## MP govt to pay college fees for girls enrolled in engineering, law, IIT and medical colleges



“We have decided that under the Ladli Laxmi Yojana, fees for engineering, law, IIT and medical colleges will not be paid by parents, but by Shivraj 'mama',” the chief minister said.

Chief Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan on Tuesday said the state government will deposit fees for girls selected to study in engineering, law, IIT and medical colleges under its Ladli Laxmi scheme.

Chouhan made the announcement while addressing Ladli Laxmi Utsav at his residence during the day.

“We have decided that under the Ladli Laxmi Yojana, fees for engineering, law, IIT and medical colleges will not be paid by parents, but by Shivraj 'mama',” the chief minister said.

He further said the “Ladli Lakshmi Utsav” will be celebrated in every city and panchayat of Madhya Pradesh from May 9 to 15, under which various competitions, programmes and health check-ups will be organised

## Central universities faculty appointments to shift to CU-Chayan portal

*The portal will provide a common platform for listing of vacancies, advertisements and jobs across all Cus*

The University Grants Commission (UGC) has launched CU-Chayan, a unified faculty recruitment portal for Central universities. UGC chairman M. Jagadesh Kumar said the “user-friendly” portal would cater to the needs of all the stakeholders in the teachers' recruitment process.

“The UGC has developed this portal to create an enabling environment for both universities and the applicants, with universities driving all the stages of the recruitment independently, as is being done at present in the respective university,” Professor Kumar said.

The portal will provide a common platform for listing of vacancies, advertisements and jobs across all Central Universities. “The portal makes the recruitment process completely online starting from application to screening, with alerts to all the users of the portal,” the UGC Chairman said.

It will have features such as single applicant login for applying to any Central University, real-time tracking of application, personalised dashboard for each applicant, administration dashboard for each University or Department, and built-in email communication tool.

The applicant can also search for jobs using various filters like the name of the University, location, designation, category, subject, type of employment, experience and education level.

“The screening committee of the University can view details of the applicants; points or research scores given by the system; check the uploaded document against each entry point; and comments of the screening committee can also be recorded in the portal itself,” Prof. Kumar said.

“Using this portal, Central Universities will continue to advertise the positions, collect online applications, shortlist the applicants, conduct the interviews and appoint faculty members, as they were doing earlier,” he said.

“All the above activities will be carried out through the administration dashboard for each University on this portal. The UGC will be maintaining this portal for the benefit of all the CUs and is not a centralised recruitment process,” he added.

Chandigarh University will offer every kind of help to the 700 Indian students – who have fallen prey to fake college admission offer letters by the fraudulent consultants – if they are deported from Canada.

Left in the lurch, 700-odd Indian students, mostly from Punjab, are facing deportation from Canada after the authorities in the country found their admission offer letters to be fake.

Chandigarh University (CU) chancellor, Satnam Singh Sandhu said, "The university will provide every possible help to these students if they are deported. We will give them admission and enroll them in the same batches. Their credit score mapping will be carried out properly. Bridge

courses will also be offered to them if needed."

Sandhu also said that if these students are deported, later the university will also assist them in pursuing their study abroad dreams in legitimate ways.

**Bombay HC dismisses plea against 75% marks requirement in Class 12 exam for IIT admission**

The Bombay High Court recently dismissed a PIL seeking relaxation of the eligibility criterion of 75% score in higher secondary examination while seeking admission to the Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs).

A division bench of Acting Chief Justice S.V. Gangapurwala and Justice Sandeep Marne observed it cannot intervene at this stage and it was for the government authorities to consider and take a decision. "At this stage we can't intervene with the ongoing process. It is for the government to consider students' grievances," the High Court said.

According to the Joint Entrance Examination (JEE) Advanced brochure released this year, candidates should have secured at least 75% in Class 12 board exams. The public interest litigation (PIL) filed by activist Anubha Sahai said until last year, the eligibility criteria of 75% was not applicable.

With this sudden change in eligibility, lakhs of students may be affected, it was submitted.

