Dear Diablo
Neighbors,

As you know, Measure Y on the ballot asked the March 3rd



Town's registered voters to approve the Town Council's rezoning of Town-designated Open Space land for Davidon Homes' 69+ house Magee "Preserve" residential development. Unfortunately, Measure Y passed, by about 54% (10,241) to 46% (8,639).

Thank you to all that participated with your volunteer time and your financial support to defeat the ill-conceived project. We never gave in and have much to be proud of. All involved will continue our efforts to protect the community for the enjoyment of all.

A switch of roughly 800 votes would have changed the result. It is likely Measure Y would have been defeated had the thousands of County residents living within the Diablo Road/Blackhawk Road corridor been allowed to vote. We disenfranchised residents will feel the brunt of Measure Y's 841 more car trips per day, increased flooding and erosion risks, increased wildfire hazards and risks of wildfire entrapment, and four years of construction traffic.

Of course, it was always a David and Goliath struggle for opponents of the project during the past ten years. Getting Measure Y on the ballot was in itself an accomplishment, as was winning two separate lawsuits against the Danville Town Council.

According to its filings with the Fair Political Practices Commission, Davidon Homes' Yes on Y campaign spent more than a whopping \$1 million to secure its

election victory. That's more than 30 times what Danville Open Space Committee-No on Y's campaign spent. In contrast to Davidon Homes' Yes campaign, the No campaign relied on small contributions from hundreds of local residents and thousands of hours of volunteer campaign work.

"Yes on Y" \$1 million campaign expenditures included a mail, sign, newspaper, and social media blitz, portions of which featured Danville's Mayor Stepper and Council members Arnerich and Storer. Mayor Stepper even hosted a phony "Town Hall" Yes on Y call-in event, which the Town Attorney later disavowed as not being a "Town of Danville" Town Hall. Ballot "harvesting", a highly questionable campaign practice recently legalized by the California legislature, was a likely part of the Yes campaign.

As they say in baseball, keep in mind that "it ain't over 'til it's over." The project still has a number of permits to secure from federal and local agencies other than the Town of Danville. SOS- Danville Group will monitor those and continue to oppose development of what remains of our open space and harm to the wonderful area in which we are all so fortunate to live.

Neighborhood Preparedness

Recommendations

We hope this note finds you and your loved ones healthy. We are all seeing the global and national news updates. The message is clear. The virus is spreading. Our health care system has been impacted and is potentially facing shortages of beds and other resources. Hence the shelter-in-place orders throughout the state and country. This is a coordinated attempt to slow the spread of the virus and lessen the impact to the healthcare systems (i.e. "flatten the curve").

The State of California and Contra Costa County are taking every step possible to do its part in "flattening the infection rate curve." The authorities are attempting to buy time through "Shelter at your place of residence" orders so the 6 hospitals within the County healthcare system can manage the predicted increase of COVID-19 cases.

By using community-based systems and strategies, we can help lessen the burden by following the recommended steps listed below. YOU, YOUR FAMILY, YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD need to be as self-sufficient as possible during this outbreak.

How Can You Help?

Our message to you follows the basic CERT motto: "Do the greatest good for the greatest number." Simply stated - Do your part to SLOW the infection rate.

What does this mean for us at home and within our neighborhoods?

- Keep your situational awareness current.
- Get your information from reliable

- Get your information from reliable sources. <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/faq.html>

- Avoid the misinformation that is so prevalent on social media and in the press.

- **Prevent yourself from getting the virus. (Take care of YOURSELF first)**

- Shelter in place.

- **Keep 6' distance from everyone outside of your home at all times.**

- Keep hands in pockets as much as possible to avoid touching your face or surfaces.

- Thoroughly wash your hands with soap and water often.

- Use hand sanitizer if soap and water is not available.

- If you go out, change your clothes and wash your "outside clothes" upon your return.

