4TH SUNDAY OF EASTER - DAILY MEDITATION: JOHN 10:11-18

A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. (John 10:11)

This familiar passage about the good shepherd calls to mind soothing images from children's books that portray Jesus as a gentle shepherd carrying a lamb on his shoulders. But Jesus paints a much more powerful picture. His good shepherd is a protector; he watches over and guards his sheep. He doesn't sit by passively when predators approach; he acts swiftly to keep his flock safe. He doesn't flee or abandon them; he stands his ground and defends them (John 10:12). He even "lays down his life for the sheep" (10:11).

We know, of course, that Jesus is talking about himself. He is a shepherd unlike the "shepherds" of Israel. In the previous chapter of John's Gospel, the Jewish leaders responded to Jesus' miraculous healing by casting out the formerly blind man from the synagogue (9:34). Jesus offered healing and revelation to God's people, yet these shepherds both rejected him themselves and prevented their "sheep" from receiving the abundant life that Jesus came to give them (10:10). In contrast, Jesus sought out the healed man, comforted him, and led him to faith (9:35-38). This is what a good shepherd does.

Jesus is not just "the" good shepherd; he is your good shepherd! Unlike a hired hand who works only for pay, Jesus is moved by a deep love for you. His love is so fierce that he freely, gladly offered his life on the cross for his sheep. For us. For you.

Today, rejoice that your good shepherd is guarding and protecting you. He is leading you securely along the perilous paths of life. He is defending you against the wolves and thieves that seek to "steal and slaughter and destroy" you (John 10:10). He is giving you new life that he won by laying down his life and taking it up again in his resurrection (10:18). He will never forsake you.

"Thank you, Jesus, for being my strong good shepherd!"

SAINT MARK, EVANGELIST (FEAST) - DAILY MEDITATION: 1 PETER 5:5-14 (April 25) ... Mark, my son. (1 Peter 5:13)

A disciple named "Mark" or "John Mark" is mentioned various times in the New Testament, both by Peter and Paul. Since the name was quite common, scholars aren't quite sure whether all the passages refer to the same person or whether this is the same Mark who wrote the Gospel bearing his name. But whether or not this man was also a coworker of Peter and Paul, we celebrate him today as the evangelist who gave the world the first inspired account of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. Mark wrote his Gospel around AD 70. Before then, both oral and written stories about Jesus had been passed down by those eyewitnesses who were Jesus' first followers. But at some point, Mark decided to collect those stories and put them in chronological order. The stories he conveyed are filled with memorable details and an immediacy that can make us feel as if we are witnessing the events ourselves. There's no doubt that Mark was a gifted writer and disciple.

But Mark was not a solo act. He had a writing partner: the Holy Spirit! According to the Catechism, "God inspired the human authors of the sacred books" (106). He chose people like Mark to write the Scriptures, and "made use of their own faculties and powers," but "he acted in them and by them" (Vatican II, On Divine Revelation, 11).

God didn't just "dictate" the Gospel to Mark. Nor did he drop down a book from the sky. Instead, he worked with him and through him. That's how he works with us, too. He inspires us, guides us, and uses our gifts for his greater purpose: to build his kingdom. We might feel unworthy to partner with the Spirit of God, but our Lord doesn't see it that way. How awesome that he puts such trust in us!

Did Mark know that his Gospel would be handed down over two millennia and read, studied, and treasured by countless people? Probably not. He simply cooperated with the Holy Spirit. In honor of this great saint, may we do the same today—and every day—in whatever way God wants to use us!

"St. Mark, thank you for writing your Gospel. Help me to trust in the Spirit as you did."

What is the meaning of Good Shepherd Sunday?

Today is known as Good Shepherd Sunday because, in each year of the liturgical cycle (on this 4th Sunday), the Gospel is always taken from the 10th chapter of John where Jesus speaks of himself as the "good shepherd".


Jesus talks about what it means to be the shepherd of the sheep. He also compares himself to the gate that sheep go through to get into the sheepfold, the yard where they stay at night for safety.

The Pharisees who deny Jesus as the way are no better than thieves trying to climb over the wall of a sheepfold, instead of entering through the gate. The message of this parable is that Jesus is the true shepherd. He is the Good Shepherd who was willing to die for those who put their faith in Him.
