Every person has a story to tell. Our stories are interwoven and we are part of one big narrative: that of humankind.

The story of humankind seems to be at a low point. Many people feel that the world finds itself in a downward spiral, an on-going mess of violence, egotism, destruction and regression. The flood of information that reaches us every day from around the globe is impossible to digest and so hugely complex that we risk to either ignore it altogether or to come to a rush conclusion based on doubtful information. Things are getting out of control and this perceived loss of control is traumatising for many. However hard we try to fix things, it seems we are only just about able to patch up the symptoms but fail to get to the roots and change things around for the better. Governments are visibly overwhelmed with the tasks ahead of them. Somehow we sense that we haven't hit rock bottom yet and that there is more to come. The world changes at a speed that makes it impossible to predict the consequences for our lifestyle. We will have to find new ways to make things work and we might do well to ready ourselves for more big changes.

Easter is approaching and I believe that the symbolism and message of Easter are today just as important as 2,000 years ago. Good Friday is the day when we remember that God has sacrificed his own flesh to die on the cross and suffer the pain of the world alongside humankind: the pain of despair, destruction, loss and death. Without the experience of Good Friday, there can be no Easter joy, without the reality of death no appreciation of the deeper meaning of life. Both are part of the same narrative. We know deep in our hearts that the deepest lows and highest highs are both part of our individual stories as well as of the story of humankind. Flowers blossom in the desert, whilst rain forests are being destroyed. Love flourishes in war times, newborn babies die in their parent's arms. Seemingly insurmountable walls are broken down, new ones are built. Soldiers ready to shoot suddenly hesitate, people we trust turn against us. This is our story. This is the Easter story.

I wish for you all that the hope of Easter will prevail over the feeling of despair. May you never lose sight of hope in the ups and downs of life and may you will always be surrounded by people and communities who carry you through the rocky stages of life. Happy Easter!

KIRK SESSION REPORT

The Kirk Session received and agreed the Local Church Review Report from Presbytery. I include the conclusion from the report and copies of the full report will be made available to the congregation.

Report Conclusion

The visiting team report that they found a congregation in good heart, active and with vibrant plans for the future. Regulatory and procedural matters were in order, although we note that Safeguarding training for Elders is described as ongoing and we would urge the Session to complete that process as soon as possible, making use of the Presbytery resources available. We were pleased to note that although the congregation felt that the relationship with Presbytery had previously been strained- mainly down to issues of communication and support re the process of union- nevertheless they felt that there was now a better and more positive relationship with the united church.

The local church review team commend the life and work of the church and their ambitious plans for future development. We would particularly encourage the proposed development of adult Christian education courses as a means of fostering discipleship. Our one hesitation is that many of the proposals are slated for year 1 of the five year plan and we fear overload to some degree, and so perhaps a little more prioritisation and staging through the whole five year planning process is necessary. We particularly commend the willingness to support the Minister's participation in the Church of Scotland's study leave scheme.

The 5 year Action Plan produced will be reviewed to take on board comments from Presbytery. The plan will be reviewed and updated regularly and committees have been asked to take on board relevant action points.

Stephen reported that Dorothy Wallace will be joining us in the summer as a probationer for 12 to 15 months.

The Kirk Session nominated Ann McLeod to be a commissioner of the General Assembly to meet in Edinburgh for a week beginning Saturday 18th May 2019.

We have lost two influential members of the Kirk Session during the last few months. John Connell had been an elder since 1963 and was Session Clerk of the former West Church. Richard Pitchers had been an elder since 1975 and was the Gift Aid Convenor for the former East Church and the Parish Church. Both will be sadly missed.

This is the last time that I will be writing the Kirk Session Report as I am retiring after 8 years as Session Clerk in both the former East Church and the united Parish Church. Willie Beattie and John Connell were hard acts to follow but with the help of Session I feel that we are in a strong position going forward. I would like to thank Christine Erwin and Helen Robertson who as assistants were always willing to help when needed. There are so many other people who have helped during this time and I am indebted to them all.

We have many talents within the congregation that help make this such a successful church under the leadership of Stephen. It can only continue if we all contribute to its smooth running.

