

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

# **Contextual Reading 1 Corinthians 4:1-5**

Servants of Christ and Stewards of the Mysteries of God

<sup>1</sup>This, then, is how you ought to regard us: as servants of Christ and as those entrusted with the mysteries God has revealed. 2Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful. 3I care very little if I am judged by you or by any human court; indeed, I do not even judge myself. 4My conscience is clear, but that does not make me innocent. It is the Lord who judges me. <sup>5</sup>Therefore judge nothing before the appointed time; wait until the Lord comes. He will bring to light what is hidden in darkness and will expose the motives of the heart. At that time each will receive their praise from God.

### 1 Corinthians 4:1

Here observe, 1. A double character given of an evangelical pastor.

He is, (1.) A minister of Christ: that is, a person deputed by the command, and invested with the authority, of Christ, to administer in holy things, to preach the word, administer the sacraments, execute church censures; being in all things an example to the flock! and the people are to account the office and work of the ministry, as a divine institution and appointment of Christ in his church; whoever slights or opposes the ministry, flies in the face of Christ himself. >

# 1 Corinthians 4:1

- As if the apostle had said, "Although I warned you, in the foregoing chapter, against an undue esteem of your pastors, and against a factious preference of some before others, to the great scandal of religion, and the prejudice of the gospel; yet I speak not this to draw you off from paying that due honor and deserved respect which belongs to their character. But I desire you to account them all, neither more nor less, but as ministers of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God." →
- 1 Corinthians 4:1 This, then, is how you ought to regard us: as servants of Christ and as those entrusted with the mysteries God has revealed

1 Corinthians 4:1

(2.) He is a steward of the mysteries of God; and that in a twofold respect. First, He is a steward of the truths of God; secondly, of the ordinances of God.

Of the truths of God he is a steward, to open and explain them for the spiritual edification of all Christians, and to defend and maintain them against the opposition of all adversaries: God's steward must not suffer vermin to destroy the provision of God's household.

He is a steward of the ordinances of God also: which he is obliged to dispense in all faithfulness to his congregation. As every man hath received the gift, even so minister the same one to another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God. 1Pe 4:10.

Observe, 2. As the ministers of Christ are described, they are **stewards**; so the qualification of a steward is declared, and that is faithfulness: **It is required in stewards that a man be found faithful.** What ground is there for trust, where there is no truth? Now this faithfulness in our stewardship includes,

- (1.) Purity of intention; a pure end in all our services will give us abundance of comfort at the end of our service.
- (2.) Sincerity and integrity of heart: a faithful minister is a sincerehearted minister, who preaches his sermons first to himself, and then to his hearers. →

- (3.) Ministerial diligence: a slothful minister can never be a faithful steward; we must study the truths of God to exhaustion, preach them to faintness, maintain and defend them with steadfastness: we look for happiness from God as long as he is in heaven, and he expects faithfulness from us as long as we are upon earth.
- (4.) Faithfulness in stewardship includes impartiality in all the administrations of Christ's house: we must take the same care of, manifest the same love unto, attend with the same diligence upon, the poorest and meanest in our congregations, as we do the rich, the great, and the honorable: for all our souls are at one price, and rated at one value in our Lord's book. Let us take care we be impartial stewards, for we must shortly give an account of our stewardship before an impartial God.



- All servants are required to be faithful, but especially chief servants like stewards, who are entrusted with their masters' goods to dispense to others. The faithfulness of a steward in dispensing out his master's goods lies in his giving them out according to his master's order, giving to every one their portion, not detaining any thing from others which it is his master's will they should have; as Paul gloried, <a href="Ac 20:20,27">Ac 20:20,27</a>, that he had kept back from the Ephesians nothing that was profitable for them, nor shunned to declare to them all the counsel of God; not giving holy things to dogs, or casting pearls before swine, contrary to Christ's direction, <a href="Mt 7:6">Mt 7:6</a>.
- Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful.

