Beyond Bees and Butterflies: Beetles as Pollinators

Beetles? That's what I said when I first learned that a beetle was a pollinator. Did you know that? I was on a tree walk with my garden club members and a representative of Bartlett Trees. We were standing under a beautiful huge magnolia tree when he shared that magnolias had been around before bees! Before bees? So how were they pollinated? I had no idea they were pollinated by beetles! Beetles still pollinate them today.

When you think of pollinators, the first thing that comes to mind are bees and butterflies. Beetles certainly aren't what I think of first. So, I had to do a little research.

Beetles like large cup-like flowers that are typically open during the day, heavily scented blossoms, and tough petals and leaves. People tend to describe flowers pollinated by beetles as spicy, sweet, musky, or fermented like overripe fruit. Magnolias have large, thick petals with sturdy carpals. This prevents the beetles from doing damage. Because flower-visiting beetles are mostly interested in pollen as a food source, these plants must produce enough pollen to ensure some is left over for pollination to occur. Beetles do not have any specialized structures or mechanisms for picking up pollen; rather, pollen grains stick to their bodies as they move from flower to flower. They are sometimes referred to as "mess and soil pollinators" since they will eat through leaves and petals, leaving small holes, and bits of plants behind. Now you know!

CLUB NEWS:

THE COLONIAL HERITAGE GARDEN CLUB:

There is a spectacular garden in our community! It has been lovingly created and cared for by Michele Garrard and her husband Jay, located at 4264 Old Lock Road.

I had the pleasure of sitting with Michele and heard about her careers and life here in Virginia. Originally a native of the northern neck, King George's County in Virginia, she and her husband Jay, moved to Colonial Heritage in 2009 after purchasing a townhouse in the community. One year later, they moved into the charming cul-de-sac of Old Lock Road and have transformed the property into specular gardens that surround the house.

Michele's 46-year-old son, John-Paul, currently resides in Richmond and Michele's mother is close by in an assisted living community. Both she and her husband are retired after a lifetime of interesting careers. Michele retired in 2001 after a 33-year career with the Department of Navy. Her roles included Director of Fleet and Family Services at Norfolk Naval Station, Yorktown Weapons Station and Newport News Shipyard, overseeing education and training, life skills, and clinical counseling programs. During the first 18 years of her career, she worked in the IT field supporting multiple Navy programs throughout the Mid-Atlantic states. Her combined roles kept computers functioning and sailors and their families at peak performance and ready to be deployed. Her husband is an Army veteran who retired from Naval Station Norfolk as IT Program Director in 2005 and is currently working towards a second retirement at a non-profit.

When asked about notable flowers in her landscape, Michele started off by describing the yellow flowered cut-leaf cone flower. A native plant that is an aggressive spreader but easy to sculpt to the desired size of your space. Celosía "Cock's Comb" can be found in abundance in her garden with colors of scarlet and flaming orange. They are very popular with bees and self-seed easily from season to season. Edgeworthia, (Paper bush) is a delightful winter-bloomer with white lightly-scented flowers that form

on a mounding evergreen shrub. The Obedient plant is a recent native acquisition to her garden with its swaying pink flowers blooming in the late summer till fall.

The Button Bush, a native pollinator has white, round, flowers with satellite-like spikes, looks like it could be straight out of a science fiction movie! Both bees and butterflies can be seen in throngs mobbing the flowers for its popular pollen. Carolina Allspice, blueberries, elderberries, native yarrow, and fig trees are all planted in the magnificent planting beds that surround her house. Planted in raised beds in the backyard are her kitchen herb garden, watermelons, peppers, and tomatoes.

Other Endeavors

If you haven't guessed by now, Michele is a Master Gardener. She volunteers in Colonial Williamsburg's arboretum where she gives tours of the gardens and notable trees to visiting guests. She also donates her time to the Williamsburg Unitarian Universalists, working to establish their certified Level 1 arboretum.

Gardening Advice

And what is her sage gardening advice? Do not be deterred if your plants don't survive. According to Michele, 20% of plants don't make it as they can be devoured by deer or rabbits, and can perish from disease, poor soil, or inclement weather. Hope and perseverance are the gardener's best friends!

She also recommends that all gardeners purchase a Hori Hori gardening knife (hers was acquired from Brent and Becky's Bulbs in Gloucester but they are readily available at a multitude of garden tool suppliers). The Hori Hori is an extremely useful gardening tool that can break up the ground and easily weed. She cautions, "keep your gardening tools sharp and clean". An additional recommendation is to plant herbs like thyme, mint, rosemary, and lavender in between the flowers to deter deer and rabbits (they do not like fragrant plants).



Home and Hearth

Michele loves Williamsburg and feels like this is "home" and is happy that fate brought her home and garden bring her joy as do her two poodles, Ginger a 13-year-old, and her new 4-month-old puppy, Penny.

Michele was awarded the Beautiful Garden of the Season award for Fall 2025 by the Colonial Heritage Garden Club and received a \$50 gift card and a placard announcing her as the winner. Congratulations, Michele! Submitted by Kiki Keating

Thomas Jefferson Garden Club:

Awarded the NGC Flower Show Achievement Award

This Spring, Thomas Jefferson Garden Club, a member of Piedmont District, VFGC, Inc., received the NCG Flower Show Achievement Award and Rosette for the Horticulture Specialty Flower Show, “Springtime Splendor”, which it hosted on April 25, 2024, at the Trinity Lutheran Church. Additionally, Thomas Jefferson received the Standard Flower Show Award from the South Atlantic Region (SAR).

