## PM Modi inaugurates 184 new flats for MPs

**NEW DELHI :** Prime Minister Narendra Modi inaugurated 184 newly built Type-VII multi-storey flats for Members of Parliament (MPs) at Baba Kharak Singh Marg in Delhi on Monday. The project aims to address the acute shortage of adequate housing for MPs and provide modern, eco-friendly residences in a vertical housing format. As part of the inauguration, the Prime Minister planted a Sindoor sapling at the premises, interacted with sramajeevis (workers) involved in the construction, and addressed the gathering. The new Type-VII residential complex has been



designed as a self-sufficient facility, equipped with modern amenities to meet both residential and official requirements of MPs. The emphasis on vertical housing was driven by limited land availability in the capital. The aim was to optimise land use while keeping long-term maintenance costs low. Each flat offers around 5,000 square feet of carpet area, with dedicated sections

for offices, staff accommodation, and residential purposes, a government release said. Environmentally sustainable features include renewable energy systems, energy-efficient fittings, and an effective waste management system. The design aims to conserve resources while reducing operational costs. The multi-storey building is built using monolithic concrete with aluminium shuttling. All buildings have been constructed to be earthquake-resistant in accordance with modern structural norms. A robust security system has also been implemented for the safety of residents.

In war damages do take place virtually

The initial objective was to destroy terrorist infrastructure and camps; and subsequently, punish Pakistan for its proxy war. Rajnath Singh claimed, without evidence, that 100 terrorists were killed; there was no damage on the Indian side; and hailed Modi 15 times in a 90 minute speech. NSA Ajit Doval had claimed, 90 days after cease-fire, that "not a windowpane was damaged." CDS Gen Anil Chauhan, on July 17, dutifully confirmed this. The government did not mention any human losses in Kashmir even as Opposition members queried in Parliament why people along the LoC were not evacuated said Rajnath Singh, Defence Minister. The question on the Moss of aircraft was dodged by the government even though the CDS, DGMO and DGAO have publicly admitted to losses. On May 30, when asked about by a Bloomberg journalist, Gen Chauhan said that "tactical mistakes" were made, but that costs don't matter, out-comes do, referring to the huge damage to Pakistan's military infrastructure (on May 9-10.) Numerous accounts have since appeared about the downing of Indian aircraft. On June 16, French Air Chief, Gen Jerome Bellanger said that he had seen evidence pointing to three Indian aircraft losses-a Rafale, Sukhoi MK30 and Mirage 2000. He added it was the first known loss of a Rafale sold to eight countries.

Full operational freedom is given to the military is a myth. If that had been the case, the IAF would have first targeted Pakistan's air defence and then terrorists, avoiding loss of aircraft. India's Naval Attache, Capt Shivakumar, on June 10 said at a seminar in Jakarta that the IAF had lost some aircraft due to "political constraints that prevented targeting Pakistan military infrastructure/air defence." Pakistan was informed in advance of the strikes. The statement was altered to say: "at start" of the strikes on May 6-7 night. Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri, briefing the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs on May 19, corrected the record: "Indian DGMO informed his Pakistani counterpart at end of Phase I of the operation, saying this is the end, no further escalation." About the ceasefire. Among other conversations between the US and Indian officials on May 10, according to sources in the US Embassy in Delhi, the US Defence Attache, Brig Gen Patrick Teague, informed the Indian DGMO around noon that the Pakistan DGMO was trying to call him. They spoke at 3 pm, but Trump had preempted India in announcing the ceasefire. US intervention during India-Pakistan crises after both countries became nuclear armed is the old nor-mal. In 1962, the US brokered Foreign Minister Swaran Singh-ZA

