

Got Yellow Jackets?

Have you seen Yellowjackets in your yard this summer? They are beneficial insects that eat garden pests and pollinate crops through daily foraging. You may see the foragers in and around your lawn or garden. If left undisturbed, Yellowjackets normally should not be a problem and will eventually go away. However, these wasps will defend their nest if they sense a threat to the colony. Nests are found in the ground, normally in dry areas. When a nest is disturbed, Yellowjackets can inflict multiple stings that are painful and may be life threatening for adults, children, and pets. If you see Yellowjackets, you or your neighbors may have a nest nearby.

Contra Costa Mosquito & Vector Control District provides yellow jacket service to property owners in Contra Costa County. A District employee will respond within 5 business days, schedule a time to come and inspect your yard, and treat the nest. Take pictures of the Yellowjackets and/or any suspected nest areas, so you can text them when they call you back and guide them. In the meantime, DO NOT disturb the nest or swat the insects with your hands. Talk to your neighbors to find out if others are seeing Yellowjackets too so the nest location(s) can be pinpointed. It takes a village!

Wildfire Season is Here... Are You Ready?

The vegetation fire on Upper Alameda Diablo in June was a stark reminder of our community's vulnerability to wildfire and the importance of being prepared. Below are key steps every resident can take to stay ready and informed.

CREATE A DEFENSIBLE SPACE AROUND YOUR HOME

- Remove plants that contain resins, oils, or waxes, and eliminate wood mulch within 5 feet of your home.
- Trim tree branches away from rooftops and remove lower branches within 6 feet of the ground.
- Clear weeds, dead debris, and other combustible material to create a minimum 15-foot buffer from structures on your property.

KEEP DIABLO'S ROADS CLEAR FOR EMERGENCY VEHICLES

- Cut back overhanging tree branches to provide a minimum of 13.5 feet of vertical clearance over the road.
- Remove vegetation, dry grasses, and duff within 3 feet of the street edge to keep evacuation routes accessible.



SIGN UP FOR EMERGENCY NOTIFICATIONS

- Nixle: Used by local law enforcement. Sign up at <u>nixle.com</u> or text your ZIP code to 888777.
- Community Warning System (CWS): Contra Costa County's all-hazard public alert system. Register your cell phone at cwsalerts.com and save 925-655-0195 as a contact.
- PulsePoint: A mobile app from the San Ramon Valley Fire
 Protection District that shares real-time 911 call data. Download
 the PulsePoint app and enable vegetation fire alerts.

PREPARE FOR EVACUATION

- Identify 2–3 evacuation routes in case your primary path is blocked. Click here for the Diablo evacuation plan
- · Create a "Go Bag" of essentials. Click here for a packing guide.
- If an evacuation is likely, consider opening your front gate for emergency vehicle access.
- Leave early when initial alerts are received—don't wait for a mandatory evacuation order.
- Be prepared to be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours, as first responders may not be able to reach everyone right away.

Meet Diablo's New Sheriff Deputy

My name is Deputy Sheriff Candace Kukla, and I'm honored to serve as Diablo's new deputy. I've been in the community for just over a month and have already enjoyed meeting many of you around town. A bit about me: I've been a sworn Deputy with the Contra Costa County Sheriff's Office since May 2018. After completing my training, I was assigned to the Martinez Detention Facility, where I focused on data analysis related to recidivism. In 2023, I was honored to be named the Martinez Detention Division's Deputy of the Year for my investigative work, attention to detail, and analytical skills. In 2024, I transitioned to the Patrol Division, where I've served in Bay Point, North Richmond, El Sobrante, Rodeo, San Pablo, and Crockett.

Over the past month in Diablo, I've enjoyed connecting with residents and learning about the community's values and priorities. Looking ahead, my goals are to foster trust through community engagement, maintain a visible presence to deter crime, respond quickly to emergencies, and use education and technology to support public safety. Diablo is a truly special place, and I'm thrilled to be part of it.