1 John 10:12 The opposite of trust

- A hired hand; one whose great object in preaching is his own interest. The wolf; the enemy of God and his people.
- By hired hands we are to understand those who retain the pure doctrine, and who proclaim the truth, as Paul says, to serve a purpose rather than from pure zeal. Though such persons do not serve Christ faithfully, yet we ought to hear them; for Christ wished that the Pharisees should be heard, because they sat in Moses' seat, (Mt 23:2;) and, in like manner, we ought to give such honor to the Gospel, as not to shrink from its ministers, though they be not good men.

1 John 10:12 The hired hand is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep. So when he sees the wolf coming, he abandons the sheep and runs away. Then the wolf attacks the flock and scatters it. 19

- This passage, however, applies not merely against wicked teachers, but also against all that have any other object in view than the glory of Christ and the edification of the Church. For every one that teaches the truth is not necessarily faithful, but, only he who desires from the heart to serve the Lord and advance Christ's kingdom. Nor is it without good reason that Augustine assigns to hired hands, (Joh 10:12,) a middle place between the wolves and the good teachers.
- Let's look at Joh 10:12



- The essential matter with Paul was, not that the Corinthians should judge him a faithful steward, or that he should be faithful in his own judgment, but that the Lord shall count him faithful. Of course, with factions at Corinth, some criticized Paul.
- 1 Corinthians 4:3 l care very little if l am judged by you or by any human court; indeed, I do not even judge myself.

1 Corinthians 4:5

Our apostle's design in these words, is not to condemn all judgment of persons, words, or actions, or to oblige us to suspend our judging till the day of judgment; but only forbids rash censuring, unadvised, uncertain, and unseasonable judging of the hearts and final states of men. We may judge what appeared, but not what is hidden and unseen: for the judging of hidden things is referred to him from whom nothing is hidden. →

Therefore judge nothing before the appointed time; wait until the Lord comes. He will bring to light what is hidden in darkness and will expose the motives of the heart. At that time each will receive their praise from God. 23

# 1 Corinthians 4:4

- My conscience is clear therefore conscience is not an infallible guide. Paul did not consider his so. He had a good conscience (2Co 1:12); but God might see unfaithfulness in him which his own conscience could not yet accurately detect. Much of his labor might prove "stubble" in the testing day. "Justified" here refers to sanctifying righteousness. Of his justification he has no doubt (Ro 5:1); but of the degree of his sanctifying righteousness, he cannot be infallibly sure until the judgment day, when he will gain or lose reward accordingly (1Co 3:14-15).
- 1 Corinthians 4:4
   My conscience is clear, but that does not make me innocent. It is the Lord who judges me.

# 1 Corinthians 4:5

- Observe farther, The person spoken of, who makes manifest the counsels of the heart, and brings to light the hidden things of darkness: it is Jesus Christ. Judge nothing till the Lord come, the Lord Jesus Christ. ....
- Observe lastly, What will be the issue and consequence of our Lord's knowing and judging the secrets of men: Then shall every one have praise of God; that is, every one shall have praise that is praiseworthy; every good man, though now dispraised and despised, though censured and condemned, though loaded with scandals and false reports, yet then every righteous man shall have praise from Christ the righteous Judge.

- How very hard it is not to judge! That critical faculty is born in us; it
  is natural for us to bring all things we hear or see before the bar of
  our human judgment. God has given us this faculty, and we cannot
  help using it. It cannot be altogether wrong for us to use it.
- I. There is a grave danger in the exercise of this faculty, a danger lest we should abuse this power, to set ourselves up as teachers, as if the right of delivering judgment had been committed to us. There is a danger lest we should judge harshly and uncharitably, to the hurt and detriment of others; from imperfect knowledge presuming to condemn the actions and motives of our neighbors: and it is against this sort of abuse that St. Paul warns us. →

### 1 Corinthians 4:5

• II. The best self-knowledge does not enable us to fulfil the functions of the perfect judge.—Our knowledge is only partial and limited when we regard others and their circumstances.