TREASURER'S REPORT

As I intimated my retirement as Treasurer of Kilbarchan Parish Church to the Kirk Session early in February, this will be my last Report. I succeeded Willie Beattie as Treasurer of the former Kilbarchan East Church in 1982-some thirty seven years ago-and became the first Treasurer of the Parish Church some three years ago. My intention is to complete the Church



Accounts to 31 December 2018, ensure the Examiner/Auditor is satisfied, approval of the Trustees is in place and present the Accounts to the Stated Annual Meeting on Sunday 31 March 2019. This will be my last duty as Treasurer. It goes without saying that it has been a privilege to serve the Church for such a lengthy period but there comes a time when you have to return to the "back benches/pews"

Many will be aware that the Church Bank Account was defrauded and although the sum illegally taken from the Account has been replaced significant disruption in the Bank Account has taken place. I have no information on how the fraud was perpetrated but the necessity for the Bank to establish a new Church Bank Account and the need for Members who contribute to the Church by Standing Order to complete new Standing Order Forms has not been without problems. Once again thank you for your cooperation. I had hoped to quietly retire into the background but "the best laid plans---"!!!

Reserves at the end of December 2018 were slightly higher than the previous year mainly due to a very welcome increase in Offerings, a significant saving in the Major Works Contract and a reduction in the Ministry and Mission payment to the Church of Scotland, 121 George Street, Edinburgh. More information will be available at the Stated Annual Meeting on the 31 March.

PRESBYTERY OF GREENOCK AND PAISLEY Tuesday 11th December 2018 and February 12th 2019 at The Cornerstone, Bishopton

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

BUSINESS: note the Rev Liz Geddes Rev Eileen Ross and Rev Peter Gill are on sick leave; the Rev David Burt has been appointed as Vice Convener of the Business Committee; there is a pressing issue of a lack of sufficient locum cover for congregations in vacancy or guardianship; and encourages all those qualified to provide such cover to consider offering themselves in service to Presbytery; Rev Iain Ramsden has been appointed as locum at Erskine parish church as from the 9th December 2018; Rev Yvonne Smith has been appointed as Interim Moderator at Paisley St Luke's from 28th January 2019, Rev Pamela Gordon at Linwood from 6th February 2019, Mr. Jack McHugh at Langbank linked with Port Glasgow St Andrew's from 31st March 2019 and Rev Owen Derrick at Greenock St Margaret's from 31st March 2019; the Presbytery Planning Task Group has concurred with the amendments made to the Presbytery plan at its meeting on the 13th November 2018, and the plan as amended is now the plan for Presbytery, all in accordance with the terms outlined in Act 7 2003, (Appraisal and Adjustment); the sist applied to that decision whilst awaiting concurrence has now been lifted, and instructs the VPC to ensure that the vacant congregations whose permission to call was withdrawn now dismiss their nominating committees and formally end their vacancy processes; the Clerk will write immediately to all congregations affected by this decision to amend the plan informing them of their right to dissent and complain/appeal the decision and of the process and timescale for so doing; Mr. Jack McHugh as the next Moderator for the Presbytery of Greenock & Paisley from September 2019; Order of the Day: at 7.45pm at the March meeting for the election of Commissioners to the forthcoming General Assembly.

TREASURER: the accounts for the year ended 30 June 2018 were presented to Presbytery; the Annual Accounts of the Presbytery, as presented, were approved for the year ending 30 June 2018, subject to any amendments which may be required following the Independent Examination which is currently being carried

out; the Budget for 2018/2019 and the Presbytery assessments for 2018/2019 as detailed were approved; Presbytery instructs congregations to make payment as soon as possible but no later than 31st May

STEWARDSHIP & FINANCE: the 2017 accounts of Linwood have been attested by the committee in the name of Presbytery and the congregation authorised to submit these to the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator; one copy of their examined Financial Accounts for 2018 should be submitted to the Presbytery Office and to the Church's Stewardship and Finance Department no later than 31 March 2019; congregations now have until 30th June to hold their Annual Stated Meeting for the previous year.

WORLD MISSION & ECUMENICAL RELATIONS: the dates of the WM Study Tour of Israel & Palestine, 1-11 November 2019, and also the WM Study Tour to Israel specifically for younger people to take place 31 May-9 June 2019, and encourage Presbyters to make this opportunity known amongst congregations; the committee encourages congregations to pray for, and support, Christian Unity Week 18-25 January 2019.