Bhutto talks on Kashmir. It also intervened during the Brass Tacks crisis (1986-87); Compound crisis (1990); Kargil (1999) Operation Parakram (2001-02) and Balakot (2019). It is rather disingenuous to quibble over the US role in orchestrating the Op Sindoor ceasefire. About the intelligence and operational lapses. Heed the warning signals: Pakistan Gen Asim Munir, at the Kashmir Solidarity Day (February 5) event in Muzaffarabad, said: "Pakistan has fought three wars over Kashmir. It can fight 10 more." On April 17, five days before Pahalgam, he told the Pakistani diaspora about the two-nation theory and Kashmir being the jugular vein. On March 11, Pakistan DG ISPR, Lt Gen Ahmed Sharif Chaudhary, said: "The rules of the game have changed" -in the wake of the attack by the Balochistan Liberation Army on the Jaffar Express, other attacks attributed to India and Doval's statement on the longevity of Balochistan as an entity. India's new normal was rechristened in Parliament by Jaishankar as "Modi normal". Its revised ingredients include: terrorists will no longer be treated as proxies; cross-border terrorism will get appropriate response (not treated as act of war); terror and good neighbourliness can't coexist. No threshold has been defined for terror attacks nor deterrence parameters outlined.

Located in front of the Emergency porch, the facility, said the Director, will further strengthen the institute's commitment to timely, transparent, and compassionate patient care. Speaking at the inauguration, Prof Vivek Lal, Director said, "This AMRIT Pharmacy is a reflection of the PGIMER's deep-rooted commitment to patient welfare. By merging technology with compassionate service, we are removing barriers between patients and timely access to essential medicines. The convenience of bedside delivery and the elimination of long queues will directly translate into a more comfortable and dignified patient experience." He said the online display of rates and discounts on PGIMER website will ensure transparency for the public. This centre has been created exclusively for dispensing medicines under the



government schemes being implemented in the PGIMER and is not a retail outlet. The AMRIT Pharmacy will operate through an online indent system. Prescriptions will therefore be raised digitally by the treating doctors, enabling the pharmacy to prepare and dispense medicines promptly without requiring patients or their attendants to stand in long queues. To further streamline service, the centre will also provide bedside delivery of medicines for admitted patients, particularly benefiting those in critical care, elderly patients, and those with mobility challenges. The PGIMER currently operates two Jan Aushadhi Kendras on its campus. The institute has earmarked another site for a similar facility at the Advanced Paediatric Centre.

As a result, the Municipal Councils of the district have collectively gather Rs 21.85 crore till August 1, 2025. In a bid to provide another opportunity for residents to clear their

outstanding property tax dues without penalty and interest, the Punjab Government has extended the One-Time Settlement (OTS) scheme till August 15. Breaking down the figures, the DC said that the Zirakpur Municipal Council led the collections by depositing Rs 13.59 crore, followed by Kharar with Rs 3.75 crore, and Derabassi securing the third position with Rs 2.26 crore.

Tree felling, illegally logs being sold, probe ordered by NGT

**PANCHKULA** : In accordance with an application submitted by Hardik Bhanot, unidentified individuals were cutting trees for commercial purposes on land protected under the Punjab Land Preservation Act, 1900 (PLPA), where such activities are strictly prohibited. The National Green Tribunal (NGT) has taken cognisance of alleged illegal tree felling in a garden located in Bhainsa Tibba village, Sector 3, Mansa Devi Complex. During the hearing held on July 29 before the Principal Bench in New Delhi, a three-member bench comprising chairperson Justice Prakash Shrivastava, Dr A Senthil Vel, and Dr Afroz Ahmad heard submissions from the applicant's counsel, Siddharth Mittal and Sumit Kumar Sharma. The applicant supported his allegations with specific khasra number details and submitted video footage (Annexure A-4) as evidence of the illegal felling, which he reportedly witnessed on



December 19, 2024. He also claimed to have seen logs being transported for commercial gain. The tribunal has issued notices to the respondents and directed the Principal Chief Conservator of Forests (PCCF), Panchkula, to conduct an immediate site inspection. The PCCF has also been asked to prevent any further illegal activity and take action against the responsible individuals if the claims are substantiated. A separate action taken report must be filed by the PCCF at least one week before the next hearing scheduled on October 30. The NGT has also instructed the applicant to serve notice to all respondents and file an affidavit of service accordingly.

