has submitted his resignation from 31st August 2023. An interview panel of Ken Gray, Maggie McArthur, Jonathan Fleming, Carol Moore and Sheena McFarlane will consider applications and interview potential candidates.

The Rev Dr Alistair Shaw is demitting his charge as the 31st August 2023 on the grounds of age.

Inverclyde Family Contact Centre plans to become an SCIO in the summer of 2023 and that from September 12<sup>th</sup> 2023 Presbytery will no longer appoint Trustees to the Governing body and the Moderator of Presbytery will no longer be a Trustee ex officio.

TREASURER: Presbytery accounts were approved for year ending 31st. December 2022. Thanks were given to Mr Jim Gibson for acting as Independent Examiner for 2022 and he was appointed for another year.

MINISTRY: intend to run Worship Leader courses later in the year, the committee has asked for expressions of interest to be made to <a href="YSmith@churchofscotland.org.uk">YSmith@churchofscotland.org.uk</a>. Congratulations to Charlene Mitchell from St John's Church in Gourock who following attendance at National Assessment Conference has been accepted for training for the Diaconate.

PLANNING: amendments to the draft Mission Plan as stated in the Extract Minute of the Faith Nurture Forum were adopted and the amended plan is now the Presbytery Plan for Clyde Presbytery. The adoption of the amended Presbytery plan means that the fourteen day period for lodging Mission Plan Review requests has begun.

#### PROPERTY REPORT

Since the last magazine report, the Property Team has met three times to review what works we would still like to do, but also to ensure we comply with the Kirk Session approved financial limits.

This year's financial limit has been reached and, in fact, exceeded due to projects which had been instructed in the previous financial year.

The small hall and session house loft spaces have been insulated to hopefully retain heat in the buildings and reduce heating costs.

The sound systems in the church and hall have been upgraded very recently.

Where applicable, the portable electrical appliances, boilers and fire safety equipment in the church, halls and manse have had their annual service.

A drone survey of the church and hall roofs has been completed to see what work, if any, is needed to the roof coverings and gutters.

We have bored into the cavity of the interior gable wall in the large hall to investigate the damp patches. However, this was inconclusive and further investigation of the exterior of the gable is now needed.

The Church of Scotland has instructed the church to prepare an accessibility audit on an annual basis. This is a new instruction and the Property Team are looking at how to comply appropriately.

The upgrade of paths has been put on hold.

The observant amongst us will have noted new paintwork, both inside and outside thanks to Iain Gibb.

#### HEALTH AND SAFETY REPORT

It has recently been noted that reports in the Accident Book (in the kitchen if it's needed) contain personal information which shouldn't be left lying around. This has now been rectified. Once the details of any reported accident/incident have been resolved and appropriate measures have been taken, then the report sheet is removed from the Accident Book and kept securely along with similar personal data held by the Safeguarding Team.

An email was received from the General Trustees in July advising us that due to high numbers of false alarms from automatic fire detection systems the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service will no longer dispatch fire fighting appliances without confirmation that there is actual fire, smoke or burning smell within the building.

Our fire evacuation plans for the buildings in Kilbarchan Parish Church have been updated to reflect this development and it may seem that the "responsible person" for any ongoing activity has the added duty of confirming whether or not there actually is a fire. However, this person should not put him/herself in any danger. You do not need to see flames to know there is a fire. If you see smoke; if you hear crackling sounds; if you smell burning; or if you can feel heat on a closed door by using the back of your hand to sense it, then any one of these is sufficient confirmation that there actually is a fire. Do not open the door if you can see, hear, smell, or feel the effect of fire behind it. Just tell the Fire Service and they will attend urgently.

Hopefully such occurrences will not happen. But it does highlight the necessity for vigilance. Do check that gas and electric appliances are turned off before leaving the buildings. Please ensure that everyone stays safe.

#### **Renfrewshire Foodbank Summer Update**

foodbank The information presented below is taken from Foodbank's latest update so thanks to them for giving me permission to reproduce it here.

#### **Food Parcels**

In June & July Renfrewshire Foodbank (RF) supplied the following parcels across their distribution network:

```
Singles – 506 (June - 272, July – 234)
Couples -142 (June -81, July -61)
Small Families (up to 4 people) -125 (June -67, July -58)
Large Families (5+ people) – 46 (June – 24, July – 22)
Total – 819 (June 444, July - 375)
```

These parcels provided 1355 people with emergency food. This breaks down to 960 adults and 395 children.

A total of 16,536.19kgs of food, toiletries and cleaning products were distributed.

In comparison to the same period last year, RF has seen a 10.97% increase in food parcels issued and a 5.6% increase in people fed. This breaks down to 7% more adults and 2% more children.

#### **Donations**

In June and July RF received 10,628.34 kgs of donations, and purchased 1745kgs of stock over the period. This was made up of fresh items for the fresh packs and a top up of most needed items.

July also saw a significant milestone in terms of donations. RF reached a phenomenal 1 million kgs donated since RF's records began.

The Foodbank model is based on the community helping the community. Renfrewshire Foodbank would not exist if it was not for the kindness and generosity of the community of Renfrewshire and beyond.