Additional Solicitor General Anil Singh had argued for the National Testing Agency (NTA) that the policy of 75% criteria was applicable since 2017, was temporarily relaxed for the years 2020-21, 2021-22 and 2022-23. "It is not that we are implementing or re-implementing. This condition was kept in abeyance, and it has been revived," Mr. Singh said.

**NEP makes education a commodity: Kerala Minister**

Kerala Higher Education Minister R. Bindu said the New Education Policy (NEP), released by the Centre in 2020, will function as a vehicle for "communalising and commodifying education". Inaugurating the 'Assembly on Education', organised by the All India People's Science Network, here on Sunday, she added that the NEP should be viewed in the "background of current socio-political situation" where communal forces are joining hands with corporate forces. "NEP urges to impose centralisation, denouncing the federal principles of the country," she said.

She demanded parliamentary scrutiny of the NEP. "The NEP has not been subjected to any legislative or social scrutiny; it has bypassed the parliamentary procedure; through a travesty of social audit, it has invited public opinion through UGC and disregarded the replies," Dr. Bindu said. "An educational policy should scrutinise the impacts, merits and demerits of the previous policy documents. But the NEP never makes an attempt to study the impact of the previous policy documents. Most of the time, it revels in a remote past in the glories of an ancient India," she said.

**City's Ritvik bags AIR 200, Sanya AIR 344**

NEET-UG results were declared on Tuesday and successful candidates from the city were in a jubilant mood. While Ritvik Anand of Ludhiana bagged the all-India rank (AIR) 200 with a score of 700, Sanya Aggarwal secured AIR 344. Besides, Garvit Khanna got AIR 1,092.

**Singapore-India Teacher Training Project Benefits 60,000 Students and Educators in Bangalore**

Robert E Lucas, an esteemed

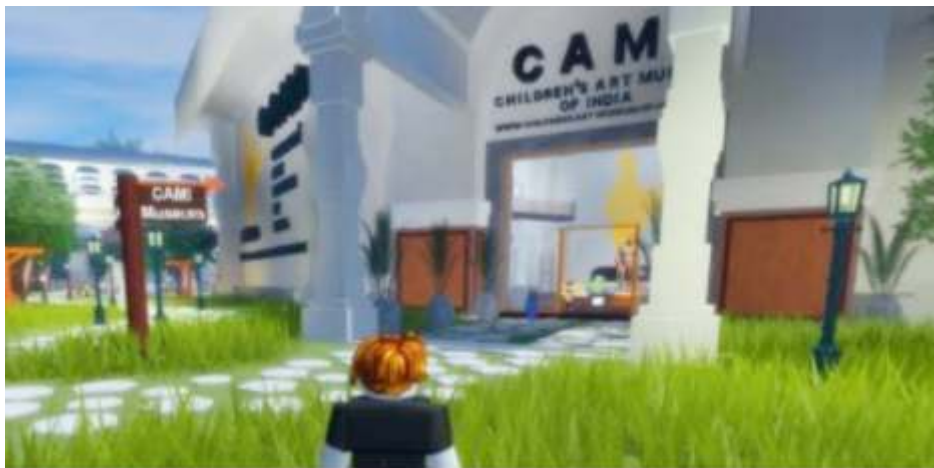

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# CAT is Common Admission Test

## What is CAT?

The full form of CAT is Common Admission Test. CAT is a national-level management entrance exam that helps applicants gain MBA/PGDM admission to IIMs and other prestigious management institutes across the country. There are three major areas of the test: Data Interpretation, Verbal Ability and Reading Comprehension, Logical Reasoning, and Quantitative Ability. However, the only criterion to sit for CAT is that the applicants must be studying in their final year or obtained a bachelor's degree with a minimum of 50% aggregate.

## When is CAT 2023 conducted?

The CAT 2023 is conducted in the month of late November to early December across 150 exam centres located in different test cities of India. CAT is conducted every year by any one of the Indian Institutes of Management (IIMs) based on a policy of rotation. Candidates who are seeking admission to the MBA programme will have to appear for this entrance test and obtain a valid score to be eligible for admission to IIMs and other top B-Schools of India.

