Message from Father Apostolos



Fear No Evil

One Saturday evening 30-plus years ago Denise and I were hanging out at her parents' house huddled by the radio, eagerly waiting to hear the debut of one of the tunes my band had recorded. It was an ethereal jazz-rock tune titled "Fear No Evil" and it would become one of the more popular songs in the band's repertoire, decrying the fear so prevalent in the world. Nothing has changed since those heady days of our youth filled with weekend concerts and trips to the recording studio; fear is still a staple of daily life.

If anything, the industry of fear has become more ruthlessly efficient in engendering fear and its correlates, anger, violence, and suspicion, within the hearts and minds of the world's citizens as news organs churn out an unbroken litany of fear-inducing news accounts. But to protest the ubiquity of fear-mongering in the guise of news accounts is not to say that fearsome

events aren't actually present in the world. Criminal activity, terror attacks, war-ravaged nations and tidal waves of displaced souls sent fleeing from certain death surely present fearsome images of the often tenuous nature of "peace in our time."

I joked recently after watching an especially shrill evening news broadcast, one that featured terrorist plots, extreme weather, the outbreak of a new virus, and bad economic news that maybe we should go hide in the closet until the "all clear" was sounded. What would the purveyors of such artfully-packaged fear-as-news have to gain that such resources are expended in its production?

A steady diet of fear renders a people malleable and open to courses of action unthinkable in its absence. Fear encourages the acceptance of draconian measures and the surrender of hard-won freedoms. Fear sets neighbor against neighbor and assigns blame and culpability to whichever religious, cultural, national, or "foreign" group that finds itself in the cross-hairs at the moment.

But fear should not be so much as named among committed Christians; at least not fear as defined and understood in the vernacular.

Holy Scripture has quite a lot to say about fear as you may well imagine. The 23rd Psalm contains the line our band used to write the tune; "though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death I will fear no evil for Thou art with me." The Lord Jesus Christ cautioned His Disciples not to fear those who can kill the body but instead to fear the one who can drag our souls into hell. (Matt. 10:28) and St. Paul wrote to his spiritual son, Timothy; "For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power, and love, and of a sound mind." (2 Tim. 1:7)

Wise Solomon once wrote that "the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom" (Prov. 9:10) and every Divine Liturgy witnesses the invitation to receive the Body and Blood of Christ "with the fear of God, with faith, and with love." The challenge of fear lies in its direction and not merely in its presence; in other words, we have a tendency to fear the wrong things!

Angry mobs can be incited to form and to chant hateful, bigoted things in response to events continents away and yet very few fear that inevitable moment when the soul slips the confines of the body to wend its way either to Paradise or Gehenna.

The prospect of a sustained economic downturn engenders more fear within our ranks than whether or not our young people are walking with Christ. We're capable of far greater depths of fear over the outcome of national elections than we are when we approach the Chalice unprepared to receive "the Fire that burns the unworthy," as one of our prayers before Holy Communion states.

If the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom then let us choose to be wise! And as wise men and women who rest secure in the mercy of the God "who desires that all men should be saved and come to the knowledge of the Truth," (1 Tim. 2:4) let our godly fear be directed with reverence toward the One who alone transforms fear, faith, and love into blessed communion with Him.

But let us cannily resist the "spirit of fear" that does not come from God but is so prevalent in the world and instead keep our gaze squarely focused on the Almighty God whose providence directs our lives.



Wednesday Bible Study



There was never a question that our youngest child would attend HTA. We weren't interested in other Christian-based programs and sending him to a vanilla franchised preschool was simply out of the question. We wanted him to go



What is Apokries?

Apokries in Greece is a special time filled with fun, laughter, and of course, food. The tradition of Apokries started so that the Christian people could celebrate and indulge before the great 40 day Lent of Easter.

It lasts for three weeks before this period of fasting begins. People dress in masquerade, play games and jokes, have a huge parade, and throw sweets to the observers. People are dressed in costumes with masks, depending on the local traditions, and play jokes on the pedestrians. This takes place only at night. Also, kids and adults knock on the doors of the houses and the homeowners try to guess who they are. Sweets, usually homemade, are offered to the "μασκαράδες (people in masquerade)".

The first day of Lent follows the last Sunday of Apokries. The day is called " $K\alpha\theta\alpha\rho\dot{\eta}$ $\Delta\epsilon$ ut $\dot{\epsilon}\rho\alpha$ " which literally means "Clean Monday".

What is Clean Monday / Η Καθαρή Δευτέρα?


The first day of the great 40 day fasting period for the Greek Orthodox Christians is Clean Monday. The name "Clean" came about because the housewives, in the past years, were symbolically cleaning, getting ready for the Sarakosti ($\Sigma \alpha \rho \alpha \kappa \sigma \tau \dot{\eta}$).

The families go out to the park and have a picnic. They eat and drink laying down on the fresh spring grass and kids fly their kites all day.






