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

Summer Reading | Book Review: Why do I do what I don't want to do.

WHY

WHAT

I DON'T

TO DO?

JONATHAN "JP" POKLUDA

ave you ever asked yourself, "Why do I do what I don't want to do? I'm sure we've all been there at one time or another. The easy answer is because we can't help ourselves. The Apostle Paul in his letter to the Romans (verse 7:21) puts it this way: "I have discovered this principle of life — that when I want to do what is right, I inevitably do what is wrong. (NLT) We can't help ourselves by ourselves, but there is help.

This summer's book reading, Why Do I Do What I Don't Want to Do: Replace Deadly Vices with Life-Giving Virtues helps us see, just as Paul does, that every Christian gets stuck at some point on their journey doing something they don't want to do. But we don't have to stay stuck. The author, Pastor Jonathan Pokluda, shares his journey in a very transparent way – a life once filled with partying, sex, pornography, ,and drugs – and offers biblical and practical tools to help us live the life God intended for us.

In his easy to read, 217-page book, Pokluda unpacks the godly principles we are encouraged in Scripture to pursue — humility, forgiveness, sobriety, generosity, diligence, self-control, authenticity, rest, optimism, and gratitude. As the author writes in the very first sentence of the book, "We cannot stop a bad habit. We can only replace it with a good one."

From his own life and years of research, Pokluda says there are two lessons that stick out the most: One, sin (most often) subtly creeps into our lives; two, there are no quick fixes - pursuing holiness is a lifelong pursuit full of micro-decisions along the way. Pokluda breaks the book into two parts. In Part 1, he deals with what he calls five classic sins (or vices) and their corresponding virtues: 1) Pride & Humility; 2) Anger & forgiveness; 3) Greed & Apathy and Generosity; 4) Apathy & Diligence; and 5) Lust & Self-Control. An interesting takeaway from the author is that pride leads to every other vice.

Proverbs 16:18 (MSG) says of pride: "First pride, then the crash – the bigger the ego, the harder the fall."

In Part 2, Pokluda lists the five most important modern battles we fight daily: 1) Perception Management & Authenticity; 2) Entitlement & Gratitude; 3) Busyness and Rest; 4) Drunkenness & Sobriety; and 5) Cynicism & Optimism. If we can rise above these harmful habits and patterns, we will live in a way that is countercultural and stands out, drastically different from the people around us, "Pokluda writes. And the good

news, the author writes: "We can fight

these modern wars with the ancient, timeless truths of Scripture."

As the apostle Paul wrestled with the question of why I do what I don't want to do in Romans 7, he offers incredible hope in Romans 8:1-2 (NLT): "So now there is no condemnation for those who belong to Christ Jesus. And because you belong to him, the power of the lifegiving Spirit has freed you from the power of sin that leads to death.

"We cannot stop a bad habit.
We can only replace it with a good one."

Deaconness Estelle Kennedy

Remembered as a Generous
and Committed Servant

Deaconess Estelle Kennedy never served in the military, but she lived her life on the battlefield. That would be the Christian battlefield on which she took her stand and, as the lyric to her favorite hymn says, she "promised him that I would serve him till I die. I'm on the battlefield for my Lord."

Her tour of duty ended on July 13, with her passing at the age of ninety-one. A celebration of Life service was held on July 23 at Mt. Zion. A second service

and internment were held in New Rochelle, New York. Deaconess Kennedy served faithfully as a Deaconess. She also was a member of the Scholarship Ministry, Sunday School teacher, and a member of the Manasseh Tribe.

Family and friends remembered her during their tributes as a supporter of education and the youth, a world traveler, a sophisticated lady who was well dressed and beautiful, a friend, and a committed servant. "She was a strong godly woman, who served others by serving people, "said close friend Betty Donaldson. Deaconess Chair, Mary Joseph said Deaconess Kennedy "was a great encourager to us in the Deaconess Ministry." Her nephew, Rev. Dr. Kenneth Davis of New York, called her a "trail blazer who made sure her family had an opportunity of getting an education."

In his Words of Comfort to the family, Pastor Edwin Coffie took his message from Psalm 116:15, "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints." His points of emphasis were that Deaconess Kennedy: 1) Loved her Church. "She served faithfully in many capacities but most important to her was the scholarship committee and education. She gave generously." 2.) Loved her Pastor. He acknowledged that he was a benefactor of her generosity as she encouraged him on special days with tokens of appreciation. Additionally, whenever she traveled to Africa, she brought him custom-made attire. 3.) Loved her Savior, "whom she trusted unconditionally.) Said Pastor Coffie: "She served faithfully down here because she had great expectations for over there. She wanted to see the great King face to face."

was held at her beloved Mt. Calvary Baptist Church of Palm Coast. Following the family's farewell glance, Pastor Edwin Coffie set the tone for the occasion. Reminiscing on the legacy Sister Spann left for family as well as for all those whom she loved, Pastor Coffie said: "When you live right, you can leave right." Sister Spann was indeed a gifted bearer of the Good News, and that virtue was highlighted in the obituary as well as in reflections delivered by Sister Elizabeth Eubanks (as a sister in Christ), Brother Joseph Jones (as a member of the African American Cultural Society), and by Mrs. Hillary M. Lyals (representing the family).

In his eulogy of Sister Spann, Pastor Coffie focused on Philippians 1:20,21 – a passage filled with words of rejoicing. Using Paul's declaration in Verse 21, "For me to live is Christ, but to die is gain," Pastor Coffie

Pastor Edwin Coffie began his eulogy of Mother Reed by referencing two passages of Scripture: 1) Philippians 4:11 - Not that I speak in respect of want: for I have learned, in whatever state I am, therewith to be content) and 2) Matthew 5:16 - Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven. Both passages support the fact that "People would rather see a sermon than hear one," Pastor noted. "The life we live will determine the legacy we leave," Pastor continued. His first point, therefore, was that Mother Reed lived with the assurance of standing on the promises of God. She showed up for church in seasons of strength as well as in seasons of struggles. Secondly, she also lived with the assurance of God's provisions: "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added unto you." Finally, Mother Reed understood the significance of a consistent testimony. She lived life in such a way that she always gave God praise. She was indeed a living epistle.

focused on the following "gains" Sister Spann is now experiencing and what we also will one day gain1) She has gained a better body — a glorified body that can never die. 2) The beauty of any home pales in comparison to what God has prepared for us. "Mother Spann," Pastor said, "this home has your name on it!" Therefore, as followers of Jesus Christ, we can all look forward to gaining a better inheritance. 3) Sister Spann has also gained eternal fellowship; the circle is forever unbroken in heaven. Furthermore, she understood that every praise is to our God, so Sister Spann was ready, willing, and able to talk about the goodness of the Lord. Since she knew there was a time and season for everything, Sister Spann was also ready to meet the Lord.

In closing, Pastor Coffie paraphrased 2 Timothy 4:7-8: She fought a good fight, finished her course, and kept the faith. Therefore, there is laid up for her a crown of righteousness.