## How is the CAT exam centre allotted to the applicants?

The CAT exam centre is allotted to the applicants based on their

chosen preferences. The applicant can specify up to six cities on the application form where they would like to take the CAT 2023 exam. Once a CAT 2023 exam centre has been chosen, requests to modify it will not be accepted by the conducting authority. Although not guaranteed, candidates usually get the first or second CAT exam centre of their choice.

## What is the duration of CAT 2023?

The duration of CAT 2023 is two hours or 120 minutes. The test will be conducted in Computer-Based Mode (CBT). As there are three sections (VARC, DILR, QA) in the CAT exam, each section will have a duration of 40 minutes. Slot-wise, the exam will be conducted in three sessions, namely, Morning, Afternoon, and Evening.

## Who is the conducting body of CAT 2023?

It is given that only IIMs will be the conducting body of CAT 2023. In India, there are in total of 20 IIMs, and one of them administers the CAT exam every year on a fixed rotational basis. As soon as the latest notification is released, CAT authorities will announce the organising body for CAT 2023. In the years 2022 and 2021, CAT was conducted by IIM Bangalore and IIM Ahmedabad respectively.

## How many colleges accept CAT scores?

In India, nearly 3,763 colleges accept CAT scores since it is one of the most important entrance exams for MBA admissions in the country. Currently, there are a total of 20 Indian Institutes of Management (IIMs) that accept the CAT score. More than one thousand other prestigious management institutes like MDI Gurgaon, FMS Delhi, S P Jain Mumbai, XLRI Jamshedpur, etc. also accept CAT scores. For more, aspirants can visit the official website of the selected college to find out if the college accepts CAT scores or not.

## How tough is CAT?

Overall, it can be said that CAT has a moderately tough difficulty level, however, the exam seems easy for many students who have started their preparation early and kept practising all three sections equally. With the right preparation strategy and a lot of practice, candidates can easily crack the entrance test and score a good percentile in the exam.

## How many times is CAT conducted in a year?

CAT is conducted once a year and the application form for the exam is released either in August or September. The exam is held in the month of late November to early December every year across 150 exam centres located in different test cities of India.

## How to calculate the CAT percentile?

The CAT percentile can be calculated just like percentiles in other exams. The percentiles are just a representation/ indication of

the number of people who are behind you in the test. The General formula to calculate percentile along with some of the examples in this regard are elaborated below.

Percentile =  $(1 - \frac{\text{All India Rank}(\text{Total Candidates in the Exam})}{\text{Total Candidates in the Exam}}) * 100\%$

Example 1: Let us assume that 50 candidates appeared for the CAT exam. You have done well in the exam and scored 3rd rank in the entrance test, which means that 47 students scored less than you. Now, your percentile should be calculated as follows:-

$47/50 * 100 = 94$  Percentile.

## What happens if I fail the CAT exam?

The CAT exam does not use the concepts of passing or failing. You will either receive a high percentile, which will permit you to promptly be called from IIM or one of your top universities, or a low percentile, which will prevent you from receiving a call for the next step in the admissions process. Further, if you do not achieve a decent percentile score, you can still enrol in reputable management institutes by taking the other management entrance exams like CMAT, NMAT, MAT, IIFT, IBSAT, XAT, GMAT, SNAP, MICAT, KMAT, TISS NET, GRE, or GATE.

## How many attempts for CAT are allowed?

Inexhaustible attempts for CAT are allowed. In other words, there is no upper age limit or cap on the number of times you can take the CAT exam 2023. However, the only criterion to sit for CAT is that the applicants must be studying in their final year or obtained a bachelor's degree with a minimum of 50% aggregate. Further, if you are targeting to work for a reputed firm, a few companies consider the

number of CAT attempts taken by a candidate as an eligibility criterion. Hence, students must try to clear the exam in as minimum attempts as possible.