3rd production hub HAL Nashik cleared for manufacture of Tejas fighter

**CHANDIGARH** : Nashik, which has a history of manufacturing and sustaining the IAF's fighter fleet, has now evolved into a key hub for indigenous aircraft production. The Directorate General of Aeronautical Quality Assurance (DGAQA), has accorded flight clearance to the manufacture of the indigenous manufactured Light Combat Aircraft (LCA), Tejas Mark-1A, from the Nashik Division of Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL). This is the third production line for this aircraft. The development marks a significant milestone in decentralising aircraft production and expanding India's strategic aerospace capabilities. The Flight Clearance Document was handed over to Executive Director, HAL Nashik Division, by the Additional DGAQA on Monday. Hosting the third LCA production line outside Bengaluru, this set-up enhances operational flexibility and aligns with India's broader defence preparedness and strategic autonomy goals.

The office of the Additional DGAQA at Nashik played a pivotal role in the successful absorption of Transfer of Technology for LCA manufacturing. The office led the redesign and modification of tools and fixtures, transformed legacy work centres, and facilitated a technical shift in aerospace philosophies. Upholding stringent quality assurance standards, the team ensured the production of over 5,000 high-precision components, in-house loom manufacturing, line replacement unit testing and exhaustive pre-installation and assembly checks. Round-the-clock support was extended to mission-critical operations, including Right-First-Time ground runs, snag rectification and final system readiness, culminating in the successful flight clearance. Tejas, a light single-engine multi-role aircraft, has been

developed by the Defence Research and Development Organisation and Hindustan Aeronautics Limited. It is meant to replace the MiG-21 and boost the IAF's depleting squadron strength, which at present is down to 31 squadrons against the authorised 42. Two most squadrons of the last remaining MiG-21s are being phased out next month. The IAF currently operates two squadrons of the Tejas — No. 18 Squadron, the "Flying Bullets" at Naliya airbase; and No. 45 Squadron, the "Flying Daggers", at Sullur airbase — that are primarily mandated for air defence roles. While about 40 Mark-1 aircraft including trainer versions, have been delivered to the IAF, another 73 Mark-1A are on order. According to reports, the Central Government has approved the procurement of another 97 Tejas aircraft. Production of the aircraft, however, has been lagging due to constraints in supply of the engines. The Tejas is powered by the American GE F-404 engine. The delays in production have caused concern in defence circles.

DC rate notification for various employees on Aug 15

**CHANDIGARH** : Former MP Kiron Kher had written to the UT Chief Secretary requesting that the revised rates be implemented retrospectively from April 1, 2025. The UT Administration will announce the revised DC rates for employees from August 15. This move will benefit around 20,000 contractual and outsourced employees working in various departments of the Administration. According to officials, the Deputy Commissioner office had sought details and suggestions from all departments. A notification on the new rates will be issued on August 15 with an expected

increase of 6-10%, said the officials. As per the existing practice, the DC rates are revised annually from April 1. The employees' Joint Action Committee has demanded a 15% hike in the rates and submitted a memorandum to the Administration in this regard. The new rates will apply not only to government departments but also private institutions. Beneficiaries will include daily-wagers and outsourced workers such as "beldars", gym attendants, parking staff, "sewadars", cattle catchers, watchmen, cleaners, cooks, helpers, gatekeepers, gardeners, sanitation workers and waiters. After the hike in DC rates

last year, "beldars" wages rose from Rs 18,461 to Rs 20,000 per month. Certain categories, including those in the medical field and transport, nursing attendants, desk helpers, sports staff, medical lab technicians and junior engineers, got no benefit in the revision last year, but are expecting a hike this time.

The revised DC rates will be applicable retrospectively from April 1, 2025, till March 31, 2026. Employees will also receive arrears. An employee leader stated that wages for outsourced workers remained low compared to the rising cost of living, and the DC rates had not kept pace with inflation.