SAFETY TIPS TO HELP PROTECT YOUR HOME



The Sheriff's Department is actively investigating the recent burglaries and has increased patrols throughout Diablo. The incidents appear to follow a pattern familiar to law enforcement; suspects break a rear window/glass door, proceed directly to the primary bedroom and bathroom, and gather valuables such as jewelry, designer handbags, and firearms. In and out in under 30 minutes. Here are some helpful steps to keep your home secure:

- Install security cameras and an alarm system—and activate them whenever you leave the house, even for short outings.
- Use padlocks on backyard gates to limit easy access.
- Request a vacation house check—a Sheriff's deputy will walk your property while you're away and check the exterior of your residence to ensure your doors and windows have not been tampered with. To schedule this service, call the non-emergency line at (925) 646-2441.
- Secure valuables in a bolted-down safe—a loose safe can be removed during a burglary.
- Stay alert and connected with your neighbors—if you observe suspicious activity, call the non-emergency line at (925) 646-2442, or dial 911 in an emergency.

E-BIKES, E-SCOOTERS, AND GOLF CARTS: KNOW THE RULES



Every summer, we see a rise in e-bike and e-scooter use in Diablo—and this year is no different. These newer models are faster and more powerful, making it essential for parents to understand the laws that govern their use. Golf carts are also increasingly popular. Please make sure your child is using the correct vehicle for their age and license status.

- E-Bikes: No minimum age (except Class 3); all minors must wear helmets.
- E-Scooters: Operators must have a driver's license or permit; helmets are required for those under 18.
- Golf Carts: Drivers must have a driver's license to operate on Diablo's roads.
- All Vehicles: Must obey posted speed limits and stop signs.

These laws are in place to protect our children from serious injury. Please help us keep your child—and others—safe by ensuring they ride responsibly and within the law.

Preserving Our Rich History



Diablo's Railroad Roots



On the rain-washed slopes of Mount Diablo, in the spring of 1877, a prime portion of California's future was changing hands. Back then, Diablo was called The Railroad Ranch. Sixteen hundred rolling acres, stitched across the western base of the mountain, had been in the private domain of four men who ruled the rails across the American West: Charles Crocker, Mark Hopkins, Leland Stanford, and Collis P. Huntington—the Associates, also known as The Big Four. They had stitched iron rails into the body of the continent, run gold and people westward to San Francisco, and leveraged their wealth into land and industry across the burgeoning state.

Yet this land deal was different. Standing at the transaction's center, General David D. Colton. Colton was a Californian of reputation and ambition: a miner, railroad officer, and military man, with a knack for rising to meet opportunity. He was the newest partner of The Associates, and over the past two years, the business manager for the property.

The ranch had appeal—not just for its beauty, but because it represented the tangible fruits of California's railroad boom. But the sale was to be no ordinary cash transaction. Colton came with something else: 168 shares in the Rocky Mountain Coal and Iron Company. To the Associates, this was not just paper—these shares controlled a portion of the coal reserves in the high country of Wyoming, a vital resource for powering the locomotives that their fortunes depended upon. Those 168 shares were appraised at \$50,000, a princely sum in the days when gold lay thick in Sacramento's banks.


For Crocker, Hopkins, Stanford, and Huntington, this was less a relinquishment of land than an exchange of one form of power for another—the coal that would fuel their trains, and with them, their empire. For Colton, the ranch represented more than acreage: it signified admission to the elite fraternity of California's industrialists, the Associates having invited him not just into their land dealings, but also their confidences.



The paperwork was formalized: Colton handed over the shares; the Associates signed the deed to the Railroad Ranch on June 19, 1877. The last light caught the top of the mountain, and a new line was drawn in the California dirt.

The significance did not end at signatures. Under Colton's ownership, the ranch would change hands again after his passing, next being named the Cook Ranch, then Oakwood Park Stock Farm as it expanded, shifting from one epoch of California agriculture to another. The 1877 deal was emblematic of its era. Land, coal, and capital were exchanged with a handshake and a signed agreement, but also with a mutual understanding: power in California came not merely from what you owned, but from who you partnered with. The Big Four and Colton, through this transaction, illustrated the new dynamic of the Gilded Ageone where visionaries bartered fortunes and shaped the future not just with shovels or plows, but with stock certificates.

On those undulating acres, the dreams of the railroad—its tracks, its men, its unprecedented reach—were literally and figuratively rooted in California soil. The soil that today we call home.



Kelly and Tom McQueen will welcome their second grand baby this week, born to oldest daughter Madison and son-in-law Brayden Zwetsloot.




