From the Pastor's Heart

Is it True: The More Things Change, The More Things Stay the Same

Times flies! It is March and I have missed my personal Black History Month Celebration. Well, February is the shortest month in the year and this year Valentine's Day, family Birthdays and Ash Wednesday, President's Day, the Super Bowl and the duties of living life preempted my Celebration of Black History. But now that things have slowed down, I am going to make up for lost time and take a deep dive into my History, your History, our History, American History and World History. I especially want to study recent African-American History, the last half of the 20th Century up to our present day and time. I am going to look at the cycles of African-American history. The ebb and flow of equal-rights and discrimination, liberation and oppression, and progress and repression. In my own study I want to test the hypothesis that I am using as the title of this article. Is it true that the more things change the more things stay the same? What do you think?

A hundred years from now will it be true that the more things change the more they stay the same? I sometimes wonder how history will be recorded a hundred years from now. Books may be obsolete by then, but I predict History will still be recorded, studied, and analyzed for clues that might help people live better lives. As I have written in a previous article, the key to benefiting from all of history is the ability to go back and forth between the role of an objective observer and the role of a passive participant. Let me explain: As an objective observer of history, you want to know the truth and nothing but the truth about what happened. Once you know the truth about what happened you can become a passive participant who enters the historical narrative to deduct the motivation, strategic actions, emotional experiences, brilliant moves, and mistakes made by historical people. The difference between history and fiction is truth. History deals with the truth; fiction deals with fantasy and may have some elements of truth in it. However, fiction is not confined to or committed to the truth in any form. History records the truth about what happened in the past. Fiction uses what happened in past to the tell the writer's desired story, which is not the truth. History accepts what happened as reality while fiction writers change what happened to fit their plots and tell their storylines. Historians use factual documents, categorized as primary and secondary sources. A primary source could be a tax document, a sealed Governmental document, certified personal wills, a notarized business receipt, meeting minutes, a factual diary or journal, a written letter, etc. Secondary sources are based on personal interpretations of facts instead of the facts themselves. An editorial, opinion or gossip column in a newspaper, biographies and some autobiographies are examples of secondary historical source documents. Writers of fiction also use primary and secondary sources but feel free to alter their content to fit their storyline and accomplish their purposes which have nothing to do with truth telling.

Unfortunately, a hundred years from now I fear the problem of sin and humanity's inhuman treatment of other humans will persist and pose a dangerous problem and a serious threat for the next hundred years. Truth is the dividing line between History and Fiction, but more importantly truth is the dividing line between life and death. It always has been. From Adam and Eve failing to discern the truth between God's statements and the Serpent's statements in Genesis 3:1-5 (NRSV) Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden'?" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die."" But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." We know how that worked out.


The struggle for truth has never gone away. From creation to Christ to the struggle continued. This is clearly seen during Jesus' trial before the Roman governor Pilate: John 18:37-38 (NRSV) ³⁷ Pilate asked him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." ³⁸ Pilate asked him, "What is truth?" After he had said this, he went out to the Jews again and told them, "I find no case against him.

From Christ to the church of today the struggle to answer Pilate's question, "What is truth?" continues. I dare say it will continue from the Church of today to the Church of tomorrow unless the Truth returns in the person of Jesus Christ.

The more things change the more things stay the same, the battle to discern truth from lies continues today. I expect to be blessed by God as I study, I believe the Holy Spirit will guide me to the truth. And, I know he will do the same for you!

"We Are in Charge of Our Attitudes"

Charles Swindoll wrote about "Attitude" It stuck with me still to this day.

"The longer I live, the more I realize the impact of attitude on life. Attitude, to me, is more important than facts. It is more important than the past, than education, than money, than circumstances, than failures, successes, than what other people think or say or do. It is more important than appearance, giftedness, or skill. It will make or break a company ... a church ... a home. The remarkable thing is we have a choice every day regarding the attitude we will embrace for that day. We cannot change our past ... we cannot change the fact that people will act in a certain way. We cannot change the inevitable. The only thing we can do is play on the one string we have, and that is our attitudes ... I am convinced that life is 10% what happens to us and 90% how we react to it. And so it is with you ... we are in charge of our attitudes."

What are your expectations of the church, your church leaders, and our pastor? Like opinions we all have expectations, and we bring expectations with us that our church leaders may not be able to meet. Unrealistic expectations will bring us disappointment and disapproval. Realistic expectations and appreciating others despite their deficiencies will bring us all content & love of one another.

"Growing churches reach people and care for one another as well as those outside the church. Plateaued or declining churches get used to the status quo. They lose their first love of reaching people and make priorities of the building, the budget, the cakes baked for fellowship, and the baked chicken for folks who are sick. Eventually the pastor's primary job becomes keeping everyone inside the church happy". (Quote from Edward Hammett book Reaching People under 40 while Keeping People over 60)