Judgment is God's prerogative—not man's. 'Judgment is Mine, I will repay, saith the Lord.' 'The Father hath committed all judgment to the Son.' 'Therefore judge nothing before the time, until the Lord come.' It is worth while to notice that those who deal harshly must expect to be dealt harshly with themselves, while the merciful shall be dealt leniently with. Let us be patient with the faults and failings of those round about us; let us remember that we are shielded perhaps by the nature of our work and calling from many temptations which prove too strong for our fellow-men.

# 1 Corinthians 4:5

It is not without a cause that this warning is given, for we know what an amount of harm it does in our days; how strongly people resent it, what an amount of unhappiness it causes, how wide of the marks our judgments often are! Very often those who are the most severe judges of their fellow-men are blind to their own faults, ignorant of the fact that what they condemn in others is the very thing of which they are themselves most guilty. They show an astonishing lack of self-knowledge, which would have enabled them to show greater charity and generosity. Those who have the deepest knowledge of themselves are the most humble and pitiful and merciful in their judgment?  $\rightarrow$

# 1 Corinthians 4:5

Let us be not so ready to find fault as some are, and more ready to give praise; and if we have to give blame in the course of our duty, let us do it as kindly as we can, considering ourselves, our many weaknesses, our faults and sins.

III. God hath appointed a day when He will judge the world.—
Nothing escapes God's notice. A day of justice and judgment is
drawing near. We forget in our impatience that with God one day is
as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day. The Lord
is not slack, as St. Paul reminds us, concerning His promise. It is a
needed warning, a reminder that we must have patience. →

After all, God's inexhaustible patience and self-restraint are the very strongest proof of His majesty and power, for where there is boundless might, it is there you will find immovable calm and the infinite patience of conscious strength. God's plans are worked out in some such way as this, with infinite patience, with dignity, and with power.

### 1 Corinthians 4:5

- The Key Distinction: We judge (discern) <u>actions</u>, <u>teachings</u>, and <u>fruit</u>—things that are visible and measurable against Scripture. We leave to God the judgment of hearts, motives, and eternal destinies—things that are hidden and known only to Him.

# **Contextual Reading 1 Corinthians 4:6-13**

#### **Contrast Between Self-Glorification and Humiliation**

<sup>9</sup>For it seems to me that God has put us apostles on display at the end of the procession, like those condemned to die in the arena. We have been made a spectacle to the whole universe, to angels as well as to human beings. <sup>10</sup>We are fools for Christ, but you are so wise in Christ! We are weak, but you are strong! You are honored, we are dishonored! <sup>11</sup>To this very hour we go hungry and thirsty, we are in rags, we are brutally treated, we are homeless. <sup>12</sup>We work hard with our own hands. When we are cursed, we bless; when we are persecuted, we endure it; <sup>13</sup>when we are slandered, we answer kindly. We have become the scum of the earth, the garbage of the world—right up to this moment.

### 1 Corinthians 4:7

Learn that ministers of great abilities, eminent for gifts and graces, are in great danger of being puffed up themselves, and their people also too prone to glory in them. There is a temptation in good things, in the best things, to pride; the best men on earth may be overheated by what they have received from heaven; and Satan may take occasion to puff us up with spiritual pride; Paul puts forth this soul-humbling and pride-mortifying expostulation, What do you have that you did not receive? There is nothing wherein one minister, or indeed one man, differs or is distinguished from another, or where he excels another, but it is given him from God; it is God, and not himself, that makes him to differ.

