KIRK SESSION REPORT

During the summer months, there was only one session meeting. It was held in June, which now seems a long time ago, but I hope you all have some pleasant memories of the sunny days we have had this year.

Amongst other business, we agreed to

- take part in the Renfrewshire Doors Open Scheme again
- participate in the Blythswood Shoe Box Appeal
- have another soup lunch in aid of Mary's Meals following the Harvest Service
- proceed with arrangements for a Youth Quiz in October
- a request for some funding from the benevolent fund contributing towards the cost of the seniors' afternoon tea.

At that meeting, we accepted the resignation of Ian Keith from the post of Presbytery Elder. Ian had faithfully attended Presbytery meetings on our behalf for many years and then reported back to the Session. Ian was given a plant for his garden in recognition of his commitment to this role.

We were then pleased to appoint Graham McKay to take on the role of Presbytery elder for Kilbarchan Parish Church.

It was with regret, but understanding, that we recorded that Aaron had made the difficult decision to leave his post as our Assistant minister and take up a position with Skills Development Scotland, in order to provide financial stability for his family. A presentation had been made to him on the completion of his Probationary period but following his last service with us, there was a cake with an image of some of the things (apart from his services) which he will be remembered for.

He will be missed both by the congregations and by Stephen who will feel the loss of his help ministering to the communities of Kilbarchan and Howwood.

Further to the recent safeguarding and OSCR changes, Margaret McIntyre and Yvonne Kane have agreed to relinquish their districts and have their names added to the list of elders' emeritus. Stephen expressed the gratitude of Session for all their contributions to Session over many years.

At the end of worship on Sunday 25 May, long service certificates were presented to Gwen Howden, Alan Fulton, Margaret Gibb and Graham McKay in recognition of thirty years dedicated service as elders in Kilbarchan.

Unfortunately, Joyce Scott was unable to be in Church then, so Stephen and Christine took her certificate to her later.

They had been ordained in the former East Church on Sunday 28 May 1995 by Rev Alaster Bull and we are so very grateful for all the work they have done for the Church in Kilbarchan before and since being ordained as elders.

Again, it is sad to write of the death of more of our members – their names are recorded later in the magazine.

However, it has been encouraging to see new faces coming regularly to worship in Kilbarchan – we hope they will all have received a warm welcome from the congregation and will become involved in some of our Groups which will be starting up again soon.

MUSIC IN WORSHIP

Music has featured in Western Christian Worship from earliest times. Starting with early, sung plain chant, music developed from the 17th century into Cantatas, Oratorios and Masses written by skilled composers to modern times. The introduction of organ music into Scottish churches, particularly within the Church of



Scotland, was a gradual and often contentious process, marked by significant resistance and eventual acceptance. By 1866, however, The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland made it clear that it saw no objection in principle to the use of organs. What then is the purpose of music in worship?

Preparatory: The music played as the congregation gathers in church is chosen to 'set the scene' for the worship to follow. It is usually quiet and reflective to promote a sense of calm and tranquillity. Examples of such music include perhaps a Bach Prelude, a classical piece, such as 'Sheep May Safely Graze', a modern classic, like Bernstein's 'Somewhere', or an achingly beautiful Scottish Slow Air, e.g. Phil Cunningham's 'Loch Katrine's Lady.'

Worshipful: Singing psalms and hymns is a major part of our worship and these are chosen by the Minister to reflect the seasons, the church calendar and important events, e.g. Christenings, Remembrance, etc. Some hymns are rousing; some are tranquil; some are fast; some are slow. Even different verses require different styles. My task as Organist is to lead the singing as appropriate. An unaccompanied verse or last line is singularly effective and the congregation knows to keep singing.

Celebratory: The closing Voluntary aims to have the congregation leave the church with joy or meaning. The Ukrainian National Anthem is played to remind us of that continuing struggle, 'Variations on America' by Charles Ives is played on the Sunday nearest 4th July, as is 'La Marseillaise' near Bastille Day, 'Scots Wha Hae' near St Andrew's Day, and 'The Dambusters March' in mid-May. Sometimes it's simply a March, Toccata or Trumpet Tune to send the congregation out with a smile. Occasionally, it's a very quiet piece to reflect sorrow after a tragic event.

Choral: The Choir has an important role in leading congregational singing and performing Introits and Anthems which enhance worship. I am greatly supported by the Choir whose members are incredibly talented and loyal.

Sir Chris Hoy's "Tour de 4" Charity Cycling Challenge

The Tour de 4 is a brand new cycling initiative, born from Sir Chris Hoy's vision to change perceptions around stage 4 cancer following his own diagnosis.

This is the time of year when our Freewill Offering Convenor, Neil Chittick, will order the FWO envelopes for 2026.

The cost of FWO envelopes increases every year and therefore the Finance Team want to ensure that these envelopes are ordered only for those members who wish to use them. It is appreciated that circumstances can change and FWO envelopes may no longer be appropriate for some members.

We would ask, therefore, that any member who no longer wants FWO envelopes, notifies Neil or any member of the Finance Team **before 14**th. **September 2025.**

The number of members who give to the Church by way of monthly/quarterly/annual Standing Order is decreasing each year, mainly due to the deaths of members. As with FWO envelopes, it is appreciated that giving by Standing Order is not appropriate for everyone. If, however, there are any members who would like to consider giving by Standing Order, and who do not already do so, we would ask that you speak to any member of the Finance Team who will be pleased to deal with any queries and provide a Standing Order Form for completion.

Giving by Standing Order is very helpful to the Church. It assists the Finance Team in budgeting for expenditure during the year.

An instruction to pay an amount by Standing Order to the Church is in the control of the member and can be amended or cancelled at any time by that member.

PROPERTY REPORT

A number of projects had been carried over from 2024 for completion this year:

• The large stained glass panels have been installed in the church vestibule. The small panels will be installed in the halls soon.

During the last few months,

- the underside of the side galleries has been plaster-boarded and replastered;
- The redecoration will take place after August;
- the internal gable of the large hall has been replastered and will be redecorated after a short period to ensure the plaster has dried;
- the redecoration and re-carpeting of the Session House is due to start at the end of August;
- the external gable of the hall will be repainted soon;
- the upgrade of the rear path adjacent to the church is being reassessed.
- the first phase of repairing the manse fence has been completed and the second phase should begin in August.









