Three years in the planning, Kansas City-hosted Mid-States Conference a success

If you've ever attended a conference of any kind, you know you're with a group of people who share a similar profession or job like yours. But, if you've ever attended a non-professional conference of, say, an interest or a hobby such as the one we all share, cacti/succulents, you can relax a bit and just enjoy yourself. That's especially true in the case of the Mid-States Cactus and Succulent Conference, hosted by our club June 9-12.

There were amazing and knowledgeable speakers and a huge room full of plants and pottery. And more plants. Sales were superb. And our vendors were SO pleased with the turnout of people from our club's mailing list of more than 300 names, their friends, our club members, and even people who worked at the Stoney Creek Hotel, our conference site. They were giddy.

What's most amazing is that six people from our club... six people, made up the conference committee (with some help from two friends from the Omaha and Des Moines clubs). We began the planning process in 2018 for what was supposed to be a 2020 conference. Covid caused the cancellation. We picked back up in early 2021 with Zoom meetings every other Wednesday for 16 months and plenty of individual tasks assigned to each of us. The best word to describe the planning: details, details, details.

Skipping forward to the actual conference, we pulled it off. Some of you attended the conference and were a big help. A few didn't attend the conference, but came by and helped, too.

Thursday's opening reception was crazy fun. We sold raffle tickets and picked 10 registrants from the raffle box who were permitted to enter the sales room to shop for 30 minutes before anyone else was allowed in. That raffle raised more than \$600 for the club. The remainder of the evening was all about the plants (and the pots). Our cash register, handled by committee members, had a hot night. Sales were brisk.

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Friday and Saturday, registrants attended several 50-minute sessions on topics provided by speakers who travelled to KC from Florida, New Mexico, Texas, Iowa, and Missouri. Topics ranged from cactus diversity around the world, to succulent science and cultivating new succulent habitats. A session on dealing with bugs, another on building a greenhouse, and yet another on bonsai styling provided well-rounded learning for everyone.

Saturday evening's dinner banquet, followed by a rare plant auction, drew bids that sometimes seemed out of control. One plant even brought in \$750!!

Conference attendees left with a lot more knowledge and understanding of cacti and succulents than they had when the conference began. They also arrived home with a whole lot of new plants and awesome pottery. Best of all, they made new friends, renewed acquaintances, and finally looked at their registration "swag bags" full of great items like pens and notepads, rain gauges and special magnets, home-made cactus-themed cookies, and our totally awesome conference tee shirts.

If you didn't make it to the conference, consider next year's **national** Cactus and Succulent Society of America convention in Colorado Springs. In 2024, another Mid-States conference will be held. Followed by another **national** convention in 2025. Then, another Mid-States the next year.

June CSSA (Cactus & Succulent Society of America) annual meeting: For your information

Our club is an affiliate of a national organization representing our hobby. Our hobby is a business, too. CSSA, with an international membership of 549 members, advocates for education, research, and conservation of cacti and succulents.

Founded in 1929, CSSA offers several membership categories. For local clubs (affiliates) such as ours, the cost is \$55 annually. An individual membership costs \$50 and includes the following: a quarterly scientific journal; a seed depot of dozens of rare plants; field trips to native plant habitats; a bi-monthly webinar series featuring experts world-wide; and *To The Point*, a quarterly e-newsletter full of news, photos, information and growing tips (edited by our own club's Linda Tamblyn.) A recent offering is a supporting membership which, for just \$20, includes all the benefits of an individual membership, except for the journal.

A national convention in Colorado Springs, CO is slated for July 12-16, 2023. As of now, 14 plant vendors, as well as several pottery vendors, will sell amazingly wonderful items. Tours of area botanical gardens, local residents' gardens, and field trips are planned, along with several educational sessions for interests you didn't even know you had.

Some interesting stats about CSSA:

- Cash balance: \$324,000
- Royalty income (2021): \$29,885
- "Restricted" balance (restricted endowment for research and conservation efforts): \$564,000
- Monies paid in research grants this year: \$23,000
- Monies paid in conservation efforts this year: \$64,000

The organization is working to develop long-term projects and evaluation procedures for future research and study. This includes the conservation of seeds and plants, along with efforts to stop the illegal removal of plants ("poaching") from their natural habitat for retail selling. CSSA has purchased a drone for use in South Africa to help catch poachers and keep plants in their natural habitat.

The education of cactus and succulent enthusiasts is an on-going emphasis for CSSA. The organization continuously seeks ways to improve educational efforts, as well.

A recent photo contest brought 136 submitted photos in both youth and adult categories. The winning photos will be featured in an upcoming issue of *To The Point*.

Election of new officers and the board of directors will occur in the August. Each member has a vote, and each affiliate club has a vote. The KCCSS officers cast votes for our club.