For who makes you different from anyone else? What do you have that you did not receive? And if you did receive it, why do you boast as though you did not? 35

# 1 Corinthians 4:6

- The apostle here lets us into the reason why he had used his own name and that of Apollos in this discourse of his. He had done it in a figure, and he had done it for their sakes. He chose rather to mention his own name, and the name of a faithful fellow-laborer, than the names of any heads of factions among them, that he might avoid what would provoke, and make his advice stronger. Note, Ministers should use prudence in their advices and warnings, but especially in their reproofs,...
- 1 Corinthians 4:6 Now, brothers and sisters, I have applied these things to myself and Apollos for your benefit, so that you may learn from us the meaning of the saying, "Do not go beyond what is written." Then you will not be puffed up in being a follower of one of us over against the other.34

- Already you have all you want!, That is, in their own opinion: these words, and some following expressions, are an ironical concession. They were not full of God, and divine things; nor of Christ, and of grace out of his fulness; nor of the Holy Ghost, and of faith, as Stephen and Barnabas are said to be; nor of joy and peace in believing; nor of goodness and spiritual knowledge; but they were full of themselves, and were pulled up in their fleshly minds with an opinion of their abilities, learning, oratory, and eloquence, of their ministers, →
- 1 Corinthians 4:8
   Already you have all you want! Already you have become rich! You have begun to reign—and that without us! How I wish that you really had begun to reign so that we also might reign with you!

and of their own great improvements in knowledge under their ministrations. They fancied they had got to a perfection in knowledge and were brimful of it; and as the full stomach, from which the metaphor is taken, loathes the honeycomb, so these persons loathed the apostle's ministry, and the pure preaching of the Gospel; imagining that they had attained to something above it, and stood in no need of it; when, alas! they were but babes, children in understanding, and needed milk instead of strong meat; so far were they from being what they thought themselves to be.

### 1 Corinthians 4:9


- Besides, men and angels are offsprings of the same Father, participators of the same nature, subjects of the same moral government. No wonder they are so concerned.
- II THAT OUR PART SHOULD BE CAREFULLY PLAYED. How doubly careful are our actors on the stage, in the presence of spectators distinguished for the highest genius, education, and artistic culture! It behooves every man to be cautious how he acts in the presence of his fellow creatures, whether they are children or adults, common people or princes; but how much more cautious should he be—when he knows that angels, whose pure natures loathe sin in all its forms, have their keenest gaze fastened ever on his life.

# 1 Corinthians 4:9

- Man an object of angelic observation: Angels as spectators are intelligent, interested, numerous, constant. If the eyes of such intelligences are constantly upon us, what are the practical conclusions?
- I THAT OUR CONDUCT HERE CONCERNS THE UNIVERSE. No man lives unto himself; each unit is a link in being's endless chain. His actions must tell harmfully or beneficently on the creation; hence all loving and loyal intelligences direct, their attention to him with deep and unabating interest. →
- 1 Corinthians 4:9 For it seems to me that God has put us apostles on display at the end of the procession, like those condemned to die in the arena. We have been made a spectacle to the whole universe, to angels as well as to human beings.

- III THAT THERE IS NO CHANCE OF CONCEALING OUR SIN.
   The attempt to cloak or dissemble our sins is absurdly futile. While there is One who reads the heart, there may be millions who mark all our overt acts, whether produced in darkness or in light.
- IV THAT WE MAY EXPECT HELP IN ALL HOLY ENDEAVOURS.
   Those celestial spirits are sent forth to minister to the heirs of salvation.
- They have received a Divine commission to bear us up, lest we dash our feet against a stone. In all ages they have rendered assistance to the good.