State-of-the-art trauma centre set to open in August at GMCH-32

**CHANDIGARH** : The state-of-the-art facility, with a capacity of 259 beds, is expected to bolster the city's burdened emergency services. The Government Medical College and Hospital (GMCH), Sector 32, has finalised scheduled for opening its newly built trauma centre this August. According to GMCH Medical Superintendent Dr GP Thami, while construction has been completed, the installation of medical equipment is still underway. He said a proposal to hold the trauma centre's inauguration on the same day as the institute's 11th convocation has been submitted to the UT Administration. The name of the chief guest for the event is still under discussion. Originally sanctioned in 2019 with an expected completion timeline of a year and a half, the trauma centre project faced significant delays during the Covid-19 pandemic. The project again gained urgency as the existing emergency block began operating beyond capacity. Authorities are optimistic that the new facility will ease

overcrowding and allow the reallocation of the old emergency space for other departments. With this, the city will also house two dedicated trauma centres — the other being at PGIMER — enhancing the region's preparedness to handle critical emergencies. The trauma centre is part of GMCH's larger effort to bolster its emergency healthcare infrastructure. Currently, the hospital operates around 150 emergency and trauma beds combined, which often proves inadequate during peak hours. The existing emergency wing has long been unable to accommodate the growing patient load, leading to situations where patients were

managed on stretchers in crowded corridors. The new wing is expected to significantly improve patient care and response times. The late Dr BS Chavan, the former director of GMCH, had secured funding of Rs 52 crore for the expansion, aiming to separate trauma care from general emergency services. GMCH's 11th convocation, previously postponed due to regional tensions at the Indo-Pak border, has been rescheduled for August 2. Initially it was supposed to happen on May 2 and Union Health Minister JP Nadra was expected to preside, but Minister of State Anupriya Patel had later been finalised as the guest of honour. Degrees in medicine, nursing, paramedical sciences and allied disciplines will be awarded during the ceremony. In addition to the trauma centre launch, the hospital administration is also exploring options to utilise the vacated space in the main building for expanding the gynaecology department, which is facing persistent bed shortages.

Compounding regime of synthetic milk

from urban area to rural populace to acclimatise to their propensities. Our nation has been notoriously becoming famous, leaving concentration away from genuine natural milk. 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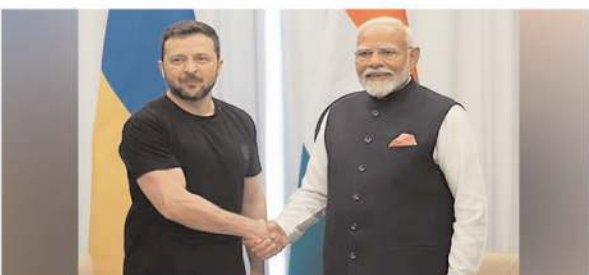
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PM Modi urges Zelenskyy for peaceful resolution of Russia-Ukraine conflict

**NEW DELHI :** India reinforces all efforts aimed at earliest restoration of peace, Prime Minister Modi apprised President Zelenskyy. Mr Narendra Modi on Monday spoke to Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy and reaffirmed India's consistent position for a peaceful settlement to the ongoing Russia-Ukraine conflict. The phone conversation between the two has happened just four days ahead of the Alaska summit between US President Donald Trump had Russian President Vladimir Putin. Modi and Zelenskyy reviewed the progress in



the India-Ukraine bilateral partnership and discussed ways to further enhance cooperation in areas of mutual interest, a statement from the Prime Minister's Office in India said. President Zelenskyy shared his views on the recent developments related to Ukraine, the Indian statement said. Modi reaffirmed India's steadfast and consistent position for peaceful

settlement of the conflict and support for efforts aimed at earliest restoration of peace. The PM reiterated India's commitment to extend all possible support in this regard. The conversation happened three days after Putin called Modi, among other global leaders. Putin had called to convey the outcome of the talks he had with Trump's envoy, Steven Witkoff, in Moscow.

Of 655 pharmaceutical units, mere 122 register for upgrade in Himachal

**SOLAN :** Despite manufacturing every third drug in the domestic market, the state's pharmaceutical industry is battling a major crisis. Only 18 per cent units have registered for the revised Schedule M stipulation of the Good Manufacturing Practices (GMP) norms by May 11. The norm made mandatory by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare in December 2023 had been conditionally extended for the small and medium manufacturers having turnover of Rs 250 crores or less, up to December end. Though the industry had sought extension to improve their infrastructure, training of personnel and arranging financial resources, they were required to submit their plan for upgrading their unit before the central licence approving authority by May 11 to convey their seriousness. Once upgraded, it will bring



them on a par with the global World Health Organisation's manufacturing standards. The large manufacturers, having turnover of more than 250 crores have, however, implemented the norm by June 2024. Majority of the firms fall under the Micro Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) category. One can gauge the dismal scenario from the fact that out of 655 pharmaceutical firms, barely 122 have registered for upgrade, thus putting a question mark on the remaining units. The scenario was equally dismal nationally where among 6,000 micro small and medium sector pharmaceutical firms only 1,246 have applied for the extension till mid-June.