All 37 members of Thomas Jefferson Garden Club participated in the event, resulting in 106 entries in Horticulture and 2 entries in Education. Of the 38 classes, thirteen received awards for scores of 90+. Notably, the show featured three entries in Displays and one Collection with a creative submission winning the Collectors Showcase Award and the Award of Horticultural Excellence.

Prior to the event, workshops were conducted to provide guidance on creating collections, displays, and standard horticultural entries. Thomas Jefferson had many new members who had not previously participated in a flower show.

The event was attended by more than fifty people, including members from ten different garden clubs, church members, and neighbors. Tours were also provided for the Trinity Lutheran Church preschool classes. Submitted by Susan Delsordo



THE GREEN SPRINGS GARDEN CLUB PRESENTS:

HOLIDAY TRADITION in COLONIAL WILLIAMSBURG, VA

The Annual Christmas Homes Tour is a celebrated introduction to this historic town brought to life by the Green Spring Garden Club, The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation's Landscape and Floral Design Department and select floral design artisans. The first Tour was held in 1961 in conjunction with Colonial Williamsburg's Grand Illumination, the spectacular fireworks celebration of the holidays that recalls the Colonies' tradition of commemorating significant events with light - candlelight, lanterns and fireworks! The Tour is still held on the first weekend in December in conjunction with Grand Illumination. Through decorating the town, our guests are given the chance to experience holidays in the colonial spirit and true Williamsburg hospitality.

The 2025 Annual Christmas Home Tour, to be held on Saturday, December 6, 2025, is the 64th Tour. It features an extraordinary selection of four seldom-viewed homes within the Colonial Williamsburg Historic Area, three of which are original homes of the Historic Area and the fourth is reconstructed on its original foundation after a devastating fire. Each of these historic homes is decorated with exquisite fresh and dried floral designs done in the Colonial Williamsburg style. The designs are composed to complement the features and quirks of each home using only materials available in Williamsburg at the time. As guests proceed through parlors, dining rooms, kitchens, and studies, hostesses highlight special architectural features and notable furnishings as well as tell the tales of the property owners, including one of the nation's founders. The 2025 Annual Christmas Home Tour features:

- The Lightfoot House: One of the original eighty-nine homes of the Historic Area, the Lightfoot House was constructed in the mid-1700's with the final design completed in 1750 for the prominent Yorktown family of Phillip Lightfoot. It now serves as the official residence of the President of the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation.
- The Prentis House & Garden: The home of William Prentis was constructed in 1725 and expanded in 1765, but burned to the ground in 1842. It was painstakingly reconstructed on the original foundation in 1938. The beautiful Prentis Garden has been constructed behind the house.
- The Grissell Hay Lodging House and Outbuildings: One of the original eighty-nine homes of the Historic Area, the core of the house was constructed in 1720 and restored in 1930-31. The stunning Doric columns and pediment of the front porch were retained in the restoration even though they postdate the colonial period. The kitchen, dairy,



smokehouse, and privy, dating from the early 19th century, are among the few surviving early outbuildings.

- The Nelson-Galt House and Kitchen: One of the original eighty-nine homes of the Historic Area, the Nelson-Galt House is the oldest dwelling in town (core c. 1695) and one of the oldest houses in Virginia. Thomas Nelson, Jr., owner during the later 18th century, signed the Declaration of Independence and succeeded Thomas Jefferson as governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Tour proceeds are donated annually by the Club to support the gardens of The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation and the Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation as well as other beautification projects in the historic triangle. Scholarships in environmental science and policy at local colleges and youth nature camp are also funded from Tour proceeds.

Peggy Singlemann is nationally known as one of the foremost gardening experts. Her experience in the field is exceeded only by her infectious enthusiasm in sharing knowledge of best practices. She is a familiar figure as the longtime host and co-producer of Virginia's only TV show, *Virginia Home Grown*, on Virginia Public Media/PBS. Peggy is also prominent in this field for her transformative role renewing and overseeing the garden and grounds of the historic estate Maymont in Richmond. She holds professional certifications as an arborist, horticulturist, and landscape designer and has greatly expanded knowledge in the gardening/landscape design fields through her national and regional speaking engagements, contributions to publications, and consulting work via her business, RVA Gardener LLC. In 2022, the Virginia General Assembly presented a commendation to Peggy for her outstanding guidance, restoration, and preservation of Maymont's gardens, grounds, and arboretum over 38 years of service.

David Seward

David Seward recently retired from Reynolds Community College as the Program Head for the Horticulture Program for 18 years. He spent a total of 25 years teaching for the Horticulture Program at Reynolds. He has worked a total of 40 years working and teaching in the green industry, predominantly focused on Landscape management and Plant materials. While at Reynolds, he developed a Commercial Pesticide Applicator Training Program, a Career Studies Certificate for Sustainable Agriculture, and a Sustainable Landscapes course. He received his BS in Biology from Old Dominion University and his MS in Horticulture from Virginia Tech.
