

A Word from Vice President David Collins

My recent election as V.P. of the USS Edisto Association came as a surprise. At the meeting in Baton Rouge I came back from a bathroom break to find I was being nominated and about thirty seconds later, elected. You asked for some biographical info so here goes.

I grew up in northern New Jersey and majored in economics at Bowdoin College in Maine. After four months at OCS in Rhode Island and six months at Supply Corps School in Georgia, I joined the Edisto at anchor in Hamilton Inlet in Labrador in June 1964. BuPers in its wisdom had first sent me by air to totally icebound Thule, Greenland, but that's another story.

Over the next 18 months I went from being the junior supply officer to being the only supply officer to being the senior supply officer. In that time I had two trips north plus the ARLIS rescue and one trip south to Anvers Island, where we built Palmer Station. I was one of the last Navy personnel still on board the Edisto after the Coast Guard took over command in the fall, 1965. With less than a year to go in my enlistment, BuPers sent me to the Naval Supply Depot in Newport, R.I. to finish out my tour.

During my final weeks in Newport, I married Holly McCutchin from Calgary, Alberta whom I had met on a fortuitous horseback trip in the Canadian Rockies when we were both 17. We went off to a honeymoon at Harvard Business School where Holly supported us for two years while I got an MBA. I then began a long career as an investment banker in downtown Boston, first with Paine Webber and then with a small firm that several of us started. Our business was raising money for companies by selling their stock or bonds and also arranging mergers and acquisitions.


We have lived for 38 years in the same house in Dover, Mass, a small town 18 miles southwest of Boston where we raised two daughters, both now married and living in Baltimore and Chicago.

I'm 68 and retired. I'll mention two tourist trips Holly and I have taken, one from Ushuaia, Argentina to the Antarctic Peninsula and the other from Christchurch, NZ to the Ross Sea and McMurdo Station, both on Russian ships and both exciting and memorable.


REUNION REPORT Baton Rouge, LA



Dear Mr. Smith:

I was a Radioman First Class on the USS EDISTO for Operation Deepfreeze One which sailed from Boston, Mass. in October 1955 towing a gasoline barge to be permanently stationed in McMurdo Sound. I transmitted numerous daily reports of the continuing operations in and around the Ross Sea. I specifically recall transmitting newspaper articles as well as television reports for the New York Times and WNBC Studios. On board at the time of my mission was Bernard Kalb, a reporter for the New York Times and William Hartigan, a television cameraman/reporter for WNBC.

I have attached for your review and possible addition to the Kee Bird newsletter two digital files you may find of interest. One is a copy of the Christmas Menu served aboard the USS EDISTO in December 1955.


The second is a deed presented to me of an allocated piece of property for each and every member on board during the aforementioned mission. This was as a result of discovering an unchartered body of water and land on the western shore of the Ross Sea, west of Cape Hallett. Our Commanding Officer Roger W. Luther deemed it necessary to name the body of water, EDISTO BAY, and the adjoining land EDISTO ACRES. Each allotted parcel is 100 feet square. It is a remembrance which can never be forgotten.

Thank you for your attention. I hope you can make use of these items. I look forward to seeing them printed in a future issue of the Kee Bird!

A lot of poems were written during that time. One was "It is happy Haskell hour" This was about the TF43 weather man, CDR Haskell. I was a member of TF43 staff but spent my time with CTG43.6 during DF III in the Weddell Sea and CTG 43.1 during DF IV, in the Ross Sea, etc. I was aboard Edisto among other ice breakers during that time. Any way here is the poem that was written during DF IV about the brave men who served in Christchurch. I started out in Christchurch starting DF IV, but flew to NAF McMurdo to relieve the Comm Officer, before the next wintering over party arrived. Then I joined to CTG 43.6. at McMurdo. I really enjoyed this poem, author unknown, as I was in the Antarctic about 6 months during DF IV.



'JUST A PIECE OF CLOTH"

A few years ago, I was in my car listening to a radio call-in talk show and the topic of the conversation was that of whether it was proper for people to burn the American flag in protest or if it was a protected individual freedom. During the talk show, so meone called in and said they didn't understand what all the controversy was about over "just a piece of cloth." The image struck me immediately of the Marines on Iwo Jima with their faces down in the volcanic ash and looking up at Mount Suribachi to see the flag being raised. Surely, they didn't consider it to be just a piece of cloth.

When I arrived home that evening, I put the following thoughts down on paper and I believe that expresses my beliefs and my feelings of who I am and the love that I have for this country. I entitled it:

"JUST A PIECE OF CLOTH"

I was with Colonel Parker and the Minutemen at Lexington and Concord

to hear "The Shot Heard 'Round The World" that began the American Revolution.

I was with General Washington when he crossed the Delaware and suffered with his men in the harsh winter at Valley Forge.

I was with Grant in the Wilderness and at Vicksburg.

I was with both the Blue and Gray when our country was healed at Appomattox.

I was with Teddy Roosevelt and the Rough Riders on San Juan Hill and with Admiral Dewey and the Great White Fleet in Manila Bay. I was with the Dough Boys in World War I, the "War To End All Wars."

and I now lie buried in Flanders Field.

I was with Admiral Isaac Kidd aboard the ARIZONA that fateful Sunday morning in 1941.

I flew *Saber* jets in MIG Alley on North Korea and I was with the Marine Corps at Chosin Reservoir. I was with the Navy at Inchon Harbor and fought on hills called Bloody, Heartbreak, Old Baldy, and Porkchop.

Did they fight and die for just a piece of cloth?

I flew bombing missions over Hanoi and was on Rat Patrol in the Mekong Delta.

I was with the Navy on Yankee Station in the Tonkin Gulf.
I flew night missions over Baghdad and was with the battalions in
Desert Storm.

Did they fight and die for just a piece of cloth?

Freedom is not free. It has a price and it has been paid many times by many people

I am a product of my past. I am what you have made me. I am an American and I am free.