The revised norms have been enforced to ensure the quality and safety of pharmaceutical products being manufactured in India while strengthening their domestic position. Several cases of global drug recalls and domestic cough syrups causing infant mortality abroad have adversely hit the image of the nation's pharma industry, thus prompting the authorities to introduce stringent norm. Contrary to these mandates, the MSMEs rue that they were unable to arrange the requisite funds amounting to crores to implement the new norms. A manufacturer will have to implement a slew of modifications related to manufacturing premises, plant and equipment, product quality review, pharmaceutical quality system, quality risk management and storage systems.

Farmers give massive rally call at Dana Mandi Samrala on Aug 24

**PHAGWARA :** A fleet of key leaders, including district president Surinder Singh Bains and district secretary Tarsem Singh Bains, addressed the media. They shared that a rally was being organised under the banner of the Samyukt Kisan Morcha to press for long-standing demands of the farming community. The district committee of the Kirti Kisan Union, Nawanshahr, has given a call to farmers across the region to participate in large numbers in a massive rally scheduled to take place at Dana Mandi, Samrala, on August 24. The leaders strongly opposed the government's land pooling policy, stating that it would not be accepted in any form. They emphasized that Punjab's fertile land produces a wide range of



pulses, vegetables, and other essential crops, contributing significantly not only to the country's food security, but also to its economy. They alleged that the state government, backed by the Centre, is moving towards displacing rural communities through this policy. They further added that the struggle to revoke the land pooling policy and to achieve other key farmer demands will continue. Preparations for the rally have already begun across the Nawanshahr blocks, and a large number of farmers are expected to travel to Samrala via buses, cars, and other means of transport.

Gurugram holistically aims zero emission by 2050

**GURUGRAM :** As Gurugram features among the top polluted cities in the country, the Gurugram Metropolitan Development Authority (GMDA) has drawn a holistic plan to reduce emissions in the city. The authority has drafted a 'net zero 2050' document, contouring the goals for urban policy-making to make Gurugram a zero emission city. Net-zero refers to the point at which a specific area or city is able to remove from the atmosphere all green house gases (GHGs) it is emitting. Effectively, it ensures that no additional carbon or other GHGs are being



added into the atmosphere. The document elaborates on the way forward to implement sustainable development strategies like construction of green buildings, setting up of centralised cooling plants in housing societies, adoption of cleaner technologies and increasing the share of electric vehicles over the next 25 years. The plan deals in four major arenas — energy, waste, transport and greenery.

New Income Tax Bill for taxpayers : Sitharaman

**NEW DELHI :** The Income Tax Bill, which streamlines TDS, exemptions and other compliance-heavy provisions and also allows individuals to claim refunds without penalty on delayed filings, was passed as the opposition parties continued to disrupt proceedings over allegations of irregularities in the special intensive revision (SIR) of electoral rolls in Bihar. The Income Tax Bill (No.2) 2025 — a major legislative move to replace the 63-year-old law governing income taxation for individuals and corporations — was passed in the Lok Sabha on Monday in just three minutes, without any debate. Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, who had on August 8 withdrawn the Income Tax Bill, 2025 — which she had introduced in February — on Monday introduced an updated version incorporating recommendations made by a Parliamentary panel that



scrutinised the legislation. Amid slogan shouting by the opposition, the bill was put to vote and passed by voice vote. The Bill will now go to the Rajya Sabha for approval and thereafter to the President for assent. It will become law once the Presidential assent is provided. The new bill reduces the size and complexity of the current Income Tax Act, drastically cutting the number of effective sections and chapters and nearly halving the word count. "Almost all of the recommendations of the Select Committee have been