- **If you do get sick - Contact your Healthcare Provider**

- Going to the doctor's office or emergency department unnecessarily may inadvertently expose you or your family member to COVID-19 or other infections and likewise expose other people to whatever illness you may have.

- Call your Healthcare Provider for a phone evaluation to determine if you need testing or treatment.

- Many people with mild symptoms can recover from COVID-19 at home.

- **Seek immediate help if:**

- You have difficulty breathing (shortness of breath).

- You feel like symptoms (such as fever and cough) are getting worse rapidly.

- You are unable to care for symptoms at home.

- If you need to go to the hospital,



call ahead so they can prepare for your arrival.

- If you need to call 911, tell the 911 operator you're experiencing coronavirus symptoms so the first responders can prepare to treat you safely.

- **Prevent the spread of virus within your home (Take care of your FAMILY second)**

- If you have a family member who is in a high-risk group, do not expose yourself any more than you would expose them!

- Be prepared to take care of your family members.

- If you have personal protective equipment (PPE) supplies at home, know where they are in the event temporary home care is needed.

- Have an isolation/quarantine plan in place - setup rooms in advance.

- Utilize your entire family network of

quarantine/isolation housing options.

- Prevent the spread of virus within your neighborhood (Take care of your NEIGHBORS third)

- Avoid large gatherings - but promote healthy communication and prevention within.

- Utilize the self-protection steps listed above.

- It's OK to get out and about. Simply use social distancing and hand and clothes washing prevention techniques.

- **Protect/Assist the high-risk populations within your neighborhoods**

- Encourage those in high-risk categories to religiously isolate themselves from everyone.

- If you are in a high-risk group - STAY HOME and isolate.

- Without endangering yourself, assist high-risk neighbors with shopping needs and other errands whenever possible.

- Encourage them to stay isolated - offer to accommodate their needs whenever possible to support this strategy.

Diablo Community Services District News

The Diablo Community Services District or DCSD is a California Special District and is governed by residents elected to a 5-member Board of Directors. The purpose of the DCSD is to provide security services to residents, maintain and improve roads, culverts under roads, and bridges within Diablo, and maintain Kay's Trail.

Kathy Torru Appointed General Manager

The Board is pleased to announce that Kathy Torru accepted the appointment as General Manager for the District in January. The position, essential to the smooth and efficient operation of the Board, requires skills in many areas. The job includes extensive administrative and support work (e.g., coordinating meetings, managing and updating the website, providing support to all Board members, negotiating and managing insurance policies, assisting with roads project bids, maintenance of Board records, assistance with emergency situations and community communication); oversight for the District's finances, including management of accounting records, and budgets; and timely fulfillment of reporting requests from the Board, and state and federal agencies.

Kathy has always been keenly interested in our community. She served on the DPOA and DMAC for several years and on the DCSD Board as Finance Commissioner for eight years. During her tenure in these positions, she developed in-depth knowledge of Diablo, its history, and its nuances. Her multi-faceted skills make her a perfect choice for the position. To that end, Kathy came on Board at the end of January, a crunch time for state reporting and finalization of the external audit, successfully completing both accurately and on time. She then jumped into the complex problem of the Dis-

trict's liability insurance coverage and brought that to a successful conclusion as well (see details below).

The Board looks forward to a long and mutually beneficial working relationship with Kathy as its General Manager.

District Liability Insurance

In January the District received a 30-day cancellation notice from its general liability insurance carrier as a result of ongoing litigation against the District since late 2017. The Board assigned General Manager, Kathy Torru, to explore alternatives in order to ensure that the District had continuous coverage. After significant time researching and cold calling agencies, and with the full support of the Board, General Counsel and State Senator Steve Glazer's office, Kathy was able to secure insurance coverage for the District, thus avoiding a lapse. Through this process the District learned a great deal about the California public agency insurance markets and will pursue these options over the next several months.

