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In many countries being a Christian or telling others about Christ is against the law or is unpopular. Christians are still being persecuted in Saudi Arabia, Iran, the United States . . .

Wait a minute. The United States? Yes, right here in your town, your school, maybe even in your home. It may not be the old-fashioned style of persecution—burning people at the stake or stoning them—but it's happening.

Persecution simply means being mistreated for what you believe. If you're a Christian who is following the Bible's teachings, you will probably—eventually—be noticed and persecuted for it. When people realize you are a Christian, they may react in one of three ways. They may respect you, hassle you, or ignore you. Usually they choose one of the last two reactions.

A few groups of middle-school students talked about the difficulties they face as Christians. Can you relate to the ways that this difference affects them?

WHAT DO YOUR NON-CHRISTIAN FRIENDS THINK IT MEANS TO BE A CHRISTIAN?

• They think you're strange.

• They say you're no fun.

• You go to church all the time; you're boring.

• They think you have to follow a bunch of rules and do nothing you want to do. Ever!

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN YOU TELL THEM YOU ARE A CHRISTIAN?

• Most of them just say "Oh" and change the subject. They don't want to talk about it.

• Some kids say it's stupid and that you just do it because your parents make you.

• Sometimes they act funny around me because they know I don't like to hear dirty words or bad jokes.

If you talk about it too much, they tell other kids not to hang around you.

I don't really tell anybody. They would probably think I'm too religious or something.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE PROBLEMS YOU'VE HAD BECAUSE YOU ARE A CHRISTIAN?

• Some of my friends are in gangs and they try to get me to be in them too, but I won't. Two girls in this one gang wanted me to help them beat up another girl, and I said I wouldn't; so now they don't talk to me anymore.

This guy stole stuff from a store and tried to get me to do it too, but I wouldn't. I told him that I go to church and youth group, but he said I was just afraid.

• We were listening to the radio when this really gross song came on. I think it's kind of sick, so I changed the station and they all yelled at me because they liked it.

• My next-door neighbor and I were really good friends when we were growing up. But she's not a Christian, and now she's totally different from me. Now we don't even really talk to each other.

HAVE YOU EVER TALKED ABOUT GOD WITH YOUR TEACHERS?

• My science teacher is always talking about evolution and saying that that's how we got here. You know, like people came from monkeys and it all just happened. I said I didn't believe it and that God created everything. Then he explained how much proof there was for evolution. He didn't put me down, but I felt stupid.

• There's one teacher in our school who's a Christian and says stuff like

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Amos 1:1; 7:10-17

Would you like to be a prophet proclaiming doom to a nation of evil people? Amos probably wasn't too excited about it either! But he was a hero because he did what God told him to do — what he knew was right.

Not only did the people of Israel oppose Amos, but the king and the religious leaders did too. Our hero Amos faced some real trouble for saying what he did.


¹²Then Amaziah said to Amos, "Get out, you seer! Go back to the land of

You say, " 'Do not prophesy against Israel, and stop preaching against the house of Isaac.'

¹⁷"Therefore this is what the LORD savs: " 'Your wife will become a prostitute in the city, and your sons and daughters will fall by the sword. Your land will be measured and divided up, and you yourself will die in a pagan country. And Israel will surely go into exile, away from their native land.' "

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"Hallelujah" if you get a right answer. But all the kids think he's weird. Some of the kids who know I'm a Christian think I'm weird like he is.

HAVE YOU EVER TRIED TO TELL OTHERS ABOUT YOUR BELIEF IN CHRIST?

• Yeah, my friend and I went up to these kids and started talking about Jesus, but they just told us to get away.

I try to get some of my friends to go with me to Sunday school and youth group. Some of them come, but a lot of times when I call them to ask if they're going to come, they make up excuses.

. I asked this friend of mine to come to church with me. But he said he goes to another church. I said, "That's great," and asked him which church. He made up some name

... so I asked him if I could come to his church and he said no, that his parents don't want anybody else coming with him. So then I said I didn't believe he went to any church and asked him why he wouldn't come to mine. But he just wouldn't talk about it.

Some Christian young people seem to feel that it's just not worth sharing their faith. It's not worth the risk of being laughed at or put down by friends because they're different. It's much safer to leave God at church. But that's not what God wants.

God knew that being a Christian in front of others was going to be tough. Several times in the Bible we are told that as Christians, we should expect to be persecuted.

But it isn't all bad news.

Jesus said, "Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven" (Matt. 5:11-12a).

Being a Christian does mean that at times you will have to be different. But wow! What a difference! It's the difference between having friends who are there only when they need you and having a Friend who is always there. It's the difference between eternal torture in hell and eternal life in heaven. It's the difference between living life making your own decisions and letting God make sure you get the best out of life.

So ask yourself— is it worth the pifference?

How can you rejoice when someone says something mean about you? What vou really want to do is get even! But Jesus says you're blessed when vou're persecuted or picked on, particularly when you're standing up for your faith.