## How much is the CAT exam fee 2023?

The CAT exam fee 2023 for General, EWS and NC-OBC categories is INR 2,300 and for SC, ST and PwD category is INR 1,150. You can pay the fees online using net banking or a debit/credit card. Candidates should be aware that the CAT application fee is not transferable. As the CAT application and registration is a one-time process, candidates must thoroughly check the form and apply accordingly.

## Can you crack the CAT exam 2023 without coaching?

Yes, candidates can crack the CAT exam 2023 without coaching only if they aggressively prepare for it. However, aspirants must keep in mind that the exam offers tough competition and simultaneously demands considerable time and consistent effort. Most experts recommend that applicants who want to perform well on the exam should take CAT coaching but it is not mandatory.

Here are 10 of the most common mistakes parents make – so do your best to avoid them in your home.

## **Mistake #1: Give your children too many rewards based on achievement or behaviour**

This is a trap that many parents fall into, and for good reason. The first time you try it, it seems to work.

You might tell your children that you'll pay them a dollar each time they get more than 85% for a class test. This seems to work because they start studying harder.

You think to yourself, "Great. Problem solved!"

Then a few weeks later you realise their motivation has waned. They complain that getting a good grade deserves more than one dollar.

An argument breaks out, and you find yourself justifying the price. You even explain that studying hard is their basic responsibility as a student.

If this describes your situation, you're not alone.

## **Mistake #2: Overemphasise the importance of academics**

Parents think that emphasising the importance of academics will motivate their children to work hard.

The problem is that this approach

doesn't turn your children into lifelong learners.

Learning isn't just about getting good grades. It's also about enjoying the process.

When children enjoy learning, they become motivated to keep on learning.

Grades can affect your job prospects, but many great leaders weren't great students. Unfortunately, many of the students I've worked with tell me that their parents seem to think that grades are the only thing that matters.

We now know that there are many different types of intelligence and that the education system only measures some of these.

All parents would agree that social skills, character development, and learning to relax and reflect are also important areas of focus.

When parents dismiss their children's hobbies and games as a waste of time, they hurt their children's feelings and damage the parent-child relationship.

Parents must value and respect their children's activities. Dance and sport can improve kinaesthetic intelligence, and games and discussions can boost intrapersonal intelligence.

These are vital skills for children to learn and carry with them through life.

## **Mistake #3: Supervise your children too closely**

Micromanaging your children produces similar results to micromanaging employees.

It builds resentment, damages relationships, and robs children of valuable learning experiences.

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# How to Help Teens Put Less Pressure on Themselves?

Self-compassion can help teens who are struggling with toxic perfectionism.



My friend's teen daughter, Belen, had a big upcoming exam this past semester. Starting a week before the exam, she studied incessantly. The night before the exam, she hardly slept—she was too nervous, tossing and turning in bed, going through in her mind all the facts that she needed to know, and worrying that she missed something important. When she finally went in to take the test, she was practically paralyzed with fear, and was barely able to think clearly.

This is a really tough time for teens. According to the U.S. Surgeon General in his advisory, the pressure that teens are facing today is unprecedented. And it's not just from the pandemic: According to the 2019 CDC Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance survey, mental health among youth did a nose-dive over the last decade, with depression and sadness increasing by 40%, and those with a suicide plan increasing by 44%.

## What's been going on?

Of course, there are many external

factors that play a role. Lockdowns and school closings have kept teens isolated—at a time when the developmentally appropriate thing to do would be connecting with their peers. According to a report, teens and young adults are stressed from what they hear in the news: gun violence (particularly school shootings and mass shootings), political discord, climate change and global warming, separation and deportation of immigrant families, and sexual assault and harassment.

But here I'd like to focus on something more internal: the exceedingly high standards many teens set for themselves. Whether it's a desire for straight As, flawless skin, or athletic stardom, the quest to stand out as “the best” often drives teens to be relentlessly hard on themselves, which can lead to feelings of unworthiness and depression. Yet knowing that there is a way out—that they don't have to relentlessly beat themselves up in order to be successful and happy—can be enormously

relieving for teens.

