# Message from Father Apostolos

## The Meaning of Holy Communion



There was a moment two months ago, just before the beautiful decorations of Christmas were to be stored away for the year, that I thought to myself; "When next these ornaments and strings of garland come out of their boxes, the world will have changed." Little could I have anticipated how quickly change would come.

Immunologists have long cautioned the world about the inevitability of a virus breaking containment and wreaking havoc. Netflix even released just recently a documentary series titled "Pandemic." It is almost too contemporary to be considered prophetic. That we failed to take seriously enough their many warnings is now obvious to all.

But beyond the grim 24/7 news cycle, beyond the unsettling specter of grocery shelves stripped bare, of shuttered restaurants and retail stores, of Wall Street on its knees, and of jobs and livelihoods lost, we are being provided a moment to contemplate in a prayerful and meaningful way whether or not the changes that are coming will be good or bad ones.

One of the changes that has been forced upon us concerns our momentary inability to gather together to comprise the Body of Christ in worship. As an act of co-suffering love, we are refraining from coming together in order to stop the rapid spread of the COVID-19 virus to buy our heroic nurses and physicians the time they need to minister to the afflicted.

To do so is an act of extreme ascesis. During the Lenten Season when we would be gathering throughout the week for corporate prayer, we cannot do so safely. The State of Emergency in Maricopa county and the City of Phoenix, and the guidelines from the CDC limit public gatherings to no more than ten souls. And in view of these strictures and the risks which ensue upon flouting them, our His All-Holiness Patriarch Bartholomew, Archbishop Elpidophoros, and Metropolitan Gerasimos have each enjoined us to obey them.

Specifically, we are instructed by our Hierarchs to offer the Divine services *only* electronically via live-streaming service to various social media platforms as we are doing. We priests have also been instructed in this Metropolis not to offer Holy Communion until these strictures are lifted. His Eminence, Gerasimos, made very clear his reasoning on a conference call with all Metropolis clergy this week.

In the last several days and until this final edict was announced, I have mulled over many conceivable plans whereby you might safely receive the Holy Gifts. I am certain you understand how disturbing it is for priests to be rendered unable to administer the holy mysteries. To do so is the very reason that each of us entered the Holy Priesthood.

But it would be reckless for any priest to expose the faithful to harm or even death. To do so would be to fail in our duty as shepherds. And having just witnessed our son's struggle and my sister's struggle with this virus, I have gained an insight into how lethal it is, even to a young and healthy person. To the elderly and to those with underlying health challenges, COVID-19 can be deadly.

His Eminence reminded the brothers that the very term "Communion" describes the start-to-finish reality of the Holy Eucharist and not simply to the culminating moment of approaching the Chalice. Correctly understood, it is never accurate to state that one "gets communion" or that one "takes communion," nor to speak of "receiving *my* communion." Communion is always experienced in community and never individually. Holy Communion must not be reduced to a commodity.

The Holy Canons of the Church which regulate and guide the act of public worship reinforce this point again and again. It is the entirety of the shared experience when the faithful gather in the Lord's Name to comprise the Church, to manifest it and to make it visibly present, that can be accurately described as Communion.

To reduce the Eucharist to the mere act of receiving the Holy Gifts, no matter what method utilized to limit the risk of exposure to harm, is to reduce the Body and Blood of Christ to something magical, something "lucky." It is the totality of worship, the litany of "Kyrie eleisons" and "amens" and the consent and active participation of the faithful that create the precise liturgical conditions whereby true Liturgy occurs.

And for now, as an ascesis of co-suffering love to our family, friends, and neighbors, and to all healthcare providers, we are unable to meet the conditions of true worship. I pray that you understand how immensely painful, how challenging, it has been to offer the Divine Oblation to an empty house, meeting only the minimal canonical conditions of worship! My first instinct was to forego the sacred offering until reminded that each and every Divine Liturgy is also offered "for the life of the world."

In time, this shadow of death will have retreated from our lands. We have the assurance of the Good Shepherd that even in the valley of this shadow we may rest secure in His provision for us. And until that time I will offer the Oblation through my own tears on your behalf and in the hope that we will be reunited again in the community of Faith.

The marvel of technology allows Alexander and me to bring our robust liturgical schedule into your homes on a variety of social media platforms. (Please note the detailed instructions in this Desert Springs edition which explain how you can tune in!)

I do not want to lose even one dearly beloved member of our Cathedral family to this virus, not when avoiding such a tragedy is as simple as staying out of its way! It remains my fervent hope that no later than at the leave-taking of Holy Pascha, these strictures will be lifted and we can gather together - albeit belatedly - to celebrate the Holy Resurrection of Christ!

The world has indeed already changed because of the COVID-19 virus. There will be no return to the exact conditions of our lives as they existed even one month ago. But the trajectory of this change is in our hands, whether or not we seize this opportunity to listen to the voice of God in the enforced silence of our sequestration.

Will we assess the health of our interior lives, of our relationships, our family dynamics, of the shape of our society? Will we emerge from this crisis kinder? Wiser? Holier? And will our Holy Trinity Cathedral family emerge from this painful period of separation more united than before? More cohesive? And more grateful for the precious moments we spend together which before we may have taken for granted? I believe the answer to these questions will be a thunderous "YES!"