PROPERTY: an application by the Greenock St Margaret's congregation to dispose of their present manse, subject to the approval of the General Trustees. The General Trustees require the net proceeds of the sale to be held in the Consolidated Fabric Fund and it will be a requirement of Presbytery that such funds are held as restricted funds for the sole purpose of purchasing a replacement manse should that prove necessary, and it is recommended that the congregation use the services of the Church of Scotland Law Department; the Church of Scotland Insurance Services (COSIS) have now indicated that cover is available for water damage and other risks at empty manses including where the heating is left on; until further notice, any installation and upgrading of AV equipment and/or lighting at churches and halls should be notified to Presbytery and the General Trustees or CARTA before any works begin; congregations who handle and prepare food such that they fall into the category of a food business operator it is essential that all congregations take adequate preventative and management steps to manage the risk of illness from food allergies; a compulsory purchase order issued by Renfrewshire Council for part of the access to the glebes at Inchinnan has been accepted, note General Trustees are acting on behalf of the congregation; the annual Presbytery Diligence Return re. The Care of Ecclesiastical Properties was completed and returned to the General Trustees on the 17th January and duly acknowledged.

HEALTH AND SAFETY SEMINAR: The property committee has invited Brian Auld, Assistant Secretary (Safe Buildings) at the General Trustees' Department to speak to representatives of all congregations in Presbytery at a Health & Safety seminar to be held in the Cornerstone, Bishopton, on Tuesday 2nd April 2019 at 19:00, tea and coffee will be available prior to the seminar beginning. Congregations are invited to send up to three representatives.

MISSION & DISCIPLESHIP: Sessions requiring training other than for new volunteers may contact the Presbytery of Glasgow on 0141 332 6606 to access their provision; applications for the General Assembly Youth Representative should be submitted; Kirk Sessions should explore what opportunities exist for a fresh expression of church in their parish, as per the General Assembly 2018 remit from the Mission and Discipleship Council; Kirk Sessions are encouraged to complete the questionnaire outlining their existing provision for mission and discipleship; the Boys' Brigade leaflets, from their Disability Advice Network, for working with young people who have a disability, these contain useful advice for all organisations; application forms for each of the 2 funds, namely the Smith-Lefevre, and Port Glasgow Newark Mission Fund should be submitted by 12 noon on Friday 22 February 2019;

MINISTRY: the Minister of every Worship Leader is responsible for their continuing Development; potential Worship Leaders should gain some experience of participation in worship before applying to become a Worship Leader.

LOCAL CHURCH REVIEW: report for Kilbarchan Parish Church was distributed; further details see Kirk Session Report.

SUPERINTENDENCE: dates, times and venues for the annual inspection of records were given and instructs congregations to ensure all records are presented for examination at their allocated time.

Sisters of Sinai by Janice Soskice

As the achievements of women are currently gaining more recognition it is perhaps appropriate to mention the contribution of Agnes and Margaret Smith. The twins, born in 1843, were promised by their wealthy father, that, if they learned the language he would take them to visit France.

The young pre-teen sisters, in what was surely an instinctive, and now recognised method, thereafter spoke only in French to each other until they were proficient in the language and thus earned their tour of La Belle France. The young polyglots subsequently mastered Spanish, Italian and Greek and were rewarded by visits to these countries.

After the death of their father, as mature women, they hired a yacht to cruise along the River Nile but were cheated of enjoyment of the sights and companionship of others by the devious ways of the captain. They blamed their lack of Arabic!

This deficiency they rectified and after hiring camels, guides, porters, tents and equipment set off on a trek across the Sinai Desert to reach the famous monastery on the southern edge.

Their scholarship was acknowledged by the abbot who allowed them the use of the library. There Agnes discovered the oldest extant scroll of part of the Gospel of St Mark.

This led to an important visit by illustrious Oxford dons to make a detailed translation.

It is disappointing to report that the Oxford authorities have never recognised the sisters' contribution although they were honoured by universities in Germany and Canada.

What is of relevant to us is that Agnes and Margaret, from age 6 to 19, spent their formative years in Kilbarchan in a large house(demolished in 1956) in Craigends Drive. (John Connell admitted to scrumping for apples there as a lad!) It is certain that the girls, both staunchly Presbyterian, would be familiar with both the original former West and East Church buildings.

These important women should be remembered with pride by our congregation.