### 1 Corinthians 4:13

• The apostle signifies, that no persons could be more base, vile, and contemptible than they were, nothing more despised, or in less esteem: he did not say this as complaining, or in any discontent at what he saw was the will of God concerning them; but to show them the difference between the apostles, and them and their teachers, and possibly reflecting upon them, as being in some degree guilty of this scorn and contempt of them, or at least, more than they ought, neglecting them under these mean and afflictive circumstances. 1 Corinthians 4:13

# 1 Corinthians 4:12

- While at Ephesus, whence this letter was written, the Apostle supported himself by working with Aquila and Priscilla at tent-making. This labour was no recreation or pastime with St. Paul, it was hard and earnest work. (See <a href="https://doi.org/10.10/10.15">1Th 2:8-9</a>; <a href="https://doi.org/10.15">2Th 3:8</a>.) That this labor was rendered more excessive from the Apostle's characteristic generosity to others, we may conclude from the expression used in his farewell to the Ephesian elders (<a href="https://doi.org/10.15">Ac 20:17-38</a>), "Ye yourselves know that these hands have ministered unto my necessities, and to them that were with me."

# Contextual Reading 1 Corinthians 4:14-21 Servants of Christ and Stewards of the Mysteries of God

14I am writing this not to shame you but to warn you as my dear children.
15Even if you had ten thousand guardians in Christ, you do not have many fathers, for in Christ Jesus I became your father through the gospel.
16Therefore I urge you to imitate me. <sup>17</sup>For this reason I have sent to you Timothy, my son whom I love, who is faithful in the Lord. He will remind you of my way of life in Christ Jesus, which agrees with what I teach everywhere in every church. <sup>18</sup>Some of you have become arrogant, as if I were not coming to you. <sup>19</sup>But I will come to you very soon, if the Lord is willing, and then I will find out not only how these arrogant people are talking, but what power they have. <sup>20</sup>For the kingdom of God is not a matter of talk but of power. <sup>21</sup>What do you prefer? Shall I come to you with a rod of discipline, or shall I come in love and with a gentle spirit?

- Truly they needed that plain admonition to save them from the pride which was discovered cropping. God help us all to profit by these admonitions and remember our place is down on the Lord's bottom; while there we never can fall, as there is no place to fall. Humility is the primary and most important Christian attribute, the antithesis of pride, the most dangerous enemy.
- 1 Corinthians 4:14
   I am writing this not to shame you but to warn you as my dear children.

### 1 Corinthians 4:16

- We have here the special advice he urges on them: Wherefore I beseech you be you followers of me, 1Co 4:16. This he elsewhere explains and limits (1Co 11:1): "Be you followers of me, as I also am of Christ. Follow me as far as I follow Christ. Come up as close as you can to my example in those instances wherein I endeavor to copy after his pattern. Be my disciples, as far as I manifest myself to be a faithful minister and disciple of Christ, and no further. I would not have you be my disciples, but his. But I hope I have approved myself a faithful steward of the mysteries of Christ, →
- 1 Corinthians 4:16
   Therefore I urge you to imitate me.

# 1 Corinthians 4:15

- The great lesson of this text is: That people ought to have a tender respect for those ministers whom God hath honored with their first conversion and bringing them home to Christ. God may make use of a multitude of ministers to instruct Christians, and carry on his work in their souls to perfection; but he maketh use of some particular minister at first to convince them, and be an instrument in the changing of their hearts; such they ought to have a great value for, they are their spiritual *fathers* in a proper sense.
- 1 Corinthians 4:15
   Even if you had ten thousand guardians in Christ, you do not have many fathers, for in Christ Jesus I became your father through the gospel.

### 1 Corinthians 4:16

and a faithful servant of my master Christ; so far follow me, and tread in my steps." Note, Ministers should so live that their people may take pattern from them, and live after their copy. They should guide them by their lives as well as their lips, go before them in the way to heaven, and not content themselves with pointing it out. Note, As ministers are to set a pattern, others must take it. They should follow them as far as they are satisfied that they follow Christ in faith and practice.

