



Wildfire Season is Upon Us





Keeping Diablo's Streets Clear

In the unlikely event of a wildfire, it is crucial that Diablo's streets remain clear for quick evacuation. Residents need to cut back vegetation to a height clearance of 13.5 feet and a width clearance of 3 feet from the street's edge. Additionally, dead grasses and duff along the street need to be removed to maintain this 3-foot clearance, as they are combustible and can hinder evacuation efforts.

Preparing Your Family for an Evacuation

Take time to research and prepare for a potential evacuation. Identify 2-3 different evacuation routes from your home in case your primary route is impassible. Numerous websites offer plans for efficient preparation. For example, creating a Go Bag is essential. Here is an excellent resource complete with pictures showing "how to."

An evacuation map for Diablo is available through the San Ramon Valley Fire Department <u>here</u>. Do your homework and be ready to leave if necessary.

Diablo's Creeks and Open Space Stability

All land within Diablo is privately owned, including properties with creeks or open spaces. Property owners are responsible for maintenance of these areas.

While the District has no legal authority to maintain these areas, the DCSD Board of Directors recognizes the community impact of a creek or open space failure. At its June 10th meeting, the Board authorized ENGEO Inc. to perform a one-time assessment of Diablo's creeks and open spaces for erosion, slope instability, and general condition. ENGEO's work will involve visual observations only, and any identified vulnerabilities will be communicated to property owners for necessary repairs.

ENGEO's assessments will occur in July or August, conducted by employees wearing ENGEO vests. For questions or concerns, contact District General Manager Kathy Torru at generalmanager@diablocsd.org.

DEPUTY DISPATCHES: HANG UP ON PHONE SCAMS!

Phone scams are fraudulent, difficult to prevent and, unfortunately, costly to those who get caught in their trap. The article below provides some typical examples that people are faced with and includes some surprising data on age groups and how susceptible they are to fraud. These scams are not just targeted at the elderly; in fact, they are very good at entrapping young adults.

Imagine that you are at home drinking your morning coffee when the phone rings. The person on the other end of the line says he is Lieutenant Jackson with the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. Lieutenant Jackson states that your grandson William "Billy" was arrested last night after being involved in a brawl in a local casino and is currently in the Clark County Jail. Lieutenant Jackson goes on to inform you that Billy will spend another night in jail if someone does not post his bail in the amount of \$1,500.00. Lieutenant Jackson stated he had attempted to contact Billy's parents but was unsuccessful.


You remember Billy had mentioned going out of town with some college friends for the weekend. And the Lieutenant sounds so credible, even providing a badge number. So you provide your credit card number to bail Billy out.

I know you're thinking you would never fall for such a scam. But according to the Federal Trade Commission in 2023 some 690,000 American adults lost in excess of \$10 billion dollars; the average loss was \$500.

While we tend to think that it is older adults who are the victims of these scams, the data does tell a different story.

Losses to some types of fraud are more likely to be reported by younger adults, while others are more likely to be reported by older adults.

Phone scams are the number one way in which Americans are cheated out of large sums of money. Scammers have spent countless hours developing new and novel ways of cheating you out of your money. The scams come in many forms but tend to make similar promises.

There is no prize: the caller says you were "selected" for a prize or won the lottery, but if you have to pay, it's not a prize.

- You won't be arrested: scammers might pretend to be law enforcement. Actual law enforcement will not telephone you
 and demand money.
- ♦ You don't need to decide now. Take your time.
- Payment must be made a certain way: wire transfer, gift card, payment app, or cryptocurrency.
- Government agencies will not call to confirm sensitive information: social security number, taxpayer identification number. Most correspondence from the government will be in writing.

Remember: if it's too good to be true, it probably is.

How to protect yourself from scammers:

- Do not engage the caller...hang up. Answering robocalls may lead to further unsolicited calling.
- Utilize call blocking programs. Consider eliminating landline telephones.
- Put your number on the FTC's national <u>Do Not Call Registry</u>.
- Don't trust your caller ID. Scammers have sophisticated cloning or "spoofing" software which gives the appearance of the call originating from a legitimate number.