And when we next gather to celebrate without fear or apprehension the Holy Eucharist, we will experience a true Communion at a depth of joy and gratitude we've never before imagined. May we *fervently and ceaselessly* beseech Almighty God for this and for His grace and mercy to flow into the tireless healthcare workers in the trenches of this battle and into the afflicted bodies of the virus's victims.

If we cannot now become a people of prayer in the face of such challenges, then we will never be. God is never more in control than when He appears not to be. All that He does or allows, He does out of unspeakable love and with a view toward our eternal disposition, not just toward our temporal comfort.

May we bathe our lives in prayer "for the life of the world" as we await that joyful moment of our reunion!

- In 2019 the average pledge per family was more than \$1,200 per year.



# St. Nectarios Books & Beyond

#### Commemoration of The Great and Holy Feast of Pascha

Holy Week comes to an end at sunset of Great and Holy Saturday, as the Church prepares to celebrate her most ancient and preeminent festival, Pascha, the feast of feasts. The time of preparation will give way to a time of fulfillment. The glorious and resplendent light emanating from the empty Tomb will dispel the darkness. Christ, risen from the dead,



cracks the fortress of death and takes "captivity captive" (Psalm 67:19). All the limitations of our createdness are torn asunder. Death is swallowed up in victory and life is liberated. "For as by a man came death, by a man came also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive" (I Corinthians 15:21-22). Pascha is the dawn of the new and unending day. The Resurrection constitutes the most radical and decisive deliverance of humankind.



The Resurrection of Jesus Christ is the fundamental truth and absolute fact of the Christian faith. It is the central experience and essential kerygma of the Church. It confirms the authenticity of Christ's remarkable earthly life and vindicates the truth of His teaching. It seals all His redemptive work: His life, the model of a holy life; His compelling and unique teaching; His extraordinary works; and His awesome, life-creating death. Christ's Resurrection is the guarantee of our salvation. Together with His Ascension it brings to perfection God's union with us for all eternity.

The Resurrection made possible the miracle of the Church, which in every age and generation proclaims and affirms "God's plan for the universe, the ultimate divinization of man and the created order." The profound experience of and the unshakable belief in the risen Lord enabled the Apostles to evangelize the world and empowered the Church to overcome paganism. The Resurrection discloses the

indestructible power and inscrutable wisdom of God. It disposes of the illusory myths and belief systems by which people, bereft of divine knowledge, strain to affirm the meaning and purpose of their existence. Christ, risen and glorified, releases humanity from the delusions of idolatry. In Him, grave-bound humanity discovers and is filled with incomparable hope. The Resurrection bestows illumination, energizes souls, brings forgiveness, transfigures lives, creates Saints, and gives joy.

The Resurrection has not yet abolished the reality of death. But it has revealed its powerlessness (Hebrews 2:14-15). We continue to die as a result of the Fall. Our bodies decay and fall away. "God allows death to exist but turns it against corruption and its cause, sin, and sets a boundary both to corruption and sin." Thus, physical death does not destroy our life of communion with God. Rather, we move from death to life - from this fallen world to God's reign.

#### Icon of the Commemoration of Great and Holy Pascha

One of the most symbolic of the Festal Icons of the Orthodox Church is that of the Holy Resurrection. In the center of this radiant event is Christ pulling Adam and Eve up from their tombs. The gates of the Realm of Death are broken and thrown down. Death, personified in human form is defeated, and bound hand and foot at the bottom of the scene. We recall the joyous words of St. Paul: "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?" (1 Corinthians 15:55)

In the background stands the host of the departed, so numerous they cannot be depicted. Among them in the front of the multitude are some of the righteous dead, though now invigorated by the Resurrection. King David and his son Solomon are seen on the left wearing crowns. Near the center is Saint John the Baptist. On the other side is Abel, the son of Adam and the first man to ever die. He wears a shepherd's robe and has a cane. Many Icons of this subject depict large crowds with a few other recognizable prophets.







# Message from Pastoral Assistant Alexander Eliades

#### Well This is Different



We find ourselves in an unprecedented time. At no time in our recent history has society stopped to such an extent as this. Public gatherings are essentially forbidden (even with just friends!), restaurants and businesses are all closed, even our church is shuttered to the public out of obedience to civil and ecclesiastical authorities. There is a statement circling online, the gist of which is, "In WWII we were asked to sacrifice our lives to save the world, today we're being asked to sit on the couch to save the world."

It's obviously an oversimplification of both situations and in no way approaches the sacrifice of the "Greatest Generation" but shows what we're asked to do. Our lives are changed and we can find it hard to find stability and solace in these uncertain times. Usually this would be the time where we would flock to the

Church and find this solace in the Lord and yet we find we must worship the Liturgy in front of a screen; it is hardly a substitute. So what do we do?

Fr. Stephen Andrew Damick wrote a beautiful article on this entitled, "Prepare Now to Return to Church" (Google it and read it!). What does this mean? Well, he tells us to create the habits now that we want to continue after this has all ended (which it will by God's Grace!). As we are in this unprecedented time, let us take up our Cross, love each other, come closer to God, and do the hard and good things we need to do! 