## Perfectionism in teens

When my daughter was in high school, she insisted that she take every extra curricular class that was available. We assured her that she'd get into a good college without taking every one. But she insisted, and gave me that classic teen eye roll, which says undeniably, “You just don't know...”

Many teens feel like they aren't good enough unless they are at the top of their class and excel in their sport of choice and are the best at the instrument they play and have a ton of friends and have hundreds of “likes” on whatever they post...you get the idea.

Some of this feeling of not being “good enough” comes from comparing themselves with others, or social comparison. Although it's perfectly natural to measure yourself against others—it is rooted in our inherent need to belong and be accepted—it isn't necessarily good for our mental health.

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## How to Help Teens Put Less Pressure on Themselves?

**Self-compassion can help teens who are struggling with toxic perfectionism.**

For teens, determining your value by comparing yourself with others is perpetuated in schools with grades and GPAs, which make it easy to see precisely how you measure up to your competition. I can still remember what my rank was in my high school graduating class—over 40 years ago! Even worse, social comparison is fueled by social media, where the number of “likes” you receive is a clear indicator of how popular you are. No wonder Franklin Roosevelt said, “Comparison is the thief of joy.” Comparing oneself to others and striving to be perfect is a recipe for mental health problems. We know from research that self-critical perfectionism is linked to depression and anxiety. This is a different kind of perfectionism than what researchers call “personal standards perfectionism,” which simply means setting high goals for yourself without the harsh self-criticism.

### What can we do?

How can we help teens see that it's possible to have high standards for themselves, while at the same time treating themselves kindly? That they can encourage themselves, speaking to themselves kindly—the way they speak to their friends—and, in so doing, keep anxiety and depression at bay?

### Ways to combat perfectionism

Simply put, teens can learn how to be more self-compassionate. Self-compassion teaches us to treat ourselves with kindness and support. As defined by Kristin Neff, self-compassion is being aware that you're struggling, understanding that difficult emotions like hurt, anger, disappointment, and loneliness are part of the human condition, and then taking an active role in supporting and

comforting yourself when you're feeling this way.

In one study among teens in Australia, for example, when teens were more self-compassionate, being perfectionistic was less likely to lead to depression. The same



thing happened in another study among Chinese undergraduates: Those who were more self-compassionate were less likely to be depressed.

It is possible for teens to learn to be more self-compassionate. Self-compassion can be cultivated and nurtured, and various self-compassion programs have been developed and tested. One is ‘Making Friends with Yourself’, which has been found to result in lower anxiety, depression, and stress.

In the self-compassion program, teens learn that they don't have to treat themselves harshly in order to motivate themselves. Second, they learn about common humanity—that other teens are struggling just like them. Although this may be obvious to adults, teens often feel like they are the only ones struggling, and that their peers are confident happy campers, strolling through the teen years without

real care.

Teens learn short meditation practices that they can do on the spot, whenever they're feeling upset or anxious, and longer meditation practices that they can do when they have the time. Most

importantly, teens learn that they have the ability within themselves to treat themselves with kindness, and that they don't have to wait for someone else to treat them kindly. Furthermore, they don't have to be perfect to be deserving of being treated well; that all of us roaming on this planet are imperfect, and being imperfect is, well, perfectly OK.

As for Belen, my friend's daughter, she's learning to be more self-compassionate. Of course, she still has to study—self-compassion doesn't let you off the hook from doing your work. In fact, she's studying just as much, but doesn't have the same fear of failing as she once did. She knows that if she fails a test, it doesn't mean that she's not a worthy and valuable good person; failing doesn't change who she is. She'll just have to regroup, and think of what's her best and most effective strategy going forward.

# Meet 2013 CBSE topper, IIT-Roorkee alumnus Sopan Khosla who works as an AI scientist at Amazon



## Sopan Khosla

“Graduate applications do not give much heed to school performance. So apart from temporary publicity and a good name for my hometown Jabalpur, I don't think a lot changed long-term after my Class 12 board results,” says Sopan Khosla.

