David went to Harvard College and Graduate Business School, and Lynn graduated from the University of Cincinnati Teachers College. They were married in Cincinnati in 1961 and still root for the Bengals.



Branching out from their small-town-American roots, the Kipps soon began a remarkably cosmopolitan life. David started his career working for Standard Oil Company of New Jersey in New York. After a couple of years, they were transferred to Miami, Florida, and from there spent five years in South America living in Columbia, El Salvador and Brazil. After all that relocating, David took a job with Kaiser Aluminum and Chemical Corporation ((KACC) headquartered in Oakland. That brought them to their current home in Diablo. California has been their home now for 52 years, except for a four-year stint in Toronto, while David ran KACC's operations in Canada. Leticia traveled with them to Brazil and later moved to California where she and her four children have all become US citizens. 

By the time David took a job with Kaiser in Oakland in 1970, the family had moved around so much they were delighted to discover a haven in Diablo. During their three years in Rio, due to city-wide safety and security concerns, they had lived on the tenth floor of an apartment building and usually kept their curtains drawn. Thus, they were immediately sold on the lovely sun-filled house at the secluded end of Campo Pelota next to tennis courts and a swimming pool for their children and with a gorgeous unobstructed view of Mt. Diablo.



David loved sports and playing tennis, particularly at Diablo, and wishes he could still do so. In his Harvard days, he was a varsity pitcher and clinched Harvard's win over Yale in their final home-and-home series before graduation. He and good friend Dana Squire won the club tennis doubles championship in 1988. David was also the President of the DCSD in 1989-90.

Most mornings, Lynn now drives with her beloved 13-year-old Chihuahua "Sparky" to Oak Hill Park where they compete with ducks and geese enjoying the lake and Monte Vista students walking laps around it for their P.E. class.
