El Nido has always been a special place to live, but according to Diablo's former long-time historian Jim Stone, it has no historical significance whatsoever! That didn't stop the El Nido residents from making a name for the street over the years as a place for long standing traditions of Block Parties, Bunco Nights, Holiday Celebrations and more. Of special note are the views and lush green surroundings of the park-like yards bordered by Diablo Country Club golf course on many of the properties.

In the early days after El Nido was developed in the early 1970's, neighbors pulled together to get to know one another in this often-overlooked outlying road away from the center of the community. Progressive dinners, neighborhood cocktail parties, and children playing in the street were common. As demographics and homeowners changed over the years, the spirit of the neighborhood remained the same, with social connection being a top priority. During the recent Covid shutdown, younger families often did the shopping for the older neighbors who were more vulnerable. As things began to ease, socially distanced gatherings were held in back yards again as a way of reconnecting.

El Nido's claim to fame in Diablo is the annual Block Party held on the Sunday before Halloween every year. This beloved tradition was started by the Gunnersons and McIntires and has continued with organization and hosting by the Breitweisers, Nejedlys and others every year. El Nido neighbors have enjoyed many baby showers, moving-away gatherings and Holiday celebrations highlighted with wonderful food, beverages and competitive games. This neighborhood has made keeping in touch a strong tradition enjoyed by young and old. A great by-product of this close connection and communication has been the resulting volunteerism by El Nido neighbors as leaders of the community in the DPOA, Annual Food Drive, DCSD, and CERT disaster preparedness for many years.



LIBRARY HAPPENINGS

TOP THINGS YOU CAN DO NOW TO PREPARE FOR WILDFIRE

The Maui fires are a very sad but important reminder to review how prepared your family is for potential wildfire in Diablo. Here are 4 things you can do now:

- 1. Sign up for emergency alerts from local agencies via Nixle <u>www.nixle.com</u> AND the Community Warning System notification <u>www.cwsalerts.com</u> used by County Office of Emergency Services.
- 2. Make a personal evacuation plan that includes multiple routes in case your normal route is blocked. Research shows that people make strange decisions under duress. It's much easier to follow a preconsidered plan.
- 3. **"Sweat the small stuff" around the outside of your home.** Move as much as you can away from the house. Patio furniture is highly flammable (unlike interior furniture). Even small piles of leaves and vegetation adjacent to your house can help spread fire into overhanging eves.
- Prepare to be on your own for at least 72 hours. First responders will not be able to reach everyone immediately. Utilize the resources at BE READY SRV <u>www.firedepartment.org/community/be-ready-srv</u>

Prepare for Another Wet Winter: Tree, Leaf, and Organic Debris Removal

With our annual rains approaching, and predictions suggesting a winter as wet as the last one, it's time to get ready. Take a moment to inspect your property for weakened mature trees or tree limbs that might pose a falling risk. Additionally, check your drainage catch basins for leaves and debris that may have accumulated since last winter. If left unattended, these can be swept into your drainage pipes by the rains, causing obstructions and potential flooding. For those with creeks on their property, ensure they are clear of debris to maintain unobstructed flow during heavy rains and prevent backups and flooding. If you experienced flooding last winter, consider stocking up on sandbags before the storms arrive.

Diablo residents, it's your responsibility to ensure that your trees, shrubs, fencing, and more don't encroach upon roads, block creeks, or create safety hazards. Let's all do our part to keep Diablo safe!

FEMA Update

Governor Newsom and FEMA declared Contra Costa County a disaster area after the December 2022 and January 2023 storms. This declaration allows public agencies within the County to seek emergency funding through the State and FEMA.

The DCSD faced over \$311,000 in winter storm damage costs for road and bridge repairs, creek trash rack monitoring, and debris removal. After applying for FEMA disaster relief funds in the spring, the DCSD was awarded \$311,000 this fall. Currently, the DCSD is working with the State to receive disbursement of the award.

Security Update

Our Deputy Sheriff, Chris Stoffels, reported an incident of vandalism to a portion of the wall on Mt Diablo Scenic located at the cut-through. A report has been filed with the Sheriff's Department, and the investigation is ongoing.

As a friendly reminder, if you're planning to be out of town, give your neighbors a heads up so they can be vigilant for any unusual activity. Our Deputy conducts house checks for residents during their absence, and if you're interested, you can sign up for this service (check out the Security section of the <u>DCSD website</u> for more details).

The most pressing safety concern in Diablo continues to be vehicle speed and the tendency of vehicles to disregard stop signs. With a significant number of residents, both young and old, working and schooling from home, it's absolutely crucial that we all adhere to a safe driving speed of 20 mph and actually come to a complete STOP at stop signs.

License Plate Reader Camera Proposal

In recent years, neighboring communities like Danville, Blackhawk, and Alamo have seen an increase in crime. While Diablo hasn't experienced the same, due to its proximity, it's reasonable to consider potential impacts. In response, these communities invested in the license plate reading camera system from Flock Safety Inc. These cameras, located at intersections, capture images of license plates, make, model, and color of passing cars. There are no pictures of the car occupants. The Diablo Deputy, along with law enforcement, views these images only when linked to a crime. The DCSD is considering adding license plate reading cameras at Diablo's entrances, and Flock Safety will present its system at the October 10, 2023 meeting.

Introducing the District's New General Counsel

At the September 12, 2023 meeting, Martin de los Angeles of Best, Best & Krieger LLP was named General Counsel for the District. Martin, with extensive experience in Municipal Law, will provide legal counsel on various matters, ensuring compliance and addressing legal issues associated with Municipal Law practice.

DCSD/DMAC New Meeting Time

The DCSD and DMAC have moved their regular meeting start time to 6:00 pm on the second Tuesday of the month. Meetings take place at the Diablo Country Club Red Horse Tavern Too (portable in the upper parking lot), and agenda packets and minutes are available on the <u>DCSD's website</u>.

Independent Financial Audit for FY 2023

Following the end of each fiscal year, the District conducts an independent audit of its finances. The firm of Richardson & Company LLP, from Sacramento, conducted the audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023. The auditors provided a clean report, confirming that the DCSD's financial affairs are in good order, with operations following state mandates. DIABLO COUNTRY CLUB RENEWS LEASE FOR OUR COMMUNITY POST OFFICE

The Diablo Post Office is so much more than just a place to pick up mail. It serves as the heart of our community, the place where we catch up on neighborhood news, enjoy holiday treats and decor, and chat with the friendliest postal team.

Our community founder, Robert Noble Burgess, petitioned the U.S. Postmaster General for a Post Office back in 1916 to ensure Diablo would remain a distinct entity. The first Diablo Post Office opened in 1917 inside the Cook mansion at 1925 Alameda Diablo. Over the years, it moved locations around our community. In 1974, Diablo Country Club graciously agreed to lease space in its current building.

The Club recently renewed the lease for the Post Office for another 5 years (August 2024 to August 31, 2029). Diablo Country Club's continued sponsorship of the location serves much more than just convenient mail delivery needs. This building lease ensures the independent designation of the Diablo community. Without this generous support, our community's name and dedicated 94528 zip code would cease to exist! Many thanks to the Diablo Country Club for providing the building for our Post Office for almost 50 years.