accepted by the government. In addition, suggestions have been received from stakeholders about changes that would convey the proposed legal meaning more accurately," said the statement of Objects and Reasons of the Income Tax (No.2) Bill. It does away with the confusing concepts of assessment year and previous year, replacing them with easier to understand 'tax year'. According to the revised Bill, individuals will be allowed to claim TDS refund even if their return of income is filed beyond the statutory timeline provided for filing of the original income-tax return. Thus, the Finance Ministry has incorporated the provision of the existing Income Tax Act, 1961. It provides for 'nil' TCS on Liberalised Remittance Scheme (LRS) remittances for education purposes financed by any financial institution.

Khojkipur found to be carrying severe pollutants : HPPCB

**PANIPAT :** The drain covers approximately 40-km stretch in Panipat district and 10 km in Karnal. In Panipat, drain-1 and drain-2, considered to be the major cause behind the Yamuna pollution, flow through the city and rural areas.



To reduce the pollution load in Yamuna, the Irrigation Department would treat the water flow at three places -- Kachroli, Kurar and Khojkipur - before it meets the river. The department has constructed a storage reservoir-cum-match box treatment structure at drain number 2 near Kurar village to treat the water. The process to construct two more structures is underway. The 8-km-long drain-1 flows from Kabri road to Chautala road and after that it meets drain-2, which meets the Yamuna at Khojkipur village. Scores of industrial units, bleaching and dyeing units along drain-2 discharge untreated effluent directly into it. As per the sources, the samples collected by the HSPCB from Khojkipur failed multiple laboratory tests and also revealed severe pollution levels. The biological oxygen demand (BOD), chemical oxygen demand (COD), the total dissolved solids (TDS), oil and grease were found more than permissible limits.

Now, to reduce the pollution load in Yamuna, the Irrigation Department has decided to treat the water of drain-2 in stretches before it meets with Yamuna. Suresh Saini, XEN, Irrigation Department said approximately 80 cusec water, which is badly polluted, flows on an average during the non-rainy season. During the rainy season, the heavy water flows from it due to which the pollution is diluted and the drain gets cleaned, he further said. Now, it has been decided to treat the drain water by making three MBT structures at Kachroli, Kurar and Khojkipur. The structure at Kurar has been constructed at Rs 10 crore, he said. As per the project, the water would be stored in the drain for around 15 days at Kachroli, Kurar and Khojkipur. A total 98 hectare metre water would be stored in the 12 km area at

Kachroli for around 5-6 days. Around 112 hectare metre water would be stored in around 13.5-km area at Kurar and after that around 125 hectare water would be stored at Khojkipur MBT structure in 14.50-km stretch, he said. During the storage at three steps, water would be treated and its BOD and COD level would be reduced with aerator and other equipment, he added. According to the project, approximately 335 hectare metre water would be stored at three places, which would not only increase the ground water level, but also make micro-irrigation in 10,000 acres possible, he said. Recently, Rajesh Khullar, Chief Principal Secretary to Chief Minister visited Kurar village to inquire about the MBT structure and also directed for sampling of the water after storage and after releasing of the water. DC Virender Kumar Dahiya said the tender process for the Kachroli project has begun while the department has prepared estimates for the Khojkipur project. These projects would help farmers in irrigation and fisheries, the groundwater would be recharged and the clean water would be discharged into Yamuna, which would also help in reducing the pollution load, the Deputy Commissioner maintained.

## All Stray Dogs In Delhi-NCR Must be Shifted To Shelters: Supreme Court

New Delhi : Away from residential localities all stray dogs in Delhi NCR will have to be shifted from localities and any organisation that blocks this exercise will face the strictest action,said the Supreme Court on Monday. The top court's significant order comes amid a rise in cases of dog bites in Delhi, leading to rabies deaths.Media has been campaigning about the stray dog menace on the streets that has left children and elderly persons injured, and in some cases, dead. Following the Supreme Court's big order, the Delhi government said it will ensure its timely implementation. The bench of Justice JB Pardiwala and Justice R Mahadevan is hearing the matter after taking note of a news report on the rising incidents of stray dog



attacks. The court said it will hear arguments only from the Centre, and no petitions from dog lovers or any other party will be heard on this subject.