- I hear that some of your teachers, and some of your members, are so conceited of themselves, that they would persuade you that I dare not see their faces, or come to discourse with them face to face, and therefore would not come unto you.
- During Paul's long absence in Asia, some of the preachers from Judea (doubtless sincerely, who were eye-witnesses to the fact that he was not with Christ during His ministry), unfortunately had impeached his apostolical authority. →

# 1 Corinthians 4:17

- Where observe, That St. Paul had led so holy and unblameable a conversation in every place where he had lived, that he is neither afraid nor ashamed that his course of life should be discovered and made known to all the world. A great example for our imitation, to walk before God and our people with such care and caution, with such heedfulness and circumspection, that we need not blush, when either our doctrine or practice are published before all the churches of Jesus Christ. Timothy shall acquaint you with my ways, and with what I teach everywhere in every church.
- 1 Corinthians 4:17 For this reason I have sent to you Timothy, my son whom I love, who is faithful in the Lord. He will remind you of my way of life in Christ Jesus, which agrees with what I teach everywhere in every church.

# 1 Corinthians 4:18

• How natural for those who had been with Jesus from the baptism of John to say, "Well, Brother Paul is a good preacher, but no apostle, for I was with Jesus when He called the twelve, and Paul was not in the country, and never came into Judea till after Pentecost. So of course he is no apostle." The same preachers pointed them to Peter, who also had been there, and commended him as a genuine apostle; not only one of the original twelve, but the senior, honored with the first gospel sermon on the day of Pentecost. This had damaged Paul's influence among them for good.

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- And I will know not the speech By speech you must understand that chattering in which the false apostles delighted themselves, for they excelled in a kind of dexterity and gracefulness of speech, while they were destitute of the zeal and efficacy of the Spirit. By the term power, he means that spiritual efficacy, with which those are endowed who dispense the word of the Lord with earnestness. The meaning, therefore, is: "I shall see whether they have so much occasion for being puffed up; and I shall not judge of them by their mere outward talkativeness, →
- 1 Corinthians 4:19

  But I will come to you very soon, if the Lord is willing, and then I will find out not only how these arrogant people are talking, but what power they have

### 1 Corinthians 4:20

• The kingdom of God in the church, or the kingdom of God in the particular soul. God has not sent his ministers to subdue souls to himself by fine, showy words and phrases, but by a lively preaching the gospel, while his power attends their plain preaching; and the power and efficacy of the preachers' doctrine appears in their holy life and conversation, so as their people cannot say to them: Physician, heal thyself, .... So the kingdom of God in particular souls does not appear in words, but in the power which the word of God has upon men's hearts, in subduing their lusts and corruptions, and bringing their hearts into a subjection to his will.

4:20 For the kingdom of God is not a matter of talk but of power.

in which they place the sum-total of their glory, and on the ground of which they claim for themselves every honor. If they wish to have any honor from me, they must bring forward that *power* which distinguishes the true servants of Christ from the merely pretended: otherwise, I shall despise them, with all their show. It is to no purpose, therefore, that they confide in their eloquence, for I shall reckon it nothing better than smoke."

- As if the apostle had said, "Come I will among you, to regulate disorders, and to rectify abuses: now choose how I shall come; whether in the milder way of kindness, love, and meekness towards you, or exercising the power God has given me, of inflicting corporal punishments on offenders, by delivering them to Satan as God's executioner upon their bodies."
- Note here, 1. A power, which the apostle intimates himself to have in the Christian church; namely, the power of the rod, that is, a power of inflicting the severest of corporal punishments, even death itself, upon notorious offenders.
- 1 Corinthians 4:21 What do you prefer? Shall I come to you with a rod of discipline, or shall I come in love and with a gentle spirit?

- Thus Elymas the sorcerer was smitten with blindness by St. Paul, Ac 13:8-11.
- Ananias and Sapphira struck dead by St. Peter, Ac 5:1-10.
- Hymenaeus and Philetus delivered unto Satan, 1Ti 1:20.
- It was usual with God, in the earlier days of the gospel, to give Satan leave to seize the bodies of such as were, for their obstinate perseverance in sin, cut off from the communion of the church; who plagued them with diseases, and sometimes with death, which is called the destruction of the flesh, 1Co 5:5.