Sopan Khosla (26) topped the CBSE Class 12 Board examinations in 2013 with 99% in science. A student of Delhi Public School in Jabalpur, he pursued BTech (2013-17) at IIT Roorkee, where he was awarded the director's gold medal for outstanding all-round achievement and a master's degree (2019-21) from Carnegie Mellon University in the US. Khosla is an applied scientist at Amazon Web Services AI Labs in California.

### Q. What's the best thing about your work?

I get to work on what I love while impacting millions of users. Disentangling valuable signals from the ambiguity of communication has been a long-term interest of mine. A successful interaction, for example, a

dialogue, is dependent on the mutual understanding of the world-models of all parties. As humans, when we talk to other humans, we take in subtleties beyond the mere set of symbols and sounds. We make assumptions that leverage common-sense, interpersonal relationships, and world knowledge to better understand the other person's needs, intentions, and emotions. In my job, I work towards building AI systems that can capture such hidden (semantic and pragmatic) signals from their conversations with customers. So, the systems can now better understand the customer's goals, and help them take actions towards fulfilling those goals.

### Q. What are the habits from school or college life that have stood you in good stead?

The major ones have been perseverance and discipline. Whether lifting heavier weights, learning a new sport, or doing research, these two have always been the make or break for me.

People talk about talent as if it is an inherent ability to be good at something or that one can only be born with it. I would firmly push back on that and posit that like everything else, “talent” can be (and has to be) developed through discipline and perseverance.

### Q. In hindsight, one thing you wish you had done differently in school or college or life?

I wish I had explicitly sought collaborations and contacts during my Masters at Carnegie Mellon University. I don't know whether it was because of the Covid-19 pandemic, the remote classes, or just hesitation, but I should have approached more people during my tenure there.

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# Sopan Khosla who works as an AI scientist at Amazon



It is astonishing how many doors that can open for you. While most of us might think that we are aiming to get into a top-tier undergrad college because they have good professors or great research facilities, or we would get to learn something about a subject not taught anywhere else in the country. Sorry, to burst the bubble, but most people (including myself) don't remember much about the subjects they took in those four years, and most professors are not good teachers. That is just the sad truth. The biggest things I cherish from my undergrad days are the connections I made with other students. Some on an emotional level, some on an "admiration" level. Both of which have been equally important for me throughout. I wish I had done the same during my Master's too, especially with people who have very similar expertise to mine.

## Q. Could you talk about what helped you top the Board exam?

Extracurriculars and school. Yup, you saw it right the first time, School!! "Dekhiye padhai toh sab karte hain (Look, everybody studies)" is an infamous line from

one of the interviews I gave (in my naivety, ofcourse) after the 12th board results.

In all seriousness, what helped me do well in boards and competitive exams were these outlets. There is just too much pressure! The society builds these great colleges with the promise of golden palaces and cars thereafter. So to get admissions into such esteemed institutions for two straight years, our teens do one thing and one thing only — study. Studying for five hours? How about increasing it to six? How about you study so much that you are solving Physics questions in your sleep?! This builds up so much tension.

Things like music and badminton gave me that escape I needed to crawl through those two years of continuous stress. School, for me, was a place to interact with friends and teachers, participate in events and ultimately take my mind off things.

## Q. What doors opened for you after being a national ranker?

Honestly, not much. I went to IIT Roorkee for my undergrad. Its admission process does not consider board marks. Graduate applications give little heed to school performance. So apart from temporary publicity, a good name for Jabalpur, and occasional bullying, I don't think a lot changed long-term after my Class 12 board results.

## Q. How different are you from the young boy who topped the exam

several years ago? Tell us how you have changed...

As compared to who I was in 2012-13, I think, I have come out of my shell a little bit. During that time, I was always worrying about the future. Having not done anything until then, I was unsure of myself. I didn't really have any significant data points to build that self-belief.

Things have changed for the better, slowly, but still. I have more trust in myself when it comes to taking on hard challenges. I know that I can do anything I set my mind on. But maybe more importantly, the thought of failure, in general, does not have that crippling effect on me anymore. Along the way, I have been fortunate enough to have gathered memories and experiences that I can lean on to pull myself back up again.

