In 1963, the Fairmans built the home



She likes that houses in Diablo aren't all alike and aren't "scrunched together." Over the years, her family stayed in Diablo because of friends, large acreage for homes, no mortgage, visits to the Post Office and seeing the residents. She likes her home because of the views and the feeling that she is by herself but surrounded by other people. Though Mary has always been outgoing, she feels that meeting people in Diablo was easy partly due to a low turnover rate in homes and their commitment to building a good life in the Diablo community. She loves the "people we have on this street." Diablo was also a great place for Mary's son to be raised. Jeff sat on the fence between the Fairman and Osmer properties watching the Osmers play baseball. When he was asked to join them, it began a lifelong friendship with Mark Osmer and others. Another Diablo family with four boys, the Tiernans, arranged themselves by height like "stepping stones" and took in Jeff Fairman as their brother when he fit in as the shortest one.

As they raised their children, they also helped to save an endangered species.





When Val was dating Mary he developed a serious interest in peregrine falcons, the fastest animal on the earth. Soon Mary shared his interest in this truly remarkable bird. Val hired a rock This was only the beginning. Val and Mary built two units for breeding pairs and three smaller houses for single falcons. Peregrines, like some other raptors, have a preference for other fine-feathered friends, especially pigeons, putting a dent in the Fairman's bank account. They would bring in 200 frozen pigeons at a time to feed their growing family.

Val and Mary are to be credited as key players in saving this highly endangered species. They released 30 peregrine falcons into the wild, many of them from Diablo. When visiting Mary you are greeted with a sign with a picture of a peregrine falcon and the phrase "230 MPH." The fastest Lamborghini would be envious of 230 MPH.