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HEALTH AND SAFETY REPORT

Background

A Health and Safety initiative was launched by the Church of Scotland late in 2017 with the objective of having all Parishes formalise their Health and Safety procedures. To assist with this the General Trustees issued a Health and Safety Toolkit.

This Toolkit stresses that responsibility for health and safety within any Church of Scotland lies with its "Financial Board" which, for Kilbarchan Parish Church, is the Congregational Board. The Board is called upon to appoint a team to administer health and safety affairs and a member of the Board shall be nominated "Congregational Health and Safety Administrator" to be a point of contact for health and safety issues within the Church and to report to the Board on these issues.

The Team

The Kilbarchan H&S Team first met on 10th May 2018 and comprises the following volunteers; May Henderson, Fiona McKenzie Campbell McKenzie, Ann McLeod, Tony Martin, Gwen Howden, and Christine Erwin. It was proposed that Tony Martin take the role of Congregational Health and Safety Administrator and this was approved by the Board on 2nd October 2018.

Scope

The Toolkit recommends that the following aspects should be covered:

- 1. A health and safety policy shall be drawn up confirming strategy and congregational commitment to high standards
- 2. Procedures shall be drawn up outlining safe practices
- 3. Risk assessments shall be carried out for all buildings, including:

all hazards encountered in the day to day business of the church, fire safety, utilities,

food safety.

- 4. Consideration of the health and safety of our employees.
- 5. Provision of a Safety Poster.
- 6. Provision of Labels and Signage confirming safe practices, fire exits, etc.

Progress

A Health and Safety Policy Statement and a Health and Safety Management

System has been drawn up setting out a strategy to manage health and safety issues within the congregation and confirming the roles and responsibilities of all concerned towards maintaining a safe environment within the Church. This was circulated to Board Members and accepted at the Congregational Board meeting on 4th December.2018.

Risk Assessments are being carried out for the church building, the halls and the kitchen, and Safety Procedures will be drawn up for various activities and eventualities to help minimise any risks.

The Team are also considering our responsibility towards external groups and bodies which use Church facilities. As we have no input or control of their actual activities then it must be the responsibility of the organisers of these groups to ensure that their activities are managed in a safe manner, but we still have to ensure that they have a safe environment and know what to do if an emergency occurs.

Further Information

It is planned that all policy documents and procedures will be available on the Church website. Further information may be had from any member of the Team, and points of concern can similarly be raised.





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

HILL WALKING CLUB

On a gloriously sunny day last December sixteen of us made our way to Stirling to have an exciting escarpment walk on narrow paths round Lewis Hill. The views of the Ochils were superb, and also of the Wallace Monument

and Stirling Castle and in the distance the Munros of Beinn Vorlich and Stuc a' Chroin. We were amazed by the unusual shapes of the rocks below us and loved the views of the North Third Reservoir from the summit cairn. The descent also was interesting when we stopped to examine the remains of old limekiln workings. All in all a great day with lots of ups and downs but without having to climb too high!

The first walk of 2019 took us to Muirkirk in Ayrshire where nineteen of us, including a nine year old young lady, climbed the hill of Cairn Table which has two very high cairns, one of which is a Great War Memorial, and also a direction board pointing out Ailsa Craig, Arran and the Galloway Hills. We may have spent longer on the summit had the wind not been quite so fierce, but at least it was dry – unlike on the descent when we had very heavy rain. On the way back to the car park we stopped to read the inscription on another cairn built in memory of John Loudon Macadam and passed the ruins of his home and walked on his first ever tarmac road.

The forecast for our February walk to Broughton Heights was dreadful suggesting 60 mile per hour winds, so the eleven of us who turned up at the Steeple were relieved to give it a miss and go instead to the Greenock Cut where we had a lovely walk – half of which we had with the wind at our back blowing us along and the other half battling against it. Unfortunately we were caught in a very heavy shower, but with the strong wind we were almost dried out by the time we got back to the car. A really enjoyable morning walk – and back in time to see the rugby!

The planned walk for March is to The Merrick in the Galloway Forest, and for April the high level walk is Beinn Challum and the low level Auch Glen near Tyndrum. May and June are weekends away with walks from Braemar Hostel and Ratagan Hostel respectively. The syllabus for 2019 is on the Hillwalking notice board in the Hall.