El Nido Culvert Failure Averted

Thanks to Diablo resident Mani Ghota whose property borders El Nido across from the first green, the District was able to avoid potential culvert failure under the road at that location. Mani had noticed the culvert was in poor condition and appeared to be leaking. Ray Brant immediately checked and confirmed her concern, then took charge of finding a solution quickly, knowing that potential heavy rains could be risky. Ray contracted with a firm to video this and other key culverts so that we would have records of the status of each. He then searched for a company that could address the El Nido problem and found ENGEO, experts in this field. Ray worked with

general counsel to negotiate a contract with the firm to reline the culvert as well as repair the slide adjacent to it. The work was successfully completed in February.

A Look at Diablo's Security

One of the primary functions of the DCSD is to provide for "police protection or security system-guard force to protect and safe-guard life

property" as outlined in our formation documents back in 1969. For the past 40 years, the District has been contracting these security responsibilities to the Contra Costa County Sheriff's Office. Thus, Diablo has its own police vehicle and a dedicated deputy, Dan Buergi, who has been with us since 2013. Deputy Dan makes a point of getting to know all residents and where they live, and is always available to discuss your concerns about Diablo's security. He enjoys interacting with residents so feel free to stop him to chat. Deputy Buergi also attends each DCSD Board meeting to report on the prior month's incidents and answer Board questions regarding his report.

Ray Brant, President of the Board, is also its Security Commissioner and is responsible for planning and oversight of our security program. Ray works closely with our Deputy on scheduling and

curity program. Ray works closely with our Deputy on scheduling and review of community concerns and is our point of contact with the Sheriff's Office.

We are very fortunate to be one of the safest communities within the County, if not the State. In addition, we live adjacent to the Town of Danville which was recently named the safest City in California. In the past two years, we have had only a handful of serious incidents: two burglaries, four incidents of grand theft (theft of items with value exceeding \$950), and two of vandalism. Diablo's biggest problem is identity theft, for which our Deputy creates an official police report, which is often required by credit companies. The federal government maintains an informational identity theft website (www.usa.gov/identity-theft) that provides helpful guidance to consumers should you need it.

To remain safe and secure, we must also be the eyes and ears for our Sheriff by being proactive and responsive. See something, say something! If you notice anything out of the

ordinary, please contact the Sheriff's Office at the non-emergency number, 925-646-2441 or if an emergency, 911. Let's all be vigilant and protective of our community.

At the request of our Deputy, Dan Buergi, the Board


approved the installation of a new stop sign at eastbound Alameda Diablo and Country Club Road between the oak tree and our famous "squirrel." The recommendation was the result of traffic safety concerns at this location caused by vehicles not giving right of way to left turning traffic headed towards Diablo Country Club. The new stop sign will be installed in the near future. Please watch for it and be ready to stop and give way when appropriate.

Independent Financial Audit for FY 2019

Following the end of each fiscal year, the District performs an independent audit of its finances to assure Diablo residents and the public that the District's annual financial statements present a true and fair view of the District's affairs. The firm

of Eide Bailly, CPA and Business Advisors out of Palo Alto was retained to perform the audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019.

The auditors did not identify any misstatements, insufficient supporting evidence or internal control deficiencies during their audit and provided the District with a clean report, also known as an unquali-

fied audit opinion. Simply stated, the DCSD's financial house is in good order and District operations are following state mandates. The full audit report is available on our website (diablocsd.org/meetings—financials.html).

Spring: Here Comes the Plant Growth!

It's time for Diablo residents to make sure that their vegetation is in check. All residents should go out in the sunshine to ensure that none of their plantings are encroaching on the paved roadway. The Board recommends a width of 3 feet off the road and 13.5 feet above the road. The deadline is May 31. After that date the District reserves the right to hire a third party to cut back vegetation encroaching on the roadway and bill the property owner for the cost of the work.

Thank you for your cooperation in keeping Diablo a safe place for our residents and children.