#### **School Uniforms**

Asda Linwood and Linwood High School donated some school uniforms and RF team members have been identifying families for these and they have been very much

appreciated. A local business also held a school bag drive which collected some bags and stationary for RF to distribute too.

#### **Pet Food**

In June & July, we provided emergency food for 193 dogs, 176 cats, 2 gerbils, 1 ferret, 1 rat, 1 parrot and 2 guinea pigs. RF was also able to pass on some pet treats and accessories.

#### Van Cover

RF are still on the lookout for a couple of new van people. If yo know of anyone who may be able to help out regularly or even ad hoc to cover holidays, please contact Renfrewshire Foodbank. Ideally, they should be able to confidently drive a van and should be physically fit.

The Renfrewshire Foodbank Management Team would like to thank Kilbarchan Parish Church for our continued support of the Foodbank.

#### **AUTUMN**




Wandering aimlessly through the trees So peaceful Only the rustling of leaves.

#### SURVEY OF KILBARCHAN PARISH CHURCH GRAVEYARD

In 2021 a decision was taken to record as many of the gravestones as possible and a group of volunteers comprising Fulton Dunn, Myra and George Grant, Christine and Lindsay Erwin, and Ian Trushell commenced the task of reading and recording the details on each gravestone. This task was recently completed and recorded in hard copy format. A separate electronic database of the information was created which can be interrogated to find all relevant information held on record.

The work outlined above was rewarded when Alan Vaughan received an enquiry via the church website on 29 July of this year from Eugeniusz Kowalski, residing in the Netherlands. His father, Josef, was a Pole staying in Scotland between 1940 and 1944 who had made friends with Jessie Mitchell residing at 3 Steeple Square. Did we know Jessie's dates of birth and death?

A search of the electronic database described above found the record of Jessie Mitchell's gravestone within seconds. Jessie died on 16 December 2005 aged 96 and was the grand-daughter of Colin Houston. Her details are recorded on gravestone 7 which stands at the wall behind George and Myra Grant's house. These are the most recent details recorded on any gravestone in the cemetery. Colin Campbell found Jessie's birth details on https://www.scotlandspeople.gov.uk website and so the questions were answered within a matter of days, including a photograph of the gravestone, much to Mr Kowalski's delight.

A parallel piece of research into the Lair Records is currently being undertaken by Alex Ritchie and when that is completed the intention is to combine it with the Gravestone Records into a single publication and database.

#### Kilbarchan Parish Church Hillwalking Club Report, August 2023

June hosted our second hostelling weekend of the year, in Ratagan, Glenshiel. With several unfortunate health-related absences only three of us attended, but we made the most of it. On the Saturday we climbed the Munros of The Saddle and Sgurr na Sgine via the technical, narrow Forcan Ridge. It was a beautifully sunny day, but hot enough that we were relieved to soak ourselves in a burn at the end of nearly 12 hours on the hill. On the Sunday we asceneded the shorter but notoriously steep Munro of Beinn Sgritheall, with scree on the ascent and slalom between the birch trees on the descent. These were all new Munros for Jim Dick, leaving him with just 5 of the 282 left to climb!

On the same weekend, six walkers took a day trip to the Southern Uplands to climb the Donald of Talla Cleuch Head. The route started from the bridge over the Talla Water, high above the Talla Reservoir in Tweedsmuir, up the narrow road to the Megget Stone. The route turned north over Fans Law, and then NW to reach a gate in the deer fence and onto the top of the rather steep Talla Cleuch where a coffee break was taken. After a modest drop, the final climb followed another deer fence which took the party to the unmarked summit of Talla Cleuch Head (691 metres) just after noon, with time for Photographs and to admire the views. The return reversed the upward route, stopping again above the Cleuch, this time for lunch. The weather was ideal for hill walking - warm and sunny with a gentle breeze to cool the walkers.

July's forecast involved 5 hours of lightning, so the Munro walk was regretfully cancelled. However, the lower level walk of Dollar Glen to Glenquey (and back) was safely below the summits and ridges of the Ochils, so eight of us braved the forecast. We were rewarded by a pretty walk on good paths, with wildflowers and fast flowing waterfalls. The lightning failed to materialise and we only suffered the odd shower. There was even the odd patch of blue sky!

August's smaller hillwalk was also cancelled due to lack of numbers, with many on holiday, but five of us scaled the Corbett of Cam Creag in Glen Lyon. The walk was mainly on landrover track, with a short steep boggy section to the summit cairn. We faced the odd torrential downpour and some atmospheric mist during our summit lunch break, but the heather was in beautiful full bloom and we capitalised on the excellent coffee and cake in the Glenlyon Tearoom afterwards.

Our upcoming walks will be:

- 9th Sept: Beinn Trilleachan (Corbett), Glen Etive
- 16th Sept: Coilessan Glen, Ardgartan
- 7th Oct: West Lomond, Fife
- 11th Nov: Allermuir Hill & Caerketton Hill, Pentlands

For all walks we will meet at the Steeple at 8am. Any new members would be very welcome on these or any subsequent walks.

This fundraising is vital to support the efforts of Christian Aid to help those in need in some of the poorest communities in the world, and to campaign for real change which will remove the inequalities which blight the lives of so many.




#### THE KILBARCHAN SINGERS
