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The Reunion and the Family

Looking at the photos from the family reunion was like reading a history book about the generations of this family.

First there was the homestead of a greatgrandfather where only a pecan tree now stood. The tree was both a marker and monument to the memory of the home that was now a horse farm. The Spanish moss that hung from the tree reminded the living of the great-grandfather's livelihood. He gathered and cured Spanish moss so that it could be sold to make mattresses. All of his descendants had great respect for this man. Surely his great-great-grandkids could make it since he had.

Then there was the tin-roofed shack that stood alone out in the backwoods, still home sweet home to a "cousin" who refused to leave this "poor" dwelling. This was her place. She stood, smiling a wide welcome and opening the door to her home for a relative. The obvious warm feelings melted away any fears. There was acceptance here.

One very kind photo pictured two women and one man hand in hand in front of the church that originally had been built and then added on to by family members. Dressed in their Sunday best, they were celebrating their togetherness as family and as Christians. It was a celebration of love that would reach to include innumerable other members of the family, young and old, and that would last not just this Sunday, but through the weeks, months, years, and decades ahead.

The mother showing the pictures told how she almost felt a sense of loss coming back from that reunion. "There are a lot of people down home who have never left their roots. They have this wonderful support system for the young people. There are the older people who can provide a special kind of care,

some extra loving. They can help correct the young people, discipline them without trying too hard. The young people can find understanding outside their own home. They find special bonds in this community, a sort of freedom. While some families have become so mobile and have gone off in different directions, their family members have stayed close together. They all live within walking distance of each other. In fact, they purposely build their homes close together. Several young people whose parents had been separated found a special security here. They were assured that they would always be members of this family and be at home here, that the family cares about what happens to them."

Other photos showed a special barbecue dinner, and the theme on the banner was the importance of the family in the twenty-first century. Parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins were sitting around spending this special reunion time together. The story is told that one family member came up to another and said, "Aunt so-and-so wants you." This guy was 50 years old, but he got up to see what this matriarch of the family wanted. He believed that no matter how old you get, you still respect those older than you.

Several photos showed a man who had watched his father work hard for someone else because of a lack of education. It was his boyhood dream to build his father a home. He would think about his dream as he plowed the farmland his dad owned. There was one part of the 90-acre stretch that was untillable because of the number of trees. This is where he and his cousins played. As a kid, he marked the trees in these woods-cherry, walnut, oak, pine-knowing that he would one day cut down these trees to build a house for his dad.

When this boy became a man he inherited this area of the farm. From the untilled fields he dug up enough flint rock for the walls of the home, and he and his sons cut down the very trees he had marked as a boy. Family members and other members of the church and community worked together to build this home where now all are welcome to come and to stay. Sticking together, always—that's what the reunion and this family are all about. you check out the beginning of everything in the Book of Genesis, you'll discover that Adam and Eve didn't just bump into each other on an evening stroll and decide to invent the family. The family was God's idea, carefully planned from the beginning of time. You may recall that things were less than perfect right from the start. But God put us in families for several good reasons.