## Q. Looking back at your school education, with the benefit of hindsight, what is the one thing you think should change or improve?

Subjects that provide education about finance, investment, and commerce should be included in the curriculum regardless of the chosen stream.

# Best Career Options for LLB Graduates

The legal profession in India has witnessed numerous changes over the years. Lawyers are no longer confined to the courtrooms where they represent their clients. Legal graduates today work in a variety of settings, including corporations, IT firms, administrative services, law firms, and corporate houses.

Lawyers in India are not restricted to the three branches of government: legislature, executive, and judiciary. With constantly changing legislation, it's more necessary than ever for businesses to get legal counsel that can address new requirements in various industries.

We currently live in an extraordinary world. Thousands of people are losing their employment as a result of the COVID outbreak. ## Best career options for LLB graduates

### Litigation

Litigation entails advocating for clients in a court of law. Before you can practice on the court, you must first meet certain prerequisites. The requirements are- an LL.B. degree, the 'Certificate of Practice' obtained after passing the *Bar Council Exam*, and membership in the Bar Council of the state in which you desire to practice. This procedure turns you into an "advocate".

As an advocate, certain characteristics provide you with an advantage. These include the capacity to communicate with clients, as well as a flair of persuasiveness (which aids in making an impression on the presiding Judge), and lastly organizational and managerial skills (as litigation involves getting loads of paperwork completed on time).

### Law firm

A law firm is another way to enter the field of litigation. A law firm is a partnership that employs lawyers to represent clients. A law company might either specialize in one area of practice

or practice in various fields.

It is currently common for law undergraduates to intern for a legal firm over a period of internship breaks, with the law company finally offering them a pre-placement position (PPO). This is a win-win situation for all sides because the legal firm hires someone who is familiar with the firm's operations and expectations, and the graduate receives an employment opportunity on a silver platter. You can either undertake legal research, drafting, and paperwork in a law office or represent a client in court. To qualify for the latter, you must first be an advocate.

### Judicial services

The judiciary is another legal job option for fresh graduates. This entails taking the individual state's Judicial Services Examination and, if chosen, serving as a Civil Judge or Judicial Magistrate. Questions related to current events, English, substantive and procedural civil and criminal law, property law, contract law, and other topics are included in the exam.

### Corporate sector

Every firm or business organization engages in day-to-day operations that involve legal complexities. The advice of a legal practitioner is frequently valued, whether it is for the design of a contract or for advice on the legal implications of any activity.

Working in a corporate office's legal department entails creating

contracts, negotiating, advising on mergers and acquisitions, insolvency, and maintaining corporate compliance, among other things.

One must first look for a vacancy in a company's legal department and then apply for it. This is usually accomplished by going to their official website and emailing the application paperwork to the company's HR Manager.

## Judicial Clerk

When it comes to deciding cases or making up for the mistake, every judge needs help. This task is done by the Judicial Clerk who is essentially an assistant to the Judge in conducting research on the cases that are in front of the judge. The duties of a judicial clerk vary from one court to the other and from one judge to the other. The requirements of a Judicial Clerk are as follows:

- A candidate must be a citizen of India and not be below the age of 18 years and above 27 years as of the last date of receipt of applications.

- The candidate must be a law graduate with a Bachelor's Degree in Law (including an Integrated Degree Course in Law) from any school/college/university/ institution established by law in India and recognized by the Bar Council of India for enrolment as an Advocate.

- Candidates enrolled in the fifth year of the Five-Year Integrated Law Course will be allowed to apply if they can show proof of obtaining a law qualification at the time of the interview/before starting the assignment as a Law Clerk/Research Assistant.

- The candidate must be computer literate, including the ability to retrieve needed information via search engines/processes such as Manupatra, SCC Online, LexisNexis, Westlaw,

and others.

## Human Rights lawyer

Human rights lawyers are at the forefront of the fight against breaches of human rights all around the world. They take on cases involving their clients' inherent dignity. Vulnerable populations, marginalised groups, women, children, indigenous peoples, refugees, LGBTI communities, and others have their rights protected.