"We are not doing this for us, it is for the public interest. So, no sentiments of any nature should be involved. Action should be taken at the earliest," Justice Pardiwala said. "Pick up dogs from all localities and shift them to shelters. For the time being, forget the rules," he told amicus curiae Gaurav Agarwala, who suggested the steps that can be taken to address the stray dog menace.

When Justice Pardiwala

sought Solicitor General Tushar Mehta's opinion on the matter, he was told that a site in Delhi had been identified for relocating stray dogs, but the plan was stalled after animal rights activists obtained a stay order.

"All these animal activists, will they be able to bring back those who have fallen prey to rabies? We need to make streets absolutely free of stray dogs," the bench said, adding that it won't allow any adoption of stray dogs either.

Among the solutions suggested to the court was the adoption of stray dogs, but Solicitor General Tushar Mehta raised concerns that people may take the dog in for a few days and then let them out again. The bench then clarified that no one will be allowed to adopt a stray dog to stop authorities from moving it to the shelter.

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## Morni,Tikkar Tal run short of dry place, boating halted

## J-K witnesses successive anti terror operations in Kulgam

Srinagar : Four security personnel were injured in overnight firing as the gunfight in Jammu and Kashmir's Kulgam district entered the ninth day on Saturday -- one of the longest anti-terror operations in the valley, said officials .

Eleven security personnel have been injured in the operation since the beginning of the operation, they said. The operation is still ongoing, and further details are awaited, they added.

Two terrorists have been killed in the encounter, which began on August 1 after security forces launched a cordon and search operation in a forest area at Akhal in the south Kashmir district, following specific intelligence inputs about the presence of terrorists



there.

After an initial exchange of fire between the two sides last Friday, the operation was halted for the night, but the cordon was strengthened, and a d d i t i o n a l reinforcements were rushed to the area, officials said.

When the firing resumed the next day, two terrorists were killed. The identity and the group affiliation of the slain terrorists have not been ascertained so far. Security forces have maintained a tight cordon in the area and continued

to battle the terrorists hiding in dense forests. Senior police and Army officers, including the Jammu and Kashmir Police chief Nalin Prabhat, and the Army's Northern Commander Lt Gen Pratik Sharma, are closely monitoring the operation round-the-clock, officials said.

Security forces have pressed drones and helicopters into service to track the terrorists down in the forest area. Para commandos were also assisting the security forces in neutralising the hiding ultras.

## India welcomes Donald Trump-Vladimir Putin summit in Alaska

**NEW DELHI :** India on Saturday welcomed the summit between the United States and Russia to be held in Alaska on August 15. India, therefore, endorses the upcoming summit meeting and stands ready to support these efforts," said Randhir Jaiswal MEA official spokesperson . On Friday (August 8, 2025), Mr. Modi had held a telephonic conversation with Mr. Putin. Following the



conversation, Mr. Modi had announced on X that the conversation was "very good and detailed" and thanked Mr. Putin for sharing "the latest development on Ukraine". A day earlier, National Security Adviser Ajit Doval had met Mr. Putin and other senior Russian officials, including Russian Security Council Secretary Sergei Shoigu where the two sides discussed India-Russia defence ties. In his announcement on the summit, Mr. Trump posted on TruthSocial, "The highly anticipated meeting between myself, as President of the United States of America, and President Vladimir Putin of Russia will take place next Friday, August 15, 2025, in the Great State of Alaska. Further details would follow.

## Tender for 200 tonne dry waste plant

CHANDIGARH : For 200 tonne dry waste plant , the civic body has finalised its plan to conduct the tender formalities.The engineering department of the MC has traced two companies eligible after completing the technical scrutiny, following which the process of financial bidding has started to select the new bidder . A total of five companies showed interest in the bid to run the dry waste plant, out of which three could not



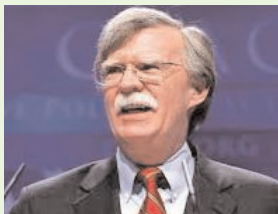
